Our school dances. Lets just put it this way, there was no sipping tea and talking about literature during these occasions.







olunteering dedicated time and energy is the key to helping our youths of American today. This is the goal of the National Youth Service Day Rally, held here at Northeast April 20, 1993.






AS ELECTIONS



Although we will all choose different plans and go our separate ways, we would never trade the memories of our Northeast days


We are the Vikings and for the future we are willing to fight!



"The team competed in many meets and did very well," says Coach Wade, "many returning athletes gives hope to a brighter '93 season."












YOUTH COURT






ACADEMICS

The Partners in Excellence (PIE) program is for college bound students who wish to get a head start on college credit hours. The program coordinator is Kim Monroe who has worked with this program for three years.

The program is available to juniors or seniors in high school. There are approximately 20 high schools, including the Kansas City School District, that are participating in this program. There are currently 300 students who are involved in the program, and 37 of them are from Northeast.

To become part of this program, interested students had to take a placement test to help them choose a class. Kim Monroe helps students keep informed of activities and workshop dates. The workshops are provided for students in high school and college as well. To complete the requirements of the program, students have to attend two workshops, their regular class, and fill out bimonthly forms that report on their attendance to college.

At the end of the program is an awards assembly where students receive a certificate of completion at their high school. There is also an awards ceremony for students and parents at the end of the semester.
