The history of Northeast High School dates back to 1911, when the proposal for a new high school was discussed and endorsed by the Northeast Improvement Association.

A committee, which consisted of R. A. Long, Col. F. W. Fleming, E. C. Meservey and J. E. McFee, consulted with the school board about building the high school. On November 2, the Board of Education officially purchased land along the boulevard for \$30,000. The site of the school, 415 S. Van Brunt, measured 600 feet north and south and 249 feet east and west.

Soon after the purchase of the land, a committee was sent east to study high schools. One year later, construction of the building began in the spring of 1912.

There was a movement to name the school James M. Greenwood High School to honor the former superintendent but when the building was christened on April 13, 1913, it was named Northeast. At the time, the building was unfinished and students had to attend the old Central High School, located at 11th and Locust, from September to April. The school's enrollment was 707. (At the time Central, Westport and Manual were the only high schools in the Kansas City School District.)

The first principal of Northeast High School was C. B. Reynolds who was appointed on March 19, 1913, with C. H. Nowlin as the Vice-Principal. Mr. Reynolds spent several months assembling a faculty and planning the curricular and extra-curricular offerings. When the 1913-14 school year began in September, Reynolds was principal of the Northeast "school-within-a-school." at Central. The Northeast student body moved to the completed high school in April. The seniors of the first graduating class were in the new high school only a few weeks before graduating at Assembly Hall on June 9, 1914.

During that year, the school colors, purple and white, were chosen and the name "Nor'Easter" was chosen as the name of the yearbook and newspaper. At the time the yearbook and newspaper were jointly managed, but they were eventually split and they named the newspaper the "Northeast Courier."

School clubs organized quickly and the Treble Clef Club was considered the first school organization. The growth of the school clubs led to the organization of nine societies and 15 clubs including a Glee club, German club, Alpha Literary club, the Northeast Society of Debate and the Shakespeare club.

Aside from the many school clubs that formed, the features of Northeast made it one of the most up-to-date schools in Kansas City at that time.

Unusual features included the swimming pool, a lunchroom and kitchen, an outside athletic field and running track, a gymnasium with an iron spiral staircase leading to the track above, large auditorium, an emergency room and rest parlors for teachers. Other special features included sliding blackboards and a model apartment in the home economics department.

Since its inception Northeast High School has only had ten principals and approximately 25 vice-principals. The principal with the longest tenure has been Mr. Stephen Brown, Jr., who has been in charge since 1979.

Through the years, Northeast became well-noted for its academic achievements, athletics and R.O.T.C. program. Today, the school strives to maintain its historical integrity as a new kind of up-to-date school focusing on the magnet themes of Law, Public Service and Military Science. Former yearbook editor, Donald Click, envisioned great things for the future students the feeling of accomplishment and pride on which they may build a greater school."

In hopes of making Northeast a greater school, two men, who shared many fond memories of their alma mater, Carl DiCapo and Rex Hull, class of 1944, decided to form an Alumni Association.



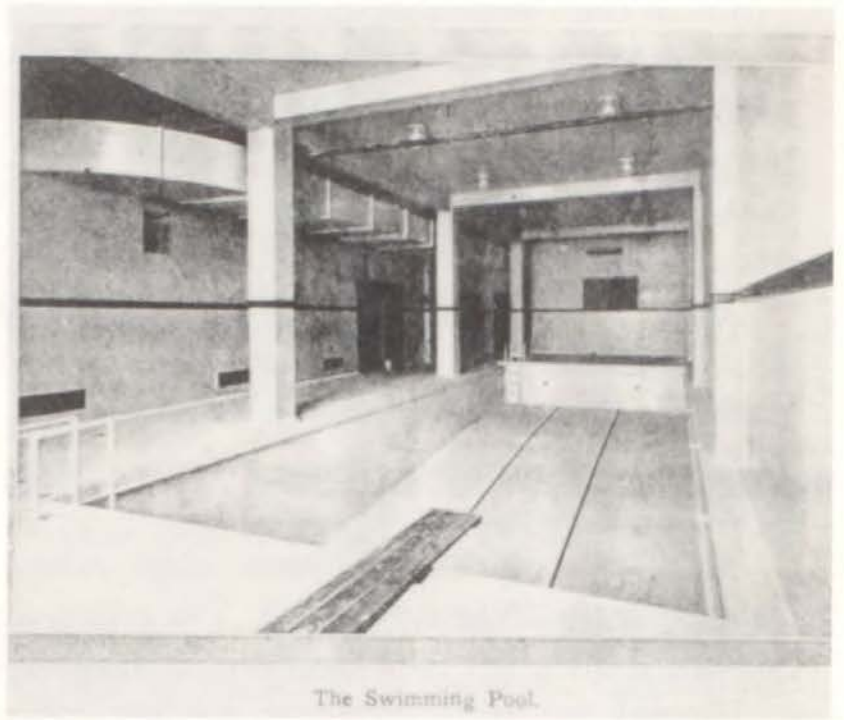

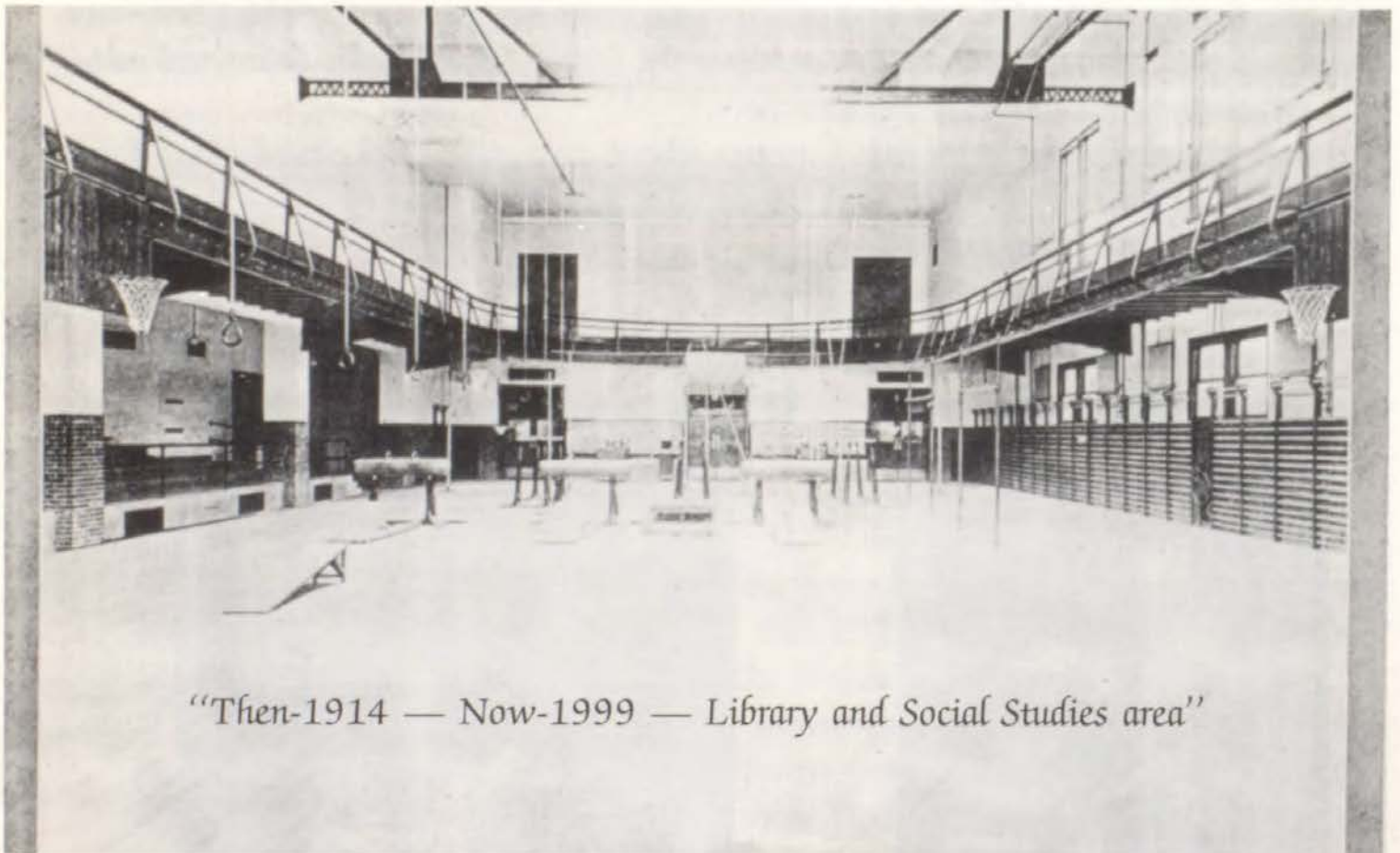

About Our Scholarships

The Northeast Alumni Association awards two scholarships each year. The Markey-Peters Scholarship is a \$2,500 scholarship to the college of the recipients choice. Students with the necessary qualifications apply for this scholarship in April. Members of the Scholarship Committee review the applications taking into consideration subjects taken, grades achieved, ranking in class, teacher evaluation, students' employment, extra curricular activities, family background and financial status. The students are interviewed by the committee and a recipient is selected. This scholarship is in honor of Coach E. A. Markey and Coach Reeves Peters. Two of Northeast's finest coaches.

The second and third runners up receives the scholarships established by June Drew Ebensteiner and Frances Drew Whiteside, graduates of the Class of '47. These scholarships are for \$1,000 each and are designated as the Drew Twins' Scholarship. The same criteria applies to the awarding of this scholarship.

We are now providing financial assistance to qualifying students who take courses to receive college credits while attending high school.

We are proud to award these scholarships to students who have made such great strides. It makes this experience rewarding and worthwhile.



Fund Raisers

How are we able to award these scholarships? We are able to achieve this by our two yearly fund raisers, and from membership dues and donations received from Northeast High School Alumni and friends.

In the spring of each year, we sponsor a **Golf Bash**. The golf tournament is held annually at one of the local golf courses. It has been very successful in raising enough money to fund the major part of our yearly Markey-Peters Scholarship.

In the fall we have a dinner/dance. This provides a fun night out for our entire Alumni Association. A raffle is held at the dance made up of items donated by businesses and friends. This function is usually held at the Ararat Shrine Temple.



We have annual or lifetime membership dues to enhance our funds, and we also have Viking golf shirts and hats available.

As the first recipient of the Markey-Peters scholarship, Rachel A. Quintero was given a chance to reach her career goal. After being awarded \$2,500.00, Rachel applied to the University of Missouri Kansas City to further her education in Liberal Arts and Elementary Education. As the senior class president at Northeast in 1989/90, she was awarded a new scholarship by the Alumni Association. This scholarship was given in honor of Coach E. A. Markey and Coach Reaves Peters, two of Northeast High School's legendary coaches. E. A. Markey led his football teams to seven city championships from 1937 to 1955. His undefeated 1948 team allowed only six points to be scored on them, a school record which has never been beaten. Reaves Peters dedicated his life to teaching young athletes, to do their very best. As a man of the highest ideals, he stressed self-respect and earned the respect of his basketball teams. Peters led his teams to eleven city and three state championships from 1948 to 1963. Both of these men were honored in 1988 for their coaching and educational excellence.

Applicants of the Markey-Peters Scholarship are interviewed by the Alumni Association and members of the faculty of Northeast High School. Out of the ten applicants that applied and were interviewed, Rachel was the top choice for the class of 1990. Rachel plans to educate young minds in our greater Kansas City area and is currently a student teacher at Gladstone Elementary School. Persons who received this honor were:

Stephen Brown, Jr. has

served **the longest tenure as principal** in the history of Northeast High School. In a period of turbulent transition, he has steered the Vikings toward the millenium. "I believe," he said "that I was lucky to be at the right place at the right time." "Now," he continued "Northeast and the entire school district will see sig-

nificant changes in the way we deliver instruction to the students and increased accountability to the parents and the community. The students will see a greater emphasis on improving their personal responsibility especially with test achievement and attendance."

Mr. Brown graduated from high school in Joplin, MO and completed his undergraduate degree at Lincoln University. He acquired a Master's Degree from Central Missouri State University and an Education specialist Degree from the University of Missouri — Kansas City. Before starting his teaching career, Mr. Brown spent a tour of duty in the Army, obviously a good grounding for the future principal of the Military Science Magnet.

Mr. Brown held certificates in Social Studies and English when he entered the KCMO School District in 1968. He spent 3 ½ years at Central Junior High School before entering a Management Internship Program for Principals. He held Vice-Principalship from 1971 to 1976 with a short period as an Interim Principal. In 1976-77, he was Vice-Principal of Paseo High School and Principal of Westport Junior High School from 1977-79. In 1979, he was appointed Principal of Northeast High School.

Education is cyclical Mr. Brown commented, "The more things change, the more they stay the same." One thing has not changed at Northeast. "I believe that more than ever, Northeast, is the BEST GETTING BETTER." It is little wonder that Northeast has long been seen as a rock of stability in a sea of change. The Vikings and their leader are ready to face the changes of year 2000.

Northeast and Richard Haskell have become synonymous in the minds of many graduates and their parents. Since 1962, Instructor/Coach Haskell has personified stability and continuity in the physical education and science departments. He is the senior member of the teaching staff with 37 years of service on behalf of Viking students.

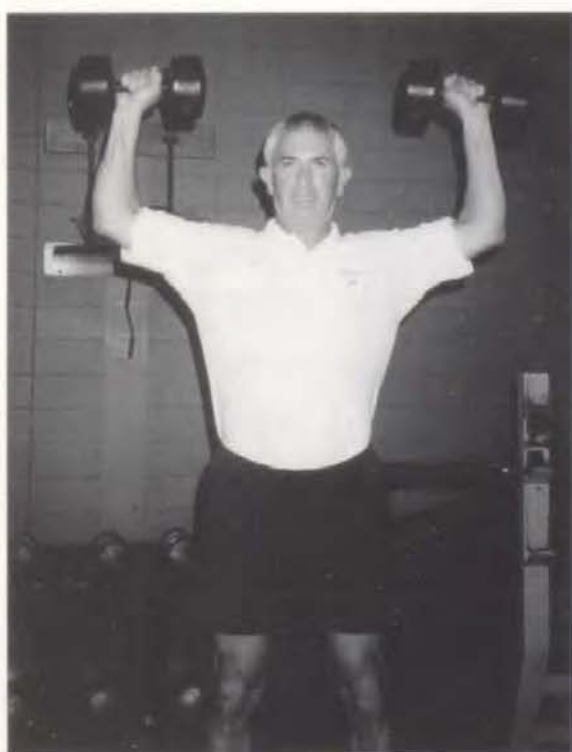
Mr. Haskell has instilled a sense of purpose and determination in thousands of students. He believes and practices the Greek ideal — **a strong mind in a strong body**. He graduated from high school in Norborne, MO ('56), did undergraduate work in physical education and biological science at Missouri Valley College ('60) and pursued graduate studies at Emporia College, University of Northern Colorado and Central Missouri State University (M.S. in Education '68).

Mr. Haskell has been an ardent advocate of physical fitness and interscholastic sports. He participated in high school football, basketball, track and boxing. In college, he played football, ran track and participated in weight lifting. In 1997, Mr. Haskell was inducted into the Missouri Valley College Athletic Hall of Fame. At Northeast, Coach Haskell was a leader by example in football, basketball, track, cross-country and Olympic weight lifting. "I believe that weightlifting" Haskell said "instills the best of mental and physical attributes such self discipline, physical techniques, physical conditioning and competitiveness. It gratifies me to see our students break national records while representing Northeast."

When asked why he has remained at Northeast, Haskell replied "I enjoy the students, staff and the community. My closest friends are Northeast people. Nothing makes me feel better than seeing one of my students succeed in college sports or academics and most importantly in their chosen profession. It is the most rewarding aspect of my teaching career."

Mr. Haskell's interests outside school are definitely active and geared toward the outdoors. "Duke" as his friends call him loves to inline skate, snow ski, boat, water ski, canoe, motorcycle and travel. His spectator favorites include boxing and spring car racing.

When asked to comment about retirement, Haskell said simply, "I still love my job and I enjoy working with the kids especially the lifters. I might stay for a while."



“Failure never crossed my mind.” Harold Hudson was plainly stating the conviction of a man, teacher and coach who succeeded despite the odds. Mr. Hudson was the first black basketball player at Oklahoma University. He attended OUI after winning All-State and All-Oklahoma honors at Purcell High School in Purcell, Oklahoma. In addition to basketball, the high school phenomenon played football, baseball and ran track.

After graduating with a degree in special education, Mr. Hudson taught at Dungee High School in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. He coached basketball during his two year stint.

Harold Hudson came to Kansas City, MO School District in 1964. He taught and coached for 3 years at Central High School and then spent 5 years at Central Jr. High School. He then returned to Central High School for another 6 years. In 1978, he came to Northeast. “Northeast was the first integrated school in which I taught in my career. I have really enjoyed working with students of different cultures and race.”

Harold Hudson has been a real inspiration to the students and staff of Northeast. He is a classic example of the “Best Getting Better.”



In Loving Memory of Timothy LaMont Hall



Timothy LaMont Hall was born in Kansas City, Missouri on February 15, 1974 to Jimmy L. Hall and Joyce Hall.

Tim attended Paseo High School in his ninth and tenth grade years. He transferred to Northeast where he completed his high school career, in 1992. While attending Northeast, Tim played basketball and he gained over a 1000 yards as a running back in football. He ran track with Tim Harden, a 1992 graduate and the 1996 Olympic silver medalist.

In 1994, Tim continued his studies at Kemper Military Junior College in Boonville, Missouri, where he played football. In 1995, he transferred to Robert Morris College in Corapolis, Pennsylvania. Tim starred in football leading the NCAA division 1-AA school in rushing. He was voted the most valuable Robert Morris player in football and track.

In 1996, Tim was a sixth round draft pick for the Oakland Raiders of the NFL.

Tim died on September 30, 1998. He was not only an outstanding athlete, but a highly respected individual by teachers, staff, and his peers. Tim will be greatly missed.

101 Years of Pride

Having lived for over 100 years, Gladys Raymore Wilson has seen and done what many people only dream about. As an independent woman, Gladys, only sees her age as "an minor obstacle."

One of her many accomplishments was to be a graduate of Northeast High School. She graduated in 1915, remembering it as "a very happy time, I felt proud to go to Northeast because so many nice neighborhood people went there. We all walked together to school, rain or shine."



After graduating, Gladys' yearning for knowledge, led her to the University of Missouri at Columbia. At the university, Gladys fulfilled her dream to become a teacher. She wanted to give back what she had received. Although her mom disapproved wanting her to do something "more glamorous" like art or singing. Gladys knew her dream could only be fulfilled if she went with her instincts and became a teacher.

In 1932, she began teaching kindergarten at Fairmount. "Walking in the door on the first day, I remember every child was up out of their seat screaming and yelling even fighting . . . it was horrible. I slowly walked up to the front of the room and just smiled. The children was astonished I didn't scold them but I just smiled. Then one by one, they began to sit down. Later I found out why the last teacher left, she couldn't discipline the children. I never had a problem, children just need a smile a day."

After that year, Gladys went on to teach at McCoy for many years and then to North Rock Creek. She taught for 44 years in the Kansas City School District, retiring in 1976.

I asked Gladys about the difference. She said "parents were different then . . . the world was different. Parents would invite me to Sunday dinner and even take me to the theater. I was treated beautifully. The world was more trusting and appreciative place."

When told she was the oldest living graduate, she said "Oh my, can you believe that." Laughing she went on to say "In two more years, I'll be 103 years old and I'll have lived in parts of three centuries. That's my next goal . . . write that in your yearbook."

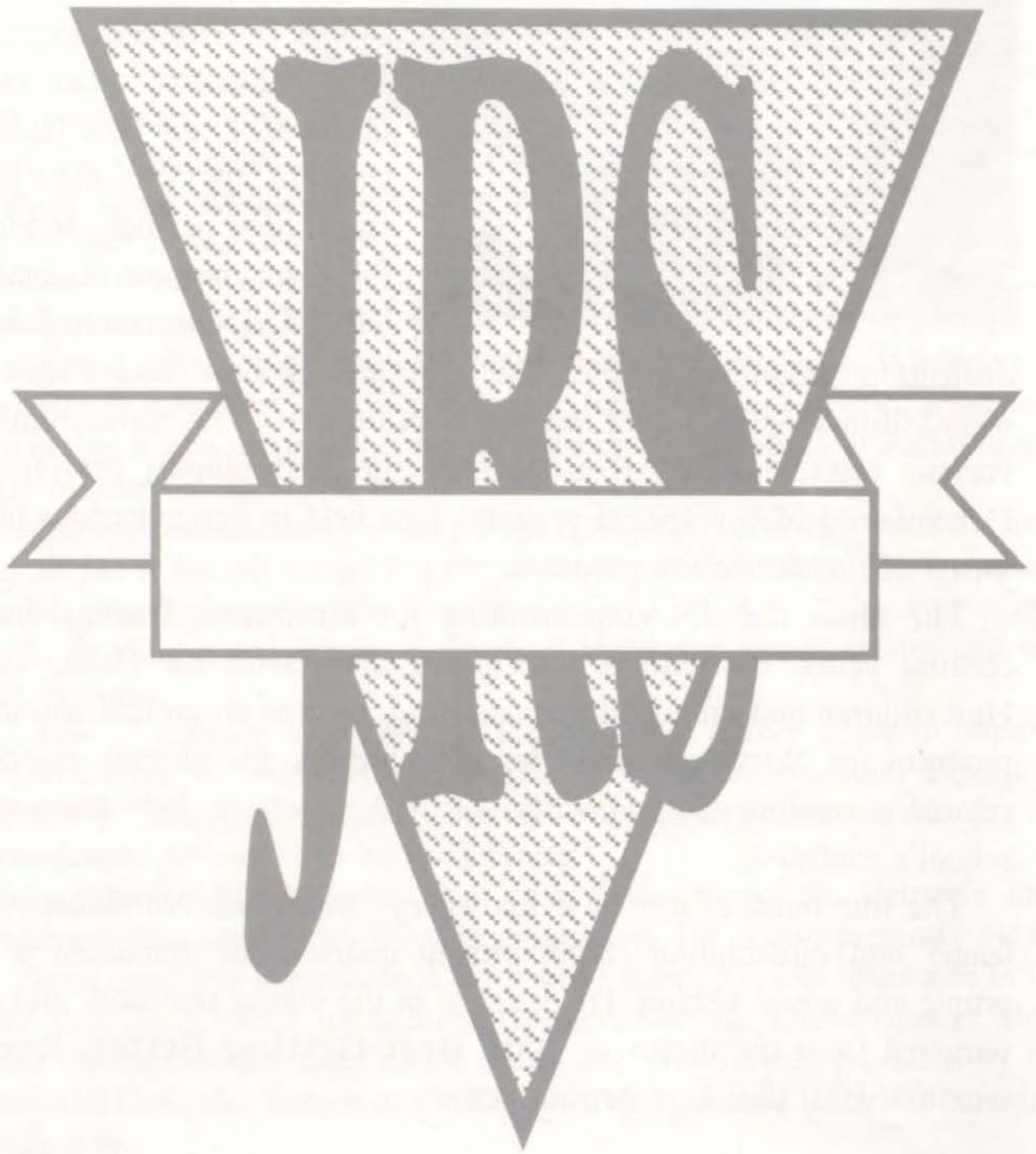

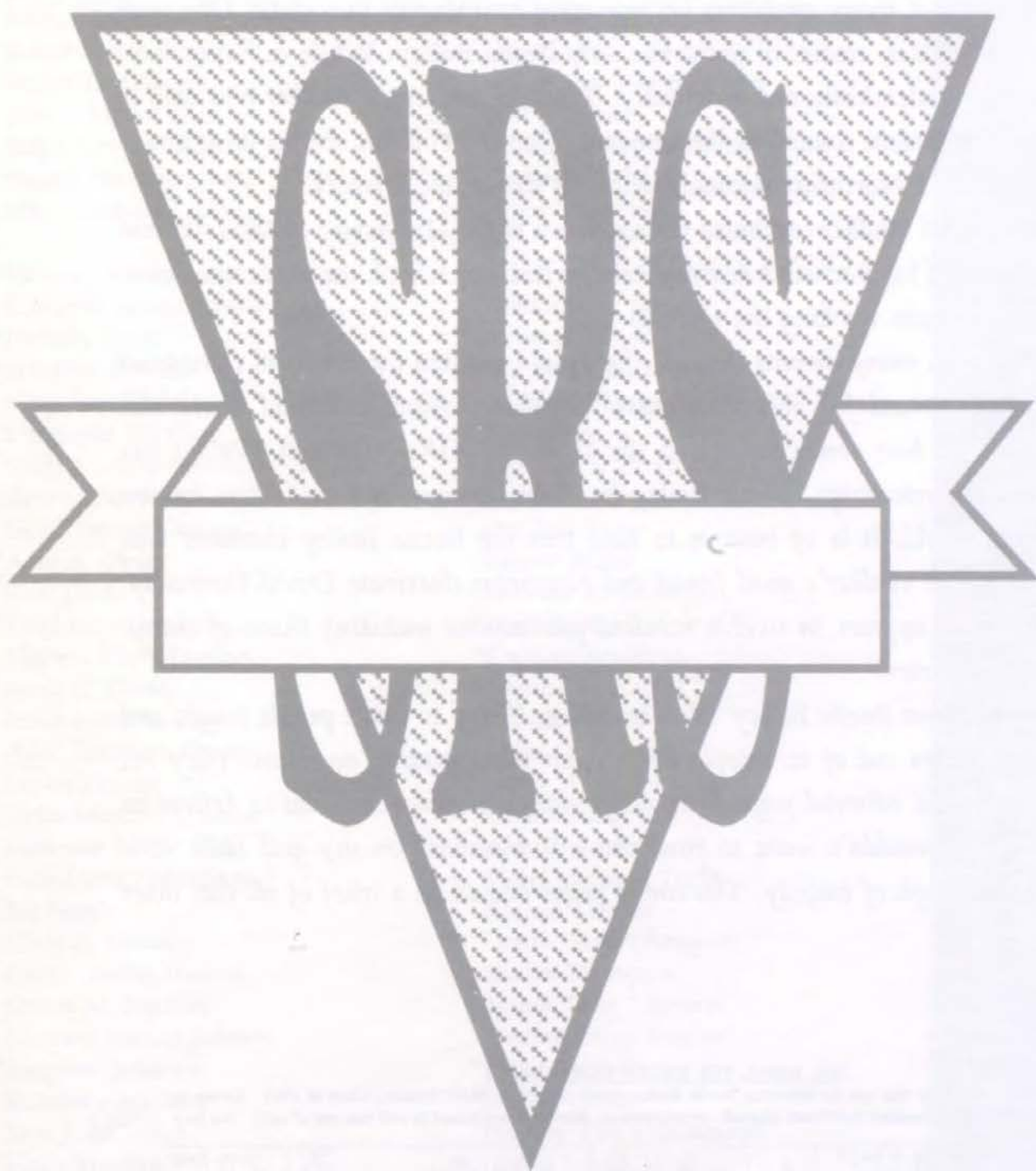

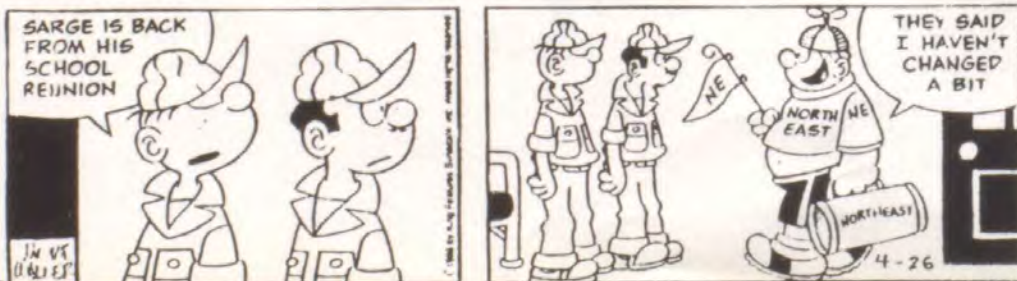

It is of interest to note that the Beetle Bailey character was reportedly based on Walker's good friend and Northeast classmate David Hornaday. Beetle Bailey now appears in twelve hundred publications including those of thirty-seven foreign countries.

When asked about Beetle Bailey Walker replies, "I try to make people laugh, and keep my own views out of it. People don't want ideas pressed on them. They get plenty of that on the editorial page. I wouldn't want a clown in a circus to deliver an ecology speech. I wouldn't want to find anti-war messages on my golf balls. The papers are full enough of tragedy. The comic pages should be a relief of all that other stuff."

Judge William G. Gray

No one can predict the future or know exactly what information or field of study will be particularly relevant in one's life. William Gray believes that Northeast prepared him well to compete effectively in all of life's challenges. Addressing a magnet law class several years ago, he told the students that he endured chemistry but was happy to leave it behind in high school. Years later, the Honorable Judge William G. Gray handled

one of Kansas' most infamous murder cases involving a great deal of technical chemical evidence. "I was surprised how chemistry came back into my life, but as usual, Northeast had prepared me for life's challenges. Whether sitting in a history class or singing in the choir at Northeast, I knew this was the best part of my life. I didn't realize what a wonderful preparation for life (the Navy, the University and law school) Northeast provided me to keep up with graduates from all over the U.S. That is why I have been glad to return each year to work on the annual Markey-Peters Scholarship committee."

Judge Gray was born June 1, 1925 in the Inner-City area between Independence and Kansas City, MO. After Mt. Washington grade school, he attended Northeast Junior and Senior High. Bill married his Northeast sweetheart Virginia Johnson his wife of 44 years until her death in 1989. The couple's closest friends included Viking Classmates.

After the Navy, Bill obtained a BA from Park College and attended Kansas City University for a LLB degree. After 27 years with Newbill, Brannack, Buck & Gray ('48-'56) and in private practice ('56-'75), Governor Bennett appointed him a Corporation Commissioner in 1975 and Governor Carlin named him Judge of the District Court in 1980. Over the years, Judge Gray has held both civic and political posts. He has been proud of his contributions but he has been especially satisfied with his work as member of the Northeast Alumni Association and board member.

As the Judge says 56 years later "I moved on to "Big Time" at Northeast High School."

What is SLIP?

The Summer Law Internship Program is an eight-week program for high school students who have expressed an interest in a career in law. The program was initiated by the Kansas City Metropolitan Bar Association.

Program participants are high school students from Northeast High School. They are selected by the members of the Public Service Committee based on their academic performance, school involvement, teach recommendations and an interview.

ommendations and an interview.

Through a grant from the Lantz Welch Foundation, the students are outfitted in uniforms of blue blazers, khaki pants or skirts and white shirts. The students also receive name tags identifying them as Summer Law interns. In 1998, uniforms were purchased from Nordstrom's.

Kansas City area law firm have agreed to provide the students with full-time jobs the duration of the eight-week program. The students perform a wide variety of job tasks, including acting as couriers, providing office support and answering telephones. Interns are paid directly by the firm.

The Program Administrator is a faculty member of Northeast High School who supervises the student's progress throughout the program. Each student's law firm or company supervisor submits a weekly report on work attendance and performance to the Program Administrator. The Program Administrator works closely with the students' supervisors and deals with special needs or problems of the students or their employers.

The goal of the program is to provide positive work experience for inner city youth. Through their work, the students learn about the legal system, are exposed to a healthy productive work environment and are put in daily contact with lawyers, judges, and other positive role models. In the process, it is hoped that many of these students, in turn, will be encouraged to pursue careers in law.

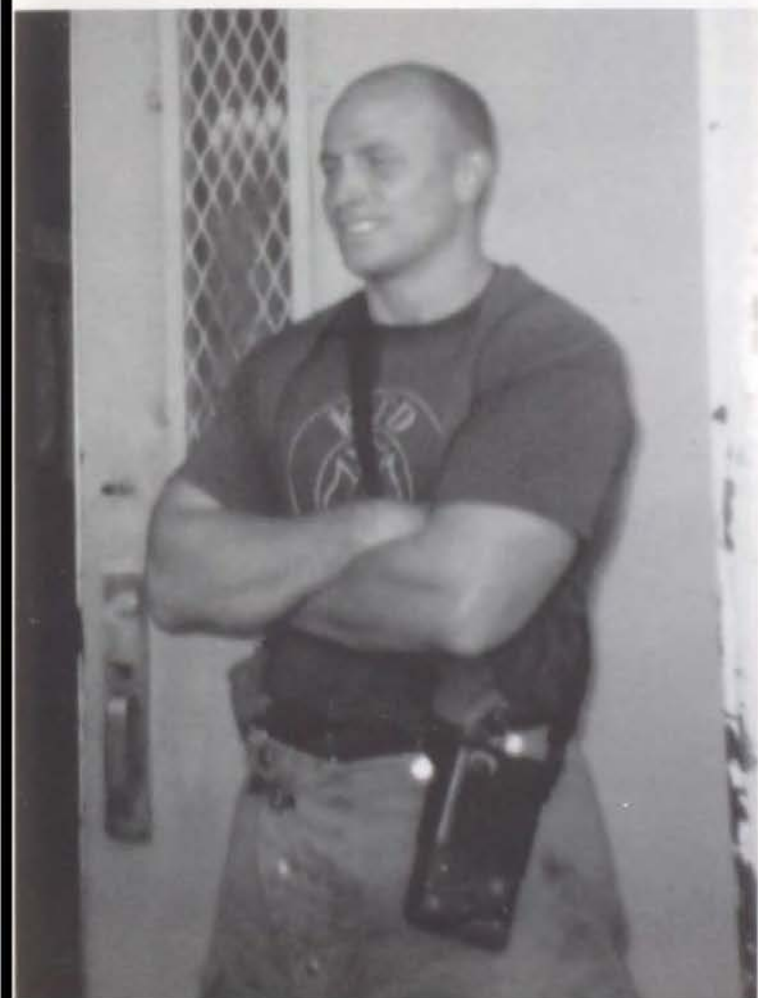

The Life and Times of Maxwell Taylor

Maxwell Taylor was an ambitious young man who excelled beyond his own dreams. In sixth grade, he wrote "major general" as his professional ambition. The answer was too modest by two stars. He was a star student and keen debater who won a high school

competition as an orator at fourteen. Taylor graduated at sixteen and was voted "most genuine boy student" by his senior peers. He took the examinations to Annapolis and West Point and entered West Point in 1918 and graduated in 1922. He was the captain of the tennis team and graduated 4 of 102 and a captain on the regimental staff. The yearbook noted "He is without a doubt one of the most learned scholars of the class."

Taylor's Command and General staff school class at Leavenworth, Ks. included 62 officers who became general officers. Taylor was a noted linguist (Spanish, French and Japanese). After serving as staff officer for chief of staff George Marshall, Taylor went to the airborne warfare unit of the U.S. Army. He commanded the 101st Airborne Division on D-Day and during Operation Market-Garden.

After the war, Taylor was superintendent of West Point, Army Chief of Staff, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, presidential advisor and ambassador to Vietnam during the 60's.

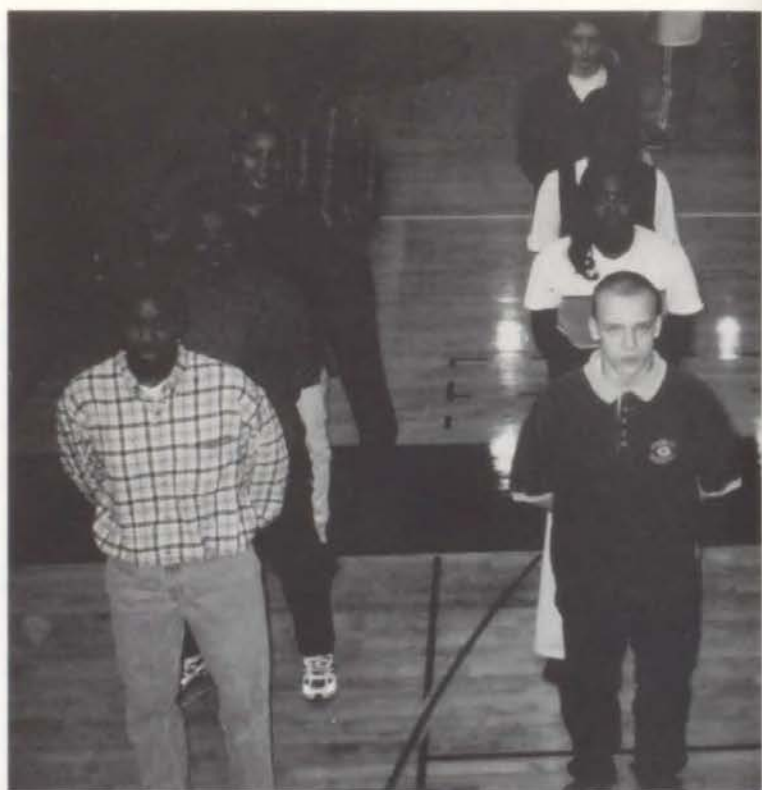

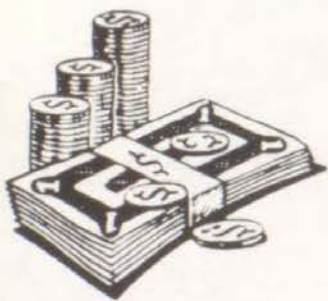

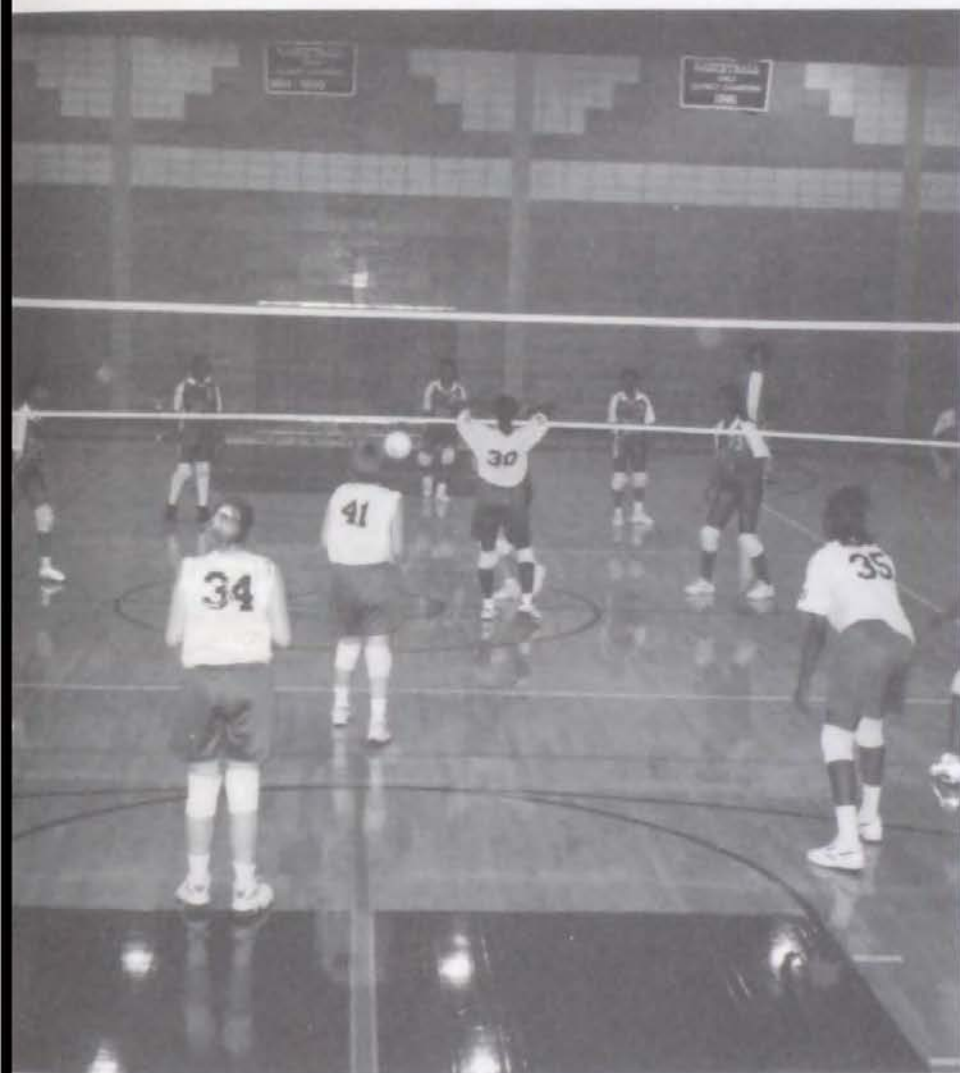

With his collegiate career at the University of Kentucky behind him, Tim is ready to meet the world's best. "It has truly been a wonderful experience and a blessing."



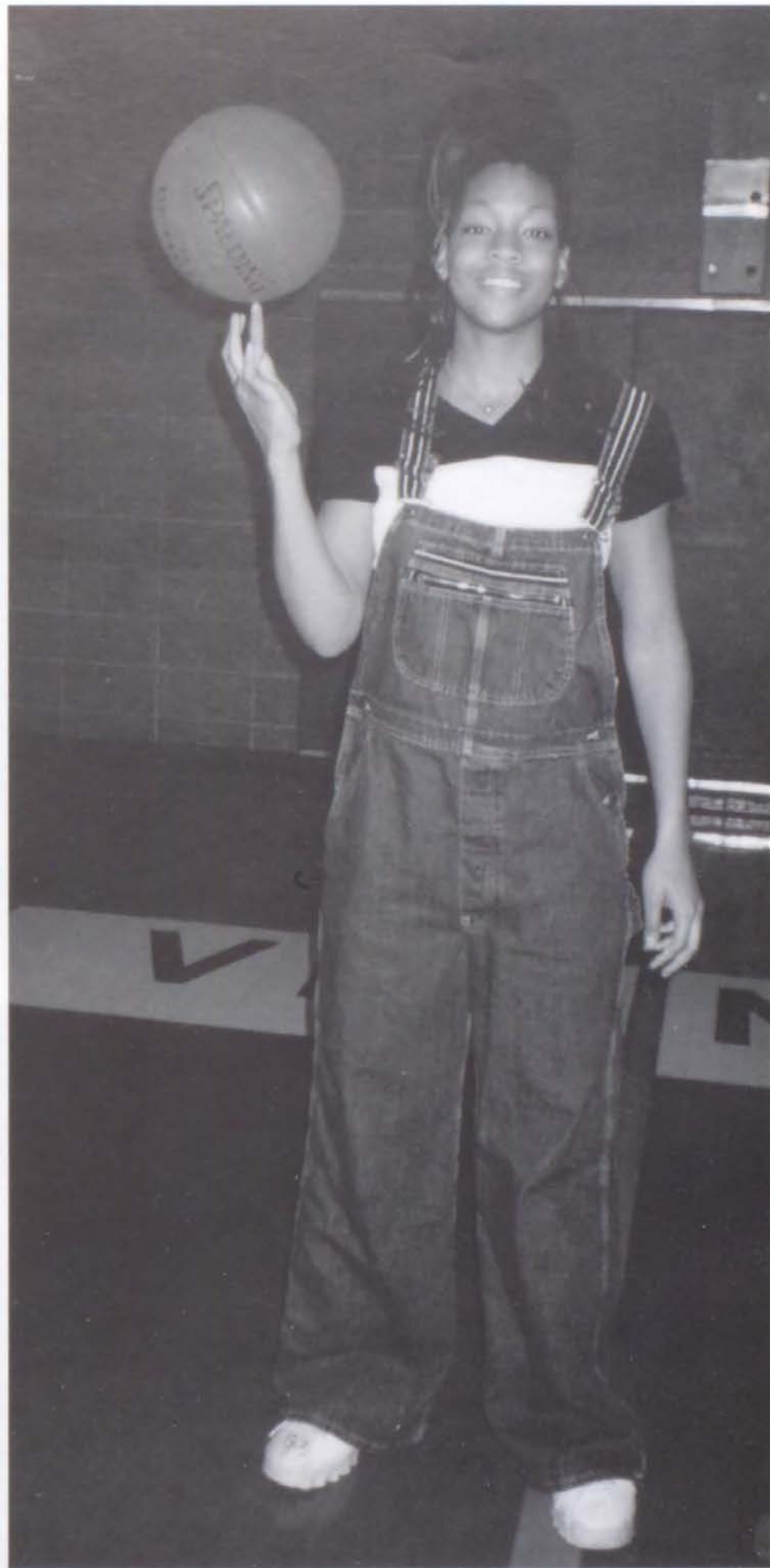

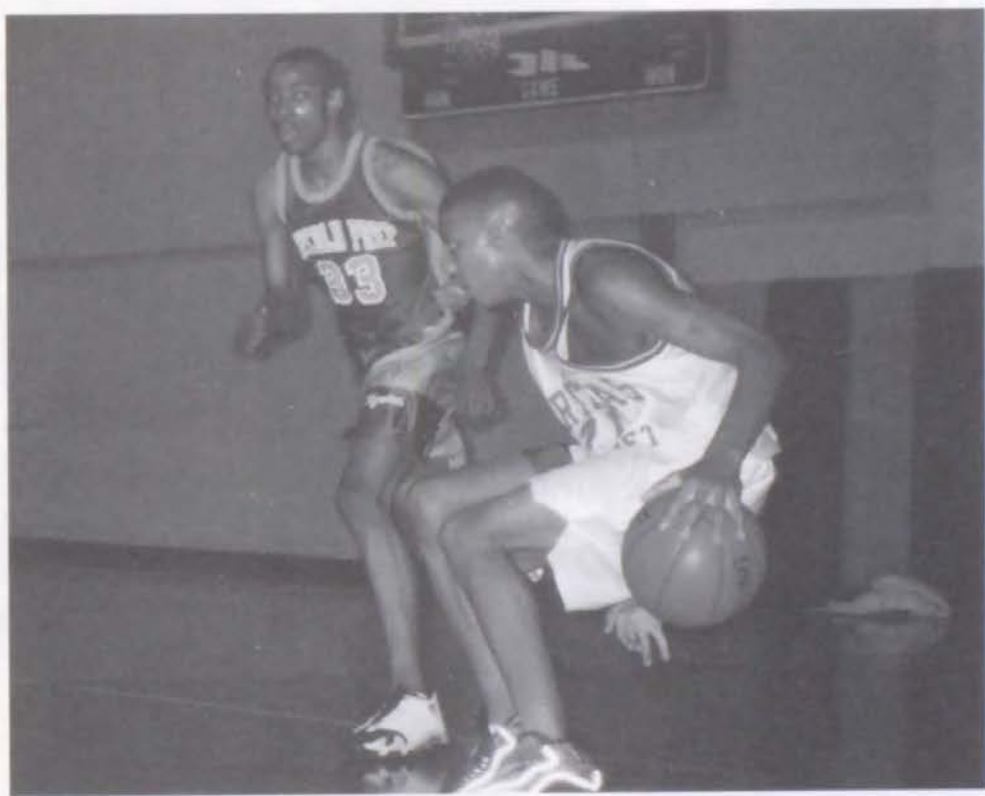
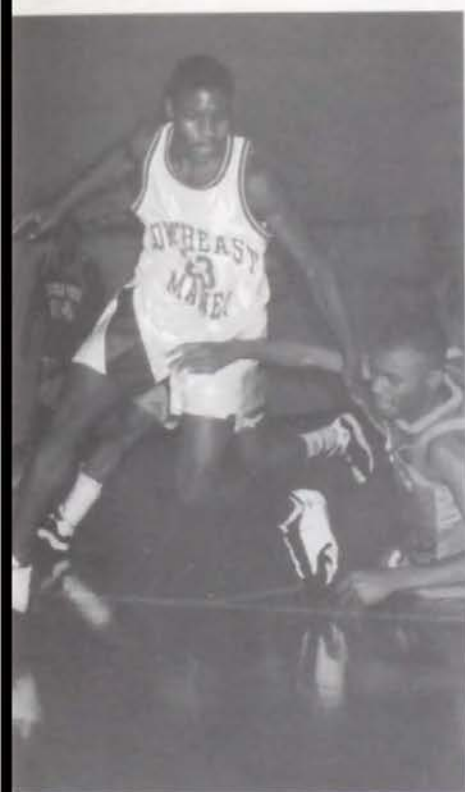

Parliamentary Procedure: the Correct Plan for Conducting Clubs/Organizations

Clubs and organizations follow a standard order of business, which is called an agenda. The standard format for a meeting is as follows:

- 1) **Call to order:** The president or chairperson opens the meeting by saying, "I now call this meeting to order." This statement alerts all member that the meeting is beginning and that they should be quiet. The president or chairperson's job is to make sure the meeting runs according to the rules.
- 2) **Minutes of the meeting:** The secretary reads the minutes, which are a written record that outlines the decisions that were made at the last meeting. The president or chairperson asks the members if there are any additions or corrections to the minutes. If there are no corrections, the minutes are accepted as a permanent record of the organization. If there are corrections, they are amended as necessary.
- 3) **Roll Call:** The secretary calls the names of all members of the club/organization to keep a record of who attends.
- 4) **Treasurer's Report:** The treasurer reports the money that the club/organization received since the last meeting and the money it spent, as well as the current balance of their accounts.
- 5) **Committee report:** Committees report on the status of their activities. Committees are set up in clubs/organizations to do research or plan events. Each committee presents a report at a meeting to let the entire membership know what they have done or plan to do. Committees that exist year after year are called standing committees. Other committees may be established as the need arises for them.
- 6) **Old business:** Any issues that were discussed at the previous meeting but were not decided on become old business. Old business is reported at this point in the meeting.
- 7) **New business:** New ideas that members would like to have considered are brought up at the end of the meeting.
- 8) **Adjourn:** When all business and ideas have been discussed the president or chairperson announces "this meeting is adjourned" this alerts the members that they are free to go.
