Enrollment has increased to 1,300 student. Out of the 1,300 students, 90% of the students are minorities. Among the minorities there are 21 distinct languages spoken.


When do we eat?


Body Art

Through the Vo Tech program students have the option to study in the area of child care, culinary arts, auto technology business administration, dry cleaning, agriculture, cosmetology, botanical gardening, or collision repair. "I want to be a chef, it's fun, and the Vo Tech program gives me hands on experience and college credit," explains culinary arts student Catherine Preston.

This year Vo Tech students have had several days out of school. "Even though I don't enjoy school that much, I like going to Vo Tech. When we couldn't go to Vo Tech, I felt like I had been robbed of my education," sighs Danika Jenkins. Vo Tech had four snow days. They also had no school at Metro because someone set fire to the building. Due to the fire they were dismissed for two weeks.

The students at Vo Tech receive three credits. They have the choice of attending the morning session or the afternoon session. Northeast has approximately fifty-five students participating in the Vo Tech program. "I enjoy going to Vo Tech because I get to meet people from all over the district and learn a trade," explains Carlis McCormick. Vo Tech is a growing program and is an excellent opportunity for high school students. "I love animals and working with them. When I graduate, I want to be a veterinarian. The Vo Tech program has taught me the basic skills I need to know for my profession," explains Diane Coe. The majority of the students attending classes at Vo Tech are planning to pursue a career in a field offered at Vo Tech.





Our Legal System

The Summer Law Internship Program for 2000



The Summer Law Internship Program gives juniors and seniors the oppportunity to experience the life of an attorney, judge, paralegal, or investigator. This program lasts for eight weeks. The program is sponsored by the Kansas City Metropolitan Bar Association Public Service Committee.

After they are chosen to work for the program, the students are given uniforms provided by Nordstrom's Department Store and a name tag that indentifies them as summer law interns. The student is provided with a full time job at a salary of \$7.50 to \$8.00 per hour. They are given a wide variety of responsibilities and tasks. Some students work in the law library as an assistant some in the mail room, and the others work as an assistant clerk in the office. When working in the office, the person has to be careful that the paperwork is filed in the right case folder and with the right case number. The cases that the attorneys work on can last up to a one year or longer. Then are some cases that are confidential. The law library updates research cases and Supreme Cour decisions. The mail room routes letters that travel within and outside of the firm. They also make copies of cases for attorneys or clerks. The work attitude always has to be positive, respectful polite, and mature.

The Summer Law Internship supervisor at Northeast is Ms. Alma Smith. The supervisor in the individual firms has to submit a weekly report on work attendance and performance to the

program administrator. The program administrator works closely with the interns and aids them on any needs or problems that they have concerning themselves or other employees.

The main goal of the Summer Law Internship Program is to provide a positive work experience for teenagers who are interested in a law career.

The process of getting a job in the Summer Law Internship Program might seem easy but it is not. The first step is to apply for the Law Internship Program. Over thirty students applied for it but only nineteen students was chosen. The members of the Public Service Committee picked the students based on their academic performance and teacher approval. They were also selected for the ability to work in an office atmosphere.

After being chosen to interview as an intern, the students had one more step to complete. They had to be interviewed by the Public Service Committee and they had to answer questions such as: Why did you want to work for the summer law internship? What do you like about this work?, How did you find out about this internship program?, Are you able to work with others?, What work experience do you have? What do you hope to bring to this internship?, and How will



this help you in your career? "I was nervous and afraid at first," recalled Heang. "I was confident in myself," said Mikala. All the pressure was centered on the interview but afterwards, it felt great if the interview went well.

The students go to orientation, have lunch and get the chance to meet some attorneys and professors. They get a chance to know the history of the Summer Law Internship program. They go through the process of orientation, where you learn how to act while working at the firm and the consequences if you don't act right or do anything that is not appropriate. Then after all the reviews, you get the uniforms and have a meeting with The Summer Law internship Program Committee.






Moralistic





















Tirestone initiates the largest tire recall in history after dozens of rollover accidents appear to be caused by faulty treads. At least 148 deaths in the United States are linked to the defective tires, although other problems with sport utility ve also are under investigation.



A Summer air travelers wait out some of the worst flight delays on record. Bad weather and heavy air traffic cause delays that reach a peak in June, when only 66% of the flights arrive on time.

Millions of Californians go for hours without power in January 2001 as utility companies cut off electrical supply due to low reserves. The crisis, blamed on aging generating plants, deregulation, soaring wholesale prices and debt-ridden utilities, spurs other states to begin devising prevention plans.

In the closest presidential election in more than 100 years. Republican George W. Bush of Texas beats Democrat Al Gore from Tennessee. The race isn't decided until 36 days after the popular election, when Florida's hotly contested 25 electoral votes are awarded to Bush. On December 4, 2000, the U.S. presidency remains in limbo as both Florida and New Mexico officials recount ballots to determine who will win their state's electoral votes. New Mexico goes to Gore. Ultimately, Bush wins Florida which gives him a narrow victory.

> On election night, several TV networks prematurely declare Al Gore the winner in Florida, only later to reverse themselves, twice. The fiasco confirms many Americans' distrust of polling and early "calling" of elections.

In one of his first duties as Presidentelect, George W. Bush nominates Colin Powell to be Secretary of State. The four-star Army General becomes the first African-American in history to serve in this role.

In October, the USS Cole is bombed while refueling in Yemen. A number of terrorist groups are suspected of the blast that kills 17 sailors and injures 39.




