

Wilkommen in Deutschland!

"Welcome to Germany!"

Last April, twenty-seven girls from Germany came to America, lived with Sion girls, and went to school with them for a month. Then, on June 23, twenty Sion girls arrived in Dusseldorf International Airport, eagerly waiting to reunite with their German friends and meet the families they would be living with until the end of July. Most soon found out how difficult it was going to be, living in a household in which only their exchange student and maybe a sibling or two spoke English. These girls frequently ran into problems describing what they wanted to say, usually ending up playing charades to get the point across.

Once the French and Spanish educated girls started getting a little German under their belts, communications improved a little, but they soon learned that German students only wanted to teach the Americans words which would not help them in their everyday life around their host parents. After going to Sion's sister school in Ahaus and attending classes for a week and a half, the Sion girls went on summer holiday with their exchange students. They travelled to Berlin, the Netherlands, the North Sea, and many other places in Germany and neighboring countries.

While in Germany, Sion girls learned of the different culture of German teenagers. They learned that only about 10% of teenage German girls don't smoke, and the legal drinking age is sixteen. At the end of their school year, the German students had class parties to talk about the year. They also have a huge camp-out to welcome the holidays, where they spend the night together before the last day of school.

Though life with their host family was sometimes difficult, the Sion girls were sad to leave, promised to return soon, and learned many valuable things from their summer spent in Germany.



A Beginning and An End
















Where did the Christmas Dance go?



























Amnesty International is an organization to promote and defend human rights of people across the globe. Students may think that the group is new to Sion this year, but it is actually back after a ten-year hiatus. This past summer, President Suzanne Hogan worked with Mr. Hill to get the club up and running again after so long. The accomplishments of Amnesty International show how successful Suzanne's efforts have been.

Amnesty meets every week and has many dedicated members who participate in a variety of activities and projects. Many write "urgent action" letters to the governments of various countries regarding the release of political prisoners. Students have written to Colombia, Indonesia, Sudan and Yugoslavia, to name a few. Other students attend vigils for prisoners receiving the death penalty and hand out black ribbons at school as a form of death penalty awareness. Five club members, along with Mr. Hill and Ms. Nichols, attended the Amnesty International Midwest Regional Conference at St. Louis University.

Walking around the campus in early December, Sion students may have seen the numerous "Toast and Jamnesty" signs that decorated our halls. The "Toast and Jamnesty" meeting was held on the "Universal Declaration of Human Rights Day," December 10th. The meeting's purpose was to educate the students about the thirty human rights established by the United Nations and, of course, to eat toast and jam.
