




Excellence is a trademark that one strives for. At Olathe South we've spent the last decade striving for this goal.




Elated with the thrill of victory, Olathe South's 1990 State Champion Softball team, after beating Olathe North 2-0 in the final game.









The young artists here at express themselves in English South, through their artistic expression have shown the other students that talented young people are capable of producing art that is pleasing to the eye and intriguing to the















Coach Bud Wheeler said that this year was an interesting year. He said that the offense was so young and




Quarterback **Billy Turner** finds a hole and runs it in for a touchdown. Turner was a leading force on this year's team.

















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












# AFTER FIVE YEARS AS PRINCIPAL, DR. PATRICIA ALL BIDS FAREWELL TO SOUTH

Dear Students:


