Returning to league competition the Bucs took a fast game from the Southeast Knights. The game proved closed in the waning minutes of play with the Bucs winning 33-32.

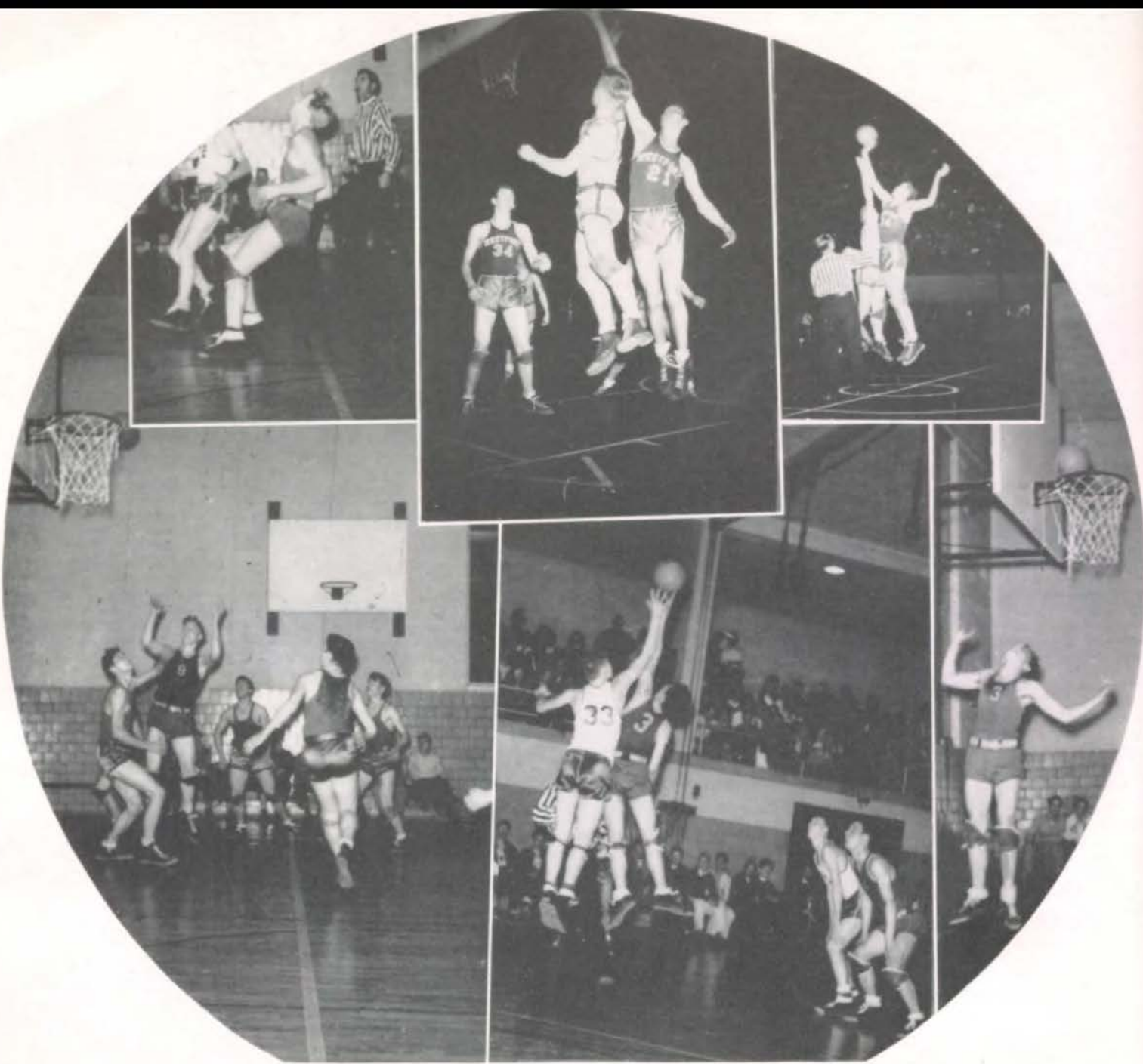

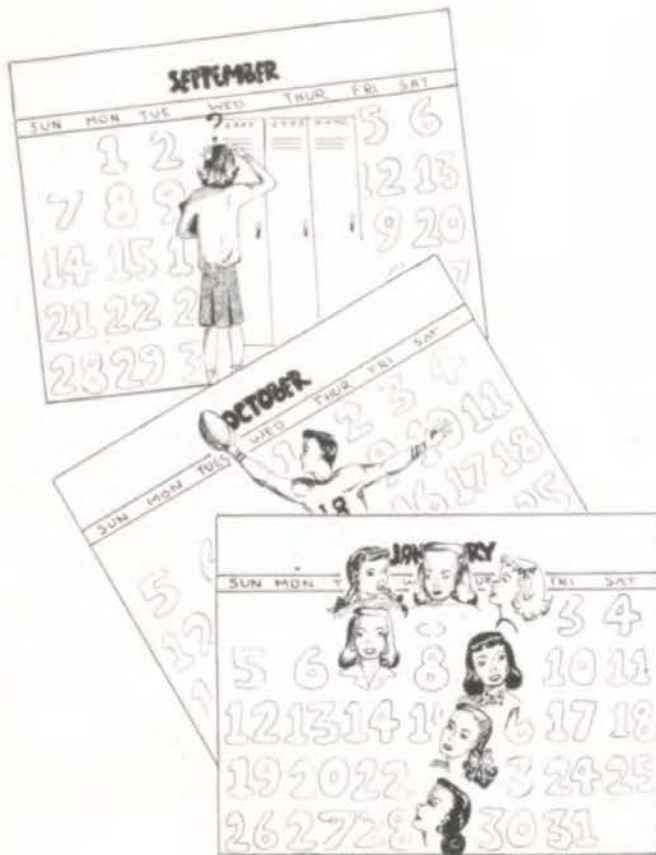








# CALENDAR
