The JROTC program prepares high school students for leadership roles while making them aware of their rights, responsibilities, and privileges as American citizens. The curriculum includes basic military tasks and marching, but more importantly it includes techniques to improve self-esteem and self-discipline. The mission of JROTC is to motivate high school students to be better Americans. As a member of the JROTC family, each student is expected to assume a leadership role. There are four levels of Leadership Education Training beginning in the freshman year. Each successive level places higher demands and expectations on the cadet.






At least part of the darkness and hopelessness of our current time is because of what the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. called "a tragic breakdown of moral standards and the midnight of moral degradation".

I know I'm young and idealistic, but like King, I have a dream, and I'm ready to move on and overcome any struggles I have to face. I believe that the races, cultures, nationalities, communities and nations need to come together to make peace.

I would like to lead others in a movement to put our struggles and differences aside and join in an effort to unify against the forces that divide us.

The struggle becomes worthy for each of us if we keep in mind the difference we will make in the future. We must be aware, committed and educated to do what we think is right in hopes of leading those blinded by the ignorance of hate, and trapped in the struggle, to freedom.



I am a 17-year-old black female, standing 5 feet 5 inches tall. My dress can range from a miniskirt to a business suit, with a rhythm in my hips and pep in my step. But the tap in my foot intimidates.

I get repeated looks over shoulders and faster-paced walks - - the

faster I walk the faster they walk, until finally they're running across the street.

It's because of me (a 3.0 GPA student at a performing arts school) that someone's panting, out of breath, until they are no longer able to run.






