As people characterize the decade of the '80's, yuppies, Reagan, and the demise of communism in Eastern Europe readily come to mind. Most people overlook the debut of *The Voice* in 1985. Although its sales have not grown as fast as *USA Today* (another newspaper established during the decade), *The Voice* has steadily improved each year, and, unlike *USA Today*, its price has remained the same.

This year *The Voice* was under the leadership of Executive Editor-in-chief Rachel Cole, Executive Editor Chris Robbins, Managing Editors Lisa Nelson and Kartik Singh, and Supervising Editor Brian Fedotin. Mary Ruple served as the faculty advisor.

The Voice tackled difficult issues such as drinking and driving, rape, and preserving the environment. The paper also managed to forge new ground with colorful

forums by writers such as Pat Faltico, Mike O'Shea, and the tandem of Richard Jenkins and Kris Rajanna. Other articles dealt with subjects ranging from a review of horror movies to a college basketball preview. An editorial by Brian Fedotin on the situation in Panama even motivated President Bush to order an attack on Panama.

The top editors collaborated to say, "Good food, good music, good dancing, what more could you ask for?" Well, how about a functioning computer? This year *The Voice* was fortunate enough to acquire a MacIntosh to replace its old, seldom working computer. This has resulted in a much better looking newspaper. *The Voice* closed out its inaugural decade successfully due to strong senior leadership and an impressive staff.

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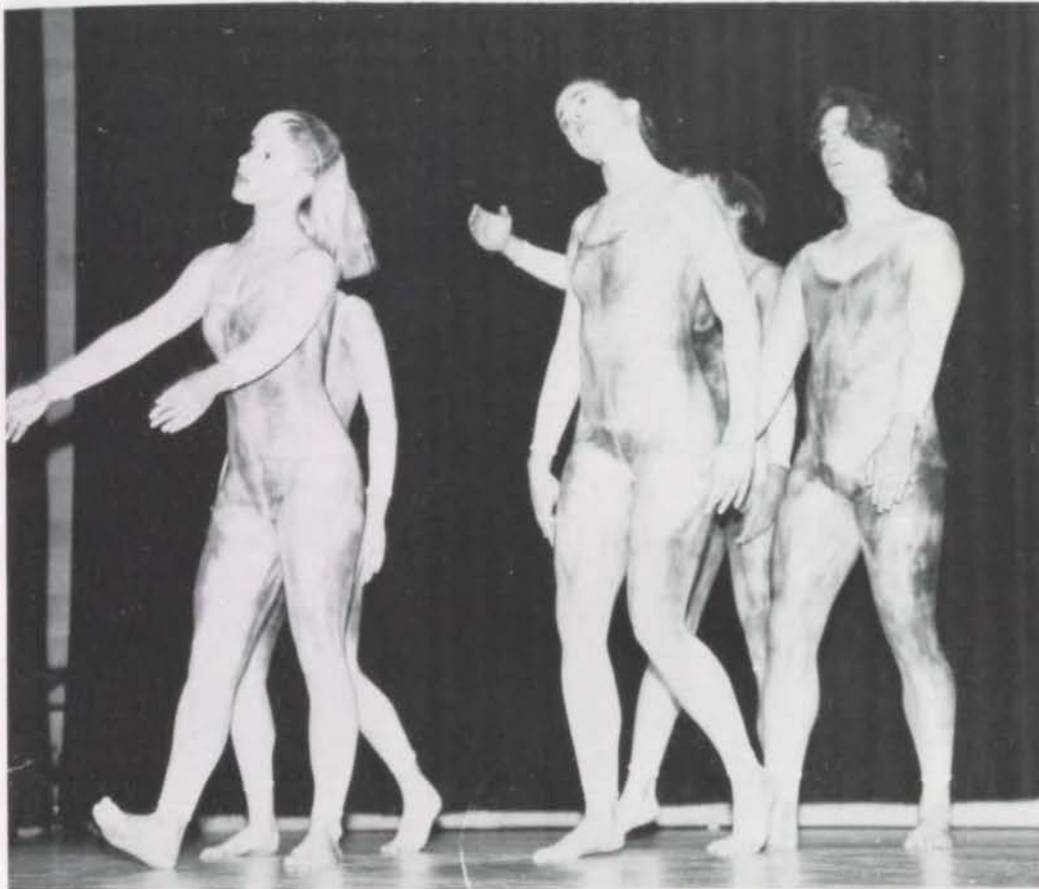

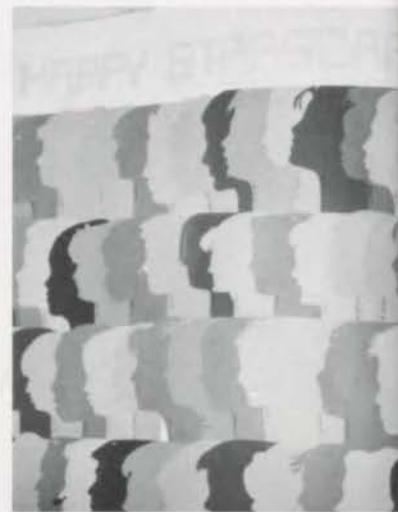

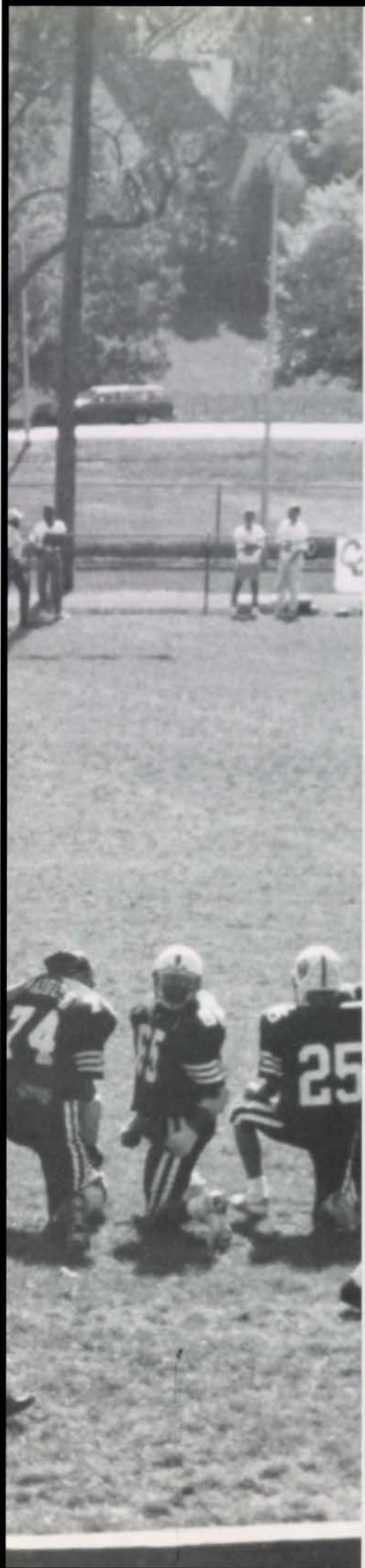

After ten months of rest, the varsity football team began their season in early August. For a change, the team was blessed with great pre-season weather; the temperature was in the 80's and the humidity was considerably low compared to last year. The team was lacking in size, both in numbers and in stature. Despite the fact that the team had very little experience, everyone was very optimistic about the season.

The first home game against Westport was marred with penalties. However, the Raiders surpassed the expectations of the coaches with a great defensive effort. They lost the game 14 to 12 on a questionable call by the referee that would have won the game. The next game was the annual barbecue game which was postponed until the following Monday. Unfamiliar with playing Monday games, the Raiders lost 16-0 to the Pleasant Hill Roosters. In the following game, the Raiders played their best half of the season against the Central Eagles when the team scored 29 points in the first half capped off by a 97 yard fumble recovery by senior Cory White. In the second half, the team was struggling to hold on to the lead.

The team prevailed and won 29-22 thanks to a last second interception by senior linebacker Brady Battmer.

disappointment." The Raiders, upset by the loss to Pius, breezed through their first two district games by annihilating Sherwood 43-0 and Holden 20-14.

In their final game, the Raiders faced future Hall of Famer Robbie Allen and the Butler Bears. Allen rushed for over 270 yards in 27 carries. 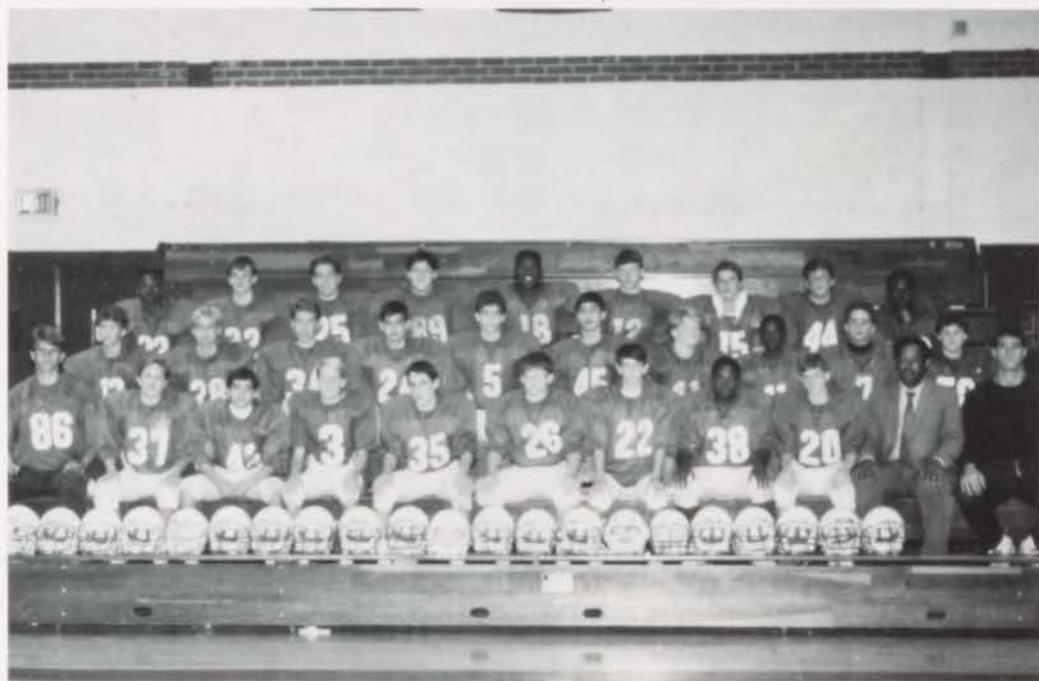

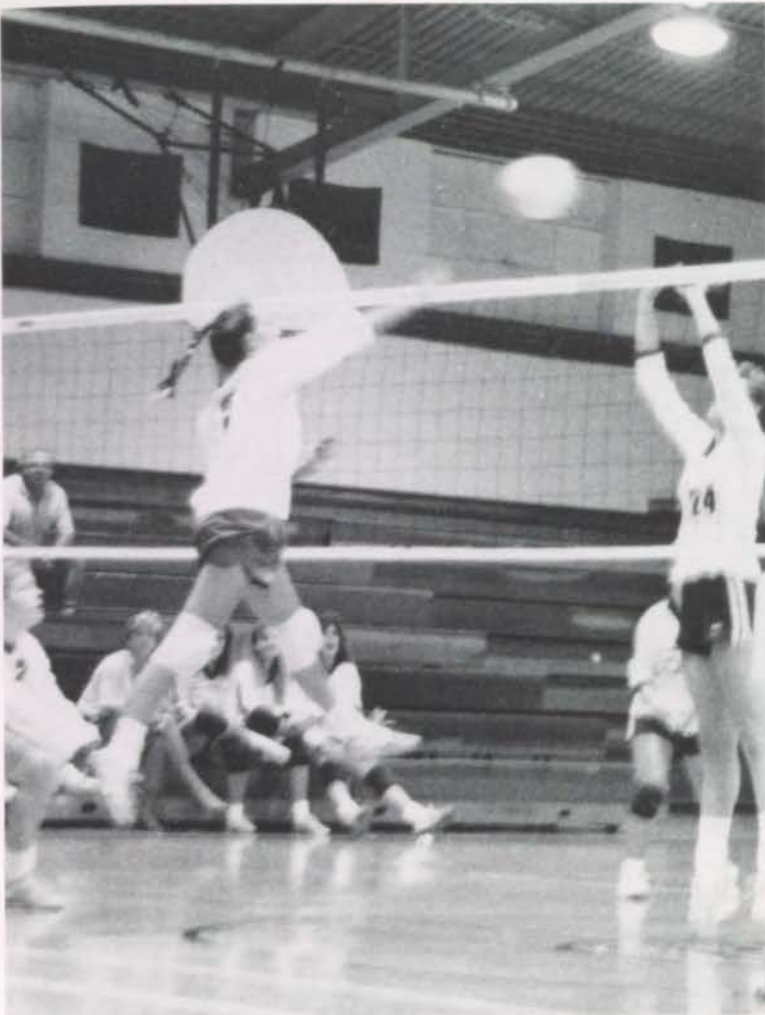
of the season."

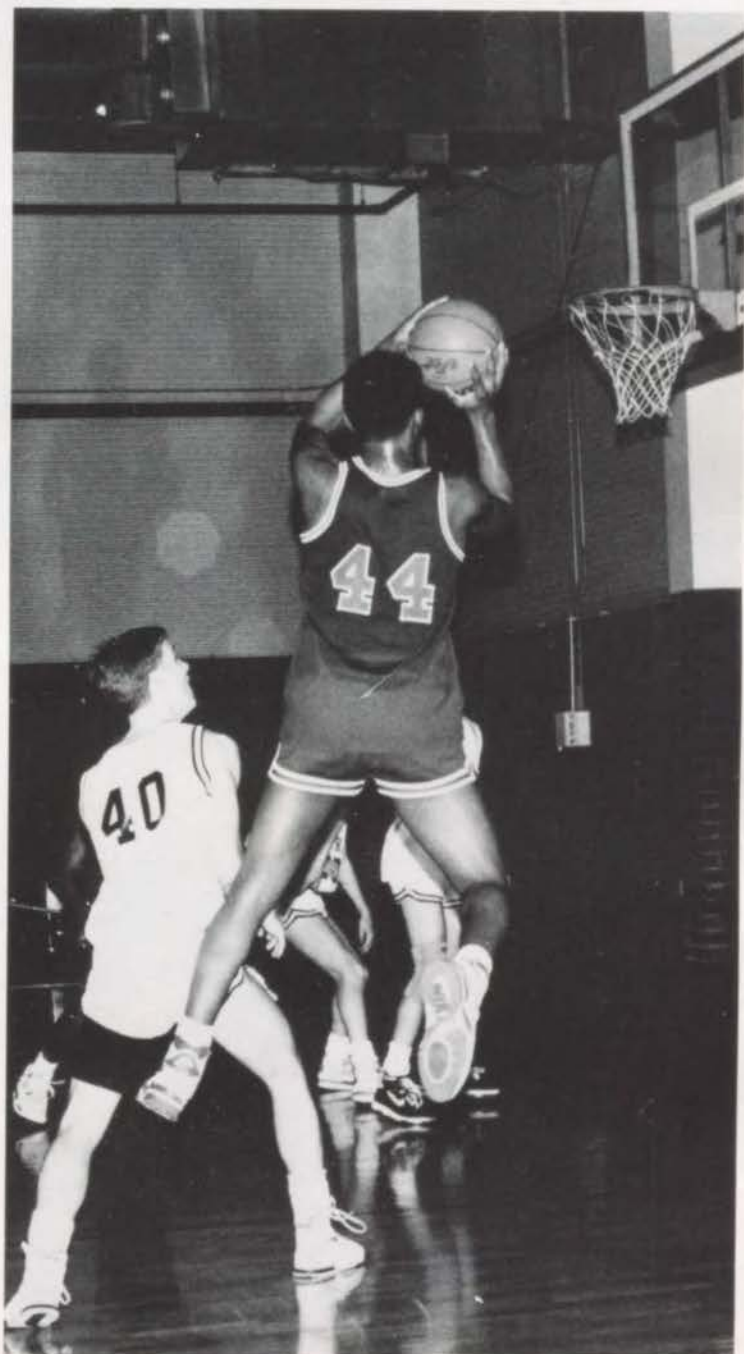

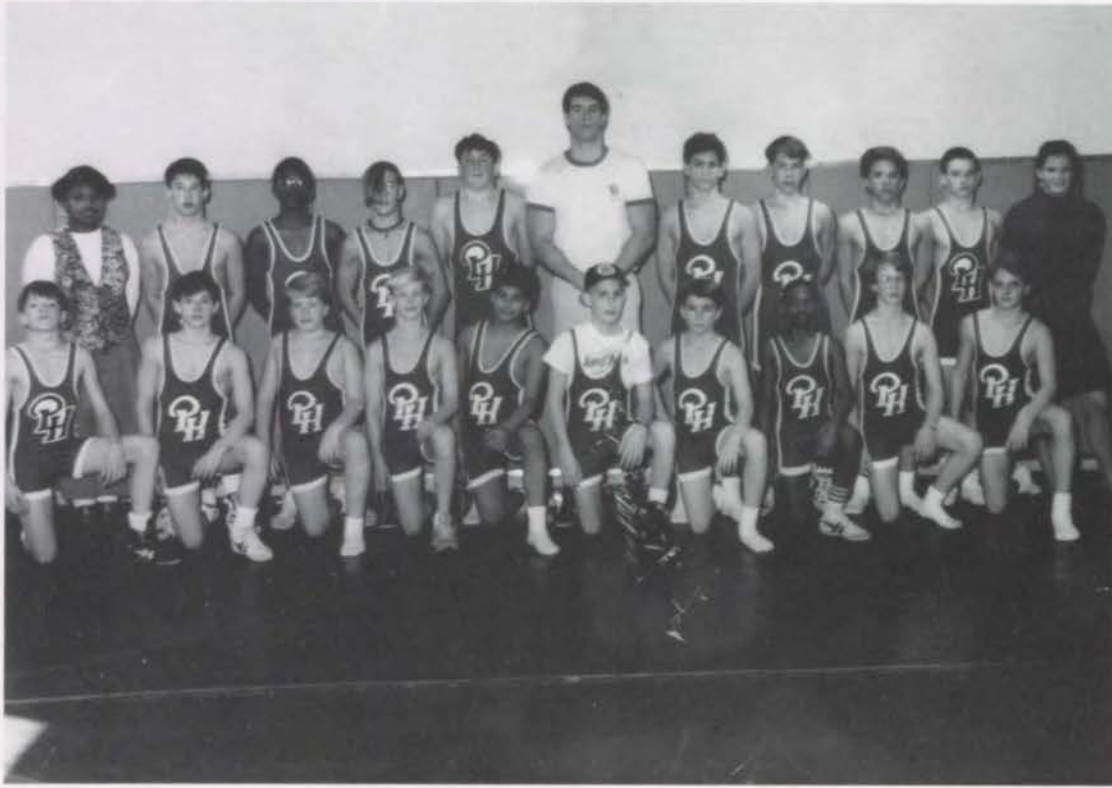

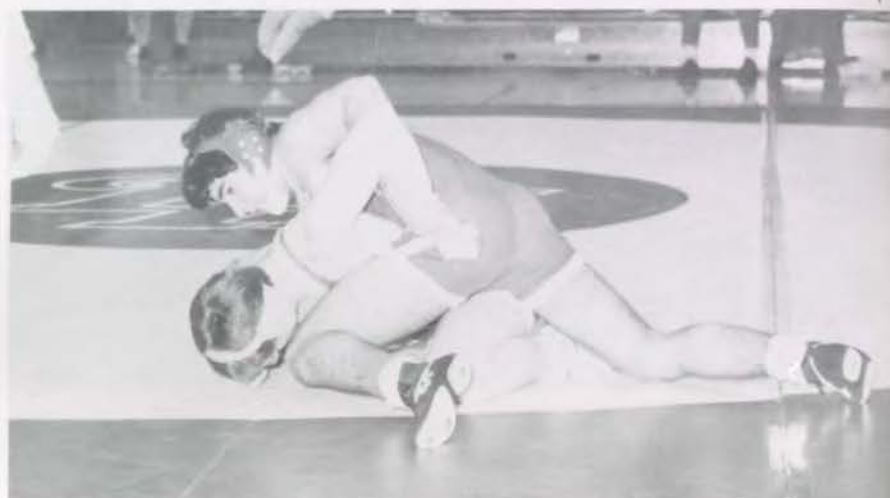
WRESTLING

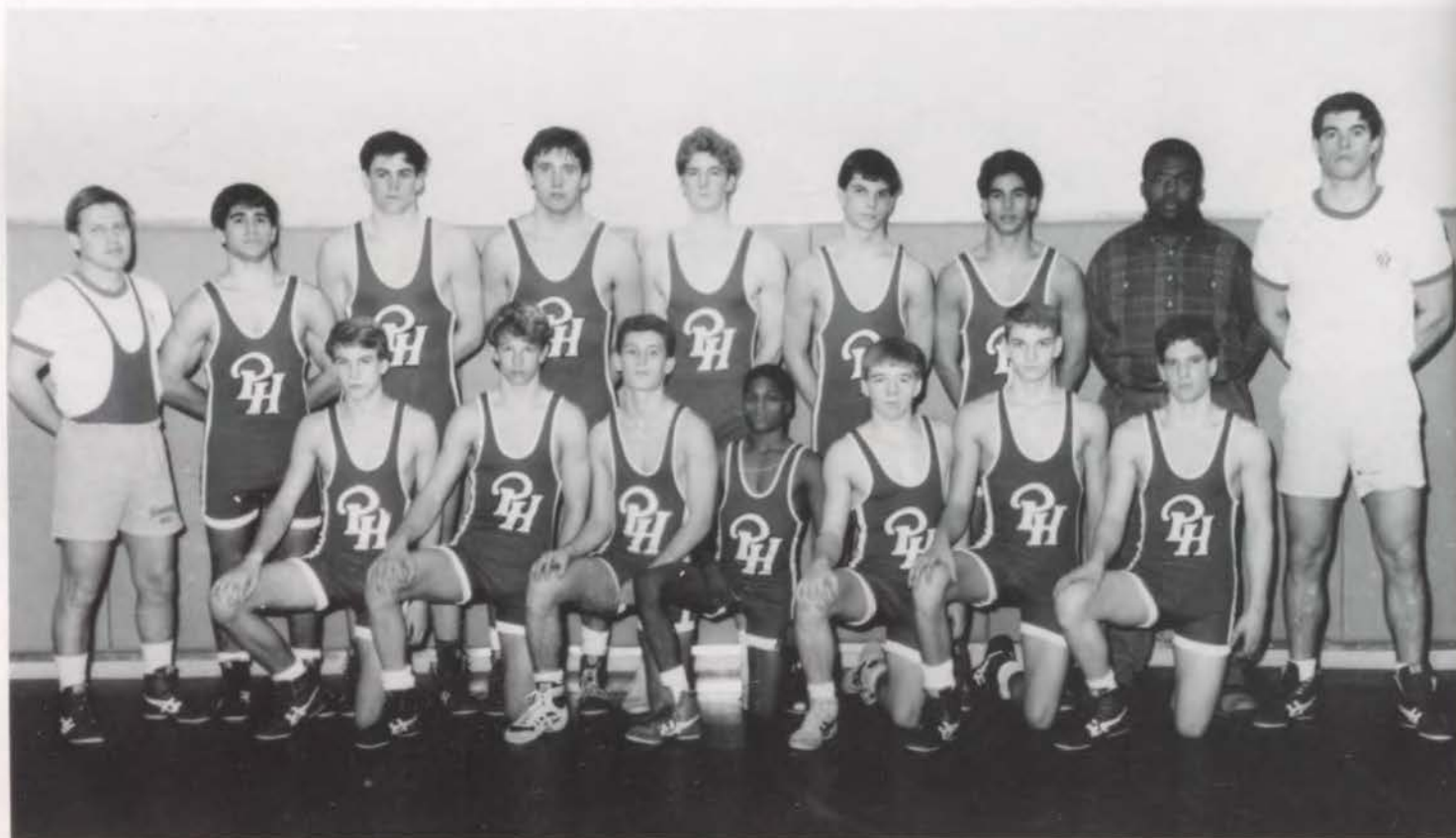

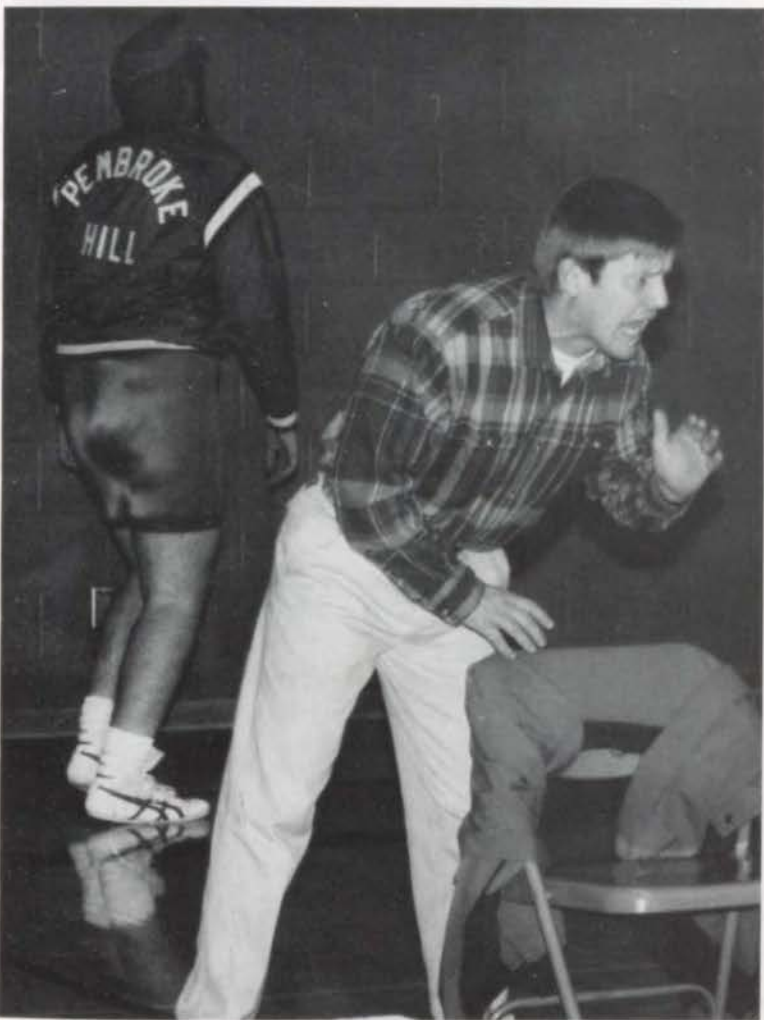
1) Roger Hawkins flips his opponent over just like Hulk Hogan. 2) Bill Padula's opponent is pinching him very hard.



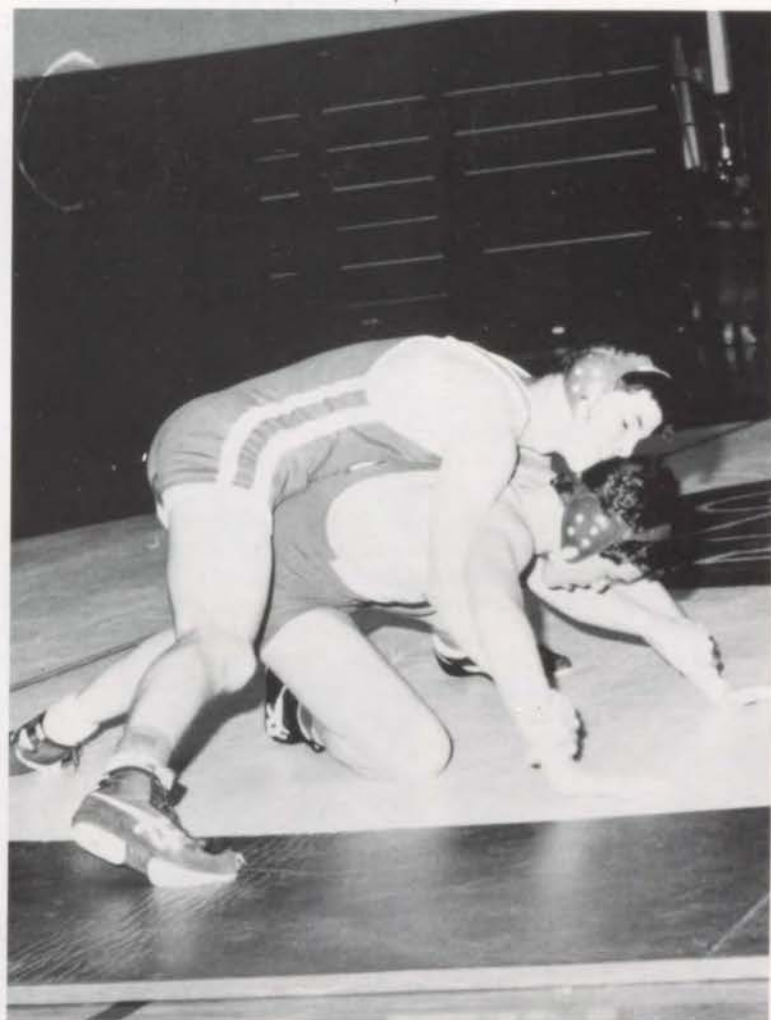

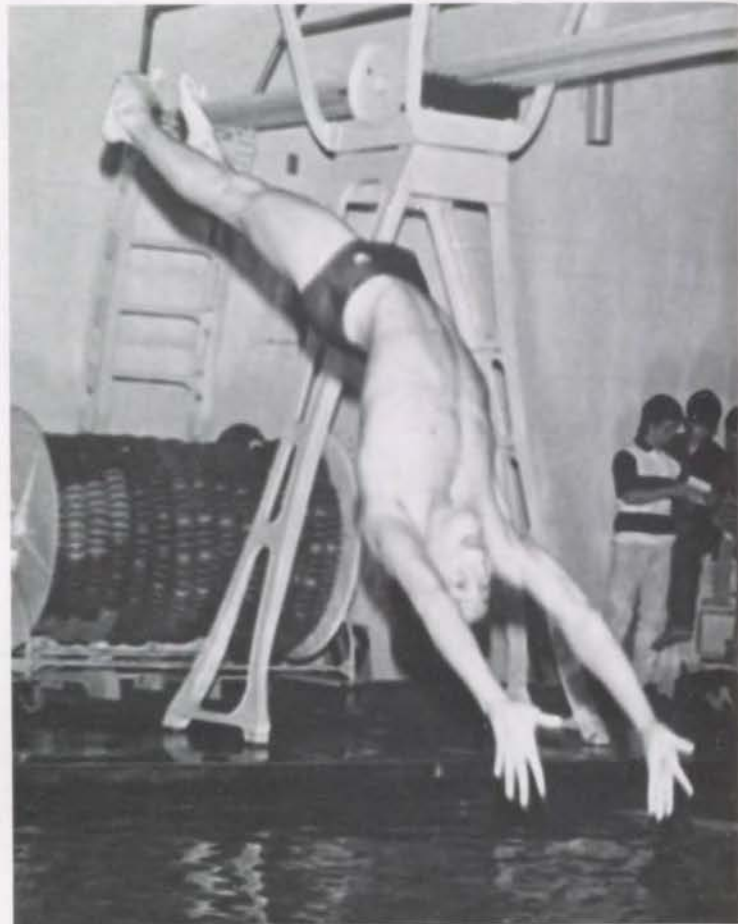

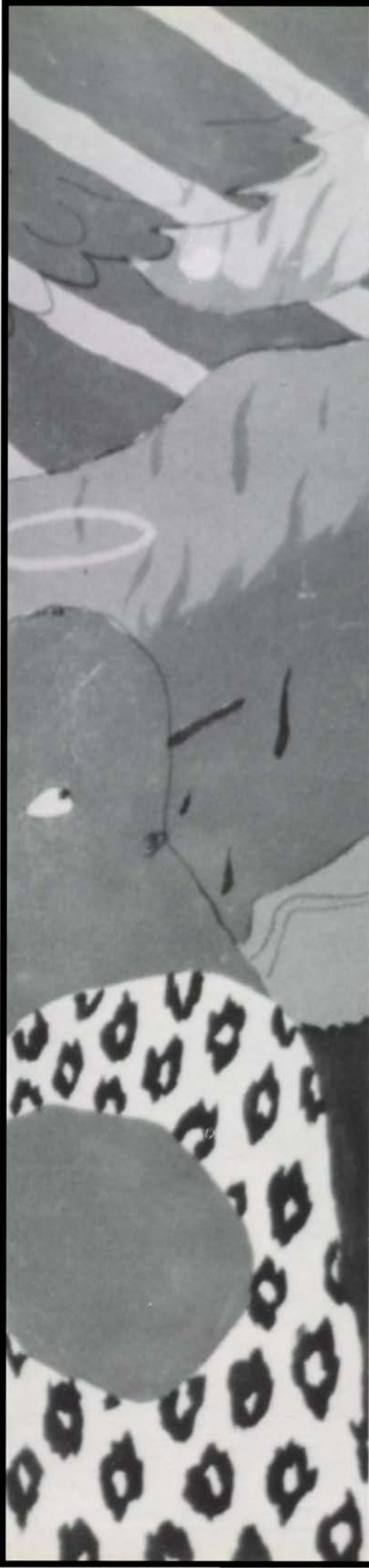

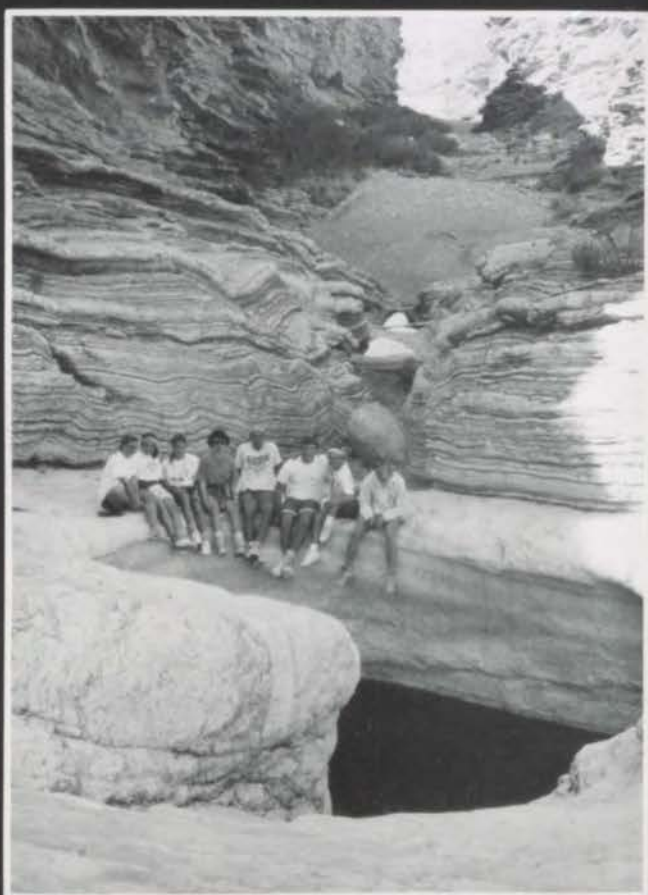

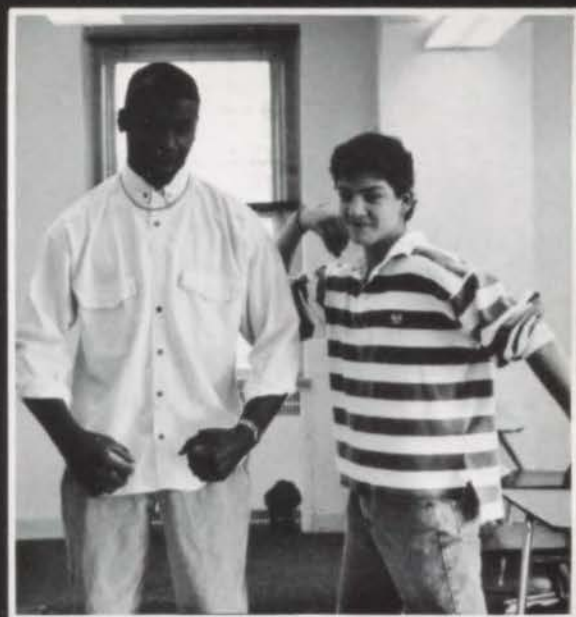

Academics seemed the only obstacle which the junior class had to work at. With the help of their omnipotent pedagogues, the juniors absorbed more information than any other class in the country.

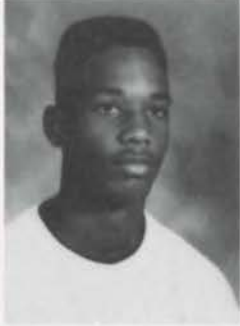

KARATE

Karate may be defined as a weaponless means of self defense. It consists of dynamic offensive and defensive techniques using all parts of the body to their maximum advantage.

Karate Practice is divided into three categories:

- Kihon (basic blocks, punches, kicks, and stances).
- Kata (prearranged forms simulating combat situations);
- Kumite (sparring).

In each category the beginner is given instruction at the most basic level until the techniques become spontaneous.

The practice of karate tones the body, develops coordination, quickens reflexes, and builds stamina. The serious practice of karate develops composure, a clearer thought process, deeper insight into one's mental capabilities, and more self confidence.
