### Commercials Alter Our Outlook








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### lay out everyday, seven days a week—I wanted to catch the rays



After playing football for four years at Raytown, Daryl Posey (#70) stated, "I really enjoyed playing football this year, because it was such a complete turnaround from last year." The 1988 football captains, Rod Daugherty (#55), Zane Hall (#77), Robbie Park (#47), and Scott Shippy (#14), led the Jays to a winning season.







popular "torn jeans." Old and worn out jeans could be changed into an entirely new look by simply ripping and tearing holes wherever felt.






The half-time entertainment, male Jaywalkers performed to ZZ Tops' "Legs." The co-captains were John Armstrong, Craig Huscher, John Nes-







Sajak, "Wheel of Fortune" game show host, joined Carson and Letterman in the late night t.v. rating race.



gies hanging from rear view mirrors.























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
















#### Cheerleaders Encourage Spirit


#### J.V. Wins Seven Straight


#### SOCCER Another Top Ten Effort







#### Team Toughs Season Out











Coach Cox stated that the group's small size caused an advantage to the team. "I had more individual time to work on moves with this group. Mat time is a must in this sport in order to show any improve-













"Look here, son," the father called to his oldest boy. "Here is my letter jacket from when I attended Raytown. I also still have an old football trophy and my class ring!"



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
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
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



















## ELVIS SEEN IN BANDLOBBY




