Starting a new year


"I was excited for the first day of school because I got to see my friends and be an upperclassman," said Junior Angelica Choun.




Many girls go through a long routine each morning, but there are some that really don't care.





What a way to start the year off, but with a Fiesta! A "Mexican Fiesta," this year's Back to School Dance theme, was a fun experience for students and teachers.


"My favorite part of this dance is seeing all the kids that I know and meeting the new class," said Mr. Drace.

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

"There are too many students here," said Senior Ayu







































"I enjoy Electronic Journalism because it allows me to be creative and make good videos," said **Cunningham**.
















Beginning a new




Chris' dream, however, is to be a scientist.


"I would like to teach people how to make volcanoes," he said. **Chris** says his latest accomplishment is taking apart a CD player to find out what was inside.







Most teachers started studying science in their high school years and followed through college classes. Now they are teaching students what they know and love.


Parts of science have a lot of small details and very complex solutions. Science is a subject that most students do not take lightly because it is one of the harder high school departments.








Senior Jerica Poynter, who is particularly passionate about art, couldn't pick just one art class, and therefore is involved in Photo I, Graphic Design and Pottery.
























The golf team is very close. "With only eight girls on the team it was hard not to be very close. We were mostly juniors and we were like family," said **Junior Corey Hinsley**.








"If you work hard at practice, you will work harder when it comes time to go against someone during a real match," said **Junior Scott Gumm**.

The boys practiced every day after school for a couple hours. At the end of practice they "go live." That's where they practice with the other teammates as if they were in a real match.

























Competing Against the Odds



Also, I want to thank Davidson. We have had our little arguments and fights, but I know it was only because she wanted this yearbook to be the best that it could be.








- 22 Rita hits the Louisiana coast and heads for Texas.
- 23 Thousands evacuate eastern Texas and the 9th Ward of New Orleans floods once again after levees are overrun.


