

The day started early with the class floats' arrival in the front circle. A faculty committee selected the winner, which was announced later at the pep rally immediately following classes. The rally began with the introduction of the Homecoming Queen finalists. The candidates included Sue Coppinger, escorted by Jim Jantsch, Lisa Marietti, escorted by Jerry Rauschelbach, Nancy Lombardino, escorted by Joe Glynn, Brigid Neville, escorted by Tim Johnson, and Kathy Welsh escorted by David Dunn. Then John Garlich, this year's guest speaker, inspired the crowd with a talk about the importance of this year's Homecoming.

After John's speech and following a suspenseful moment of silence, the seniors were named as the float contest winners.

Tbe parade, which started soon after the pep rally, journeyed from **Rockhurs**t to Notre Dame de Sion and to St. Theresa's Academy.

Homecoming Day ended with the long-awaited football game pitting Rockhurst against Southeast. Alex Staab led the offensive assault with 141 yards rushing. Quarterback Jerry Rauschelbach completed over 30% of his passes to belp the Hawklets take a 24-0 lead at halftime. The defense, led by linebacker Tim Johnson, was the **key** force behind the Rockhurst attack. Southeast was held to 14 total yards offense, the defense's best game of the season. Rockhurst defeated Southeast 31-0.




















Thursday the freshmen and seniors were encouraged to participate in "Old Croney day" where everybody dressed in the 30's-40's styled clothing.

The week ended with a Big Brother football game, when seniors supplied rides for their little brothers to the varsity football game Friday night.









Students Make Missions Possible



Sale-O Grosses 75,000 Despite Weather

Despite a heavy snowfall on the weekend of February 7, 8, 9 and 10, Sale-O-Rama grossed over \$75,000.

Donors were invited to shop before the general crowds on Thursday. But the number of shoppers was smaller than in the previous years because of the fiveto-seven inches of snow which covered Kansas City on Thursday. The donor's sale grossed \$15,000.

On Friday, thanks to quick snow removal the night before, sales picked up again. A tremendous throng showed up for Saturday's sale. Close to \$20,000 was collected before Sale-O closed at 5:00 p.m. Sunday's half-price sale, advertised for the first time on local radio, made over \$13,000.

Several booths were eliminated to provide more space for existing sections and booths. The "Green Thumb" booth was discontinued to make more room for televisions and stereos. Every television was sold this year at full price. Rock-O-Rama cups designed especially for Rockhurst shoppers and Alumni were sold in the booth which replaced last year's "Arts and Crafts" display.

The many donations and workers helped to make Sale-O-Rama a great success. The donations were numerous and the workers "fantastic," according to Mrs. Barbara Decker, chairperson of the Sale.

School Cashes in on Auction

Cache '80, one of the many successful fund-raising events held throughout the school year, opened its doors on Saturday, March 29, 1980, from 6:30 P.M. in the school gym, netting over \$45,000.

As in past years, the Cache '80 auction was organized primarily by the Fathers' Club and the office of the President. This year, Mrs. Jean aher, Cache secretary, worked with the Fathers' Club as an administrative assistant.

Close to 600 bidders attended the formal sit-down dinner, which was prepared by the Food Service, Inc., at a cost of \$10 per person.

After dinner, Mr. DeWees and two other professional auctioneers, along with five members of the Fathers' Club, opened the bidding at the oral auction, declaring the minimum value established for each item by that item's donor. Among the items was George Brett's autographed third base, which sold for \$170. The auction also featured five used cars, including a 1936 Dodge, which sold for \$1,900.

By far, the most profitable aspect of the Cache '80 event was the money jar passed around by Rev. Jack Hunthausen, S.J. Contributions to the jar totaled \$2,600.

Meanwhile, a silent auction was held in the Gym, where people went to examine items of interest and submit bids in writing.

When all the figures were in, the silent auction netted \$14,000 and the oral auction netted \$31,000. The total, \$45,000, was \$5,000 less than last year's total and \$15,000 less than the expected goal of \$60,000.

Beautiful Weather Graces Carnival Profits

Students canvassed neighborhoods, stationed themselves at shopping centers and churches, called friends, and contacted relatives in an effort to sell tickets to the 14th annual Rockhurst Carnival, held May 2,3,4. These ambitious salesmenship tactics resulted in a \$6,000 increase in pre-sales. This, coupled with perfect carnival weather, helped vault net profits to a record total of about \$22,000, \$6000 more than the 1979 carnival total.

Mr. Ed McGurren, carnival chairman, acknowledged that even if the weather had been unpleasant the Fathers' Club was ensured a success because of excellent ticket pre-sales. "This year the students did a better job selling tickets. It was the students who sold their quota that made the carnival so successful", emphasized Mr. McGurren.

Ticket sales were on the Spirit Contest by request of the administration. The fact that sales were on the Spirit Contest may have helped the carnival to surpass its 20%-increase goal by nearly \$3,000. The juniors sold the most tickets, clinching first place in




the Spirit Contest.







Senior Help Less Fortunate





Seniors logged at least 90 hours each at various projects between March 17 and April 4.

The Senior Projects planning committee's goals included providing the seniors with opportunities to work in unfamiliar surroundings and with people they hadn't known before and enabling them to help people less fortunate than they.

Before the project period, each senior made a selection for his project site; most projects were at institutions for the disadvantaged. These sites included **schools** for the blind, retarded, and physically handicapped, nursing homes, and clinics for the poor.

Although most of the projects selected were nearby, ten seniors selected out-of-town projects for the three weeks.

On the Friday before projects began, the school sent off the seniors with a prayer service. During the project, the seniors and their advisors held two meetings to discuss their work at their projects.

Seniors End Their Stay at Rockhurst







QUARRY Staff Records Changes















Photo Club Activated






The S & L Crew Light Up The Rock




J.V. Repeat Perfect Season

The 1979 Junior Varsity football team blazed into the season. The J.V. Hawklets posed an unbeaten record similar to that of the 1978 J.V., which is the best in Rockhurst J.V. history. The team's offense benefited from an outstanding backfield. The Defense also proved outstanding, permitting only 13 points scored against them.






Freshman A & B Teams Turn in Winning Season






















Soccer Fares Well



Hawklet Varsity Dominates Area Basketball Teams

As best as anyone around Rockhurst can remember, the Hawklet 1980 Basketball team amassed the best Rockhurst record ever. Coach Doug Bruce modestly calls the 22-2 regularseason record "one of the best," but he also acknowledges that neither he nor Mr. Alton Davis, Athletic Director, can remember a better season.

With a wealth of confidence, the Hawklets and their fans convoyed to Center High School for the 4A District Fourteen state playoffs. Center High, though, extinguished hopes of a state championship for Rockhurst when Center defeated the Hawklets 57-54. Coach Bruce said the Hawklets were crippled by fouls.


After the 87-56 loss to Raytown South, the Hawklets resurrected to defeat O'Hara 65-46 and then to turn back Columbia Hickman.






Individuals Excel

In January 1980, Fr. John M. Hunthausen, S.J., replaced Fr. Luke Byrne, S.J., as Rockhurst's new president. On January 21, Fr. Hunthausen took over the administration of Rockhurst's finances as a Jesuit Apostolate. Immediately, Fr. Hunthausen began taking care of organizational matters, such as working with the parents' clubs, representing the school in the public forum, and keeping the school's personnel informed about administrative matters.

As principal, Fr. Paul C. Pilgram, S.J., fulfilled the many routine responsibilities of that office, such as admissions work and class observation.

Mr. J. Michael McWilliams, academic assistant principal spent most of his time arranging and

Librarian Larry Grau and his new assistant, Mrs. Elizabeth Lippert, continued to process a variety of library materials, such as microfiche readers and vid-











Bringing a wealth of knowledge in business and education to Rockhurst, Rev. John M. Hunthausen, S.J., became Rockhurst's fourth president on Jan. 21, 1980. Fr. Hunthausen received B.S. and M.S. degrees in accounting from St. Louis University, and a Ph.D. from the University of Missouri-Columbia.

"My experience in business and educational instruction have helped me feel more comfortable and have given me a sense of direction," noted Fr. Hunthausen.

Fr. Hunthausen's direction emphasizes improvement. "I plan to find the weaknesses and correct them in order to make them strengths," he explained during his first week at Rockhurst. To do this, Fr. Hunthausen first began evaluations of different aspects of the school.

Fr. Hunthausen's priorities are simple: to increase the quality instruction of the school, expand alumni involvement, and strengthen "development programs" that serve as Rockhurst's financial support.

"As president," Fr. Hunthausen wrote in a letter which appeared in the school newsletter, *The Review*, "my primary goal is to enhance the quality of Rockhurst as a Jesuit apostolate."







New Faculty Added


The 1979-80 school year saw the addition of seven new faculty members, including three Jesuits and four lay faculty.

Fr. John Apel, S.J., returned to Rockhurst after a fourteen-year absence. He taught two classes of junior chemistry and served as Jesuit rector. 





Course Changes Made To Better Curriculum


Several course and requirement changes have occurred in the last year, especially in the arts, physical education, and A.P. courses.

To teach all freshmen basics of chemistry, first-year students now are required to take one semester each of chemistry and speech. Juniors no longer have to take physical education, but along with seniors, may take one of three semester-long, five-day classes, including gymnastics, lifelong sports, and team sports.

A new business department also became a part of the curriculum this year. One new class, accounting, and typing were offered, too. The communication arts department expanded this year to include in the fine arts drawing and painting, graphic design, and art history. The speech-related courses newly created were mass media and oral interpretation.

In the math and sciences, psychobiology and computer math were offered.

The number of college-level courses available to juniors and seniors were increased. A.P. chemistry, physics, and two classes (A.P. and A.C.C.P.) in calculus were offered for the first time this year. Juniors could gain college credits from Avila by taking U.S. History Survey.


