Halloween Features Add Spice to Dance

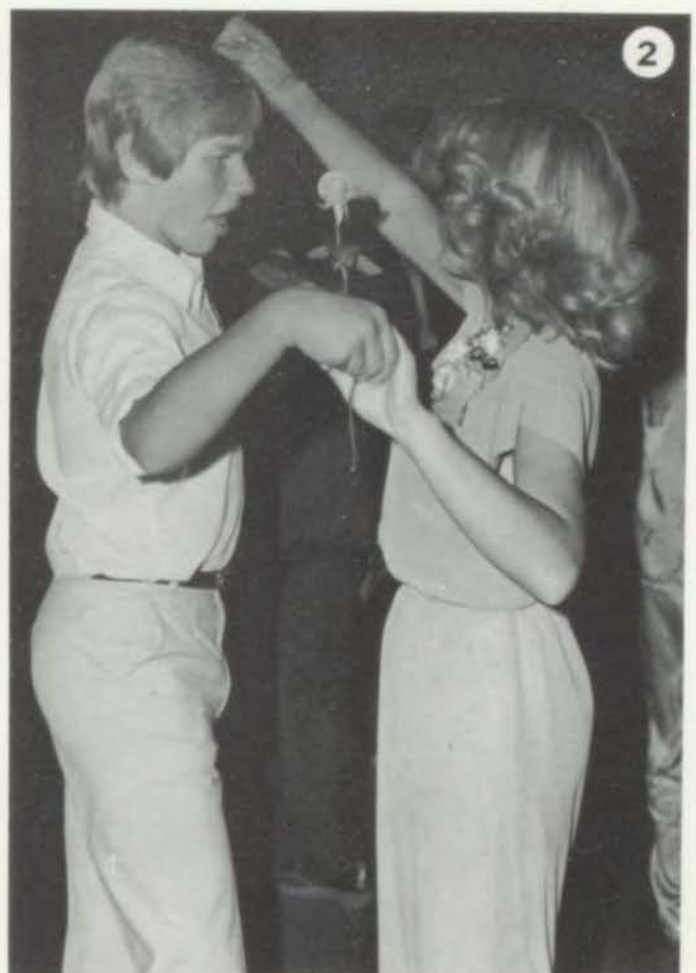

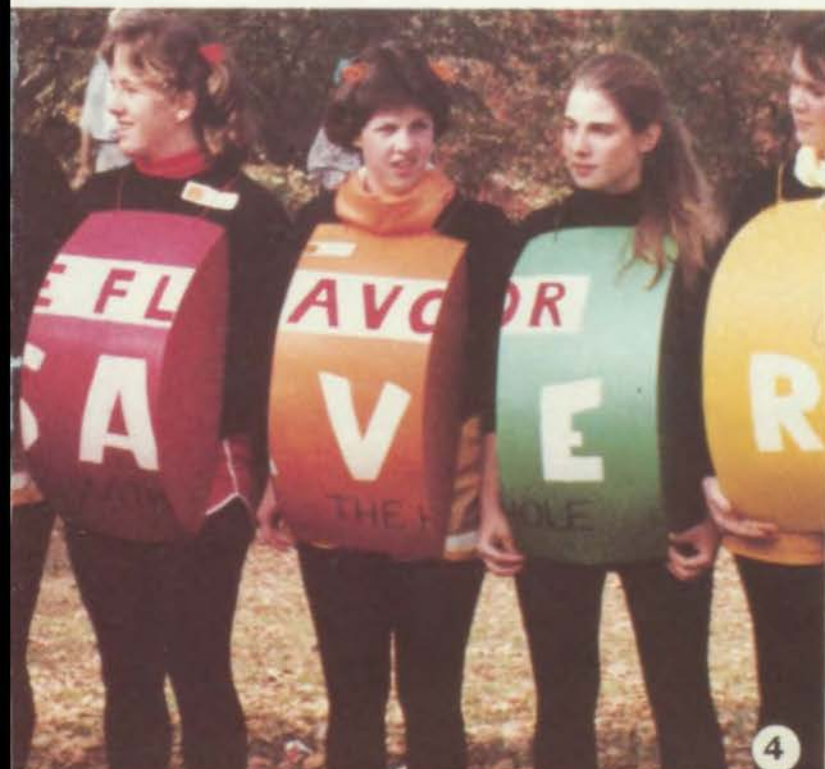

School, City, and Country Rocks with Events

The country saw a new change in philosophy and politics when Ronald Reagan rode a wave of national conservatism into the Presidency in November. The incumbent President Carter made a much-publicized appearance at Truman High School in October to drum up support from the Midwest in a losing cause. Mount Saint Helen's explosion in May seemed to characterize America's rage towards the continued Iranian Hostage crisis; meanwhile, Americans experienced joy when the American hockey team defeated the heavily favored Russian team at the Winter Olympics in February.

There were notable events closer to home. The Kansas City Royals destroyed their American League nemesis, the New York Yankees, to win the pennant and go to their first World Series ever. However, the Philadelphia Phillies stopped the team in six games. Our own football Hawkllets made the playoffs for the first time in three years and stopped the state's top-ranked team, the Raytown Bluejays. 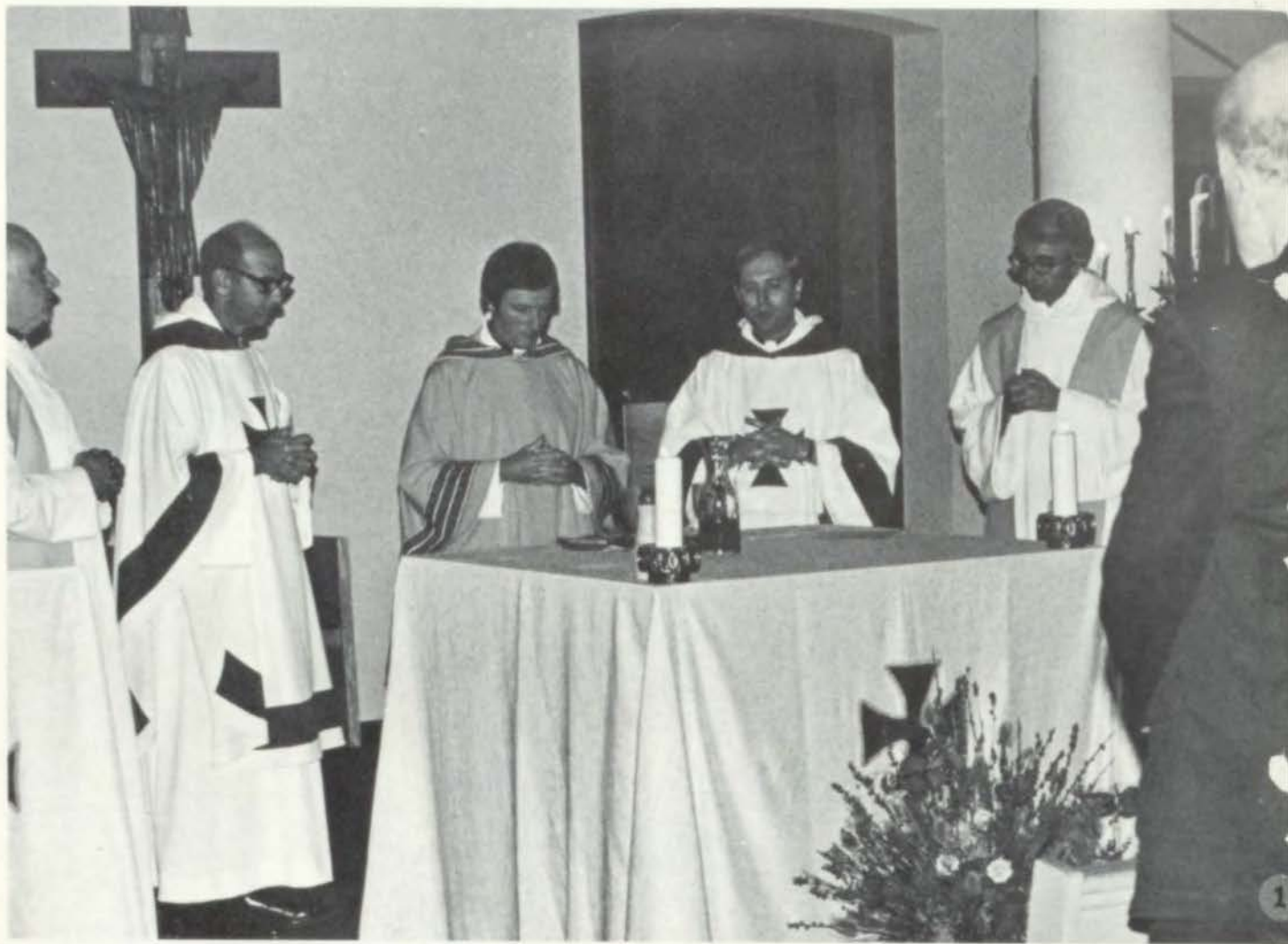

Program Expands

The 1980-81 pastoral program saw a major change when the program's retreats were scheduled from weekends to weekdays. This change enabled more students to participate fully in retreats without compromising weekend activities. Mr. Ruby became assistant director of the expanded program to handle the new retreat schedule.

Seniors were offered monthly retreat options at either Conception, Mo. or Saviour of the World in Kansas. A new site at Nevada was also used. The retreats, which focused on friendship, death, and family, involved students in discussion in a peaceful atmosphere without pressure from homework assignments. The juniors held their retreats at Saviour and Nevada. Sophomores held Days of Recollection at school in March. The freshman retreats were canceled because of conflicting schedules. Substitute activities were organized in lieu of freshman retreats.





Special Events Enliven School Year

Many events took place during the year that weren't covered by the yearbook due to their size or significance. However, others occurred that deserved more than passing attention. The Bloodmobile collected precious blood from volunteer students and faculty members in November; the annual Rockhurst Speech and Debate Tournament attracted twenty-three schools from several states in

October; Father Heinz took his final vows in December. Mr. McWilliams began a new program to introduce cultural events to the school, including a demonstration by two karate experts following the November honors assembly and a performance by a professional juggler in the January honors assembly.

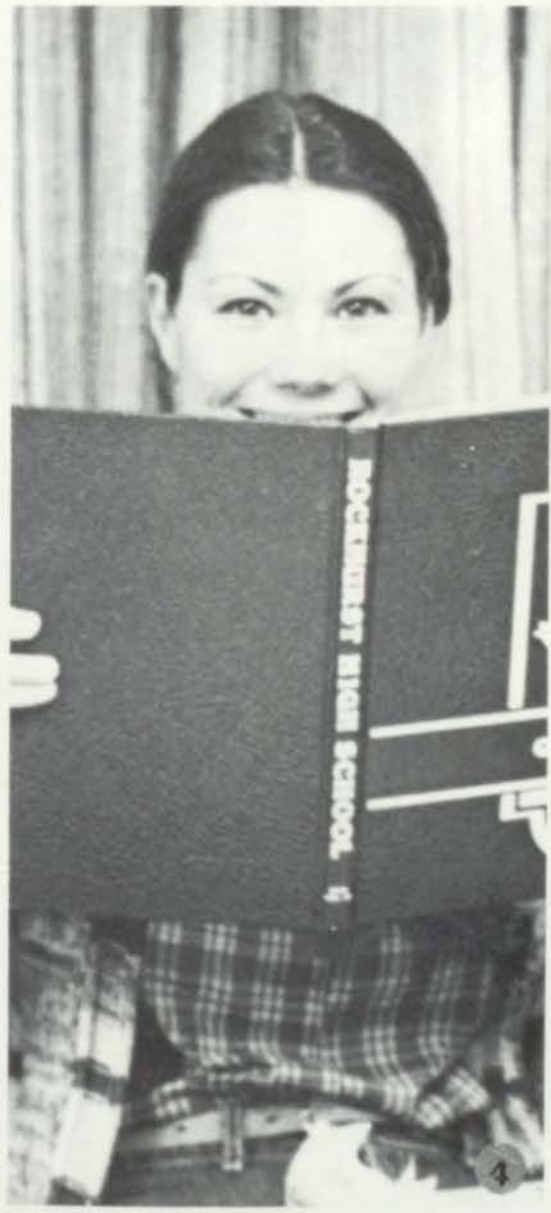
Talent Abounds

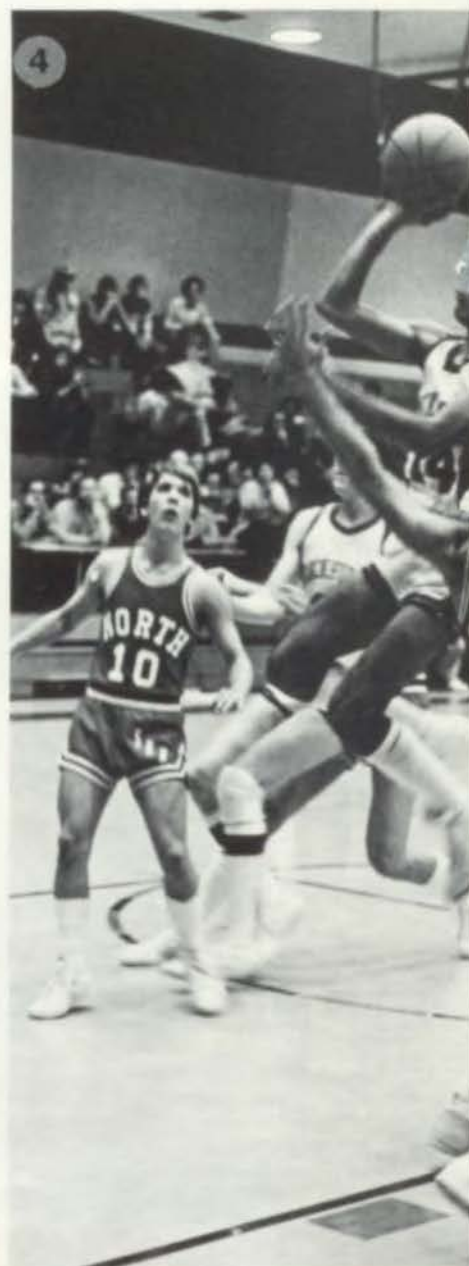

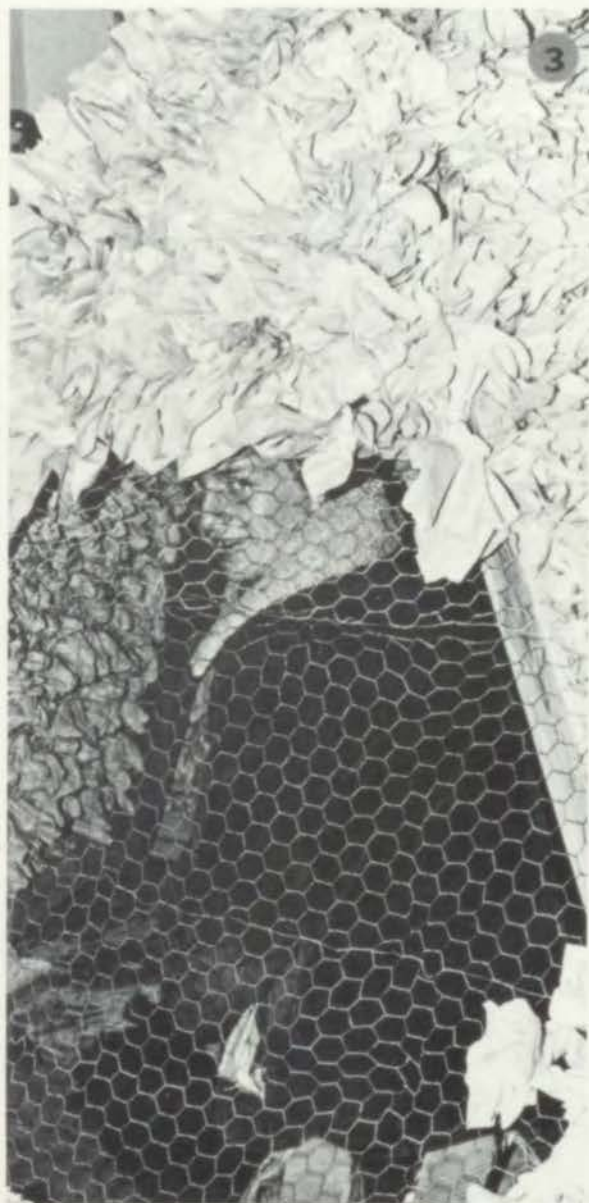


Photo Club

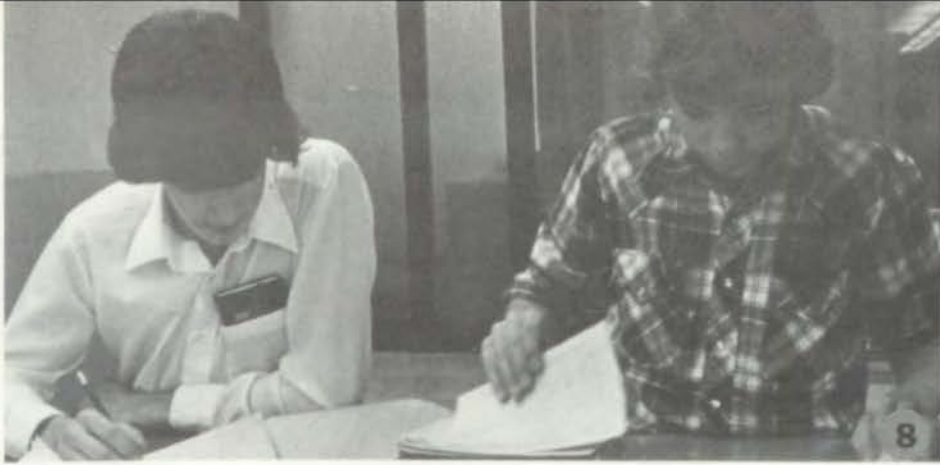

This advanced preparedness reflected many successful projects: Freshman Welcome Week, a magazine sales drive that netted \$4000 for the Council treasury, a "Hal-loween" Homecoming, a blood drive for the Community Blood Bank, "Project: Santa Claus" through which the Council played Santa to at least 250 students and faculty, a canned food drive for the Dunbar area of Kansas City, Mission: Possible Week, and other individual class activities.

During the summer President Greg Reintjes and Vice President Jim FitzGerald attended a student leaders workshop at Camp Cheley, Colorado; and Mrs. Carol Jean DeFeo, the new advisor, attended a seminar sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals for Student Activity Coordinators.

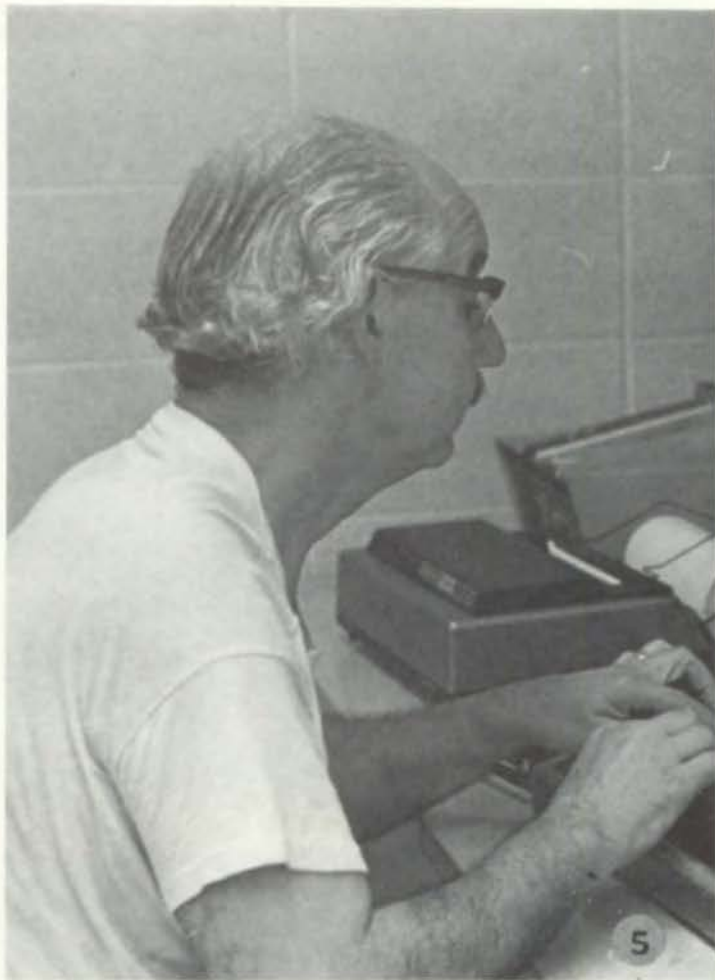




L&S Sounds Off

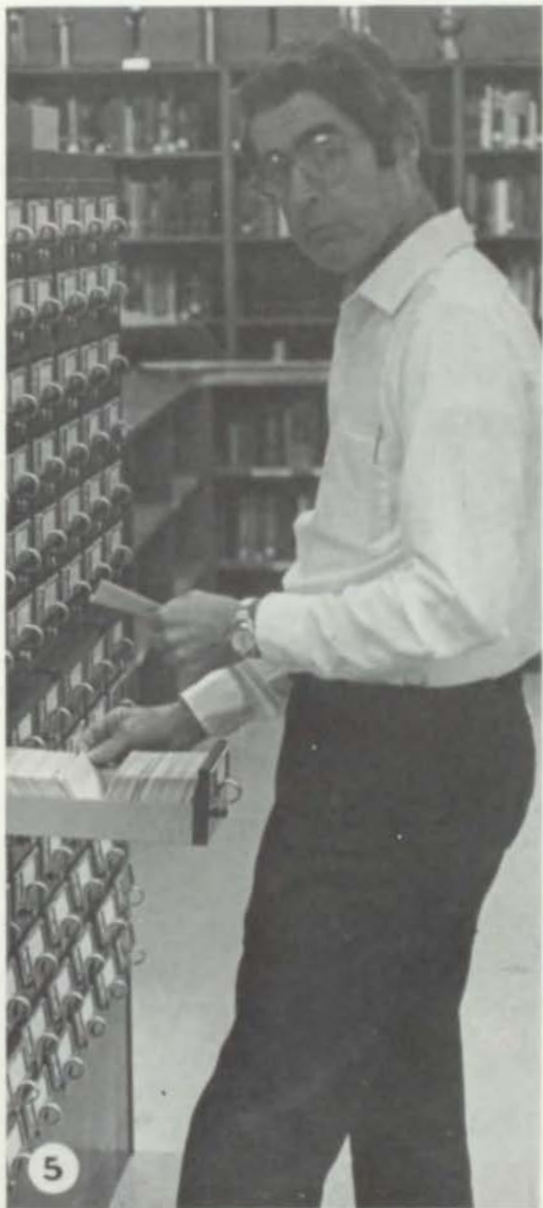
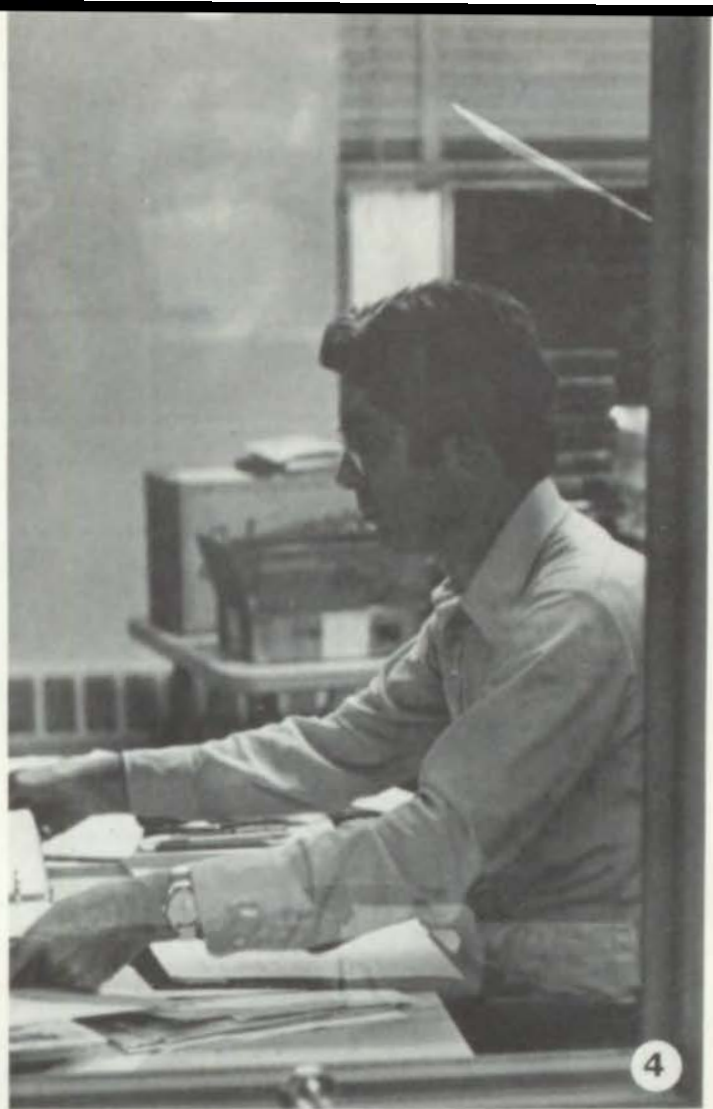


New Look for Staff

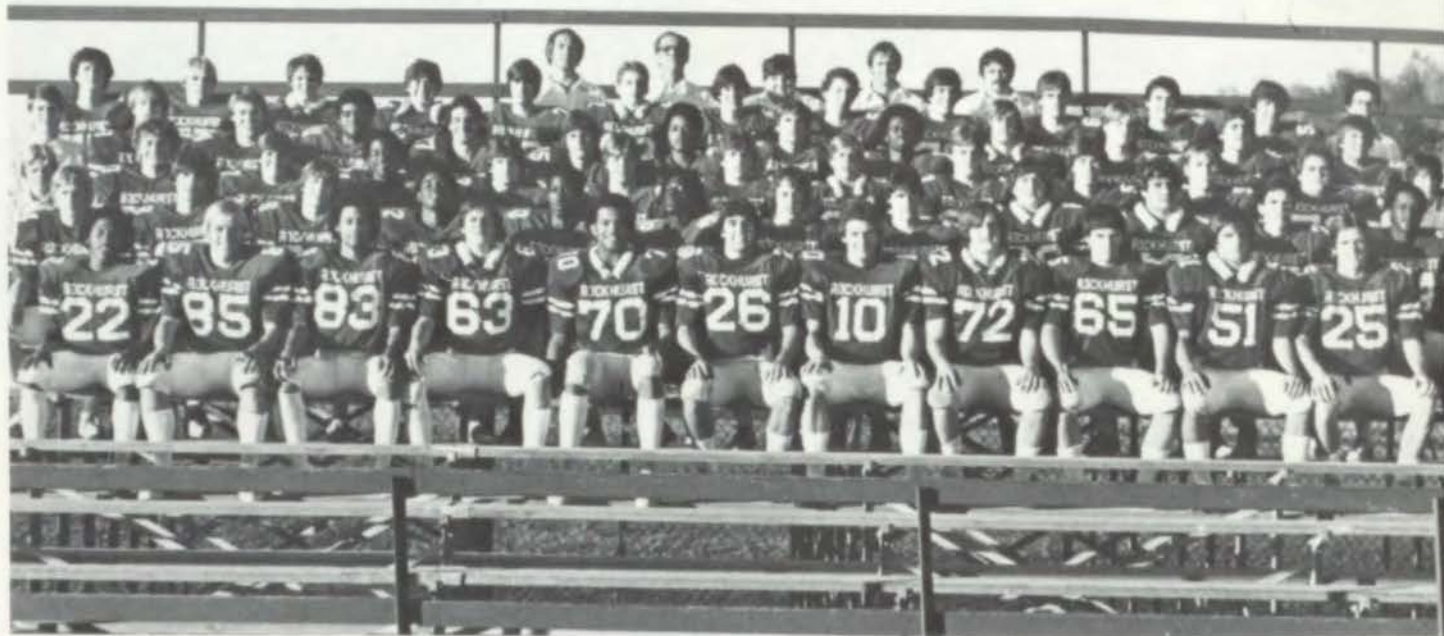

Hawklets Make Playoffs With 8-2 Season

With the loss of 26 seniors from last year's 8-1 squad, the 1980 Hawklets faced what looked like a year of rebuilding. A 17-6 loss to the number-one ranked area high school team, the Raytown Blue Jays, in the opening game of the season confirmed that the team might not be as successful as it had been in past years. 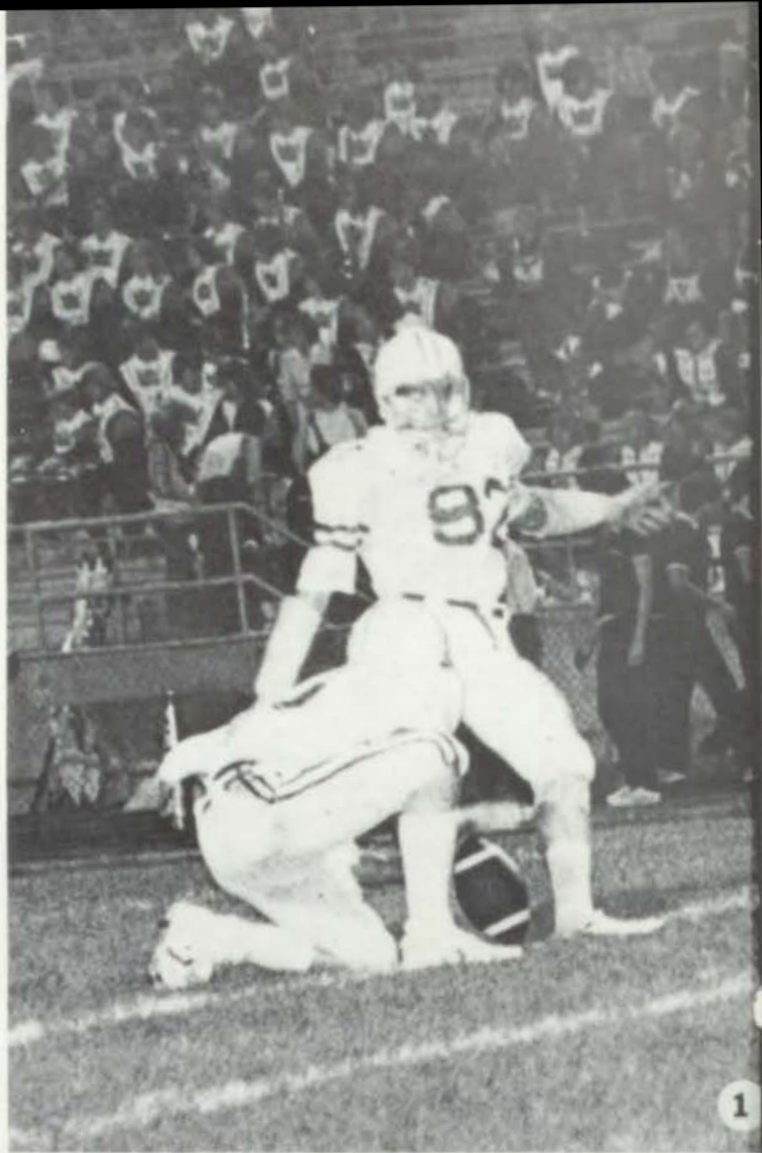

Because of this ruling, Rockhurst took its 8-2 record against Raytown, 10-0, into the District Seven playoff game. Rockhurst avenged the earlier loss by surprising the overconfident Blue Jays 24-7. However, the Dist. 8 champion, Raytown South, extinguished Hawklet dreams of St. Louis by beating them 14-0.

The second factor in the Hawklet playoff drive was a gutsy, determined squad that refused to quit. There was the strong offensive unit led by senior quarterback David Cone, which featured the running of junior tailback Tony Fritz, who rushed for 810 yards for the season and the Hawklets' All-Metro all-everything wingback Mickey Miller, who was all over the field, running the ball, catching passes, and making key interceptions on defense as cornerback. An equally impressive defense with All-Metro selections, senior David Alough and junior Brad Tyrer at the line, contributed their skills in helping shut off offenses of such teams as the eventual Class 3A champions, O'Hara, and Raytown in the district playoffs.



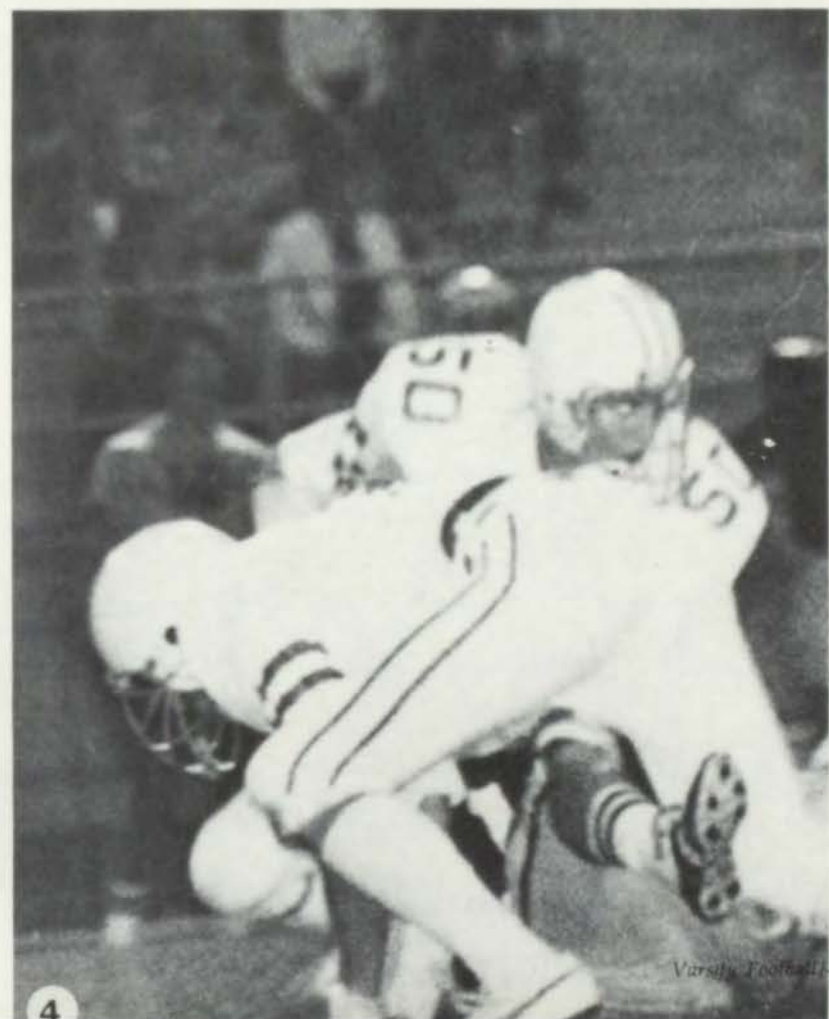

J.V. Goes Undefeated

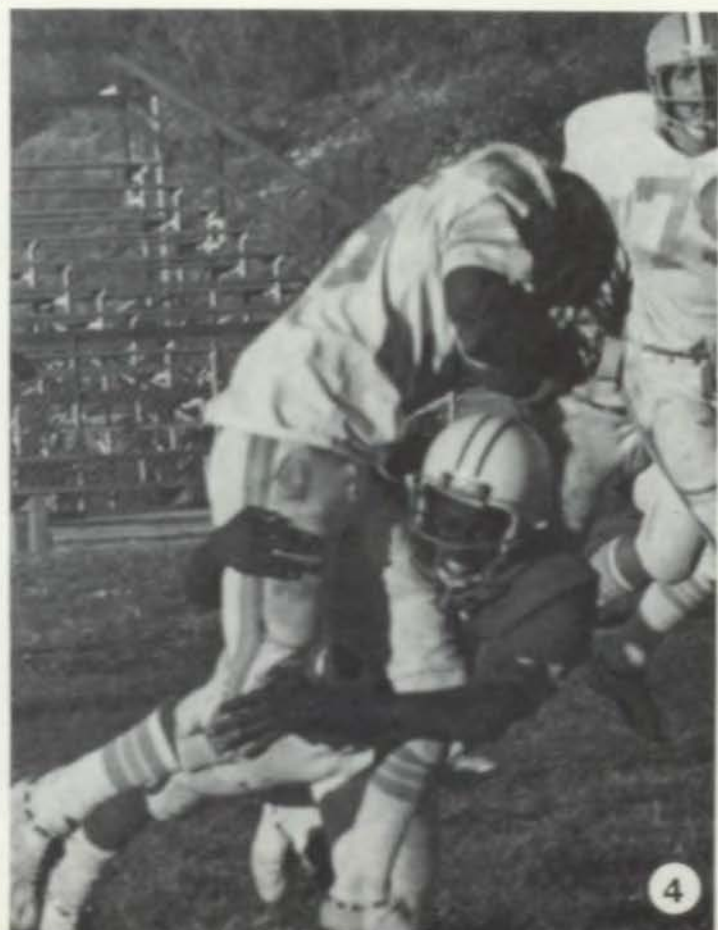

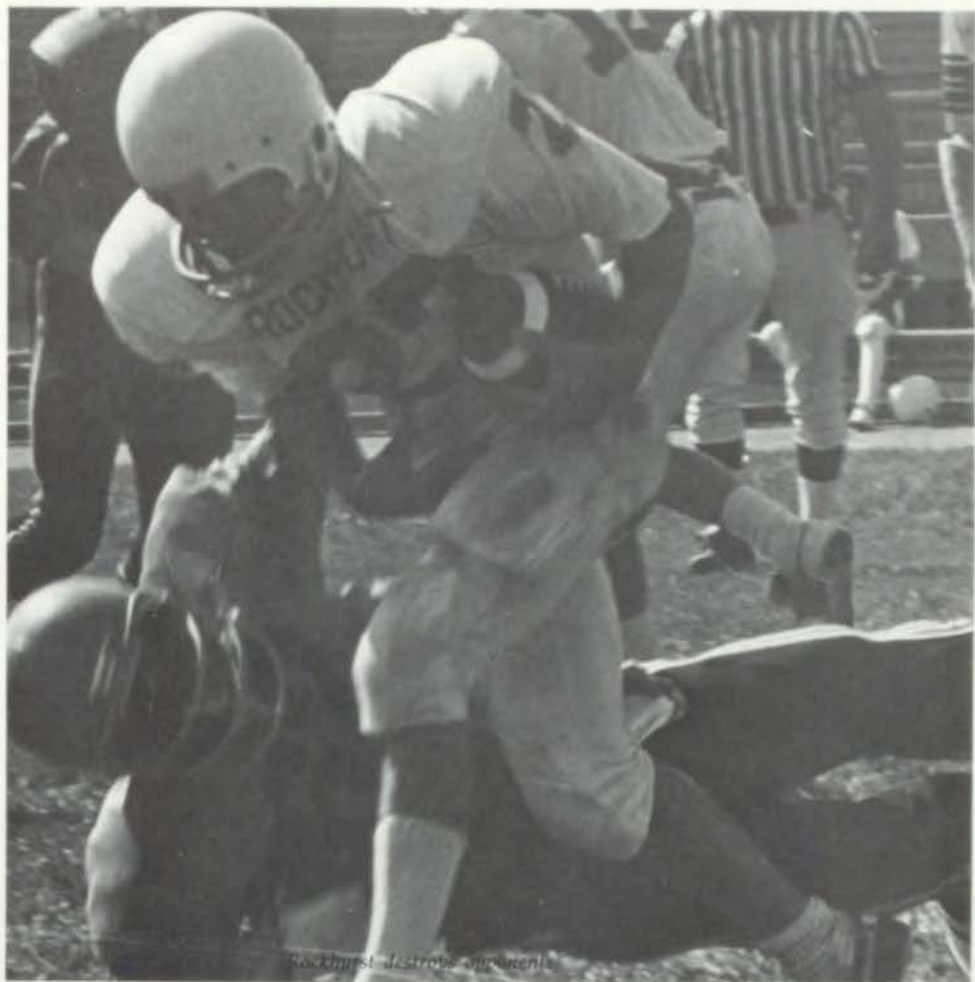

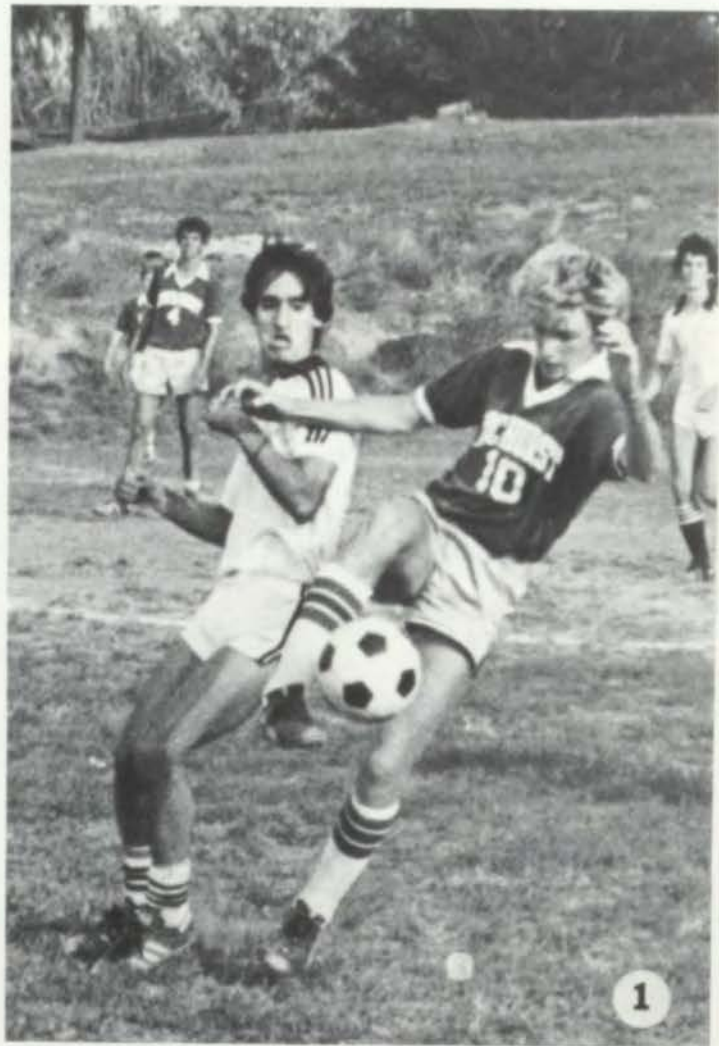

Soccer Team Wins District

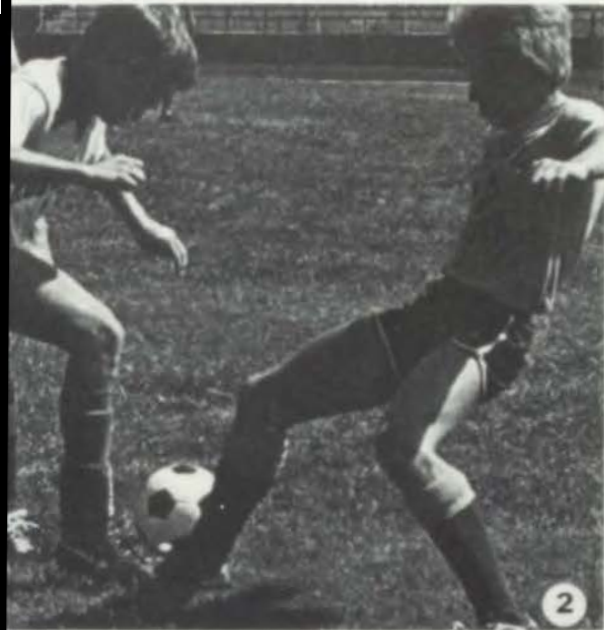

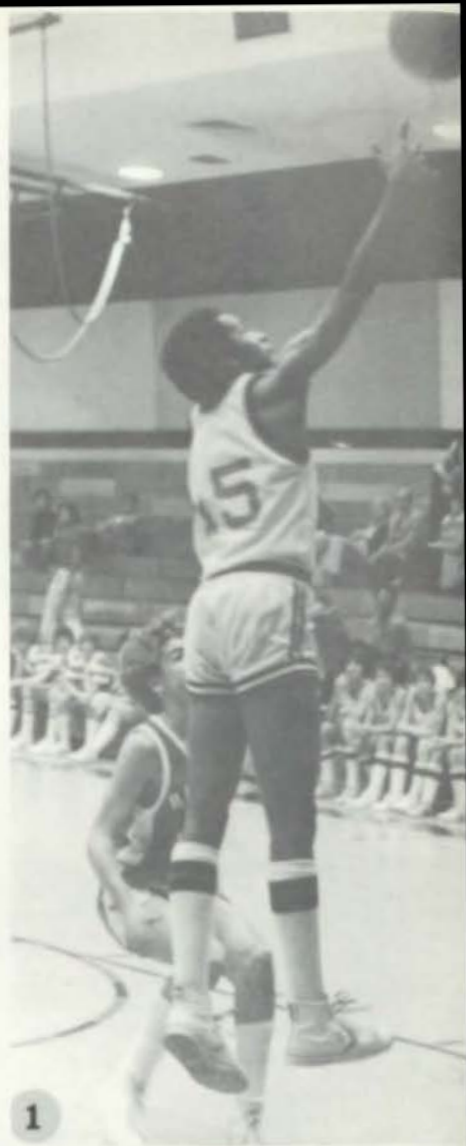


Soph/Frosh Dominate

Rockhurst's underclassmen teams dominated area opponents this season, running their composite record to 30-15. All three teams showed great balance and promise.

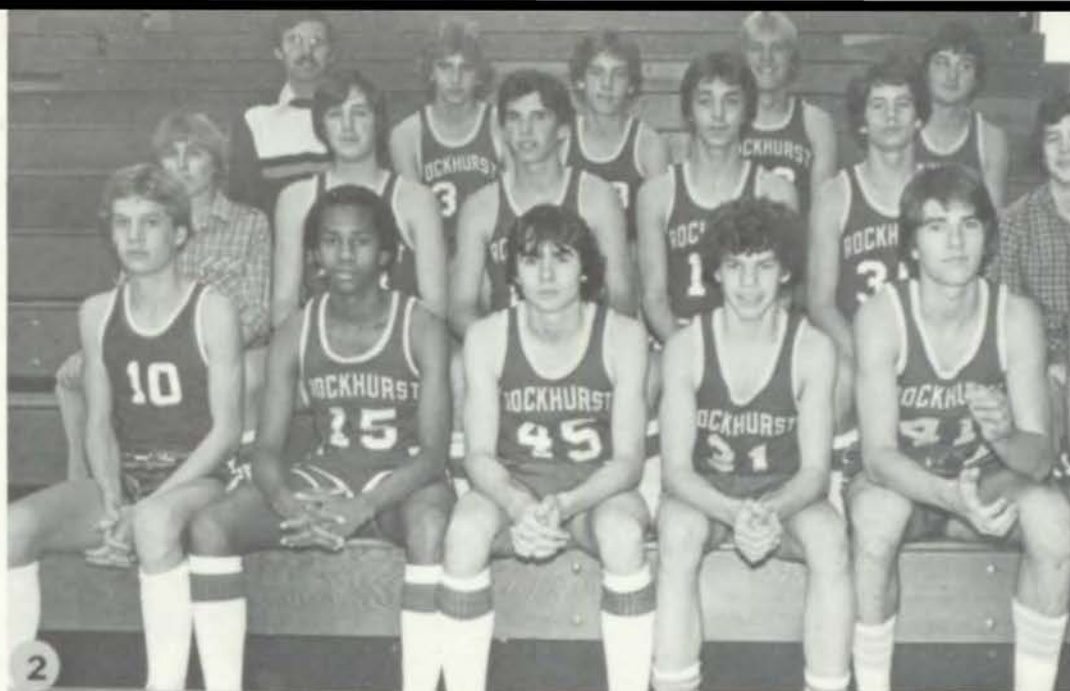

Juniors who earned Varsity letters were Mike Grosko, Mike Lipari, Matt Wurster, and Andy Oldham.

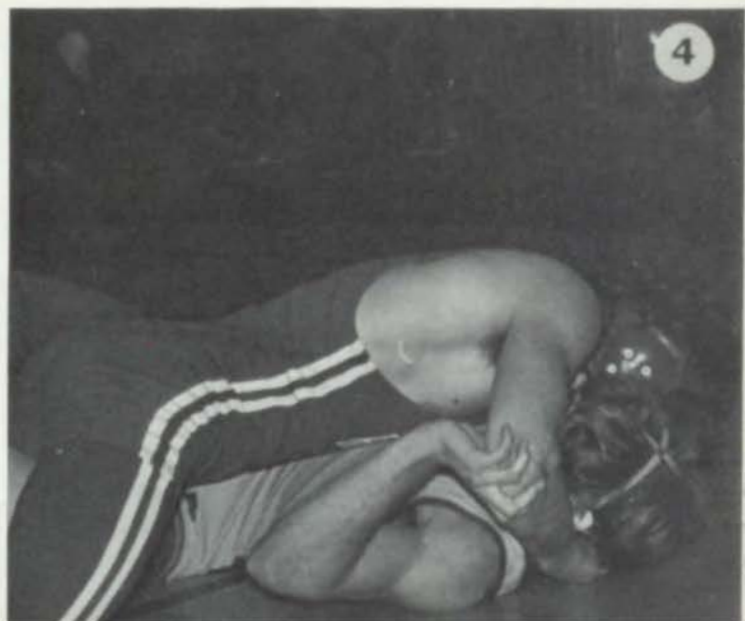
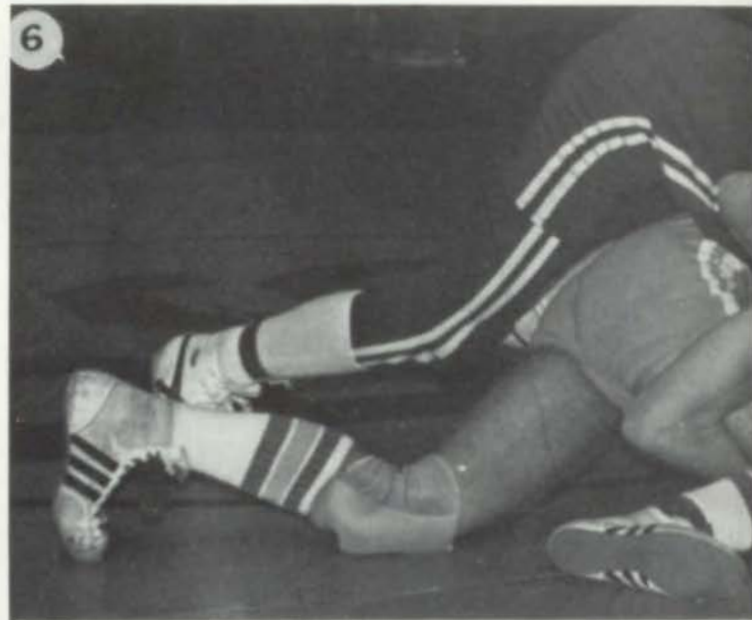

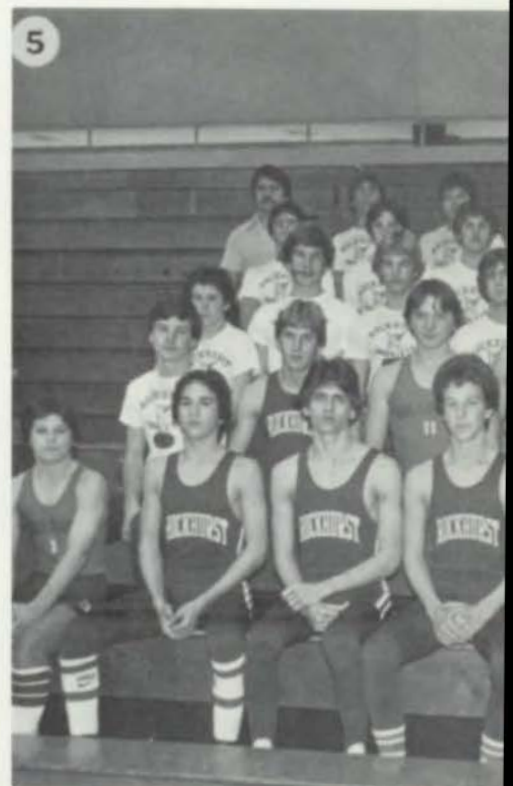


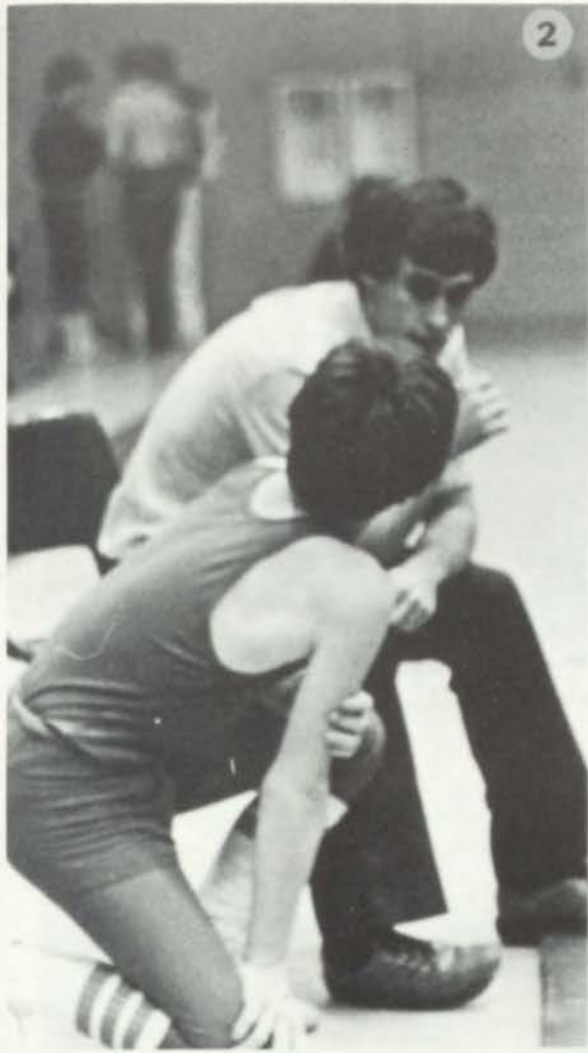
J.V. Shows Great Depth
