


















HOMECOMING 1986

CUESTERS PRESENT ANOTHER FINE YEAR


Once again the Rockhurst high school drama club presented a series of very finely acted and produced plays. The cuesters this year were made up of many returning members as well as new faces.





Friday saw Rockhurst's own version of Trivial Pursuit, which was sponsored by the Senior class. The Junior team came away with the victory.






PREP NEWS




SPEECH AND DEBATE

Rockhurst hosted its own tournament in November. "We received many good comments about our judges and timers. Everything ran very smoothly and on time," said Mr. Ramsey.


The team also competed in Districts, NSL Districts, State, and Elmore participated in National competition. He finished seven rounds which put him in the top one fourth.

SADD


As Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD) rolled through the year, they made two major changes.



The choir grew to about 10-15 students and more faculty members joined. Mr. William Stierle and Mr. John Morris were the only returning faculty members.




THE RHS LATIN CLUB



FALL YELL LEADERS









HAWKLETS DOMINATE K.C. SOCCER SCENE




"We were physically and skillfully superior to all of our opponents," freshman Coach Cornolo said.





JV COMPLETES IMPRESSIVE SEASON






SOPHOMORES GAIN EXPERIENCE






HARRIERS RUN TO STATE

Worth stated that hard work would bring out the team's potential. "They need to run during the summer to keep in shape. This is very important if the






team is going to excel," he said.
























CAGERS ROCK STATE, FINISH SECOND

Deafening chants of "We are Rockhurst" and "Rock State" were heard in gymnasiums across the state of Missouri this year as the Hawklet varsity Cagers made it past district play for the first time in 15 years on their way to a second place finish in the state.

Under the direction of Head Coach Doug Bruce and assistants Mark Bubalo and John Morris, the team ended the season with a record of 23-8 and added another banner to the north wall of the RHS gym.

The season began with a loss to a very tough Ruskin team and ended rather anti-climactically with a 72-43 loss to St. Louis Vashon in the state title game. In between, however, were the ingredients that make for an outstanding season.

Along with district and sectional championships, the season featured many ups and downs; five overtime games (three for losses), victories over traditional rivals Center and Blue Springs, and a victory over highly touted Wyandotte.

At mid-season the squad reached its low point of the year following losses to Winnetonka (2 OT), Raytown South (OT), and Blue Springs, as its record dropped to 11-6. The losses to both Winnetonka and Blue Springs were avenged in dramatic games during State Tournament play.

But in their final 12 games, the Hawklets' only setbacks were a loss to SM West in overtime and to Vashon in the title game.


The road to state was a bumpy one. After an opening round victory over Center, RHS won its first district title in a long time by defeating Southwest, 89-74. RHS then travelled to the campus of William Jewell College in Liberty to face Blue Springs for the third time.

As the game came to a close, the capacity crowd left Liberty with smiles on their faces and arms raised in victory. RHS had dominated its opponent in the 82-74 win, their first of the year over the Wildcats.

From there the squad travelled to Lexington where they were to face the Griffins of Winnetonka at Wentworth Military Academy. In a dramatic game, RHS needed free throws from junior John Cooper with no time on the clock to come away with a 73-71 victory. From there, it was on to the Final Four action for the Hawklets as they advanced to Columbia for the first time since 1971.

After a relatively easy win, 69-52, over Springfield Glendale in semi-final play, the Hawklet squad was beaten in the finals by defending champs Vashon, a team with a 31-1 record. The game, which ended 72-43, saw Coach Bruce's squad score only 14 points at the half.







Cooper showing his team leadership














IMPRESSIVE RECORD, OUTSTANDING TEAM

The Rockhurst JV basketball squad finished the 1985-86 season with a highly impressive 17-1 record. The 17 wins is the most by a junior varsity team in recent years. The Hawklets opened the season in impressive fashion by blowing out Ruskin by 33 points, 85-52. The Hawklets entered the Rockhurst JV tournament with a 2-0 record and again defeated Ruskin in the opening round, 77-56. 





The Sophomore basketball team finished its year 12-8 this year which is a little below par for the usual RHS sophomore cagers but is equally impressive considering the schedule they were up against.



Coach Munninghoff cited Eric Fisher and Scott Mason as two players who were consistent in practice and play.


But the ability to rise to the occasion was stifled sometimes, however, as was manifested in their eight losses. But of these losses many were close, hard fought games that could have gone either way at times.





"Hickey surprised a lot of people by placing that high, and he's got another year to win it all," commented Coach Wikiera.


"It took a lot of time and dedication, but it was all for State, and it was all worth it," commented Hickey.



Hampered by injuries, line up changes, and promotions to the variety and junior variety squads, the freshmen managed to make do with what they had and win doing it



















TRACK BUILDING FOR FUTURE




The highpoint of this years team as a unit came at the Miege Relays where RHS finished second.







To look forward to next year, RHS is losing Mcdonald, Looney and Aubin, but upcoming sophomore Rich Miller did impress Coach Geldhof.


"Richie will probably be a strong player next year, and I feel our JV will have to play tough too," commented Geldhof.

Miller did at times play at the varsity level, and has shown experience and prominence, as stated by Geldhof.




There was also the second place finish in the annual Heart of America Tournament for the golf squad,




Rockhurst also beat Lee's Summit with a score of 151. "The boys played outstanding and we did great in districts," Davis added.












Presidential Change in 1986




Sophomores enjoy Homecoming

SENIOR PROM


