School spirit was apparent when over \$3,000 was raised for the Jesuit missions in Belize.

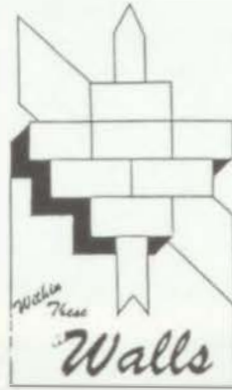
As the editor of this book, I had to choose a theme for this yearbook that would pull all the activities of

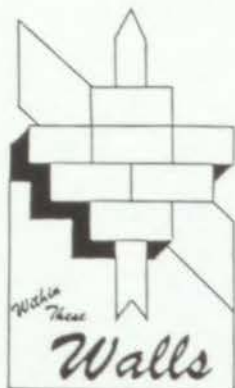

Soccer goes to State

The Hawklets entered their second straight semifinal game with only one thought--win. The only thing that stood between Rockhurst and stingy Hazelwood Central Hawks. Rockhurst went up 1-0 as Matt Ruark rocketed a volley from the top of the penalty box into the top of the net. With a little breathing room, the Hawklets intensified their efforts, this time rewarded by a Keith Jarmusch goal with the assist coming from Chuck Reid. Hazelwood battled back in the second half and finally put a goal away late in the game. It was the only blemish on the day for goalkeeper Chris Damico, who contributed yet another stellar performance. The Rock won the game 2-1, but suffered a great loss when Jarmusch injured his knee and was unable to play in the ensuing State Championship Game.

The road to state had been long and rocky, but the Rock emerged from the pack facing national power, CBC, an

extremely high-powered team, but were ready for the challenge.

The cold, misty day created a sort of somber atmosphere for the contest. Both teams excitedly worked the ball early, but settled into a cautious game style. The Rockhurst defense was a major factor in the game, repelling CBC's potent offense with stiff tackling and tenacious marking. Again, Damico was right on form, stuffing CBC's forwards time and time again. However, CBC was able to capitalize on an opportunity for an early 1-0 lead.

The second half was full of the same hard action, with the Hawklets desperately attacking the CBC goal without mercy. The game ended in an anti-climactic 1-0 loss for the Rock, but the team took the loss with great dignity. Coach Geldhof, ever the good sport, had reason to be proud of his first time ever state runner-up Hawklets.

Rockhurst moves into the Future

The future is becoming a reality as "Foundations Forever" starts a three-year improvement program.

The first stage is the construction of a fine arts building, built by Massman Construction Company. It will provide students with a place for presentation, artistic creation, and worship.

The second stage is a library/resource center, a research facility where students will be able to enter into a pre-college setting which provides a place for reading and reflection.

Finally, a \$1 million endowment fund will expand the current tuition assistance program.

The total cost for these improvements is \$3 million, to be raised over the next three years. Money will be raised through generous contributions from alumni, parents, and concerned members of the Kansas City community.

With these improvements, Rockhurst makes its move into the 21st century.

The freshman event was well attended and (of course) won by the faculty with a score of 61-60, as Coach John Morris hit the front end of a one-and-one free throw with time expiring.

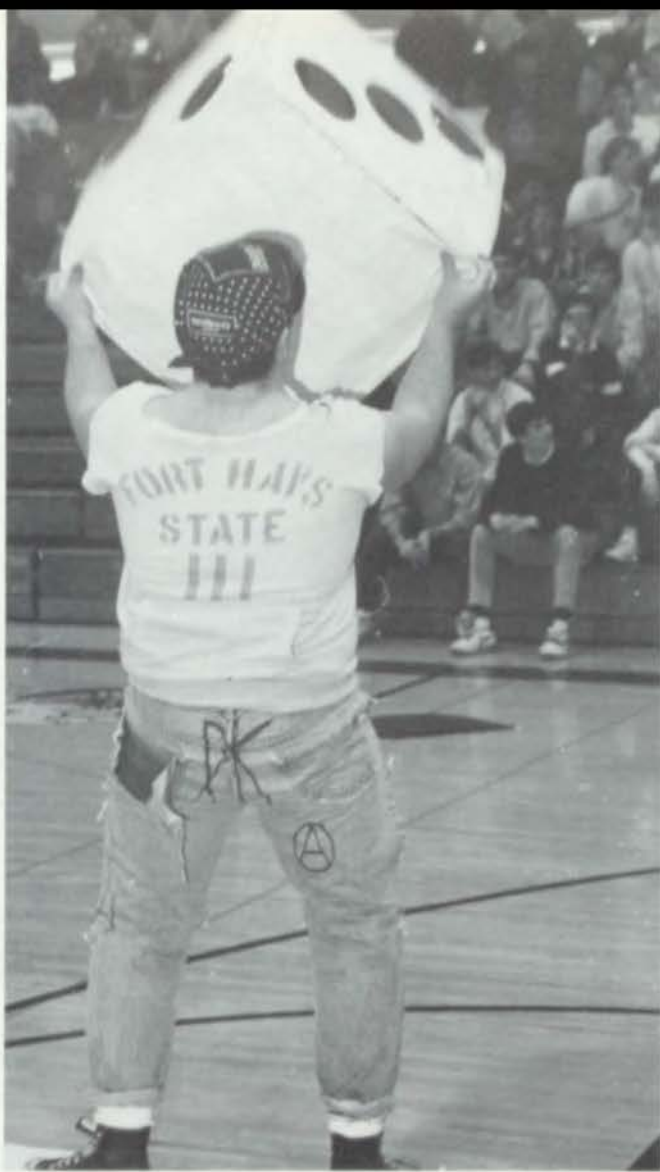
The Junior Class won the senior-sponsored Trivial Pursuit game. The seniors and sophomores tied for second, while the freshmen ended in last place.

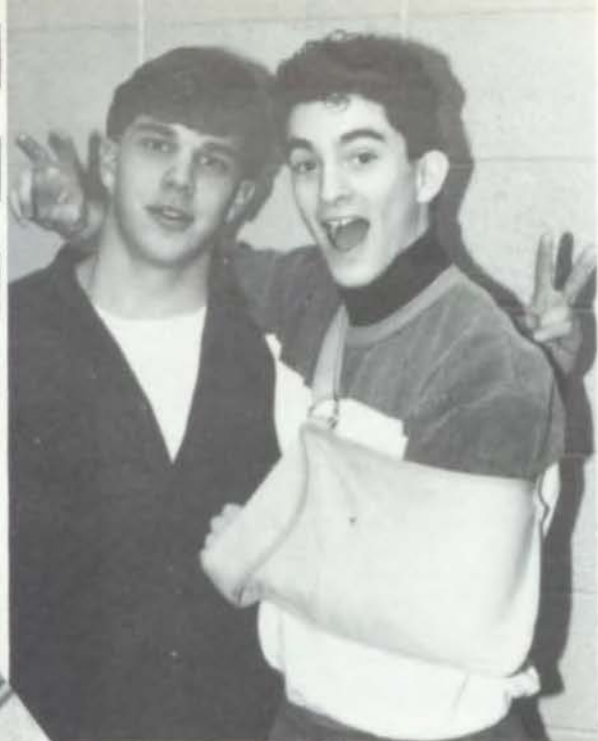

NHS has a memorable year

By organizing many events and projects, the National Honor Society has been an instrument of service for several years.

This year NHS was particularly strong, a feature which has been attributed to both the members and the various officers but especially to senior Brian Armstrong, who was the 1988-89 NHS president.

"Armstrong has a real vision. He has a good sense of organization and has been more able to take charge," said NHS moderator Mr. Tom Norman.

An example of an improvement made by Armstrong was increasing the number of service hours required to be admitted into NHS. The hours for juniors were raised from twenty to twenty five, and for seniors they were increased to twenty.

"This was done, not to make NHS more exclusive, but so the candidates would take a more active part in providing service to the community," said Armstrong.

Other requirements include being in the top twenty percent (cumulative) of the class, writing a two-page essay, and regular attendance at meetings.

Another policy of Armstrong's was the rule that, if a candidate has five unexcused absences from meetings, he is dropped from the Society. "This is so there is a year-long participation and people do not just join and then forget about it," said Armstrong.

Among the activities NHS sponsored this year were the NHS Mixer, the evening honors assembly, which was highlighted by a speech by the American Baseball League President Dr. Bobby Brown, and the Battle of the Bands.

"It has been one of the best years we've ever had. This is due to the dedication and commitment of personnel, officers, and even the individual members," said Mr. Norman.

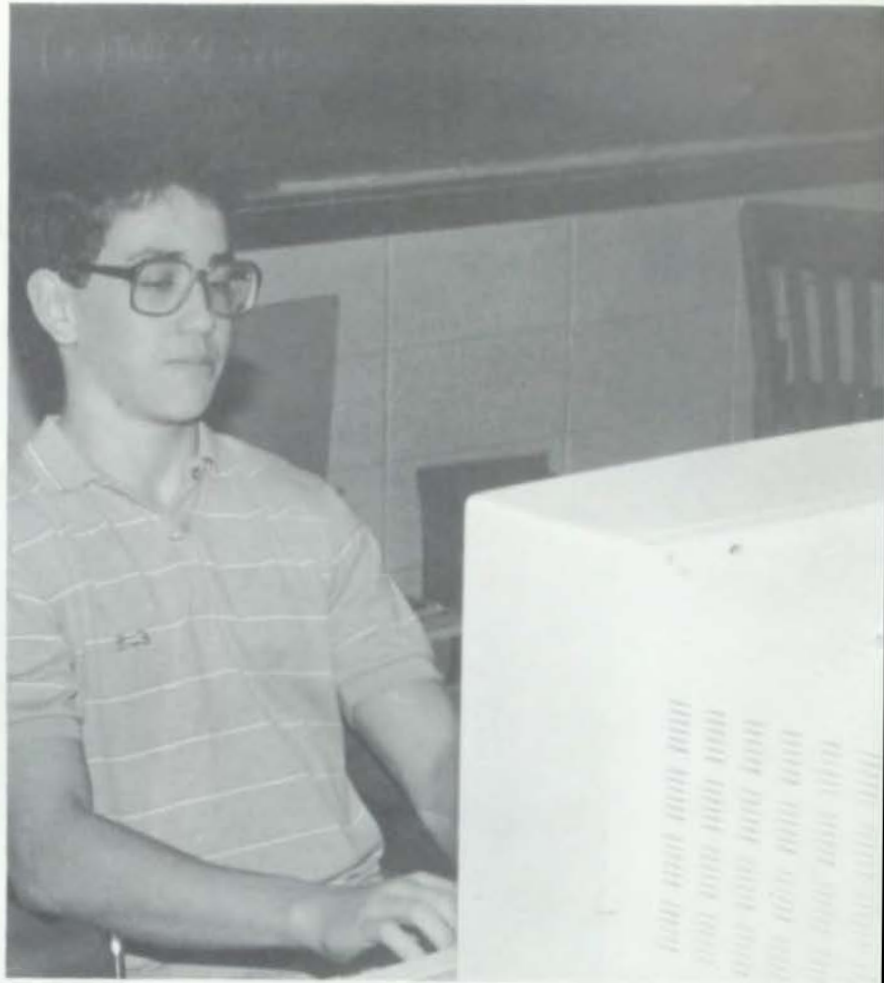

The Math Department, headed by Mrs. Carol DeFeo, has continued to prepare Rockhurst students for college by making changes in its program. These changes involve the math curriculum and incorporating computer equipment into the classroom.

A new benefit for Rockhurst students has been the introduction of the computer into the classroom. Mr. Frank Lyngar, Algebra II and analysis teacher, began using a computer to graph equations in class three years ago. "The computer allows me to get into more depth. Problems that would usually take the entire class period to graph can now be shown in a matter of seconds." Through the use of computers and hand held calculators, students are able to cover more material in less time.

A recent study stated that 75% of all graduating high school seniors are unprepared for college-level math (calculus). Mr. Lyngar agreed with the report but stated that roughly 75% of the Rockhurst graduates are prepared for college level calculus. This is made possible through the diverse course selection at RHS. Students choose from over nine levels of math courses ranging from Algebra I to Advanced Placement Calculus II. These courses can meet the needs of practically any student.

Although America as a whole seems to be failing in the areas of math and science, RHS continues to prepare its students for college and beyond through the continual addition of new tools and techniques.

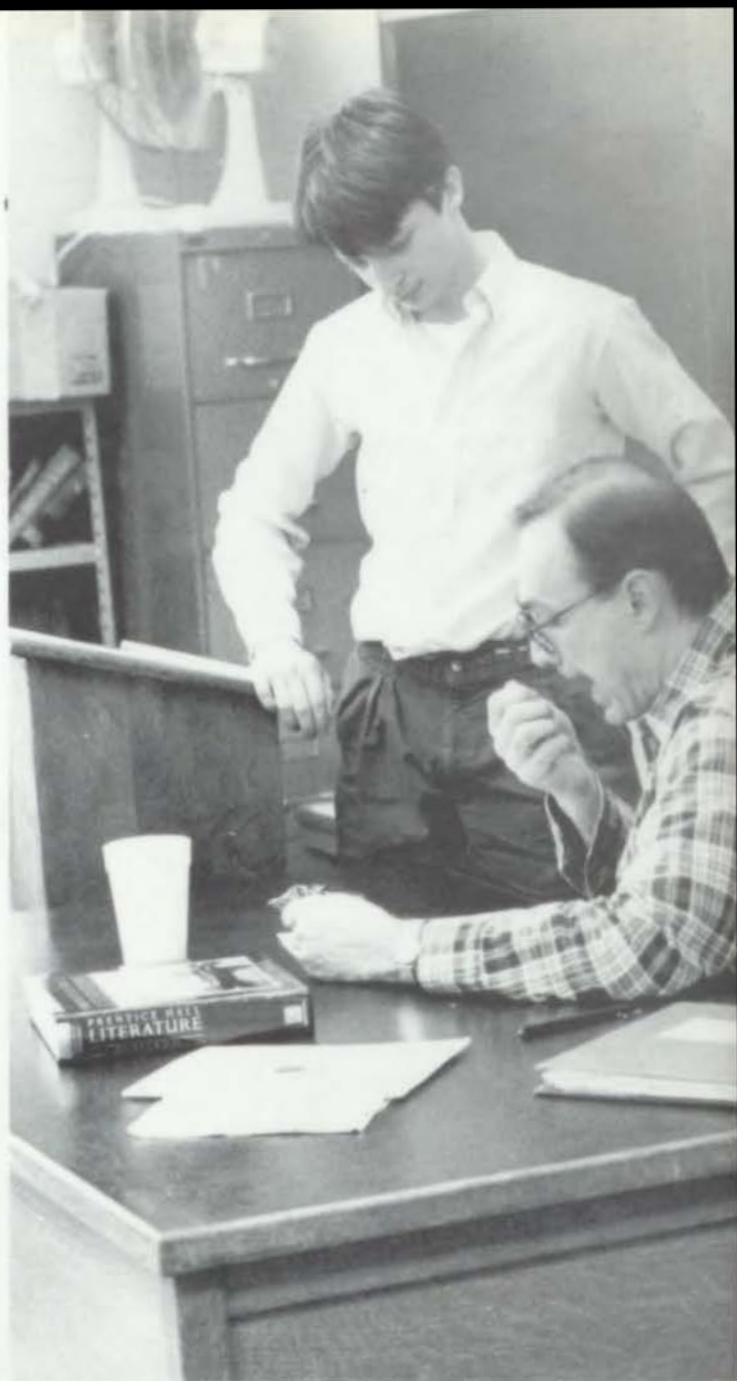
Along with her, others in the English department feel that students are appreciating literature more than in past years.

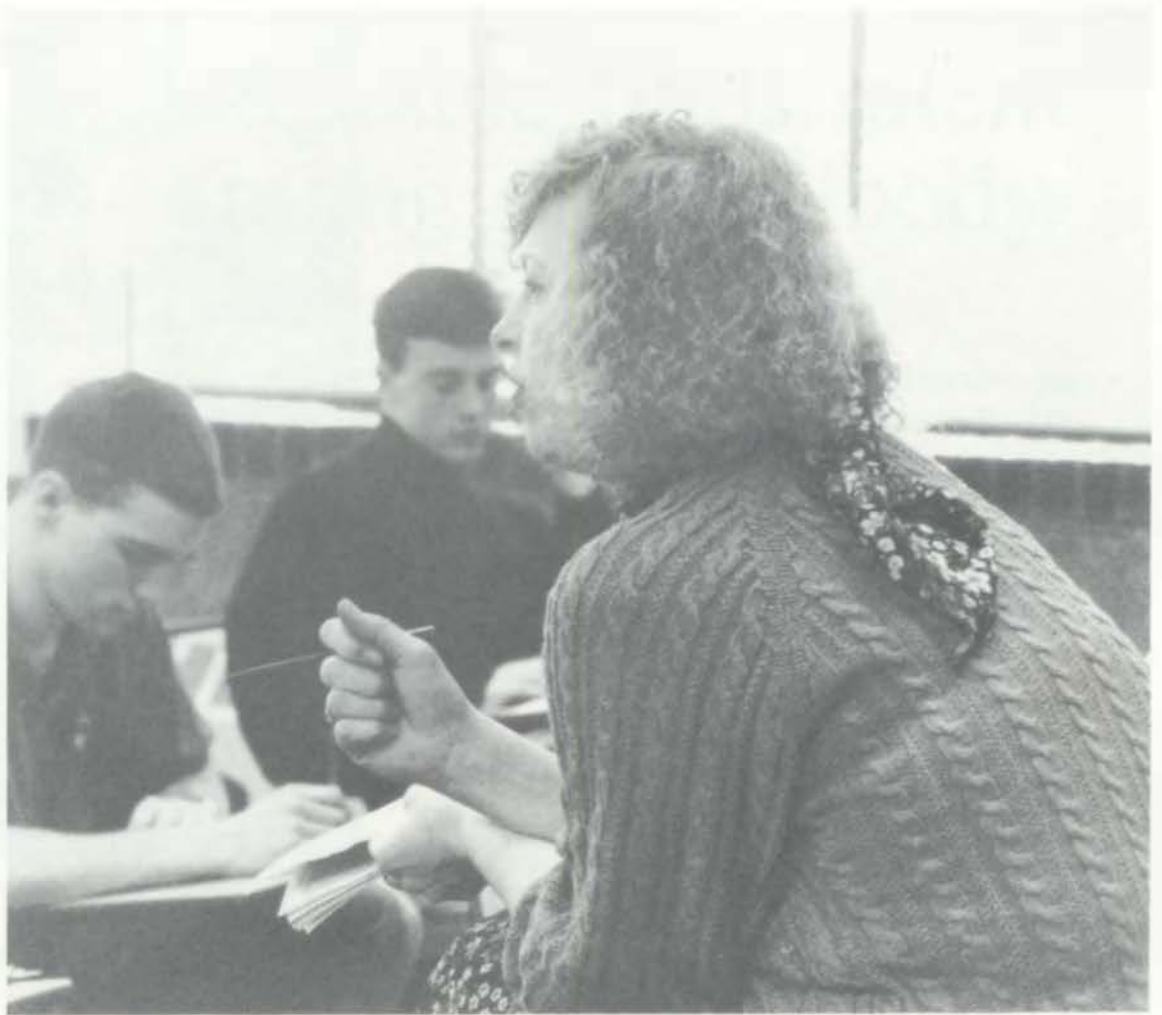

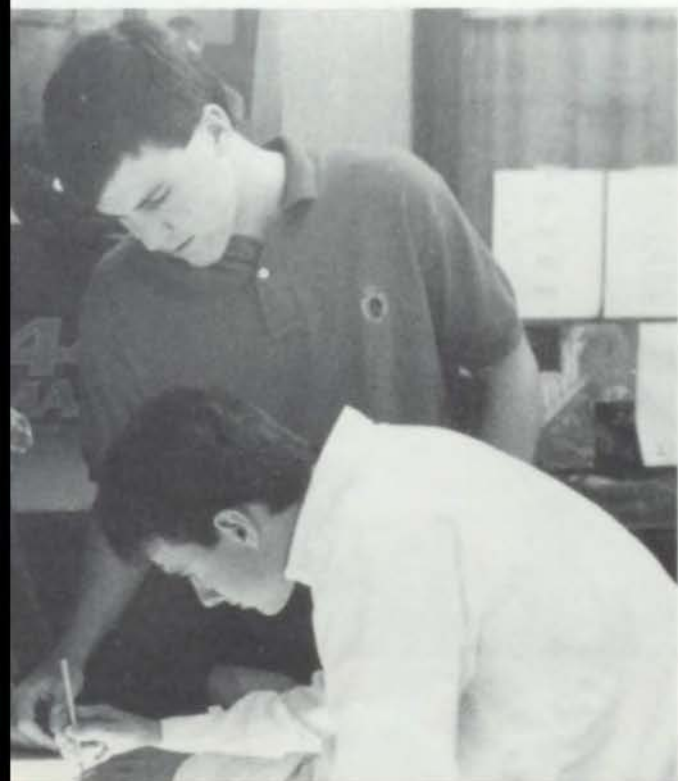

It is hard to get staff members to give up their time after school and time on into the summer months but some make the sacrifice and follow through with the commitment they made to themselves and other members on the staff.

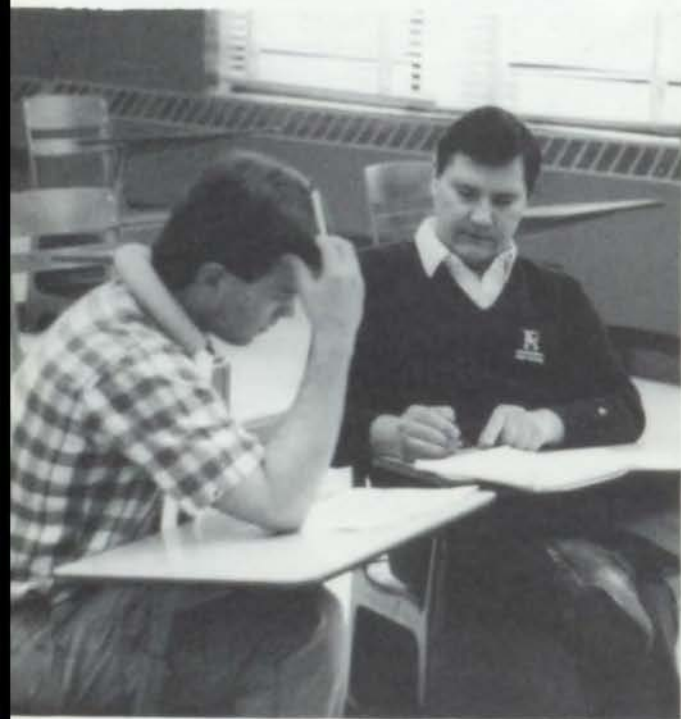

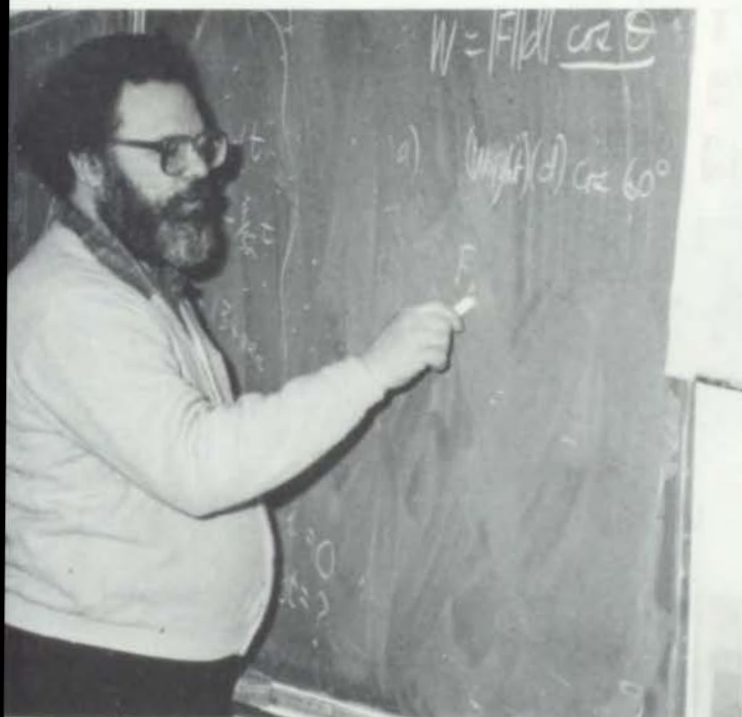
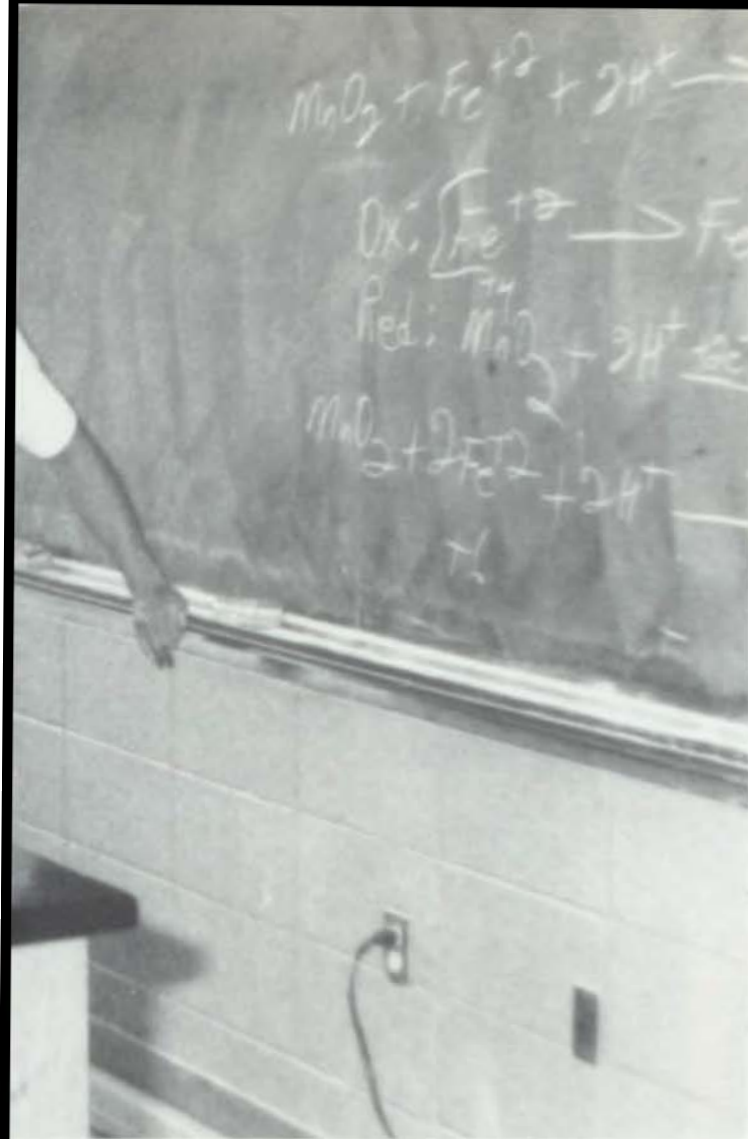
Science looks beyond

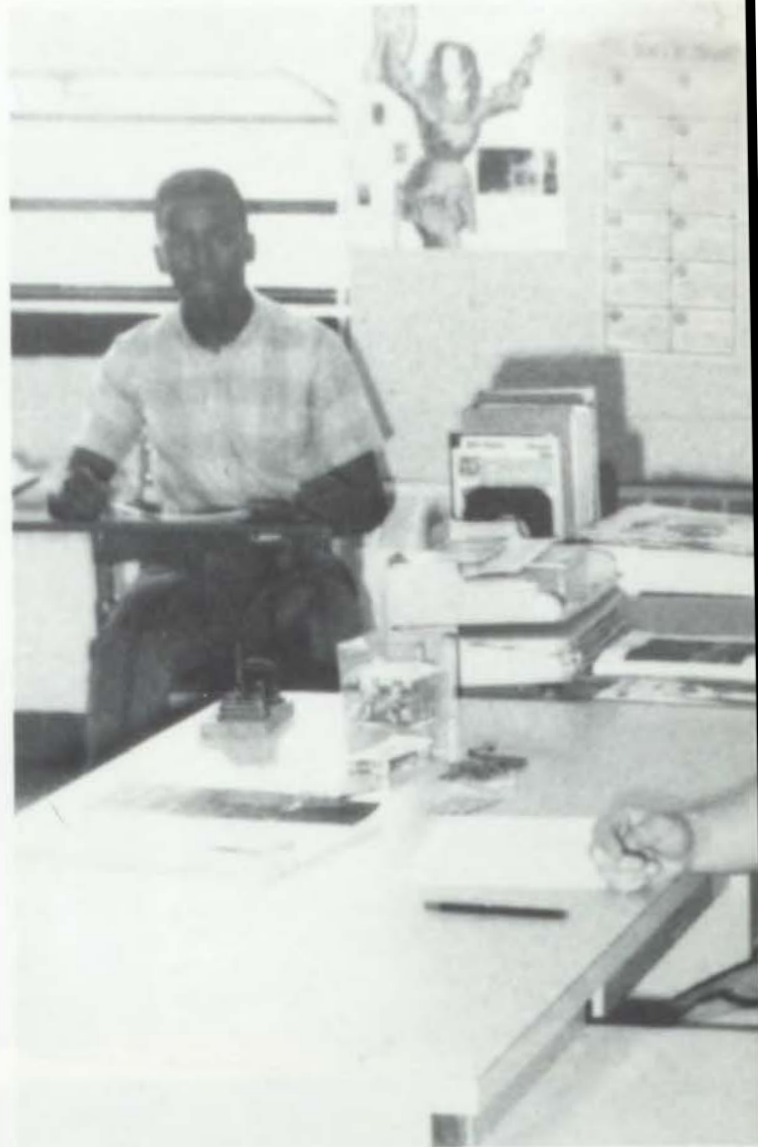

Mrs. Christine Schultz watches the language grow inside each of her Spanish I and II students. She feels that the time to use the language is now.

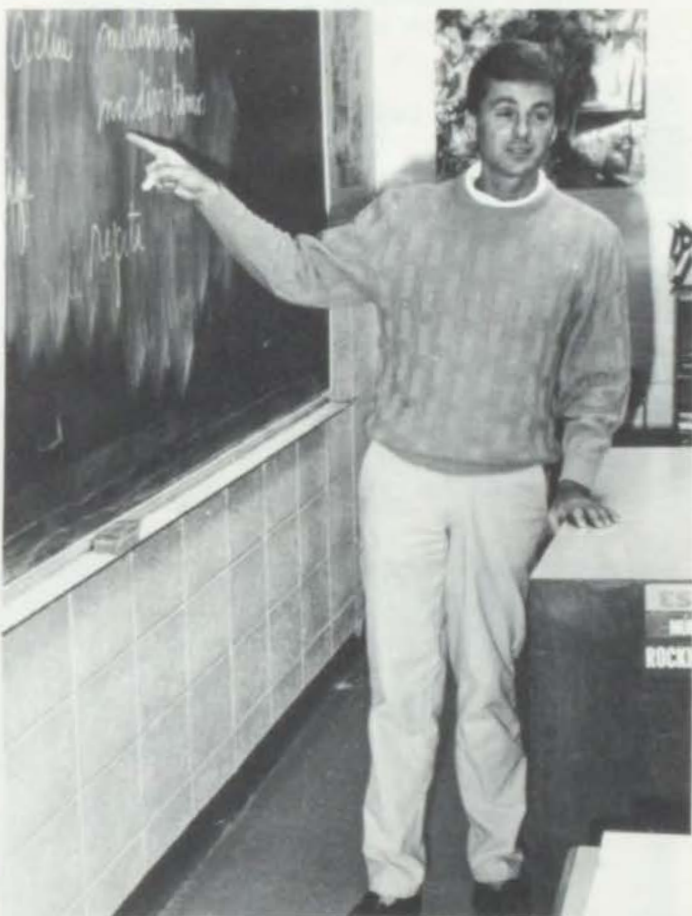
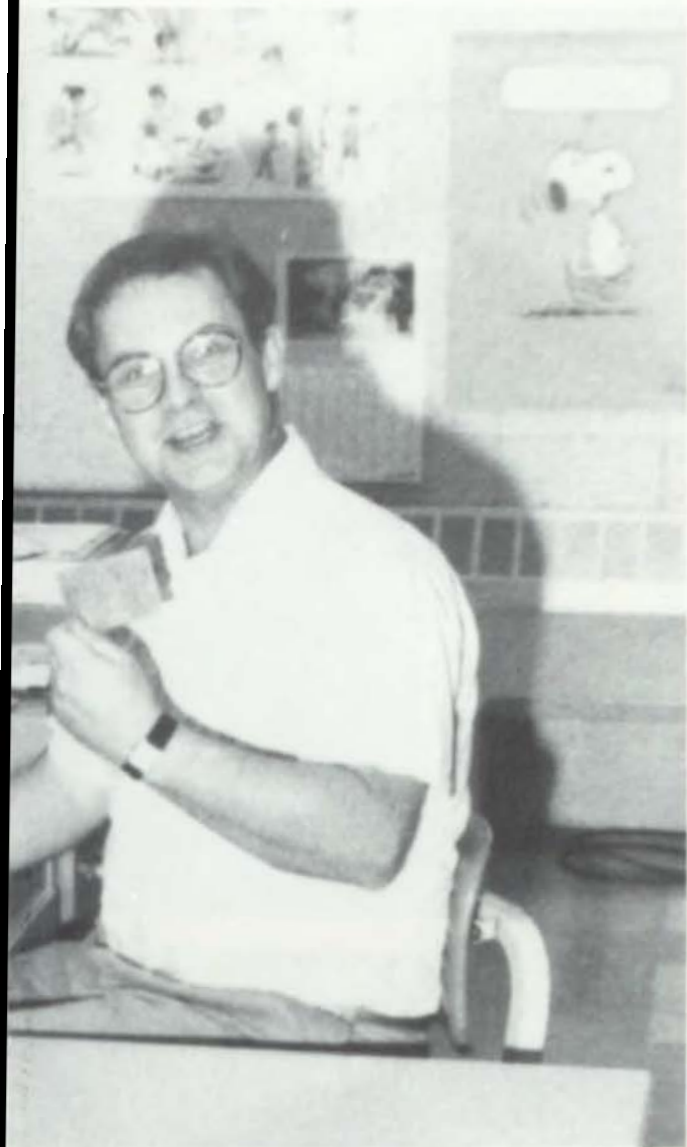

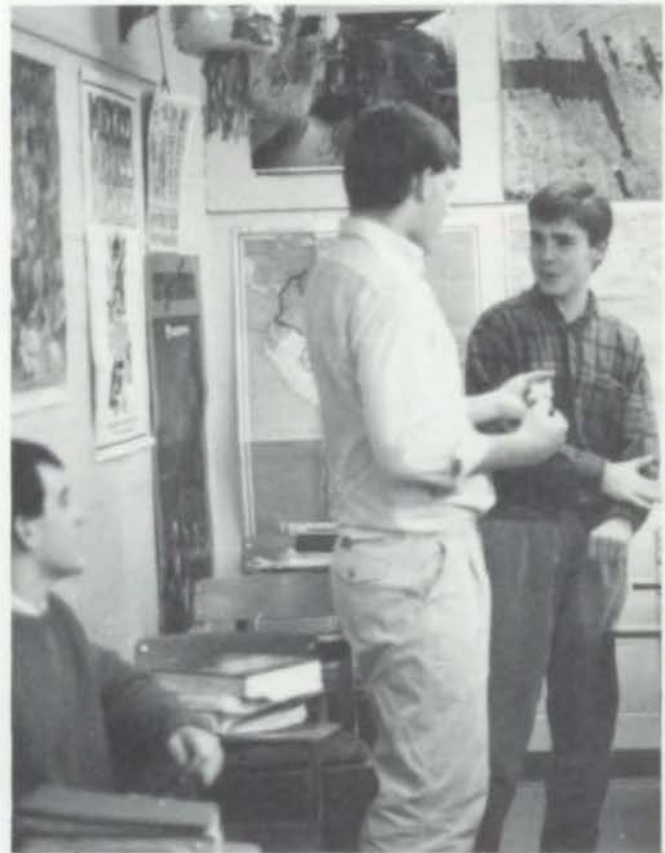

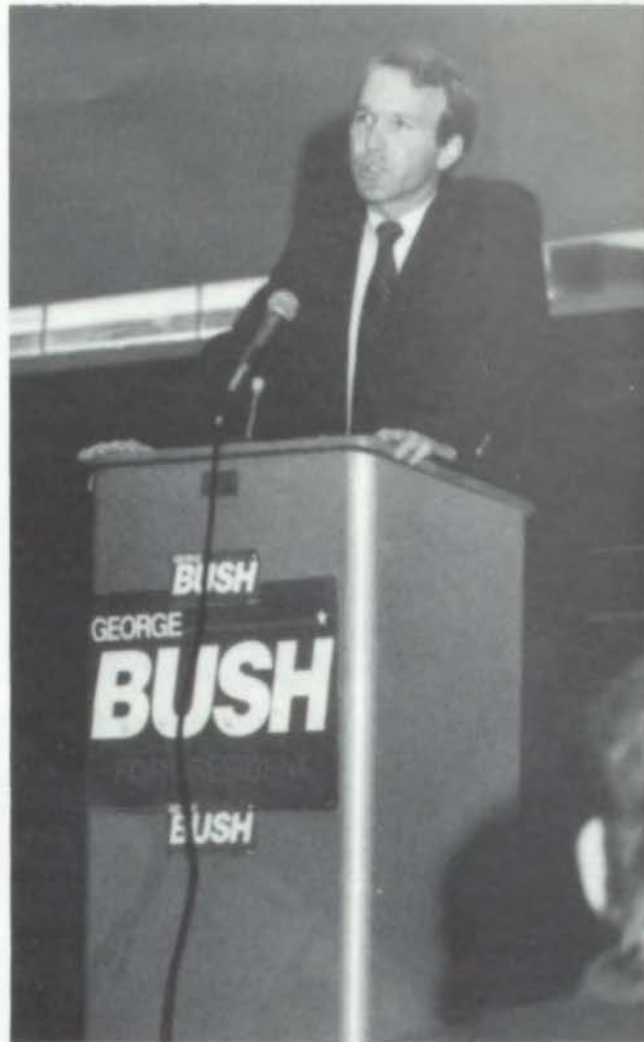
SPA becomes active during the election year.

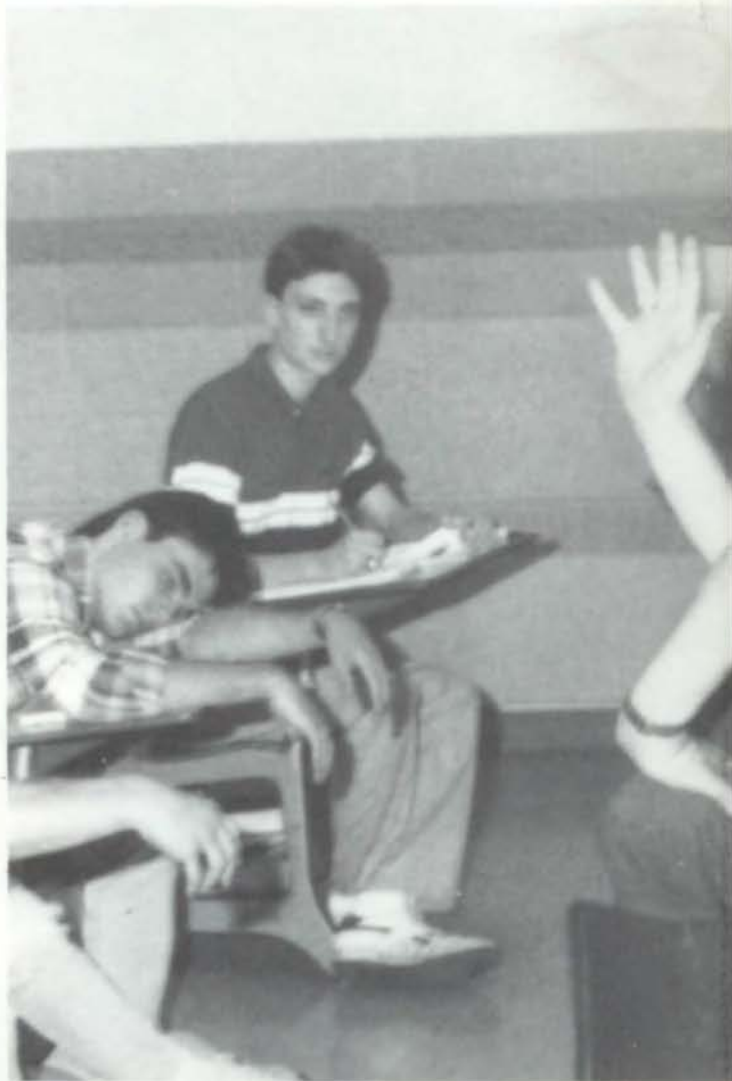


Theology department helps students grow

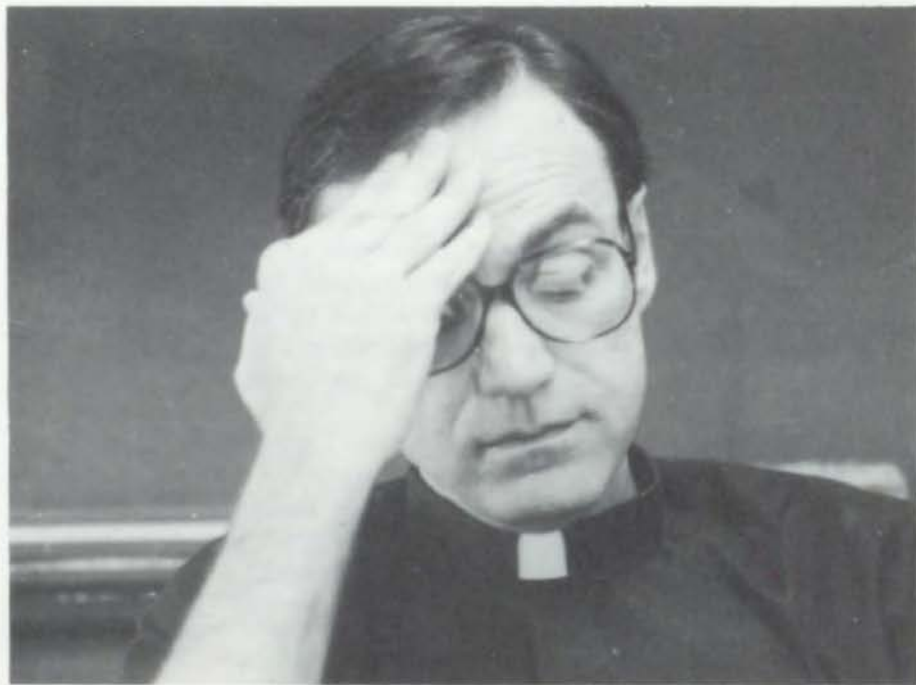

"I do not think it would be Rockhurst without Coach Davis' speeches," says Junior Mike McGlinn.

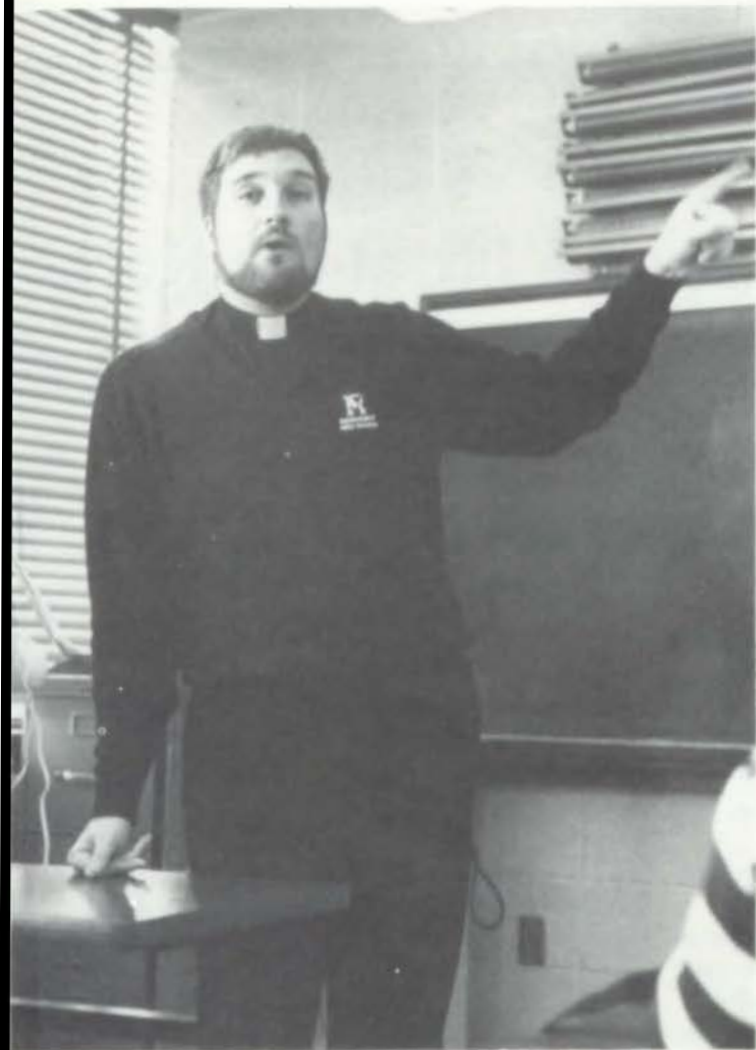

The committee works to improve life at Rockhurst in a manner that reflects the best interests of all aspects of the school community.



Program honors "unsung" Hawklets

For the second year the Student of the Month program at Rockhurst endeavored to publicly appreciate "all-American citizens who don't always get recognized at Rockhurst," in the words of Mr. Stan Herbic, moderator of the Student Life Committee which conducts the program.

The Student of the Month program serves to provide "positive motivation to people who do a fantastic job," Mr. Herbic said. "Ninety-nine percent of the people elected do a fantastic job."

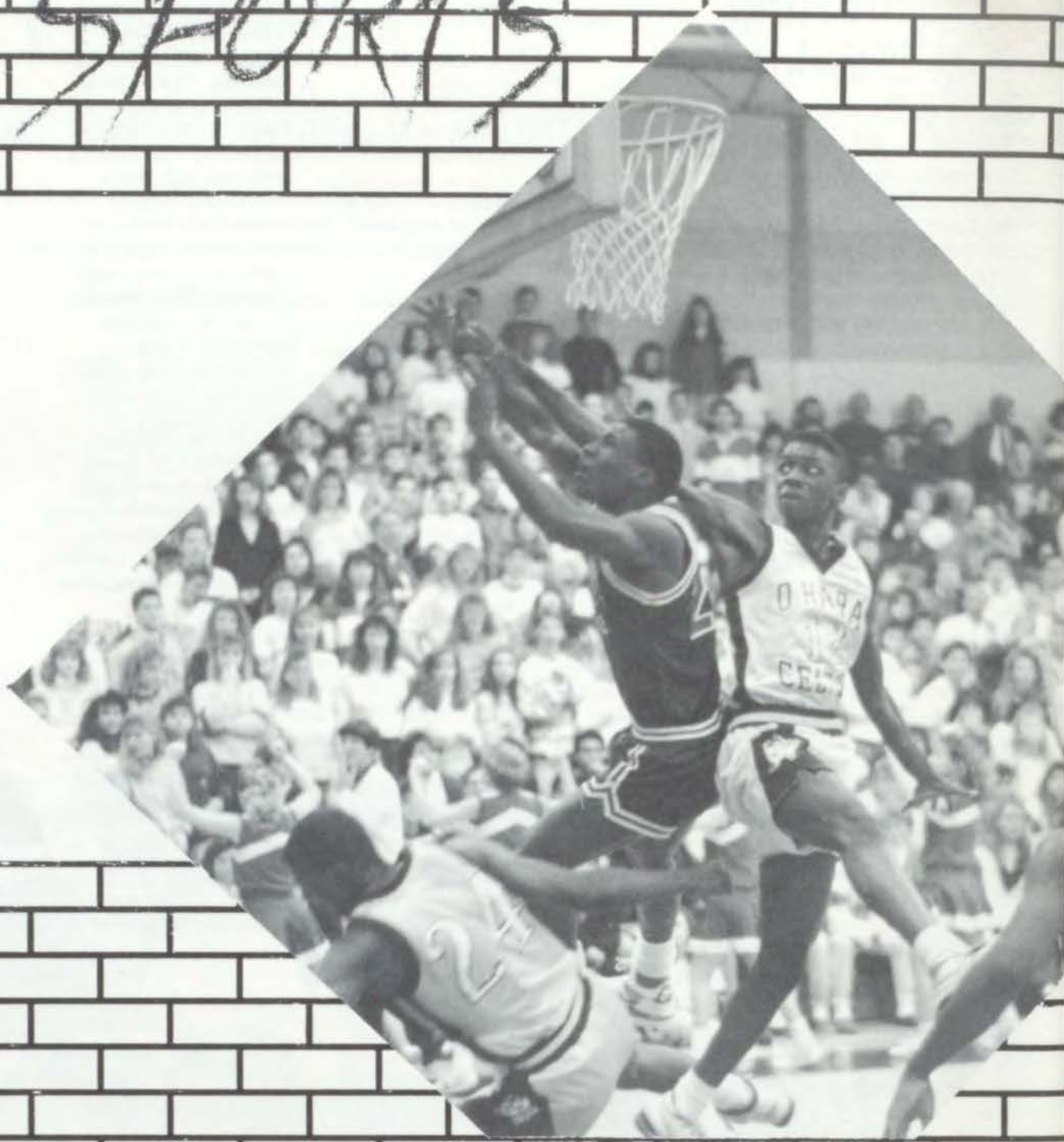

Building Rock Solid Foundations

What a year for RHS sports! The senior class did the unexpected in 1988-'89 and led the school to one of its most successful seasons in RHS history. The varsity soccer squad made history by becoming the first Kansas City team to finish as high as second in the state tournament. Their 21-2-3 record and resounding success against St. Louis opponents made it a year that Rockhurst and all of Kansas City will never forget. Meanwhile, the varsity football team had an impressive season before falling to Jefferson City in the state-semifinals. The team also made history by compiling an 10-0 regular season record for their first undefeated season in over forty years.

While these were great accomplishments, the varsity basketball team was able to go one step further by capturing its second straight state title in three years. Despite struggling in the regular season, the squad stormed into post-

season at full strength and pulled off upset after upset. The team captured the hearts of the student body, reminiscent of the Kansas Jayhawks, and at this point, the Rock was really rolling.

Strong performances in cross-country, wrestling, track, golf, and tennis also added to the Rock's success. This, combined with the emergence of a baseball team, provided great enthusiasm for the entire student body. As the year progressed, other students caught the spirit and became involved in the weight-lifting and intramurals programs.

The '88-'89 year was definitely a pinnacle for RHS athletics. It was a triumphant year, not only for the coaches and players, but for the students and fans who supported them the entire year. Great things happened within these walls, and again the Rock rolled on.

Rock unbeaten in regular season

Hopes to repeat as Missouri 5-A State football champions for the third year in a row were dashed against the rocks in Jefferson City in the semifinal game of state competition. There were no last-second field goals or blocked punts this time, just a solid beating by a better team. RHS ended the year 10-1-1.

The first challenge that confronted the Hawklets in post-season play was a matchup against previously unbeaten Ruskin at districts. In a game in which the Hawklet line was to get its biggest test, the Eagles proved no match for the Hawklets. The Hawklet defense was in control the entire game, shutting out the Eagles and allowing only 4 first downs and 65 yards of total offense.

Against Ruskin, one of the highlights was a 95-yard drive led by junior quarterback Jamie Pendergast. Pendergast took over for senior David O'Keefe after he injured his ankle.

Pendergast completed two quick passes, and five plays later, junior Mark Mehrer ran nine yards for a touchdown that gave the Hawklets a 13-0 lead.

Another highlight of the season, according to head coach Tony Severinol, was going undefeated in the regular season.

"There was a lot of pressure put on our kids to make it make to the state championship. Going undefeated in a season is very difficult. That was something special. Our main goal was just to return to the state playoffs and do well."

The Hawklets' first game was a test of the team's talent, according to Coach Severino. RHS tied Ft. Smith Northside 29-29.

"I think the Ft. Smith Northside game was a baptism for us. It was our first game, and we weren't sure what we had. I think we did a lot of growing up in that game. It was an impressive game on both sides, and it set the tone for the rest of the season," said Coach Severino.

a mid-season matchup paired the Hawklets against Springdale, Arkansas. This game, among others, proved to be a showcase for senior tailback and defensive back Robert Gamble. Gamble ran for 131 yards on seven carries, and he scored three touchdowns on the way to a 41-21 blowout.

Gamble also received many post-season awards for his performance as a defensive back. He was selected to the All-Metro first team, All-District first team, All-State second team, and was the recipient of the

Bobby Dodd 1988 Back of the Year Award. Gamble will be attending UCLA on a football scholarship.

In addition, senior split-end Chris Holmes earned an All-Metro selection as well as a second team All-State honor. Junior linebacker and fullback Chris Powell was also selected to the All-Metro squad and to the first team All-State.

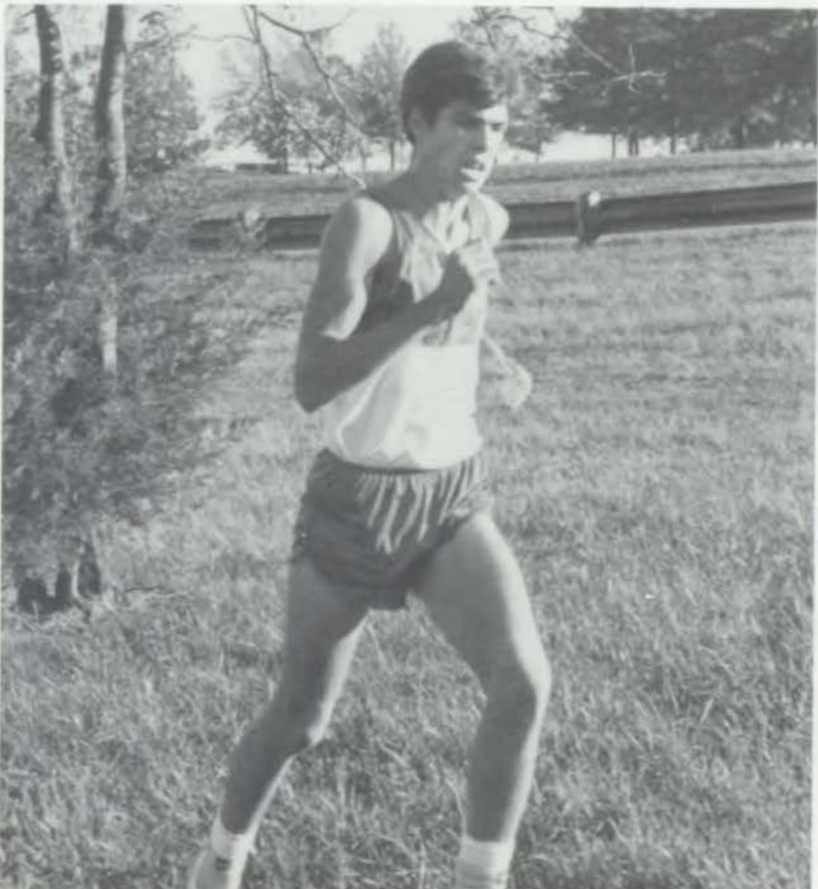

SENIORS LEAD ROCK TO TITLE

Basketball returned to its finest form at Rockhurst as the 1988-89 varsity team won the Missouri class 4-A championship with a 57-56 victory over St. Louis Vashon. It was the second basketball title in three years for RHS.

The team was paced by 6-10 senior center Chris Heller, recipient of the 1989 DiRenna Award, as the best player in the Kansas City metro area. Heller was also chosen the Gatorade Missouri player of the Year as well as

the Naismith Missouri Player of the Year. He was a first team all-metro, all-

district and all-state selection, and was named "Mr. Basketball" by the Missouri Coaches Association, an award honoring the best boys player in the state.

Coach Doug Bruce, who was named the Missouri 4A Coach of the Year, said that the team improved throughout the season, noting that, after a solid 7-2 start, the team fell to 8-5 in January before rallying to finish 23-7.

"We played better at the end than during most of the regular season. It all came together in the playoffs," he said.

Rockhurst won its fourth consecutive district basketball championship with wins over K.C. Southwest and Northeast at the Interscholastic League Fieldhouse. The Hawklets then defeated Blue Springs, 74-60, in the state sectionals. Senior forward Peter Campbell sank a last-second field goal to defeat Ray-South, 54-53, in a heart-stopping quarterfinal. The win over K.C.'s top-rated team and second-ranked team in Missouri 4A was one of the biggest upsets in Hawklet history.

As Rockhurst advanced to the Final Four in Springfield, MO, Coach Bruce said he felt the team could win the title.

"Once you get into the Final Four, anything can happen," he said.

And anything did happen. The cagers survived a 63-54 overtime victory over rival Jefferson City, a 27-2 team. Then, after controlling the state championship game for three quarters, including leads of 11 and 13 points, Hawklets survived an on-

slaught of Vashon three-pointers to claim the state title. Vashon, sporting a

front-line of 6-11, 6-9, 6-5 players, was ranked first in Missouri and in the nation's top 10 by USA Today.

Coach Bruce cited senior guard Matt Ecton, Heller and Campbell for exceptional seasons. He also said the team's guards played extremely well in the state tourney.

"Our guards—Chris Powell, Ecton, and Robert Gamble—were just sensational down in Springfield. They did a great job in the final two games," he said.

Coach Bruce added that the bench provided depth and leadership, including forwards Chris Cotton, Robert Lee, Shawn Winn, and Brian Frey.

"I thought the whole support team strengthened as the season progressed," he said.

Junior Robert Lee summed up how the season went for the Hawklets.

"It started off where we did not think we could do well, but as the season progressed, we saw we could win it all. And we did!" he said.

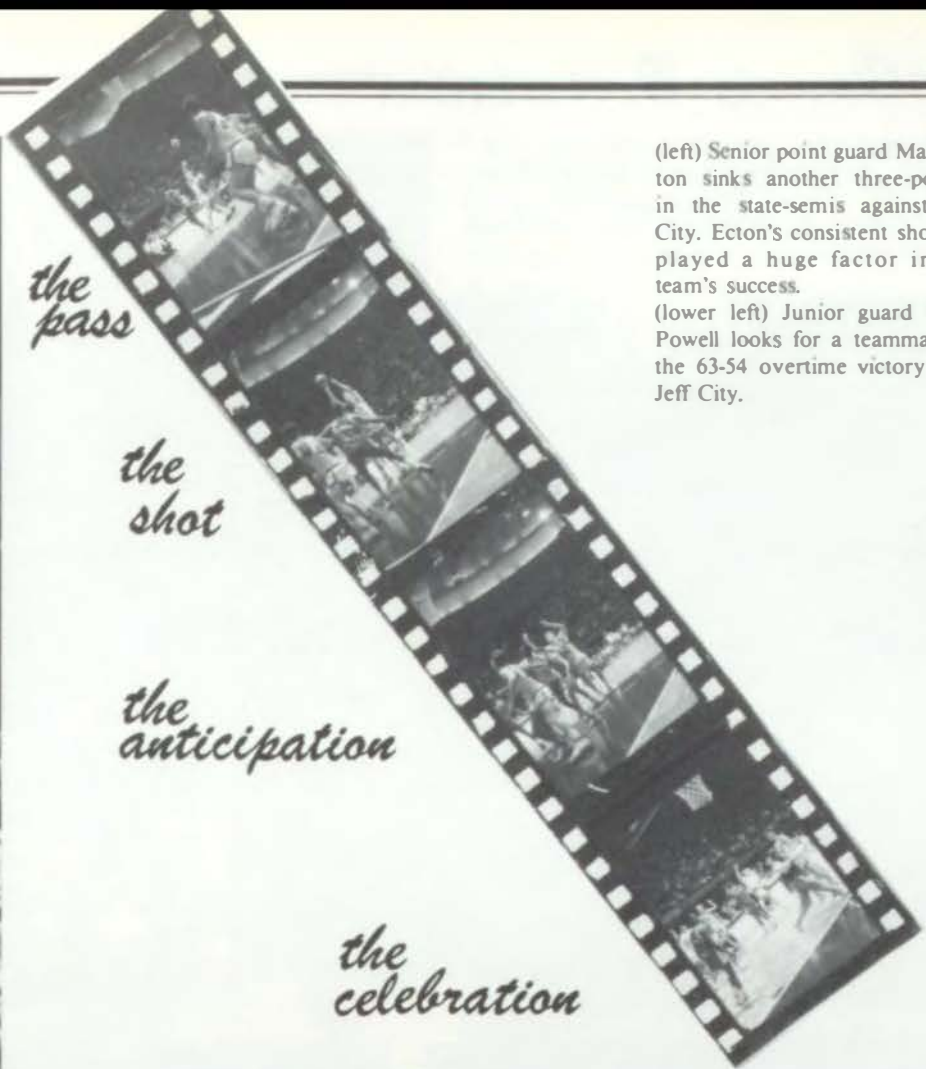

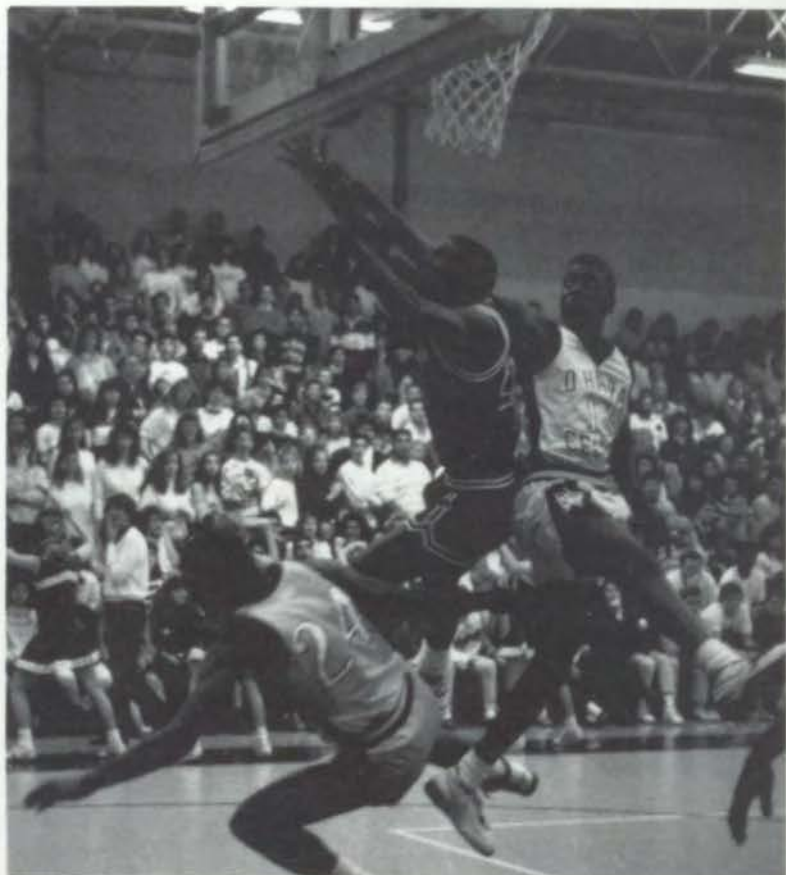
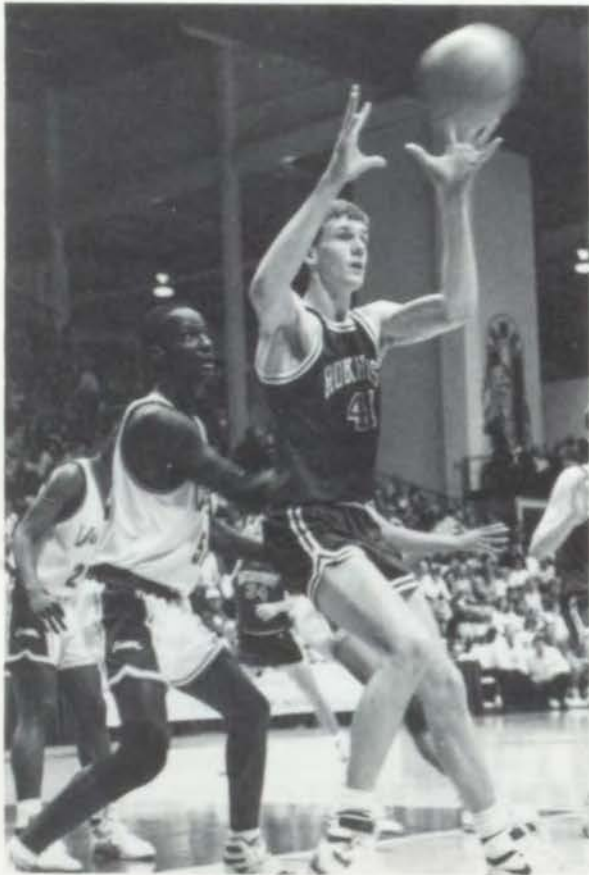

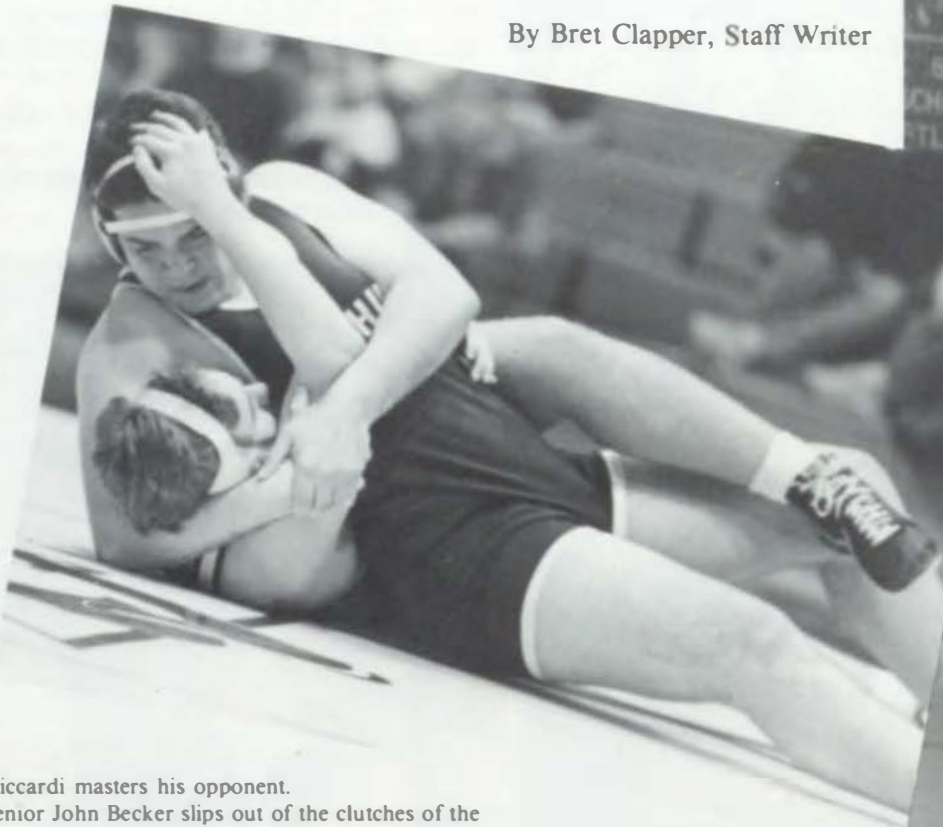

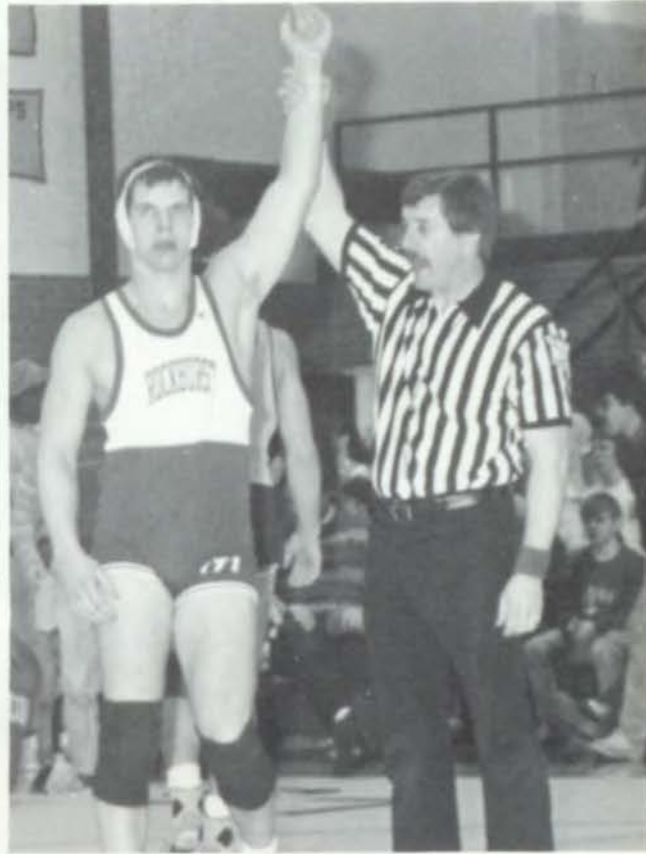


Tom Riccardi masters his opponent.

"I had a lot of fun wrestling this year, and I hope we can do well next year on the varsity level," said Pribyl.

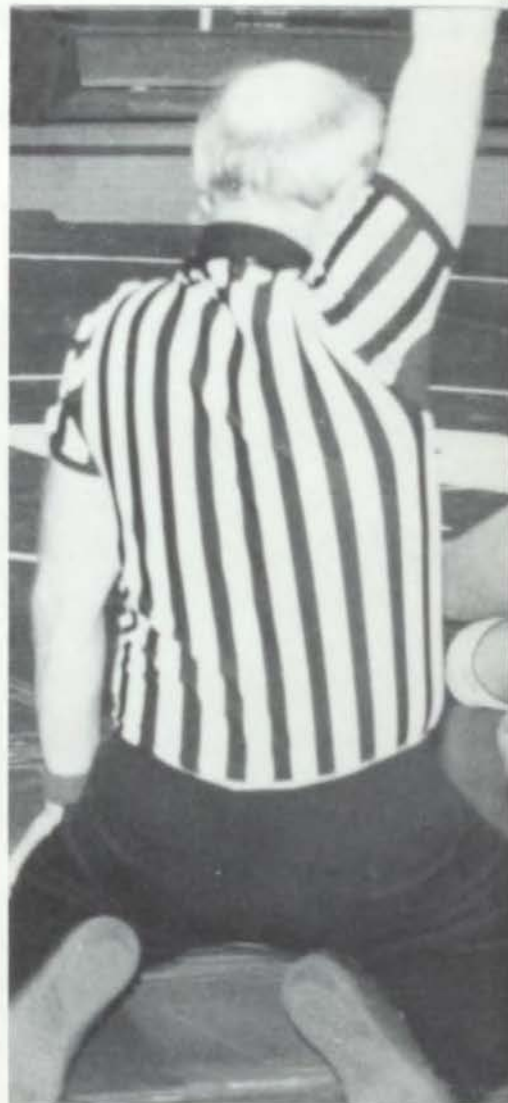
Myers summed up the season by saying, "I was very happy with my results and the results of the team."

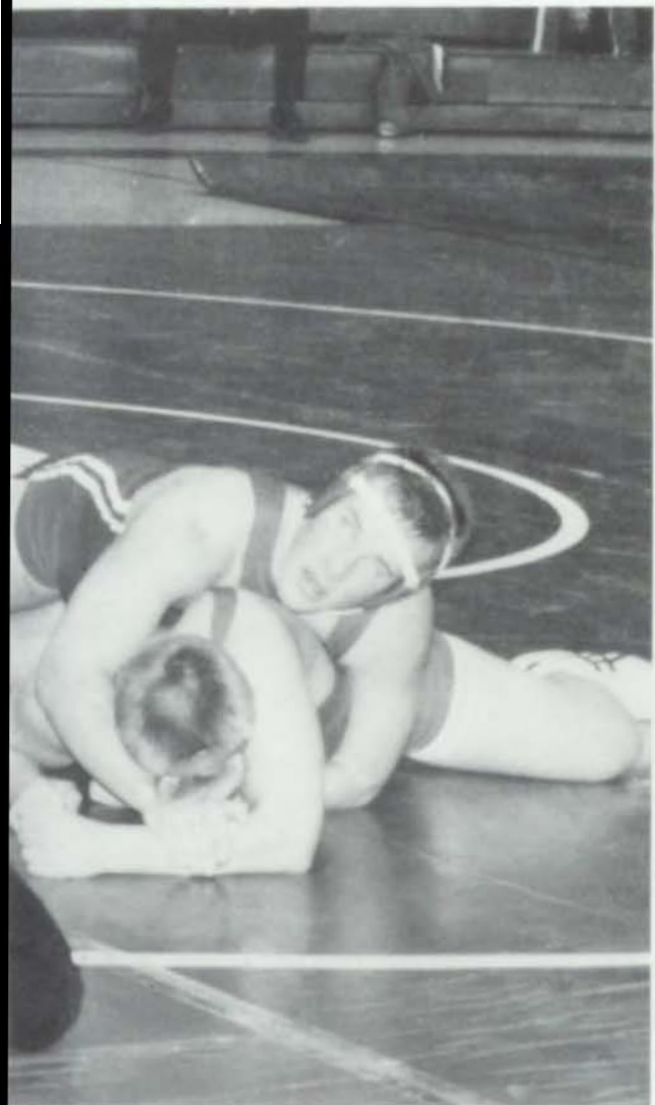
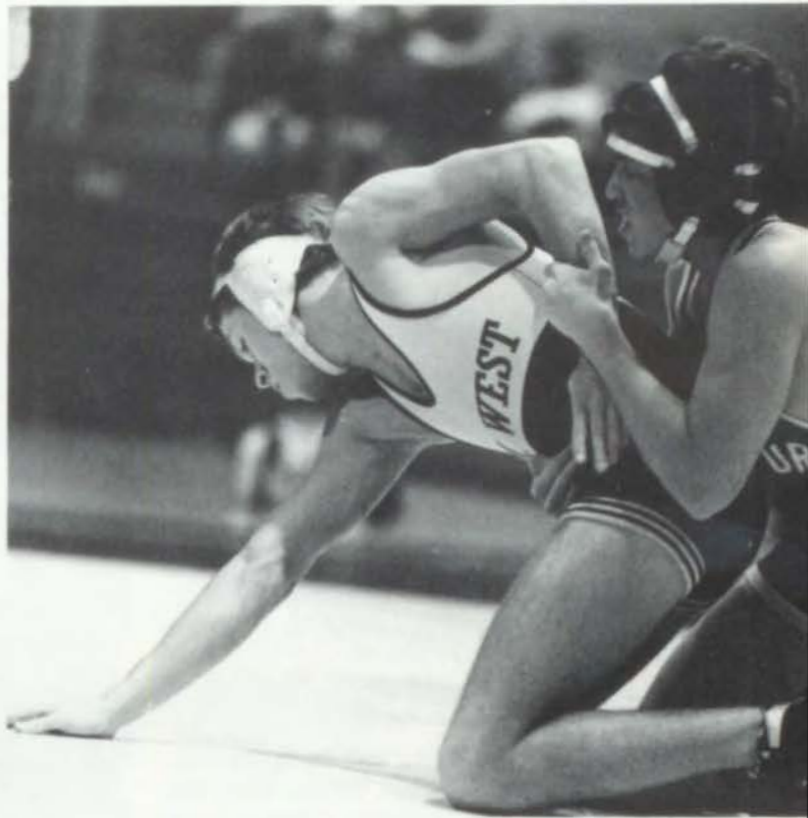

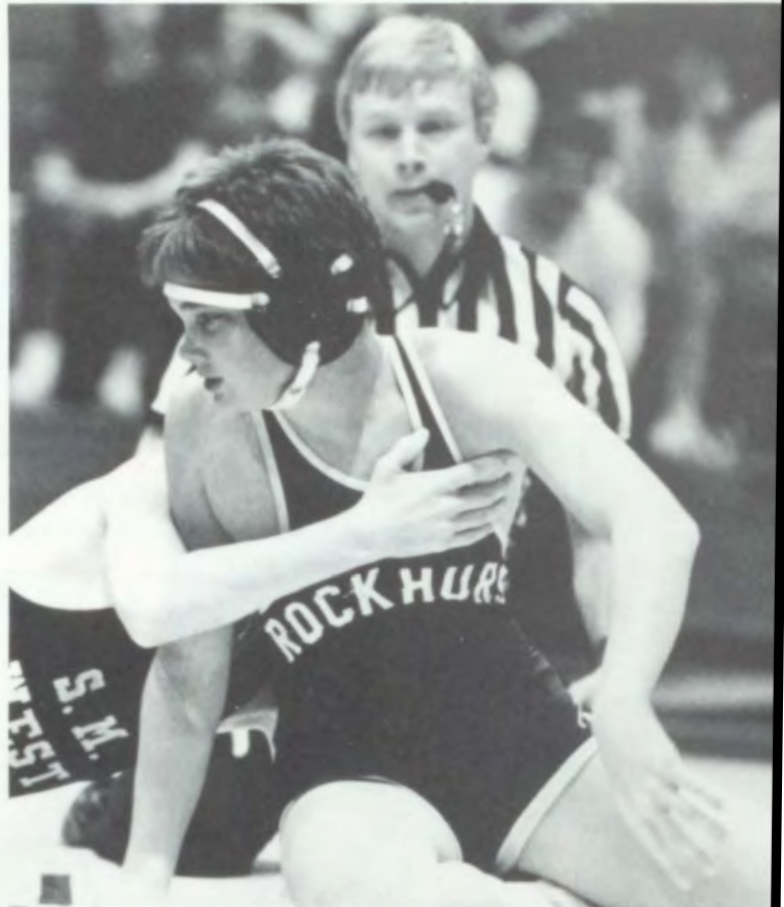

Trackmen enjoy strong season

This year's track team was one of the best since the mid-1970's, according to head coach Eric Berg. They had their highest finish in 14 years in the District meet, finishing fourth out of twelve teams.

In the districts the 400-meter relay team, comprised of Mark Wilkerson, John Mealy, Shawn Purcell, and Mark Neubauer, qualified for sectionals. The 800-meter relay team—Purcell, Mealy, Kevin Effertz, and Chris Holmes—also qualified. The 1600-meter relay also qualified, the team consisting of Matt Johnson, Wilkerson, Tim Mozee, and Holmes. The 3200-meter relay team—Kyle Myers, Brian Ward, Mike Dierks, and Jeff Lancaster—broke the school record by 22 seconds.

Individual qualifiers were Holmes in the 200-meter dash and the 400-meter dash, Mozee in the 400-meter dash, and Mark Neubauer in the triple jump.

In the sectional meet, all of the same relay teams and individuals also qualified for the state meet.

In the state meet, the 800-meter relay ran their best time of the season with a 1:30.39 and just missed qualifying fourth for the second round of the state meet.

The 1600-meter relay team finished in fifth place with a 325. Neubauer finished fourth with a triple jump of 46 feet, 9 inches.

According to Coach Berg, the seniors were the leaders of the team. "The seniors did a great job of leading by example. They had real strong work habits and never complained during practice." "As a team, this was probably the best since the 1970's, when they won back-to-back state titles," Berg commented.

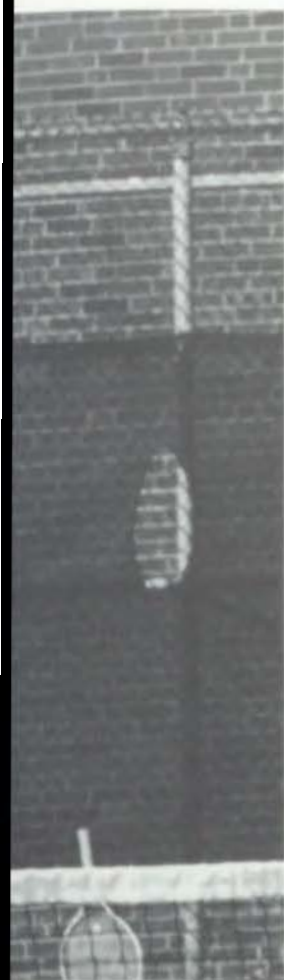

Talented golfers fall short at state

The students know that the athletic program is as multi-faceted as the student life at Rockhurst. The 1989 golf team proved this to be true.

"I was real pleased with this year's season. I had high hopes that we would win state. When you have got a bell-ringer like Bert Roney, he will bring the other people along. We placed high in all our tournaments and scored well on tough courses," Coach Al Davis commented.

In the state districts the team came in second to Blue Springs. This allowed the team to advance to State competition, where they placed sixth out of 16 teams. In state competition, sophomore Bert Roney and senior Jay Rick received medals. Roney finished 10th and Rick finished 12th.

"I have never had such a close competition among the players in 13 years. About five strokes separated the team in their season averages. I was disappointed that we did not place higher in state, but not as much as the golfers who wanted to put a banner on the wall," Coach Davis also stated.

"We placed all right in the tournaments but we could have placed higher. We are a much better team than our tournament placing record shows," junior Chris Donaldson said.

THE ROCKHURST LEGEND

When one thinks of Rockhurst High School, certain images come to mind—rows of championships banners, the Jesuits, the rock, and “The Coach.” “The Coach” is Athletic Director Mr. Alton Davis, Jr., who has been at Rockhurst for 37 years. His presence alone demands respect. He is a Rockhurst institution, and he is a cornerstone on which the Rock is built.

Coach Davis came to Rockhurst in the fall of 1952 after a two-year coaching stint at Peabody High School. Coach Davis had been a three-year letterman at Abilene High School. In August of 1943, he went overseas as a medic in World War II. Upon his return, he married to his high school sweetheart and enrolled at Kansas State University, where he played quarterback and decided to pursue a career in coaching, even though he had been accepted to medical school. It was after two years at Peabody that he decided to take a pay cut and become a part of the Rock. Now, some say he IS the Rock.

In 24 years as coach of the varsity football team, Davis amassed 154 victories, more than any other RHS coach. His squad won the state championship in 1971 and finished second at state in 1973. The fact that 150 of his players went on to play college football and seven made it to the pros is a credit to his coaching. He has also coached basketball and track, and he currently coaches the golf team.

What students remember most about “The Coach,” however, are his stories of the past and his unique ways of disciplin-

ing his students. Rockhurst alums still talk about the jockstrap checks in the gym when the Mothers Club happened to be meeting upstairs. Coach Davis has never hesitated to give his opinion on political or social issues. His stories of ways to fight the communists and his advice on how to avoid contracting syphilis are moments his students will never forget.

“The message I try to get across to my students,” Coach Davis said, “is to be honest, to be fair, and to be a man. I don’t mean the macho type, but someone who stands up for what he knows is right and has integrity. I despise a thief, a liar, and a cheat.”

Davis thinks the students today are generally the same as those 37 years ago. “The kids are the same, but the culture has changed,” Davis said. “Kids have more money, and they ride everywhere. They have to learn to exercise because it’s not built into their lives. Before 1960 most people walked to school. Computers and technology have changed our habits, and I’m not sure its for the good.”

One of Davis’s most characteristic acts as football coach occurred after losing to Joplin Parkwood in his final game. He went to the Parkwood locker room and congratulated the entire team by saying, “You beat one heck of a football team.” Coach Davis has always valued good sportsmanship. “I always felt that, when a game is over, it is very easy to be a gracious winner but very difficult to be a gracious loser,” he said.



When asked about the prospect of retirement, Coach Davis responded, “I loved this place when I came here, and I still do. I could have had better paying jobs, but I feel like this is my home. The time may be coming when I’ll have to say I’ve had enough. I may retire from RHS, but I won’t retire. I’ll play more golf and do some work for my son—but only if I can set my own hours.”

At this point, Coach Davis can have just about anything he wants. He is an administrator, a coach, a husband, a disciplinarian, and a grandfather, but most of all, Coach Davis is a man in every sense of the word. While the sun may be setting on his RHS career, one thing rests assured: his shadow will remain at the Rock forever.

Team bats nearly .500 in first season

This year Rockhurst saw the opening of the first baseball season here in over 20 years.

The season started with a game against Oak Park which Rockhurst lost 1-0. "In our first game, I saw a team that was very competitive and tough, but we lacked unity on the field early on," said Coach Jerry Goben.

Since this was the first season for baseball at RHS, Coach Goben felt that it would be an accomplishment for the team to finish .500. They came very close to that goal with a record of 9-11-1. However, Coach Goben said that they had one of the tougher schedules in K.C.

"I thought it would be better for the kids if we played people who were proven to be good," Coach Goben said. "It gave us more challenge and helped us improve."

The team averaged between five and six runs per game, with about eight hits and a batting average of .274. They held the opponents to an average of only five runs per game.

Coach Goben cited defense as an outstanding aspect of the team, averaging only two errors per game. "We had a lot of depth in the roster, and I felt like we

could have played more teams than we did," he stated.

On offense, the team met with mediocre success. They sometimes showed outstanding effort but not as consistently as the coaches had hoped.

The pitching staff did its job this season with a combined ERA of 3.9. "Our pitchers took their lumps, but the losses were not because of pitching. They did their job because they held the opponent to under five runs per game," said Goben.

Senior pitchers David O'Keefe and Scott Wissel were cited as the mainstay of the pitching staff.

"Our record doesn't show how good this team really was," Coach Goben stated. "We lost five games by one run in extra innings. That should give you an idea of how close each of our contests was."

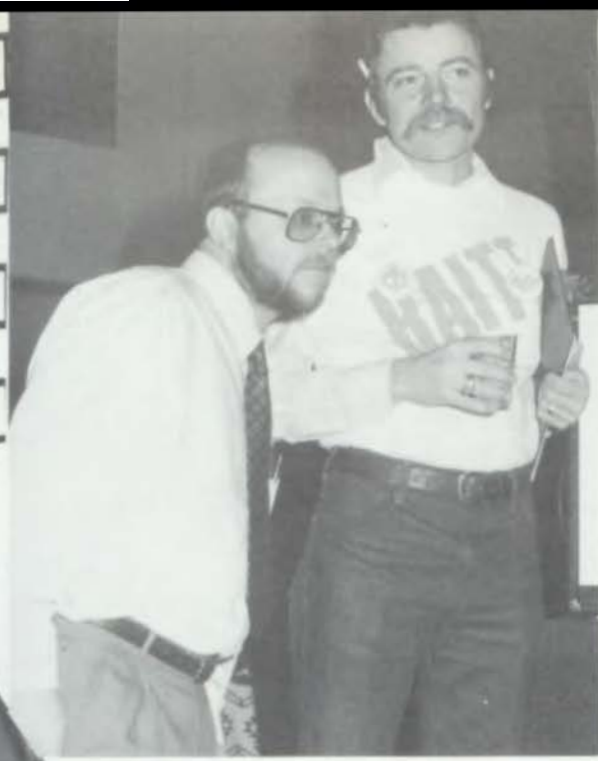

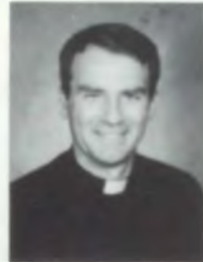

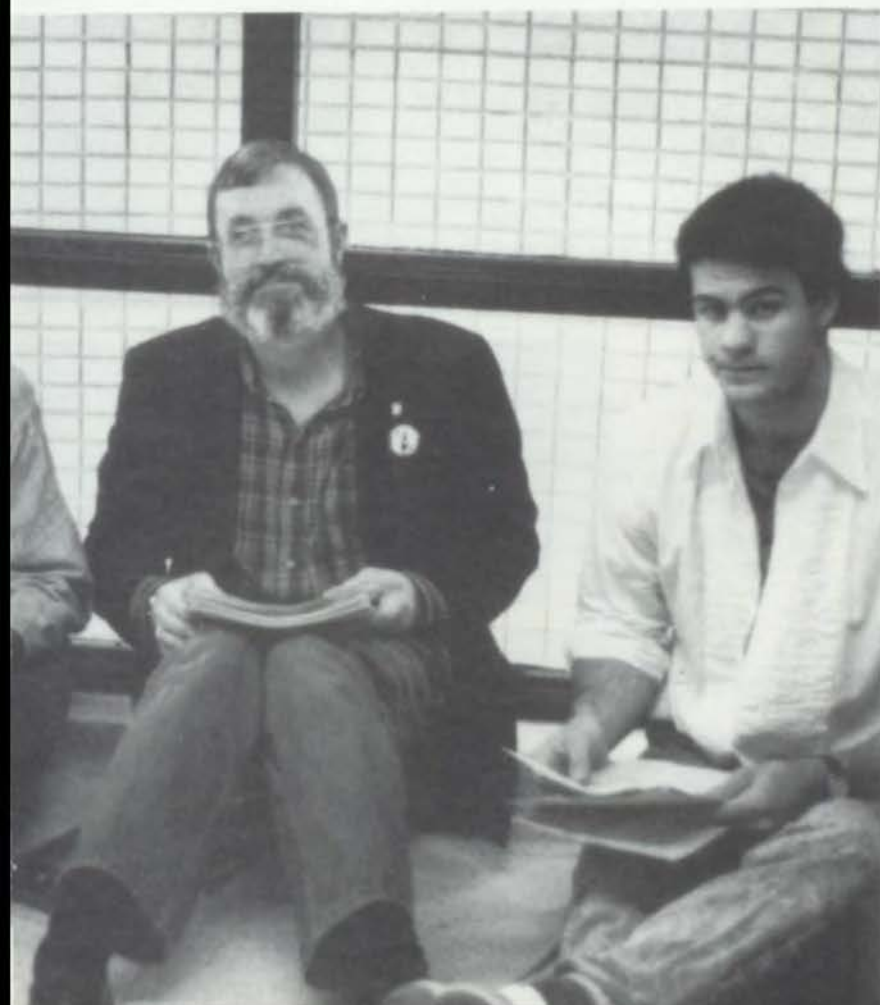

Counselors Guide RHS

Some Rockhurst students may wonder what Mr. Heringer, Mr. Berg, and Mr. Munninghoff do all day long because they see their counselors only once or twice a year—and then only for the periodic checkup. It is true that many students don't seek the help and advice of our school counselors, but many do, and the counselors spend much of their time helping these people, in addition to a number of their services for the school and students.

The counselors do not lead easy-going lives, as it might appear when one sees Mr. Munninghoff lounging in the bookstore or Mr. Berg calling out orders to the football or track squad. The only times Mr. Munninghoff has free are during activity periods. For most of the other six periods of each day, he is counseling kids and sometimes teachers, "trying to make Rockhurst the most enjoyable experience it can possibly be." Both Mr. Berg and Mr. Heringer take on the load of teaching a class on top of their counseling duties.

The counselors must deal with the difficulties and problems of approximately 258 students each. Each of them also handles a specific area

outside of his everyday responsibilities. Mr. Heringer moderates the Alcohol Awareness and Natural Helpers programs. Mr. Berg handles career choices, and Mr. Munninghoff coordinates the school's standardized testing program. All three team up with Fr. Durso, who is also a certified counselor, to help student choose a college and work through the applications process.

Why did these men choose counseling as a career? The reason all of them agreed upon was that they simply enjoy helping kids. It gives them a great deal of satisfaction to see a student successfully work toward a goal or through a problem. Mr. Berg personally enjoys working "one-on-one, rather than one-on-thirty," as most teachers do.

The assistance the counselors give is not just a job but also a service to students and the Rockhurst community as a whole. "We consider ourselves a service," says Mr. Heringer, "but we are actually only a service as much as people perceive us to be."

Class Enhances Choir

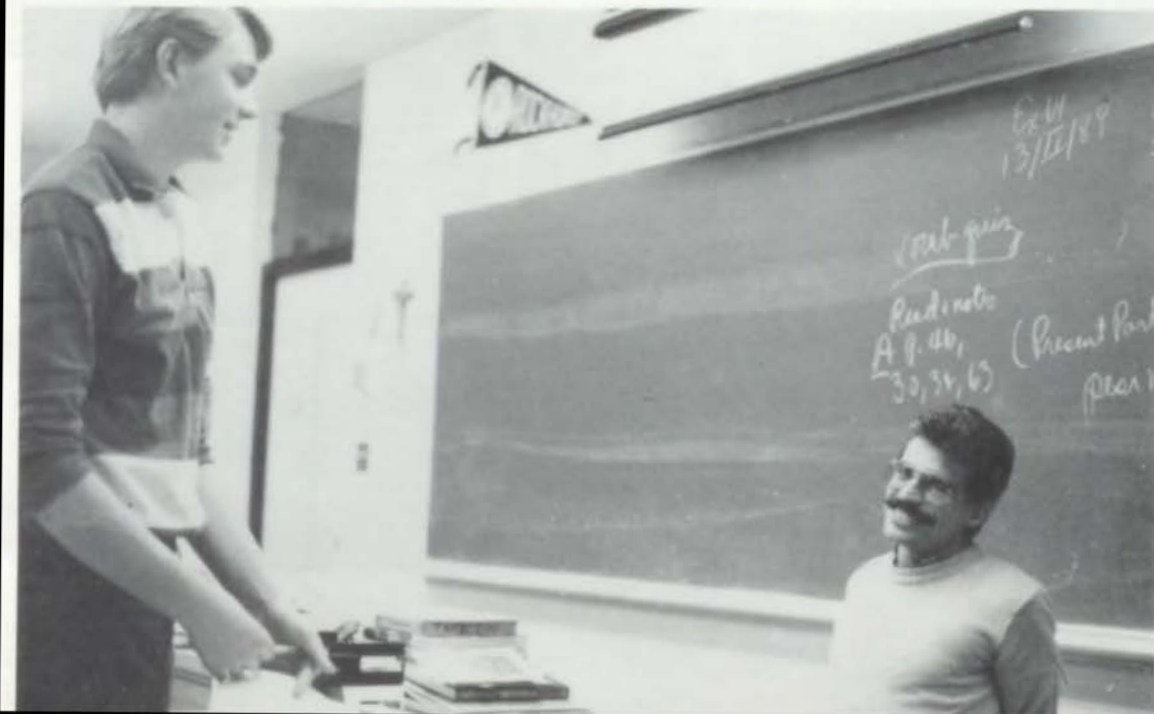
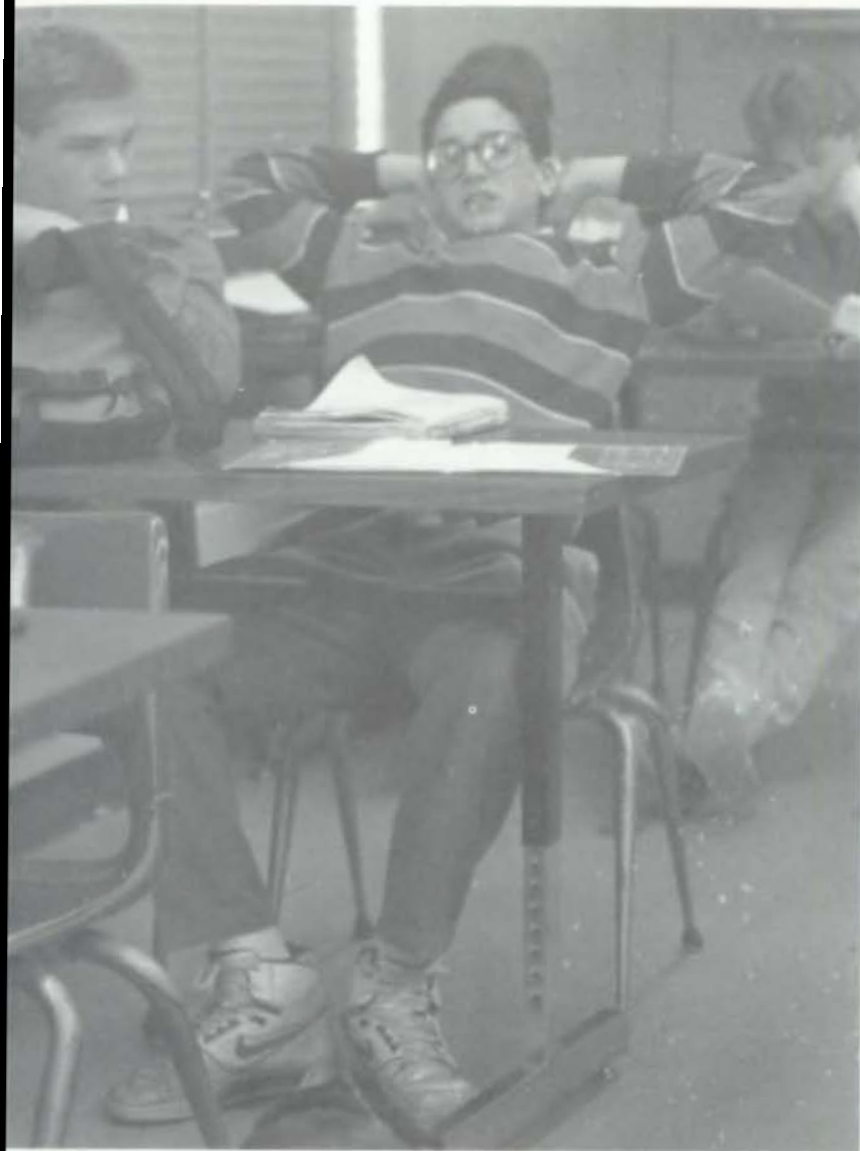

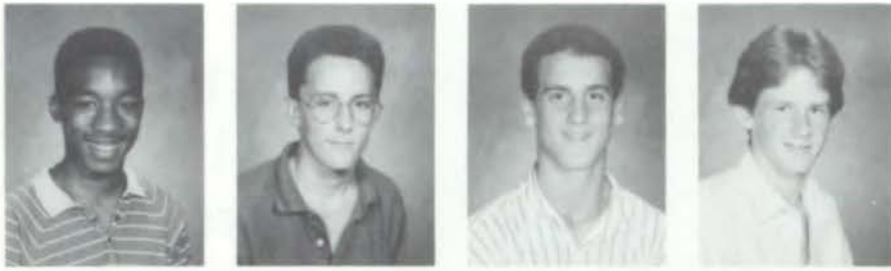
As the 9:05 bell sounded, my worst fears were confirmed as I deciphered the number ten written over "JUG"--I had become the "Other" sophomore.

"It will make their year special; it marks their transition," she said.

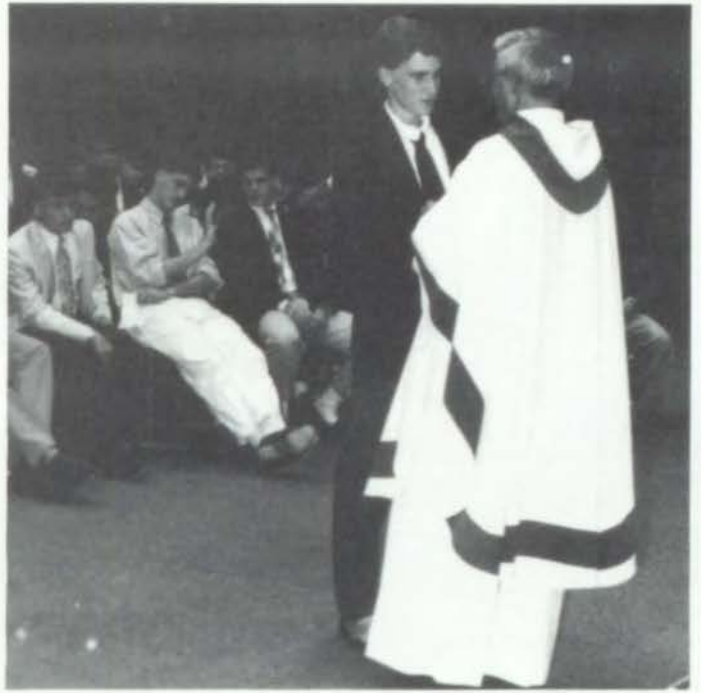
Todd Adams and Todd Schieffer were the main junior StuCo officers planning the event.
