

A graduate of Xavier High School in Cincinnati and SLU, Mr. Bowron joined the ASC because he "somehow wanted to dedicate a year in service," Mr. Bowron is a full-time Theology teacher at Rockhurst but next year will return to Cincinnati where he will attend medical school at the University of Cincinnati.



For the seniors, it was their last dance with their moms. As a token of their love the seniors gave their moms a red rose before the dance.


While a few students could be heard griping about being seated in the lobby and the small size of the dance floor, they managed to put all that aside and make the most of a memorable evening.






















Rockfest raises more than \$12,000 with fifth annual B-ball tourney

On April 27, Rockhurst's parking lot was once again lined and ready for the fifth annual Rockfest. This year's four-man basketball tournament consisted of 68 teams in three divisions.

The 8th-9th grade division was won by the "Sixers" (Ryan Graham, Greg McDaniels, Rory Donnelly and Chris O' Boynick).

The 10th-11th grade division was captured by "Return of Gray's Monkeys" (Josh Brewster, Grayson Doherty, Joe Houlehan and Joe Van Dyke). "Almost Thirty" (Jim Sheedy, Chris Heller, Chris Lewellen and Joe Digirolamo) took the 12th-Alumni division.

Unlike the past five Rockfests, this year's event raised a record well over \$12,000. This success, due primarily to more than forty-nine sponsors who donated nearly \$250 each, was supplemented by the 272 participants that paid \$10 to enter. The substantial proceeds will go toward lowering next year's tuition costs.

This year's tournament was organized and run by an Executive Board consisting of six students. Seniors Kevin Brooks and Justin Begnaud spearheaded the committee with Juniors Tim Haake and Ben Capoccia, and Sophomores Steven Bowen and Phil Duncan. Under the supervision of Mr. Tony Severino and Mr. Michael Dierks, these students made decisions, solicited sponsors, designed event T-Shirts and handled finances.

"The weather combined with the superb student organization, made this year's Rockfest the most successful ever. This year we raised more than any other Rockfest in it's five year history!" exclaimed Mr. Michael Dierks.

"Even though my team was unsuccessful, I still had fun participating in a charitable event," said Junior Joe Principe.



"It was particularly gratifying to see Pete and Tim playing Willy and Biff. These were two guys who never really had leads before, and they really came through," he said.







"We had a lot of fun this year playing a lot of concerts and sending students to state, it was a really good year for us." said Kevin Comeau.




Intramural program provides competition for all students





"I feel that the guys learned a lot during the season and also had a lot of fun during it. I had great guys to work with and that's why we were so successful," said Coach Ptasnik.





Player relives nightmare of unreal Blue Springs comeback

For most of us, it was one of the worst moments of our lives. Through the course of a twelve minute span on the evening of September 21,1996, the Rockhurst football team watched a lead that was the result of three quarters of domination dwindle into nothing. The Blue Springs Wildcats had just completed one of the most amazing comebacks in high school football history. In one quarter, everything for us fell apart and the Wildcats scored 37 points to win the game. It was devastating to the Rockhurst players, coaches, and fans who together were in a state of shock and disbelief. What had just happened? For nearly an hour following the game, the buses that contained our players and coaches were in a state of total gridlock in the Blue Springs parking lot. Time stood still as the opposing fans taunted and harassed us in their wild celebration. There we sat in shocked silence and let those awful feelings boil and churn inside of us until they finally overflowed seven weeks later.

From the first practice of the 1995 football season, it was clear to last year's team that there was one motivating factor that stood above anything else, and that was beating Blue Springs. This year's team did not have such an obvious goal to work towards. That is why the devastating loss to Blue Springs in only the third game of the season ended up to be beneficial for us. From this point on there was never a question in any of our minds what the motivational factor for the remainder of the season would be: to come back in seven weeks and crush Blue Springs in the state sectional

game on their field. For some reason, Blue Springs seems to never go away.

With the exception of one bad half of football against Garden City which cost us a close game, we consistently overcame adversity and never missed a beat for the remaining weeks leading up to the playoffs. One of the most remarkable stories of the year came between the tough loss to Garden City and the amazing victory over Jefferson City. Not only did we leave Garden City with a loss, but we were also without our top three

quarterbacks. Jeff Smith was sidelined with a seasonending injury in the opening game of the season, and both Clint

Kuechler and Dustin Van Dolah were injured in the Garden City game. Up next came Jefferson City, a team that Rockhurst had not beaten in the 90's. At one point, senior Andy Bond (who was a quarterback as a sophomore) steppped up from his linebacker position and practiced at quarterback for the week. Though he had not played quarterback in two years, he was suddenly thrust into the starting varsity quarterback position. We were desperate. In the end, it turned out that we did not use Andy, because a less than healed Kuechler was given the okay to play. Things were looking brighter. The result was the first Rockhurst victory over Jefferson City since 1989.


The Jefferson City win was a great moment, but we quickly reverted back to the task at hand which was beating Blue Springs. A series of victories propelled us into and through districts. We were district champions, but that just did not seem to be on anyone's mind. Five days later was all that mattered. Seven grueling weeks had led up to this: a sectional meeting with the team ranked number one in Missouri and 24th in America, none other than Blue Springs. Again, we dominated the first half, and again we dominated the third quarter. Foremost in all of our mind's was that horrible feeling we felt seven weeks ago while watching our huge lead disppear in only one quarter. That was not going to happen again. Unlike last time, we dominated the fourth quarter and got our refvenge, 42-7. Indeed, Rock remembered, and ripped Blue Springs.

The moment the clock expired was unforgettable. Not only had we redeemed ourselves in a dominating fashion, but the students united as one. Once the team finally made it to the buses, there were no longer and Blue Springs faithful hanging around to interrupt our continuous celebration. Indeed, this was the correct way for Rockhurst to depart from Blue Springs High School -- VICTORIOUS!



"It was a fun year and I hope to play with everyone next year," said Jamison Elder.

















"Our win at Aquinas was a big victory for us because it showed how big our hearts were," senior Clint Kuechler said.


The seniors were a key instrument in the success of the team. "All the seniors contributed well: John





This was evident to the team as they finished the season winning five of their last six games, two of them coming against Aquinas and Shawnee Mission East.







The team had two individuals participated in the state meet. Dro and Rob Reiter in the 800 meters. Coach Jorge Taracido Dro finished second for the second straight






"We were very consistent this year. Our top four stayed constant the whole year






or in neighboring communities. Another requirement of the NHS is that every student must write an essay each semester and must assume leadership in the organization of a school event.











"The Pastoral Council is the central nervous system of the spiritual life of the students at Rockhurst," senior Paul Woody, president of Pastoral Council, said.



Rockhurst placed sixth in the nation in number of new members enrolled in the National Forensics League.







Run and organized by Mr. Mark Bubalo, moderator of the photography club said that the photography club was essential to the Journalism department and its productions.


"Excellent opportunity for students to learn the art of photography and to get involved in producing school publications," Mr. Bubalo said.









Although Rockhurst is known for its strong science and math programs, Mr. Worth estimates that 60-70% of the graduates will go on into some type of business.



In one day, Stu-Co grossed over \$700 for the drive.


"In a sense, the students were giving their money and their food to a real child," Forge said in regards to Melvin.

1974.







Rockhurst remains 'destination' school

Geographically diverse is an understatement when referring to the RHS student body. Every day, students make the trek to school from virtually everywhere in the metropolitan area and beyond. While the majority of students come from nearby Leawood, Overland Park, and southern Kansas City, a significant portion are from smaller, rural areas such as DeSoto and Gardner, Kansas, and Parkville and Exelsior Springs, Missouri.

RHS is also unique because students are from both Missouri and Kansas. 66 percent of the student body is from Missouri while the other 44 percent is from Kansas. Many students travel across the Missouri River daily as approximately seven percent of the RHS student body hail from north of the river.


Zip Code 66209 located between Metcalf Avenue and State Line Road contains thirteen percent of the student body making it the most heavily populated zip code. 64114 is the second most populated zip code as it contains 91 students or eleven percent of the student body. It is located between Gregory and 119th street on the north and south while State Line and Oak Street border it on the west and east. Zip code 64113 contains 86 RHS students (ten percent) and lies directly north of 64114 between Gregory and 55th Street. Nineteen zip codes tie for being the least populated as they each contain only one student each.

RHS students travel long distances from every direction. Junior Josh Hawley and sophomore Ahsan Latif live the farthest east from RHS in Lexington, Missouri, while senior John Collins lives the farthest west in Lawrence, Kansas. Freshman Ryan Kisner travels from the farthest south living in Harrisonville, Missouri, while junior Scott McMillan travels from the farthest north living in St. Joseph, Missouri. McMillan does, however, have an apartment five minutes from RHS in order to cut down on excessive driving.







No tolerance policy sends many to JUG

his year a new policy came out to discipline the tardy. The policy stated that if you were late to Rockhurst, or to any classes, you received an automatic JUG to be served that day. It quickly was nicknamed the "No Tolerance Law." Last year, the policy for tardiness was three warnings or unexcused lates before the fourth was considered an automatic JUG. This year, to lower the incidences of people coming late, Mr. David Alvey and Mr. Thomas Murphy introduced this new policy to discourage students from "...treating their three warnings as something they can use up..." According to Mr. Alvey, the

new policy has been effective in lowering the rate of tardiness among students. The JUG room is still filled with about the same amount of students who took a few slow steps to Rockhurst or to their next hour class . Mr. Alvey explains that students should be at school on time anyway, so there should be no difference. This rule was designed to help students arrive at school or class on time unless they have a legitimate excuse.

Mr. Alvey explains, "...most of the students that have reasonable excuses, like traffic and so forth, I let off. This policy is aimed toward those students who just want to take their time to get to school and

just don't care whether or not they are late. Students who usually get JUGs learn their lesson after the first or second time."

This new rule has understandably elicited some negative responses. "I think we should get a warning before serving an automatic JUG," senior Jim Schorgl said. "Some of us make plans after school or play sports and we have to serve a JUG because we woke up a few minutes later than usual. I just don't think that it's fair." All Mr. Alvey had to say about these comments was, "...well there's only one solution. Don't be late."




































Democracy in this nation would not last long if they didn't care. At Rockhurst we make men into Christian leaders which in turn links them to the government," Mr. Spungen said.





Other students still can be found exercising their strategic minds in the "chess room."


"I love playing chess. Although I don't have time to come in here, I do when I can," senior Ryan Finley said.



"The structure of retreats seems to be working very well. We seem to be doing the right thing at the right time the right way," Mr. Ruby said.


Fr. Mark Daues, S.J. is new to the retreats this year. Fr. Daues is in charge of the junior retreat.

Heightened parking lot security reduces auto thefts and break-ins

For many years students who drive to school have been a little uneasy about leaving their vehicles unattended throughout the school day, giving easy targets for theft and vandalism. This was understandable, since most break-ins occur during class time. Thanks to the administration the parking lot was made safer and more secure with the hiring of Ameriguard's security officers, who patrol the parking lot while students are in class.

Sergeant Mark Cantrell and Officer Michelle Tompkins of Ameriguard made an impact on theft and vandalism this year. Mr. Dave Alvey said that the officers act as a deterrent by scaring away potential thiefs and vandals. In on instance they stopped an egging of the school before it happened. This saved the cost of labor for clean up.

Although they constantly watched the parking lot, Ameriguard officers expected to stop all vandalism. There has been one report of a broken window so far, but the number of break-ins should decrease from the 14 incedents last year. However, we will not be able to confirm this until the end of the year.

When break-ins occured, Rockhurst did everything they could to catch the suspects. Ameriguard officers were allowed to hold the suspects, just as every other citizen is, but were unarmed and excercised extreame caution in doing so. They immedeately radioed Mr. Alvey, who called the Kansas City Police Department. The K.C.P.D carried out the investigations.

Rockhurst is considering additional other kinds of security in the future. When the new additions to the school are completed there could be gated entraces to the parking lot and an alarm system for the school.







Finally, the commencement ceremonies were held back at Municipal Auditorium where the graduating class heard a speech from class Valedictorian Kevin McManus.







On July 17, 1996, a Boeing 747 jumbo jet took off from JFK International Airport in New York, never to reach its destination in Paris. TWA Flight 800 exploded and crashed into the ocean in hundreds of pieces. There were no survivors of the 230 people aboard.

On July 27, 1996, a pipe bomb exploded at 1:20 AM, killing Alice Hawthorne of Albany, GA, and injuring 111 others. A Turkish cameraman rushing to the scene died of a heart attack. Richard Jewell, a security guard working in the part, alerted police to a suspicious knapsack and helped evacuate people just moments before it exploded.

Mr. T.Michael Lillis 1939-1997

Community mourns the loss of 'Mr. Rockhurst'

Note: The following story was written before the death of Mike Lillis on March 5, 1997. It was decided to print the story as it was written in tribute.

Everyone who knows Rockhurst knows Mike Lillis. "He's 'Mr. Rockhurst' himself. I mean the man practically bleeds blue blood. When I need to know something about Rockhurst's history, Mike either knows

it or has the resources readily available to find out," said Mr. Tom Murphy, Rockhurst High School Principal.

Mike began his long association with Rockhurst in 1952 when he entered as a freshman at the campus then located at 52nd and Troost. During the next four years, Mike made the most of his educational experience both athletically and socially. He lettered in football both his junior and senior years under the direction of Coach Al Davis, and was a part of the 1954 team that went undefeated (9-0) to win the last

championship in the now-defunct Catholic League. Mike's intense love of sports led him to manage the Rockhurst basketball team for two years, the track team one year, and was nominated Student Council representative of the Lettermen's's Club for two consecutive semesters.

When Mike wasn't on the field, he was quite studious, enjoying such subjects as mathematics, foreign languages and American History. In the spring of 1956 Mike graduated in the upper half of his class with a GPA of 3.3.

"Now that I look back on my high school experience at Rockhurst, I can say I really enjoyed it and still value the lessons that I learned to this very day. Until I die, I'll never forget all the life long friends I've made, and the teachers and coaches, particularly Coach Davis, that helped shape who I am today," said Mr. Lillis.

The following fall, Mike attended Kansas State University on a football scholarship and majored in pre-engineering. Unfortunately, his football plans were ruined only three quarters of the way through his freshman season when he tore both ligaments and damaged the cartilage in his right knee. With this,

Mike gave up his football dreams and moved back to Kansas City to attend Rockhurst College.

In his first year at Rockhurst College, Coach Davis hired Mike to be the Sophomore Football coach at Rockhurst High School. For the next two years he served as the varsity's lineman coach, but resigned following his graduation from Rockhurst College with a BSBA in marketing. In 1961 he went to work for a local insurance company. For the next ten years, despite his heavy work load as an insurance salesman. Mike still assisted Rockhurst's football program until 1971 by helping run

summer camps, assisting in preseason "two -a-day" practices, and scouting opponents during the regular season.

In 1990, with the Rose Theatre just completed, the Mike was hired full time to be the Theatre Manager and Work Grant Supervisor.

Mike's wife Janet, daughters Katie, Carol, and Sheila, and sons Tim and John have each contributed countless hours to the Rockhurst community by helping out in concessions, advertising sales, and clerical work in support of their father's love of Rockhurst.

Over the years Mike has shown overwhelming generosity, hard work and commitment, through which he has ultimately strengthened the school and community for the past forty-five years. story by Jesse Felzien



Father William Steiner, S.J. 1921-1997

RHS feels the loss of a hard working behind-the-scenes man

Fr. William H. Steiner, serving as an Associate Pastor at Guardian Angels Catholic Church, passed away Feb. 12, 1997, due to unexpected complications following routine heart surgery. This ended the 75year-old Jesuit's half-century span of service to his fellow man, including nearly 30 years with the Rockhurst Community.

Fr. Steiner's legacy at the Rock started in 1938 when he transferred his junior year from Pilsen, Kansas, High

School Rockhurst. Graduating the following year, he immediately entered the Society of Jesus, and four later vears obtained Bachelor of Arts and a Masters Degree from St. Louis University. In 1952 he was officially ordained and took his final

vows on August 15, 1955. Over the next several years he served in many ways, and in many different locations, including Regis College and High School (Denver, CO), St. Mary's College (St. Mary's, KS), and Mount Kapaun High School (Wichita, KS). One of his most noteworthy accomplishments happened in the 1950's when he almost single-handedly supervised the construction of the Jesuit Retreat House in Frasier,

In 1964, Fr. Steiner came back to Rockhurst, which would become his home for the next thirty years. As both an artist and an extremely skilled craftsman, he quickly found his role and started out with a number of physical plant initiatives such as grounds maintenance. One such endeavor includes the imposing "Great Wall of Steiner", located immediately behind the field house, constructed under his watchful eye over many years by

students serving JUG. Throughout his career he also served as both a history and theology teacher, college buildings administrator and an Assistant to the President of Rockhurst High School.

"Fr. Steiner was one the most dedicated individuals that I have ever encountered throughout my entire life. The man's work ethic and it's direct effect on the Rockhurst community is absolutely amazing," said Mr. Tom Norman, Theology Department Chairman.

Over the years Fr. Steiner has served in many capacities, but he is remembered founding "shepherding" the famous Sale-O-Rama. This enormous garage sale has not only served as a yearly reunion for parents and alumni, but has raised a substantial amount money of Rockhurst. In 1994, Steiner's last year,

Sale-0 raised a record \$74,000 and had averaged \$50,000 a year in the recent past. In Sale-O's 35-year history, it has been estimated that it has easily raised more than a million dollars for the school. Sale-O-Rama's vast financial success eventually served as a prototype for other volunteer fund-raisers such as the Spectacular Auction and the Al Davis golf tournament.

"He was a quiet man who worked primary behind the scenes who, in the end, had an astonishing effect on this school," said Fr. Chris Pinne, SJ.

From this, it's fairly safe to say that no matter where Steiner applied his talents, whether it be in the classroom or in the warehouse, his hard work enhanced the lives of a long line of students and their families. Through the Rockhurst community, he indeed made a positive impact in the local community. story by Jesse Felzien







Brother Lawrence Eilert leaves Rockhurst having exemplified Jesuit ideal of *Man at Work*

The Rockhurst community has had to come to terms with the departure of the beloved Brother Larry Eilert and many have come to evaluate the profound im-

pact of his 25 years of service.

Brother Eilert's life of service began in 1934 when he was a senior in high school. In the fall, he attended an annual retreat where a priest convinced him of his true calling. Although at first wary of the idea of becoming a religious brother, by the following year he knew he had made the right decision.

"After I signed on with the brother-hood, I was so scared that it nearly took a team of horses to drag me to the seminary, but once I got used to the life, it would have taken *three* teams of horses to drag me away," quipped Brother Eilert. "Honestly, I've never regretted it for a minute."

For the next 27 years, he worked at a seminary located in Florissant, MO, outside St. Louis. One year he worked in the apple orchard as a picker. Later he was put in charge of running and maintaining the multi-acre vineyard. When the vineyard was closed in 1958, Brother Eilert's duties shifted to maintaining the seminary's 30-acre grounds until leaving in 1971.

On May 1, 1972 he came to Rockhurst and was put in charge of maintaining the school's grounds. Up until 1993, his duties consisted of mowing the playing fields, repairing Jesuit community cars, and helping Fr. William Steiner (his best and closest friend) with Sale-O-Rama. But over the years, he has become best known for such thrifty habits as daily dumpster raids where he retrieved aluminum cans for recycling.

In 1981, Brother Eilert started a scholarship fund to assist students with the school's growing tuition. To raise money, he organized paper drives and sold them to area companies for \$3 per hundred pounds. In 1988, the price of newspaper drastically dropped so Brother Eilert turned to recycling aluminum cans. Over the past 16 years, he has raised more than a quarter of a million dollars which continues to grow by earning up to 14% interest.

Unfortunately, during the past five years, his severe arthritis and Parkinsons disease have grown worse, greatly limiting his abilities. It is for such health reasons, along with the fact that the Jesuit residence will eventually be moved, that Brother decided to move to the Jesuit Hall high-rise on the

campus of St. Louis University.

"It's sad to see a great man, who helped make this institution what it is today, leave after more than two and a half decades of service," said Fr. David Suwalsky, S.J. "I'm positive the Rockhurst community will immediately feel his absence and miss him ex-

tremely."

"It's kind of ironic that the all three of the hardest decisions of my entire life was deciding when to leave," said Brother Eilert. "The first was when I decided to leave home for the seminary. The second was leaving the seminary to come to Rockhurst and third, being the most difficult, is leaving Rockhurst, the home that I served for twenty-five enjoyable years. But I look to my future at the retirement home with optimism as just another step in the right direction down life's long path."
