







Sophomores traveled to Adventure Woods in south Kansas City and Juniors went in small groups to either Conception Abby or Savior of the World Seminary. Seniors and a few Juniors took part in five Kairos Retreats.

"The purpose of any retreat, on or off campus, is to give students another way to try to find a relationship with God in a different setting," according to Pastoral Director Mr. Joe Delehunt.

The main purpose of the retreat program at Rockhurst is "to get to know yourself, to get to know classmates and to get to know God on a higher scale," stated Mr. Delehunt. 


"What you got from the play will be different than the person sitting next to you; just as what you 'get' from life," added Mr. Cilley.





"The play was a real test of my physical comedy. I had a terrific time doing it. It was definitely a wonderful experience," said Vick. story by Reed Davison





The seniors traveled all around the metro area to work on their projects, from agencies at 30th and Troost to 119th and Roe.


Though the seniors taught alot they already knew, they seemed to learn alot too.


John Taylor worked at the Children's Center for the Visually Impaired. At the center John assisted kindergarten and pre-school age children with reading, and kept them entertained.










\$100,000 mark surpassed for first time in 36 year history

In its 36th year, Rockhurst's Sale-O-Rama, one of Kansas City's largest garage sales, grossed over \$100,000 for the first time. These funds went toward lowering the cost of student tuition and supplementing the cost of running the facility.

While the sale itself ran for only two and one half days, the time and effort in preparation—soliciting, collecting, organizing, and pricing—took parents, and friends of RHS over six months.

Advertising, good weather, and the sale's reputation contributed to the record profits, according to Mrs. Judie Scanlon, Special Activities Coordinator.

"This year's Sale-O brought in record sales as well as about 500-600 volunteers," Mrs. Scanlon said.

According to Mrs. Scanlon, the event could not have happened without the volunteers who would spend up to 12 hours a day helping.

Along with the huge turnout of volunteers, Sale-O-Rama also had more donations than previous sales. Four mothers are responsible for monitoring the tasks needed to have such a successful sale. Mrs. Jan Elder and Mrs. Kathy Knopke, cochairpersons worked for over sixth months preparing for the big weekend in October. Mrs. Elder and Mrs. Knopke were assisted by next year's co-chairs, Mrs. Cheryl Dress and Mrs. Cindy Pratt-Stokes. Mrs. Pratt-Stokes recognized that, "Every volunteer should take credit in the sucess of the sale and realize that the sucess shouldn't be be measured in dollars, but in how it brought the community together with Rockhurst."

"Sale-O-Rama is known around Kansas City, for its great bargains and fun. If you don't find it at Sale-O, God didn't make it," Fr. Thomas Pesci, S.J. stated. Story by Willy Fagan



Seniors take a trip of a lifetime to help others during Spring Break instead of partying

hen Spring Break rolls around many students pack their bags and head for the slopes, the beach, or some tropical island, but this year six seniors headed for a different sort of place. Instead of partying on the beaches of Cancun, seniors Vince Rupp, Adam Maese, Rich Wikiera, J.V. Wilson, J.P. Latinzer, and Casey Smith went to Honduras with Fr. Chris Pinne, S.J. to see the diffrence in lifestyles and poverty.

On Sunday, March 15 the group left Kansas City International Airport and began a trip that would change their lives. On Sunday night the group arrived in Nigrito the small Horduran village they would stay at for three days. "When we first got there, we just settled in, unpacked, and met the

missionary priests," said Wilson.

For the first three days of their trip the group met the villagers and interacted with the different lifestyle the village offered. Wilson recalled the day they spent at the Nigrito Nutrition Center. "We went and played with these little kids, who were just like us except we had enough to eat and they didn't."

After three days the group left the village and hiked into the mountains to see an even more impoverished lifestyle. "The mountains were full of shacks, where the people were just so much worse off than even the villagers. We thought the village was poor, but these people were even lower on the

poverty scale," Rupp commented.

At night the group would sleep in churches up in the hills, while during the day they would hike from village to village. Despite the poverty the group encountered in the villages, they found that the people were not poor in spirit and generosity. "It struck me that the people even in the poorest villages, would be hospitable and considerate to our needs," said Rupp.

The group was lead through Honduras by Fr. Pinne who leads missionary trips each year. One of Fr. Pinne's close friends is a missionary priest in Honduras who works with the people each and every day, while celebrating mass in the villages he travels to. The group was amazed to see how much church meant to the Honduran villagers. Each member of the group took something special home with them from Honduras, but for each it was a trip of a lifetime. Rupp summed up his experience by stating, "The people of Honduras, despite their poor conditions economically, truly were a generous and inspiring people. My trip definitely taught me to appreciate what I have."

"It was something I'll never forget," Wilson stated.



Annual Hoop event raises \$12,000


Rockfest once again fulfilled its goal of providing a fun day of basketball and raising money for needy students.


This year's tournament, held in April, had over 250 participants, 71 teams and 60 sponsors, and raised over \$12,000 for the Rockfest Scholarship Fund.

















Two losses to Blue Springs dooms Hawklet chances to 'Rock State'

he Rockhurst Hawklets continuing battle for excellence in the 1997-98 football season was stopped short of their ultimate goal—the state championship. After eight convincing wins and two unexpected losses, the Hawklets were defeated by the Blue Springs Wildcats for a second time in the state sectionals, ending their 8-3 season.

"The turning point in our season was the loss against Liberty," said starting junior cornerback Kariem Cherry.

"We had a really good year. Great years are the ones that go all the way," said Head Coach Tony Severino.

The two teams that did not allow Rockhurst a "great" season were Blue Springs, and Liberty, who over the last two years have become new rivals. "We played hard and well against Blue Springs, but we made mistakes," said Coach Severino. "Our biggest heartbreak was the Liberty loss. However, our development after that fourth week was phenomenal. We had a different attitude after losing to Liberty."


"After the loss, we knew that we were better skilled and more athletic than the teams we had lost to in the third and fourth weeks. Our efforts were now concentrated on being mentally tough and doing the little things right. That is where our seniors stepped it up and became leaders of our team. That is what made us successful," said junior lineman Tim Hanrahan.

This different attitude was obviously shown in the games that preceded the second loss to Blue Springs. The highlight of the season was the win against Jefferson City, undefeated, and ranked in USA Today. Jeff City finished as state champions with only one loss, to Rockurst. Other high points in the season were the win against Lee Summit North, Fort Smith Northside, Garden City, and defeating Raytown in the district championship.

"The Lee Summit North victory was important because we came back from multiple injuries and still came out on top." Coach Severino continued that, "this year's team was the first since 1987 to beat Fort Smith and Jeff City in the same season."

The Hawklet squad consisted of 22 seniors, 45 juniors, and 15 sophomores. Eleven seniors and five juniors were returning lettermem. "Larry Marshall was a key player in the backfield. Sean Doyle is the best all around player in the city. Matt Zender and Jim Radovich were the anchors for the offensive line. Greg Oppold was the second leading tackler. John Taylor and Brandon Severino made big plays in big games, and Dustin Van Dolah really developed in his leadership and skills," said Coach Severino. "Other outsanding players were Jerod Dunleavy, who made outstanding catches (especially against Blue Springs) and Brandon Shelby who stepped up to back up Marshall," he added.

"I feel good about next year. We're getting experience back along with a lot of young talent. The sophomores have great amounts of skill and the juniors are fairly complete," Coach Severino remarked. "Next year we need to make our mental toughness equal to our physical toughness, especially up front." Story by Phil Duncan









"We are looking for Jeff City to become our biggest rival in the future," said Coach Morris.



The game against Aquinas, a 12-0 loss, damaged the momentum of the team. According to freshman John Phelps,"We played well, but we just got beat."


The commanding victory over Park



The most outstanding players were the number one runner, junior Mike Schaefer, and Varsity Captain, senior David Wood.







"We were close at times throughout the season but we never quite got over that hump and we were not quite as good as we could have been," said Coach Bubalo.






Junior guard Brandon Severino prepares himself to be fouled by a Lawrence opponent as he tries to score. The Hawklets lost to Lawrence 65-81.














The team had a hard time because of many rain delayed games, and the bad weather didn't allow them to practice a lot on the field together.













Swimmers capture 5th straight league championship crown

he Rockhurst Aqua Hawks proved to be a contending force in the area for the 1997-98 swim season. The team, coached by Mr. Andy Hagedorn with the assistance of second-year coach Mr. Fred Schlichting, enjoyed their most successful season ever.

The Hawklets made an impact in all meets in which they participated. The team placed fifth place or better with eight returning lettermen at all dual and invitational meets, and qualified all three relays and five individuals for the state meet in St. Louis.



"I hope our team will have this much success next year. It will take a lot of hard work, but I do believe we can do it." Story by Dan Watson






"There really is not a word to describe this season. We were like a juggernaut; any school we faced we just ran right over them," said junior sensation Fugit.








"Next year we should be even better becasue we only have one senior graduating," Thomas commented.





he Intramural Sports Program prevails once again in its 14th season. Over 500 students participated in the program this year, which included basketball, volleyball, football, and soccer.










Pastoral Council plans Rockhurst religious events



At State, senior Josh Hawley placed second in Extemporaneous Speaking and fourth in Lincoln Douglas Debate, senior Ryan Baber placed third in Oratory, sophomore Edward Shelton won first place in Poetry, and sophomores Eric Garcia and Evan McKay placed twentieth in Team Debate. Head Coach Don Ramsey said, "I was happy with the results qualifying five to state and having four of the five place in the top five."

Besides placing third at state, Baber also qualified for the National Tournament in Oratory. "Of all the seniors in the class, Ryan was the most competitive all year," commented Coach Ramsey.

In addition to attending the National Tournament this year Rockhurst attended the National Catholic Forensic League Tournament in Detroit, May 23-24. For the first year ever Rockhurst joined the National Catholic Forensic League, an organization for Catholic High schools around the nation.

This year the team took Baber in Oratory, Garcia and McKay in Team Debate, and Brad Lauer and Jerry Sirna in Congress. Placing at the NCFL were Ryan Baber, 7th in Oratory and Jerry Sirna, who placed as a semi-finalist in Student Congress. The tournament had over 230 contestants in each event, with over 50 dioceses participating.

According to Mr. Ramsey there were several returning seniors who contributed to the team. Tim

Fendler and Josh Hawley were this year's Debate squad co-captains. "Hawley was really competitive for the last half of the year," Mr. Ramsey remarked. "Fendler was competitive when he was out in tournaments." Seniors Justin Unger and Baber were also leaders for the team.

According to Mr. Ramsey other squad members also stood out, like sophomore Team Debaters Garcia and McKay. "They worked hard consistently as a team, and inspired other Sophomores to work hard." The biggest heartbreak of the season to Mr. Ramsey was Josh Hawley not making it to Nationals. "I still think Josh is the best extemper in the state and it was disappointing he didn't win both districts and state."

Coach Ramsey attributed much of the team's success to the sophomores on the squad. "Most sweepstakes were won by sophomores because of the very few entries by seniors," commented Coach Ramsey "The sophomores were at all the tournaments raking in points."

Rockhurst hosted its annual Invitational Tournament, completely run by the debate team. "The tournament went well; we had very responsible students and a supportive community," said Mr. Ramsey.

He attributed the success of the tournament to Hawley and Chas Eberle in the Tab room, along with Baber and Trip Ross on the Judges committee.

Coach Ramsey's hope for the future of the squad is high. "I would like to see this year's sophomores and juniors achieve success." To sum up the year he says, "The agony of decision making is only made by thought."



"NHS has been a great experience for me and the entire school community," said junior Kevin Knopke. Story by Kevin Komoroski








"MEET was a great experience because you get to mingle with different cultures and see their ways of living," stated Senior Enrique Gutierrez.





"I really enjoy the club and the way it helps the fight for the right of justice," stated Maese.









Kern said.


Some of the Pep Band's most popular tunes include, "Start Me Up," played before every kickoff, and the Rockhurst Fight Song when the players take the field or the court.

Junior trumpet player Brian Sichko summed up his third year in the band by saying, "It was a great year to rock with the Pep Band."





The staff started in the summer and had final deadline on June 12, so that the entire year could be covered in one volume. Books are distributed in the Fall for the previous school year..




All in all, Rockhurst might be a large step from someone's previous schooling careers, but it is an important step.




there actually was little visible change.



cluttered the walking area in the classrooms. "The teachers needed more room in class," Mr. David Alvey, Dean of Students, said.





They are a group of adults that neither the students nor the faculty often come in contact with. They consist of Kansas City's top businessmen and women, as well as Rockhurst Alumni, Rockhurst parents, and four Jesuit priests. These people are the Rockhurst High School Board of Trustees.

Most students will not come in any contact with these people during their years at RHS."I really don't know much about the Board. I can't even tell you who is on it," junior Josh Brewster stated.

The members of the Rockhurst High School Board of Trustees (formerly called Board of Directors) are the operators and legal trustees of Rockhurst High School. These people are charged with the oversight and policy setting for the entire school. In general, the Board has the responsibility and the authority for safeguarding the Ignatian character of the establishment and its operations, as well as Rockhurst's educational philosophy and tradition. They influence all aspects of the school including academic, spiritual, physical, and financial. The Board of Trustees consist of three women and eighteen men. Like any other board of a company or institution, Rockhurst's board has a chairman, vice chairman, secretary, and treasurer in addition to its members.

"These people assist all of us in carrying out the mission and vision that Rockhurst stands for," said Fr. Thomas Pesci, SJ, RHS President.


The Board Members, who are eligible for two three-year terms, are nominated by current Board members, as well as the Jesuit priests. Many are Rockhurst alumni including Board Chairman Mr. Charles Haake, RHS Class of '66, who is also a current Rockhurst dad and parent of two alumni sons. Another Rockhurst alumni and dad is Mr. Matt Bowen, Class of '66, a classmate of Mr. Haake. Mr. Bowen, who is also the Immediate past Chairman of the Board of Trustees, is the parent of a present Rockhurst student, and a Rockhurst graduate. When asked about his duty on the board, Mr. Bowen replied, "My job is to be present at the meetings every other month and to aid in the process of voting on specific topics."

The Board includes many non-Rockhurst members, meaning they are not alumni or a parent of a current Rockhurst student. Reverend Robert Hotz, S.J. is the current President of Creighton Prep High School in Omaha, Nebraska. Fr. Pesci is also on the Board at Creighton Prep.

"Fr. Hotz and I have a little deal. When I go up to Omaha or he comes to KC, we take each other out to dinner," joked Fr. Pesci.

hen Mr. Thomas Murphy was asked to describe his job as Principal at Rockhurst High School he replied, "I continue everyday to meet the challenges of this great enterprise (Rockhurst) and I love that; it helps me know that I am doing my job as a principal."

Mr. Murphy has been part of different Jesuit institutions for the last twenty-five years of his life, beginning as a student at St. Ignatius College Prepatory in San Francisco. When he finished his pre-dental work at the Jesuit-run University of San Francisco, he decided that instead of attending a dental school in Boston or waiting another year for admittance into an area dental college, he would agree to spend a school year teaching chemistry at his alma mater, St. Ignatius High School. At the time, Mr. Murphy did not intend to spend the next sixteen years of his life as a teacher, department chairperson, baseball coach, and then Assistant Principal of Academic Affairs at St. Ignatius, but he did!

It was in February 1995 that Mr. Murphy was invited to apply for the position of Principal at Rockhurst High School (a position held be interim Principal Dr. Jerry Goben). He flew to Kansas City and had several interviews with Administration, faculty, parents, and even students. On March 3, 1995, Fr. Thomas Pesci, S.J., RHS President, traveled to San Francisco to offer Mr. Murphy the job. He accepted after much contemplation and receiving input from his wife, Lisa. Early that summer, Mr. Murphy started

a journey that has had an impact on over 1,200 young men's lives.

Coming to Rockhurst was a change in many ways from St. Ignatius High in California. The number one difference was the climate of Kansas City compared to the warmer winter season of San Francisco.

"The winters here (in Kansas City) are.....cold!" Mr. Murphy exclaimed.

Besides the fact that St. Ignatius is a co-ed school, it has nearly twice the number of students that Rockhurst has. Mr. Murphy likes the difference and feels that smaller numbers offer many advantages.

"I like to stand in the halls and be able to recognize everyone's faces. By the time graduation rolls around, I hope to know every name and put it with the face of that young man."


It has been those faces that have made Mr. Murphy feel accepted from his first day in the fall of 1995. He feels that the class of 1996 first showed him the spirit that Rockhurst exemplifies.

Mr. Hagedorn's gruff exterior belies his warm, gentle spirit

here is one name that can put terror into the hearts of Rockhurst students, no matter who ends up having him on their schedule. His piercing stare, occasional biting remarks, and strict grading policy can make even the ablest of scholars cringe when they think of AP English teacher Mr. Andrew Hagedorn.

Born and raised near Cincinnati, Mr. Hagedorn is a product of the Jesuit system, graduating from St. Xavier High School and earning a degree from nearby Xavier University. He first came on the scene as a teacher at Covington Catholic High School near his hometown almost 30 years ago, teaching in a Catholic high school setting. In 1983, he chose a change of scenery, moving to San Diego, where he taught at Francis Parker, a private school, for 6 years before coming to Rockhurst to 1989.

Mr. Hagedorn adds a personal touch to his style of conveying messages to his students. "My teaching style...is a combination of what I have picked up from teachers that I had...plus, trying to teach kids the way I would like to be taught," he explains. "I didn't like lecture courses...(however) I did enjoy the interactive classes, which involved an exchange of ideas...(in that) I, as a student, felt that 'hey, my ideas are important, too.'" Some students

respond well to this kind of learning. "I like the way he doesn't make you take notes," says Senior Steven George. "I probably learn more in that class than I do any other."

Adversity has come Hagedorn's way, on and off the school grounds. After experiencing heart complications two years ago, he was forced to change his demeanor. "It's given me some new appreciations of things that are more important than I had thought before." His attitude in the classroom has also made a turnaround. "I can't lose my temper anymore," he said. "My temper was one of the greatest qualities I had, and now I can't exercise it anymore," he kidded, "I guess you could say I've mellowed." Even though one of his best weapons has been vanquished, the English Department head still has an upbeat outlook. "I am not an invalid...there are millions of people worse off than I am."

Another challenge that Mr.
Hagedorn has had to face comes with his additional responsibility as the Head Swimming Coach. In his six-year coaching tenure at RHS, he has not had the luxury of a pool on the campus. However, this does not phase a man who coached teams to four Kentucky State Championships and four runner-up finishes during his career in Cincinnati. "When I lived in Cincinnati, I coached swimming for thirteen years, and we didn't have a

pool there...so in some ways, it's no big deal because that's what I've had to do already."

He says that the late hours and long days of practice actually make his team come together more. "I have noticed...that there is a greater sense of camaraderie and friendship...that exists on the swim team." And while he doesn't mind winning, Mr. Hagedorn approaches the sport with a different mindset for his swimmers to follow. "I stress individual improvement overall...(while) my priorities are for them (the swimmers) to be good people, and then good students, and then good swimmers, in that order."

So after all of the years of teaching kids at the middle school, high school, and college levels, why come back to the Midwest, and why pick Rockhurst? "Since I had (attended and taught in) Catholic schools all of my life (before San Diego), I realized that it (the school in San Diego) missed some of the important elements that are present in Catholic schools."

Mr. Hagedorn has enjoyed his 30year teaching tenure, and as he approaches his tenth year at RHS, he is not considering retirement. "It's still exciting to see kids make discoveries...(and) to be proud of kids for their accomplishments."

His students, in turn, are proud to have him as a teacher. "I can come into his room anytime and talk to him," claims Senior Chris Riffel. "I can get help on papers...(or) in my life."

Senior student Joe Rogers commented on Mr. Hagedorn's grading policy. "He is a rough grader, but it's for the best. It truly does help you in preparing for college, and for academic excellence." Still others come back through his door after surviving a first time. "I enjoyed his class freshman year, so I knew what to expect," explained Senior Kieran McInerney. "I wanted a challenge, and I knew Mr. Hagedorn could provide that."

What you don't know about Coach Mo could surprise you


ou may know him as a teacher, coach, or lunch monitor, but Mr. John Morris has made his presence felt for fourteen years at Rockhurst.

After graduating from RHS in 1974, the Kansas City native attended Saint Louis University, where he became interested in music and rugby, playing for SLU all four years and teaching himself to play the guitar. After receiving his degree, he continued to play rugby for nine years for the Saint Louis Black Sheep, a local club similar to the Kansas City Blues. An hour of studying a day can keep the doctor engaged

r. Fred Campisano has exemplified what a truly dedicated Rockhurst teacher will do for his students. After thirtyone years of teaching, two different schools, and a Doctorate degree in school administration, he has become one of Rockhurst's valuable resources.

Dr. Campisano, who grew up in a small town in Northeastern Ohio, attended Arizona State University where he earned a Bachelors of Arts Degree in Secondary Education and a Masters Degree in Secondary Education before deciding to become a teacher. He began his career in Phoenix, teaching physics and coaching football for Brophy High School, the local Jesuit High School. In 1969-1973 he attended University of Notre Dame Summer Institutes, where he earned a Masters of Science in Physics.

Following his ninth year of teaching, he took a position as the Dean of Students(much like Mr. Alvey's position), where he stayed for

ten years.

After receiving his doctorate degree, he decided that he wanted to become a principal. Since lay principals were not allowed in the California Province at that time, he investigated a job offer at Walsh Jesuit High School, in Akron, OH.

"I thought the interview went well, but I was unsure of the environment,"

Dr. Campisano stated.

Within a month, he found out about the opening for the principal's position at Rockhurst High School.

"I liked the school, the environment, and everything else about it. I also liked the idea that it was a Jesuit

Preparatory High School."

Because his father was dying of the "Lou Gehrig's Disease," he did not make up his mind right away, until he discussed the opportunity with his father. His father, who could not speak, wrote on a piece of paper in big bold letters, "TAKE THE JOB, STUPID."

"I called Father Tom Cummings (then the President of RHS) and accepted the position."

He was the principal at RHS for four years. During his third year,

Father Cummings had to have heart surgery, so Dr. Campisano had to do not only the principal job, but some aspects of the President's job as well.

When Father Mike Durso, then the Academic Assistant Principal, transferred to DeSmet Jesuit High School, it was decided not to hire an Academic Assistant Principal to replace him for financial reasons.

"When Fr. Durso left I did the Principal job and Assistant Principal for one year. I became burned out from doing both jobs, so I stepped down from the Principal position. Then Fr. Pesci asked me if I would like to become a Physics teacher. I agreed in 1994."

During the same year coach Tony Severino asked him if he would like to be an assistant Varsity Football Coach.

"I accepted the job even though I had not coached football in several years. I love coaching and I have never worked for a better coach before in my life. I love the way he (Coach Severino) works with the kids. At this point in my life I am having fun. This is more like semi-retirement than work."

According to some students Dr. Campisano's is the hardest class of their lives.

"Even though this class is hard, it will prepare me for college," said senior Justin Griffith.

"This class is definitely hard, but I am glad I was able to get into it

because of Dr. Campisano's great teaching ability," said senior Jonathan Lowe.

Dr. Campisano teaches Fundamental, Honors and A.P. Physics.

"The course is based on being able to apply the concepts to problem solving which is what you do if you are an engineer or a scientist. The most challenging part with the course is to able to read the problem and know what is given and what you are asking for. This is exactly what will happen to you in college," he said.

"The reason the course is so difficult is that students are not used to that approach. Plus, they find word problems to be the most difficult aspect of Math: Physics is word problems.

"Because this is so challenging and because the amount of time available for seniors to be in class is limited, I find it important to be available to them outside of class time to offer assistance," he states. "In fact, in college Physics they will be meeting with a professor to do just that."

He tutors kids in the morning from 7:00 a.m. to the start of school. He says that he does not mind the extra teaching because he knows that it is a

hard class.


"Even though I have to get up early in the morning when I receive help from Dr. Campisano, it helps me understand the text much better. This is what separates him from other teachers, He is able to go that extra mile to help students," said senior tutoree, Jon Lowe.

Dr. Campisano has a daughter who lives in Albuquerque, and a son who lives in San Diego. He and his wife Sue, who were high school sweethearts, have been having a great relationship

for 32 years

"I love the Midwest, but someday I know I will have to leave, and go back to the west. I love my kids and I do not get to see them often. Plus, we will be having our first grandchild this winter and I want to be around to spoil him of her. The only reason I would have to leave this school would be to spend time with my family, not because I do not like RHS. It has been a great experience for which I am very thankful for."




"I think the applications give students a higher respect for graduation. They know graduation means a lot, so they have to take it seriously to graduate,"




