

The Martyrs Mosaic

A unique mosaic was designed and created by RHS art instructor Connie Greany with the collaborative efforts of her students. It was inspired by the 1989 murder of six Jesuit priests and two women in El Salvador. The idea evolved into a major spiritual response through prayer, research, volunteers,

and developed into a unique art form, taking nearly a decade for completion.

A few Rockhurst students in Mrs.
Greany's clay classes had completed the required assignments and were asking to do some extra work so Mrs.
Greany explained her idea for the mural. Gradually more students, including those involved in the Visual Arts Club, became involved in the project. As one class would end, another would begin, and continue the work.

The 3-D shapes that represent the six Jesuits and the two women slain, radiate around the central 'IHS' form. Small broken clay works are used as a sign of our broken lives that, when

combined, give glory to God. The surrounding circle represents God, infinity, the life cycle and is

decorated with words describing St. Ignatius, Jesuit phiand the

losophy and the faithful.

The four arms of the cross display the seal of RHS, the world map marking the influence of the Jesuits, the communion cup and host, and the bold initials 'RHS' represent the pride the students have for this community. The cross represents the sacrifice of our lives for the lives of others, as Jesus gave his life for us.

Principal's death shakes up Rockhurst community

Mr. Murphy ver the last five years Rockhurst High School has been "richly blessed to have for its principal one of the most sought after educators within the Jesuit school system, Mr. Thomas Murphy. His talents were enormous. He knew people," said Fr. Thomas Pesci, S.J., Rockhurst High School President. "He appreciated them, loved them, and, oh yes, he challenged them."

On Tuesday, December 28, Mr. Murphy, Rockhurst Principal for nearly five years, passed away at the age of 42 due to complications of acute pneumonia. His death was a shock to the Rockhurst community.

Mr. Murphy was born and raised in San Francisco, and attended St. Ignatius Prep and the University of San Francisco, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Biology. He was deeply devoted to his high school alma mater, and returned as a science teacher and baseball coach, later becoming Science Department Chairman, and eventually Assistant Principal for Academic Affairs.

"Tommy always had a deep spirituality," said Rev. Mario Prietto S.J., who had been principal when Mr. Murphy attended St. Ignatius Prep. and had been his mentor in education. "He came from a strong Irish Catholic faith and his years with the Jesuits as a student helped to channel, challenge, expand, and focus his wonderful gifts and talents. I think this is one of the reasons he came back to the Jesuits as an educator," he said.

In 1994 Mr. Murphy moved to Kansas City with his wife Lisa to assume the job as principal of RHS.

"I remember interviewing him at his first faculty brunch. You could tell he was very nervous, but at the same time he was very much in charge of himself," remarked Mr. David Alvey, Dean of Students.

"Tom articulated very clearly the mission of Rockhurst. In everything he did he would always have an incredibly organized structure which has helped to develop a great faculty over the years," said Mr. Michael Heringer, Assistant Principal for Academic Affairs.

No matter how much professional success Mr. Murphy attained, his true contribution to the Rockhurst community was in the manner in which he affected lives.

"I'll always remember how Mr. Murphy would stand in the halls and greet students. He was a visible presence for us and was truly interested in being our friend," senior Brandon Shelby remarked.


"Please remember that we mourn not Tom's loss, for he has gained the Kingdom of God," said Mrs. Murphy at his memorial service. "Instead, we mourn for our loss. But please remember that we have not lost him. Tom touched each and every one of us. We carry with us a piece of him. As long as we remember him, he will live on."



Community mourns loss of Rose Teicher and John Sullivan

Rockhurst loses friends and benefactors

enefactors Mrs. Rose Sarli Teicher and Mr. John J. Sullivan, Jr. left behind a legacy of generosity to Rockhurst when they passed away late in the summer of 1999. Mrs. Teicher was responsible for the construction of the Rose Theater and was instrumental in launching the current capital campaign. Mr. Sullivan funded the new Laura and John J. Sullivan, Sr. Chapel of the Sacred Heart in honor of his parents.


In her childhood, Mrs. Teicher did not have the benefits of a Catholic high school education. According to Laurence Freeman, Executive Director of Alumni Affairs, she regretted the lost opportunity and strove to make the privilege of Catholic education available to young people today. It was her dream to create in Rockhurst the quality teaching institution she wished she had attended.

In the early 1900s, Mrs. Teicher's father, Mr. Rocco Sarli, started a pasta business called the Kansas City Macaroni and Importing Company. At his retirement, Mrs. Teicher took over the business and later sold it to Hershey in the late 70s. It is now known as American Beauty Macaroni, and the rose on the packages is the same as the rose on the RHS logo, honoring Mrs. Teicher. The windfall from this transaction provided the capital for her philanthropy. In 1989, she spoke with Reverend Thomas Cummings, S.J., about helping showcase the fine arts at Rockhurst High School. She commissioned a theater to be built for the drama department. In recent years, she has been responsible for the remodeling of the fine arts facilities.

Mr. Sullivan, a Rockhurst alumnus (Class of 1935), became a successful financier. He turned his \$8000 purchase of the Roland Park State Bank into a \$380 million estate. According to Mr. Freeman, Mr. Sullivan was thought of as "the last friendly banker left, a champion of small businesses." Mr. Sullivan believed that everything he was and everything he had achieved could be attributed to the influence of his parents. The Laura and John J. Sullivan, Sr. Chapel of the Sacred Heart is a tangible expression of his gratitude for the wisdom, love and guidance of his parents.


"We enjoyed the love, care and generosity of Rose and John for many years," said Reverend Thomas Pesci, S.J., president. "They will be dearly missed."


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
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

"It was bigger and better," remarked Mr. Heringer.


There were better decorations as well as more lights and louder music. They even had a spectacular fountain in the middle of the commons and mardi gras beads for everyone to take home as souvenirs.





Concert series premier kicks off year in style

Miss Marilyn Maye, renowned jazz singer, joined members of the Rockhurst High School Men's Choir in an early September fundraising concert in the Rose Theater in front of alumni, current families, and Miss Maye's fans.

Having perfomed a record 76 times on Johnny Carson's Tonight Show, Miss Maye provided the celebrity draw that the fundraising concert needed. The idea for such an event, which netted more than \$30,000, was conceived by Mrs. Judie Scanlon, RHS Special Activites Coordinator. Although the concert was not a substitute for the Sale-O-Rama, it did help to provide a substantial amount of money for the operational budget of the school.

"Not only did the concert help to bridge Rockhurst's financial gap, but it was also a great way to showcase the Rose Theater, said Mrs. Scanlon.

Miss Maye spent many hours rehearsing with the choir. In the weeks preceding the concert she would wake up at 5 a.m. so that her voice was ready by her 8 a.m. practice time. Senior Jack Bondon and alumnus Roger Barbieri (Class of '97) were individually picked by Miss Maye to sing duets with her. In Bondon's case it was his performance in *The Music Man* last year that led to his selection. Barbieri had performed as a child with Miss Maye and she had expressed a desire to reenact their routine.

A large part of the concert's success was due to the underwriting it received. From the patrons' parties to the tuxedos, everything was donated either by alumni or local businesses.

"The underwriting accounted for nearly \$20,000 of the total \$30,000 earned," according to Mrs. Scanlon. "The only true expenses were Miss Maye's fee, postage for flyers and an airline ticket fee," she said.

The success of the event has led to an idea for more concerts.

"It is my hope that this type of concert and other similar events become a yearly event at Rockhurst," Mrs. Scanlon said.



"Fr. Pesci's needlepoints are simply beautiful. They always attract a lot of attention and raise a lot of money because they are priceless," said Mr. Free-








Besides the daily activities of helping neighboring communities, the trip included a four hour truck ride, a one hour boat ride, and a 'Maniacal' wedding.

"We would eat huge dinners prepared by the Hondurans and they would settle for the leftovers," said Darby. Story by Sean McLaughlin







Directed by Mr. Frank Griffin and by Mr. William Munninghoff, the seniors were required to complete over 90 hours of community service during three weeks in January. They all were excused from their classes to dedicate their days working with less fortunate people.

"I think the service to the community gave our seniors a sense of appreciation for their talents," stated Mr. Griffin.

The RHS Senior Service Project was inspired by Fr. Pedro Arrupe, S.J. in who was head of all Jesuit schools when the project began in 1972. Fr. Arrupe developed this program to give the senior class a chance to experience the realities outside of school.

"Our students learned important things about life from the people whom they served," said Mr. Munninghoff.

The experiences varied greatly for seniors. Bob Stokes and Mark Molner worked with troubled pre-teens at Marillac Center, an organization dealing with children who had behavioral difficulties.


"I was amazed when I first arrived at Marillac. You could tell that the people there had physical problems. Despite initial problems, they were all great kids to work with," Mark stated. Mrs. Janet Soltys, a 5th through 8th grade teacher at Marillac center supervised Stokes and Molner.

"We wait all year for the Rockhurst seniors to come, because they have such a positive impact on the children," said Mrs. Soltys.


Rich Robinson worked with handicapped high school children in the Shawnee Mission District Schools. "It was an eye opening experience," he said. "The more you put into it, the more you get out of it."

The success of the Service Program continued at Don Bosco center, where David Hayob assisted. He worked with immigrants, helping to set them up in the United States as new members of society.

A Benedictine monk showcases the Basillica of the Immaculate Conception at Conception Abbey for a group of juniors on retreat.








Father Thomas Pesci, SJ: The man behind the Rockhurst renaissance

ev. Thomas A. Pesci, S.J. came to Rockhurst High School as president in 1993 and became the driving force to obtain sufficient funds to virtually rebuild the RHS facilities.

The appointment happened very quickly. In the span of two weeks Fr. Pesci learned of the presidential opening, was sent to RHS from the Maryland Province, and became the unanimous choice for RHS president. The Maryland Provincial, knowing Fr. Pesci was the perfect fit for RHS, told him to take the job despite Fr. Pesci's candidacy for president of Jesuit schools back east. Fr. Pesci has brought more of the Ignatian vision to RHS through art, music, diversity, facilities, and the Kairos retreat program. "I don't want us to be followers," Pesci says. "I want us to be pacesetters."

Through the talents and work of Fr. Pesci, RHS can boast of having state of the art facilities. He raised \$13.2 million from benefactors who gave their money to the "vision" of RHS education. Fr. Pesci nurtured relationships with now-deceased benefactors Mrs. Rose Teicher and Mr. John Sullivan, Jr. who gave RHS the Rose Theatre and Sacred Heart Chapel. Fr. Pesci is satisfied with his efforts on behalf of new facilities, but commented "sometimes I would rather be teaching Latin and interacting with students day to day in the classroom."

Fr. Pesci grew up in Pennsylvania, the oldest of five children and attended St. Joseph's Preparatory School in Philadelphia, PA. He was impressed by the Jesuit Scholastics at St. Joe's who impacted his decision to become a Jesuit. Fr. Pesci studied at College of the Holy Cross, Fordham University, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Weston School of Theology before being ordained in 1979. He worked in the Maryland Province as a teacher, chaplain, and vocations director and is especially proud of "The Care Walk," an outreach program to the homeless, which he cofounded in Society Hill, Philadelphia.

Fr. Pesci is happy with the accomplishments of RHS, but has additional goals for the school nonetheless. He wants RHS to have a national and international reputation, finished sporting facilities, more emphasis on endowment, and continued development to make RHS the "place to be." Fr. Pesci would like to make sure the construction is complete and a new president is lined up before he leaves. According to People magazine "the Rev. Thomas Pesci, S.J., is not a second-place kind of guy. Neither is the school he presides over as President." Story by John Linhoff







Rockhurst is known for its superb Jesuit educators and one with lengthy credentials is Fr. Chris Pinne, S.J.

Director of the Rockhurst mission to Honduras, Fr. Pinne has his hands full with supervising the Alumni Service Corps, teaching Freshman Theology, and steadfastly monitoring the hallways, speaking to everyone he sees every other waking moment.

Fr. Pinne is inspired by Fr. Patricio Wade, S.J., the RHS missionary contact to the Honduras.



While in school in Boston, he also was a deacon and religious education instructor for the seventh grade at Saint Catherine of Genoa Roman Catholic Church from 1991 to 1994. From 1987 to 1991, Father Suwalsky was a faculty member and administrator (even a wrestling coach) at Saint Louis University High School. He has also spent summers in Belize, Central America and studied Spanish in Cuernevaca, Mexico.

Rockhurst has helped to inspire Father Suwalsky especially with some of his beliefs.









Military Intelligence

The military is an institution that instills in it's members strong values that stay with them for the rest of their lives, much like the experience of a Rockhurst education. They are both structures that give a person a sense of duty and honor and teach one the value of hard work.

Five members of the Rockhurst faculty have military experience including three who have retired from extensive military careers. They are Dr. Jerry Goben, Mr. Paul Ptasnik, Mr. Chris Jensen, Mr. Phil Baker, Mr. Ron Geldhof and Mr. Tony Brown (who is still serving in the Air Force National Guard).

"My nineteen years in the military have been the best because every day has brought new challenges and excitement," said Mr. Brown, who since this interview moved on to Notre Dame de Sion to manage all physical plants.

Dr. Goben started his military career by serving five years in the Regular Army and then twelve years in the Missouri National Guard. He served in Vietnam and was involved in the Cuban Refugee Fiasco. His most memorable military experience, however, was the day his son was born at Ft. Benning, GA. Some of his commendations include the Purple Heart, the Bronze Star, and the Humanitarian Service Medal.

Mr. Ptasnik began his military career by attending West Point followed by 27 additional years of military service including serving in Vietnam in 1970-71. His most memorable experience was commanding an MI-AI tank battalion of 58 tanks and 550 soldiers in Germany from 1988-1990. While serving in the military he received the Rauger Tab and the Combat Infantry Badge.

Mr. Jensen served in the military for 20 years without seeing combat. During his career he was stationed at places such as Erlangen, Germany, Ft. Knox, Kentucky, and even Leavenworth, Kansas. While in the military he received the Meritorious Service Medal.

Mr. Baker served 24 years in the military including four at West Point. He was stationed with a combat unit in Germany during the Gulf War but did not see combat.

Mr. Brown has served nineteen years in the military and is still in the Air National Guard. He served in Desert Storm and has received awards for Air Force comendation and outstanding achievement. The most common value that these men have instilled in their lives based on their military service in the value of hard work. Dr. Goben's optimism that anything can be accomplished, Mr. Ptasnik's value of doing one's job to the best of his ability, and Mr. Baker's value of the positive power of teamwork are all products of experiences gained in the military.



"The purpose of the battle is to raise money for the Hondurans, showcase RHS musical talent, and to have a good time," said Mr. Norman.





G rads return to the Rock

Rockhurst provides a livelong bond for many of its graduates as shown by the many alums who return to teach at RHS.

"The main factor behind my return to RHS was the opportunity to serve a community that provided me with so much," said theology teacher Mr. Kevin Charcut ('95). Sixteen current teachers are alumni, representing graduating classes from 1959 to 1995.

As eighth graders choosing which school to attend, many of these future teachers were strongly influenced by their family traditions, as well as the reputation for excellence in academics and extracurriculars Rockhurst had even then.

"My parents wanted me to go to Rockhurst, but there was something inside of me that knew RHS was the place for me," said math teacher Mr. Ryan Bailey ('95).

"I wanted to attend the best school in Kansas City, to develop all of my talents for the future, academic and athletic," said Spanish instructor Mr. Bert Roney ('91).

The RHS alumni have a wide collection of memories from their time as students.

"Winning student council president was my greatest memory," said theology teacher Mr. Tom Norman ('59).

For others, athletic experiences left lasting impressions from their high school experience.

"Being defensive captain in football my senior year was unforgettable," said biology teacher Mr. Steve Ryan ('59). Mr. Charcut and math teacher Mr. Kevin McArdle ('95) played together on the Rockhurst soccer team that finished third at State in 1995.

Athletic Director and math teacher Mr. Doug Bruce ('67) played second base for the 1965 Rockhurst baseball squad which won a League Championship, and started at guard for the basketball team that went to State.

"Winning the State Championship in golf my senior year was very memorable, especially with my younger brother Matt on the team," said Mr. Roney.

"As a member of the RHS community I remember the Jefferson City triple overtime game, the spirit of the crowds at sporting events games, and my running experiences," said journalism and Spanish teacher Mr. Michael Dierks ('91).

Obviously, a love of teaching and of the RHS community led such a large number of RHS graduates to return to teach at Rockhurst.

"I think I decided to teach here because of the influence some of my teachers had on me when I was a student and I wanted to make an impact on the world and not just sit behind a desk," said Mr. Dierks.

Almost all teachers shared the view that the best part of RHS is its community.

s many kids struggle to arise with the early sun, the Rockhurst maintenance crew has already begun their daily tasks. A housekeeping crew has worked until midnight the evening before preparing the building for the next day's classes. They unlock the doors and clean up spills left behind before continuing their assigned projects that maintain the school's complicated infra-

structure.

The faces are familiar. but their stories are not. Before their careers at Rockhurst, the maintenance crew started out far from their present vocation. From across the seas came three familiar faces: Mr. Deng Khammanivony, Mr. Lanley Thatsanithone, and Mr. Ben Sabido. Mr. Khammanivony and Mr. Thatsanithone were both born in Laos, an Asian country nestled between Thailand, Cambodia, and Vietnam.

Mr. Sabido was born in the Philippines, located above Indonesia and between the South China Sea and the Pacific Ocean. Mr. Khammanivony came to Kansas City in 1986, where he started his work at Pembroke School. Later, he heard of an opening at Rockhurst, in which he was accepted in 1997. Mr. Thatsanithone, on the other hand, arrived in Kansas City in June of 1980. Jokingly referred to as "Skeeter" by his peers, Mr. Thatsanithone studied the art of welding for eight years. He knew Mr. Khammanivony before, so when an opportunity at Rockhurst became available, Mr. Khammanivony recommended his friend.

"I took him under my wings," explained Mr. Khammanivony.

Likewise, Mr. Sabido applied to Rockhurst, though not without some prior engagements.

Along with this wife and two kids, Mr. Sabido, otherwise known as "Father Ben", came to Missouri in 1991. At that time, he had almost 12 years experience with the Merchant Marines, where he studied mostly electrical and plumbing applications; a background in which he still carries. He applied to Rockhurst that same year.

Mr. Harry Ward, also known as "Dirty Harry", grew up in Kansas City, but was born in Tennessee. He attended various colleges, such as the University of Missouri-Rolla and Johnson County Community College, obtaining a building maintenance degree before starting grounds work at Rockhurst in 1986.

"Because I'm outside all the time, I tend to get dirtier than the other guys," explained Mr. Ward. "That's why they call me Dirty Harry."

Mr. Tony Brown, "Big Daddy", who has been at RHS for five years, was born in Marshal, MO. Most of his childhood was spent in Kansas City, where he joined the Air Force in late 1975. He studied for 19 years as an aircraft mechanic, later attending MIT and the University of Oklahoma. He later went on to graduate from a school in Okinawa, Japan, earning a Bachelor's degree in aerospace engineering.


"It's a nice atmosphere to surround myself with," explained Mr. Brown. "They're all good guys to work with."


In the years they've worked for Rockhurst, the maintenance crew agree that the students have given back to the maintenance staff.



The Hawklet Soccer Team returned 13 lettermen and posted a 27-1-1 record on its way to repeating as State Champions.

"This year's team had more depth and experience which helped us in the championship," said Head Coach

Luke Maese, and Jim Davey.

The Hawklets put up solid statistics for the season. In route to their 27-1-1, record they scored 116 goals while only giving up 17. They defeated three eventual state champions including the #1 team in the country,

Lance Snodgrass, Ryan Raybould, Joe Burns, and Matt lewitt

Chris Lawson. The Hawklets played the championship game with three starters standing on the sidelines. Josh Williams had a stress fracture in his foot; Brian Siegel separated his shoulder, and Jason Woods had been ejected with a questionable red card. Despite this adversity, the Hawklets were able to break the scoreless tie in the fourth minute of overtime with a loe Burns goal, propelling the Hawklets over St. Louis University High School, 1-0.

The injuries the Hawklets dealt with in the State Championship Game were nothing new to the team who were plagued by injury much of the year. Junior midfielder Brendan Matthews had his share of injuries, including back spasms, but commented that "everyone on the team knew their role, and when it was their time to fulfill it they did not miss a beat."

Seniors Joe Burns and Matt Jewett led the offensive attack for the Hawklets, as Burns broke the school record for goals with 31. On the defensive end, the Hawklets were led by seniors Jason Woods, Matt Darby,


Marquette Prep High School. The Hawklets were ranked #10 nationally at the end of the year.

"It's hard, because you're always playing with new guys," said Taylor, "but guys stepped up and we adjusted."


This was a credit to the overall athleticism and team skill, according to Reardon. Hard work was also a plus for an excellent defense, noted Taylor.

"Can't stop the Rock" was the ever present battle cry of the 1999 football season. Scoring a total of 496 points while holding it's opposition to just 161 points the team made it to the State Championship game, losing 15-7 to Mehlville High School.

The Rock set a tempo for the season with a blowout against interstate rival St. Thomas Aguinas 48-13.

Coach Tony Severino said the coaching staff knew early that they would be using senior, Simone Award winner Brandon Shelby as the foundation for the offense.

"We also hoped that the others would step up and fill the void left by the graduates of last year," Coach Severino said.

The Rock accepted that challenge head on and became the highest scoring team in Rockhurst history, capping off the season in November by defeating the number one ranked Jefferson City Javs on their own turf, 34-0.

"On a real team someone always steps up to make the big play, and we had that this year," added Coach Severino. He considered the unsung heroes to be seniors Paul Rohrer, Willie Ronan, Brett McCracken and team tackle leader Cal Gast.

"I just did what needed to be done," says Rohrer.

The Rock moved on to the State Championship game, for the first time since 1989, playing Mehlville in the TWA Dome in downtown St. Louis. "We never doubted we would get to the State Championship," said Gast. "It was just a matter of time. It wasn't meant to be though."











"It is so hard to have to sit on the bench and watch the game without being able to make a physical difference in it," said Edmonds.







"It's an organizational headache trying to figure out where you're going to be everyday, but it didn't affect our performance," Coach Campbell said.



"An air-tight infield is a powerful force, especially for the confidence of our pitchers," Coach Bascom said.














"It was one of the most amazing comebacks I have ever seen," stated Coach Carruthers. "It was too bad that we played so poorly in the first half because we just ran out of steam."










Nick Johnson walks off the field after scoring the Hawklets third goal of the game. Matt Hall sprints past a defender and finds an open Hawklet to pass to.







"Winning the championship was a great way to finish off my intramural career," said Smith.


"It was fun to play in front of a large student crowd, and it really fired us up to play," McGannon added.

Coach Pete Campbell was the director of the volleyball league, which wasn't as competitive as basketball, but the games were still very entertaining, according to Coach Matt Nolen.





"Despite all of our hardwork and long hours, in the end it was worth it all," said Bondon.






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

"It is really great to see the freshmen getting involved," stated David Finke, President of SPA, "This preparation will just mean more awards next year."


After the model UNs, which were held in late winter, the focus of the club shifted from foreign policy to the upcoming elections. The club conducted a voter registration drive in May.

"Hopefully the voter registration helped to make many students aware that they have a say in their government," said Mr. Elmore.


To expand its influence in the school, SPA setup several bulletin boards that displayed key current issues and encouraged concerned students to write in with their view.

Students, teachers take time out from summer to experience the joys of serving others in need

Eleven students along with Ms. Peg Mulvihill and Mr. Corey Quinn lived for six days during the summer above the rectory at St. Louis Parish at 60th Street and Swope Parkway in Kansas City. Their main task was to help other people in any way they could.

The Total Ignatian Experience (TIE) was formed by Ms.

Mulvihill in May of 1999 with the intention of giving students the opportunity to experience a life completely different from normal suburbia, while helping underprivileged people.

"It was a great experience to work for, and with, others, "said senior Daniel Clark. "We learned how to deal with each other, to be nice to each other and learn to work together."

The students performed various tasks throughout the parish, including working in soup kitchens, and homeless shelters, and sometimes tutoring young children. They met with Mayor Emanuel Cleaver and other teens from the HOPE center who were there to perform similar tasks. The students often ate dinner at the soup kitchen at the end of

their long day. They woke up at 7 a.m. and went to bed around 10 p.m. and had only one hour of recreation per day.

A highlight of the trip, according to many in the group, was when a middle-aged woman named Eula

came into the rectory one evening around 11. She lived in an abandoned house and she carried all her clothes with her in a backpack. All of the Rockhurst students had a conversation with her and found out who she really was, rather than just dismissing her as a homeless woman.

"It was too bad because all we could do for her was give her a sleeping bag and send her on her way," said Clark.

"This was my first experience with the older students and my first opportunity to appreciate their maturity and compassion they are capable of showing," said Mr. Quinn. "It was an entirely new life compared to Rockhurst. We worked really hard and learned how privileged we really are," said Clark. Story by Pat O'Brien


"I think that every year we figure out a way to do our activities by working more closely with the officers to improve the club's quality," said Senor Roney.



The 1999-2000 *Rock Collection*, funded annually by The Andrews McMeel Co., was in the capable hands of experienced students, according to Ms. Otto. The art and literary magazine was edited by returning seniors Mark Cummings and Tim Wientzen.

"This year our students worked once more with the Quark Express program," stated Ms. Otto. "This software was been widely used in the design community, so our kids get the real practical hands-on experience with the industry standard program rather than Adobe Pagemaker."

Junior editors publish biggest yearbook in history

Choosing a theme of "Rock of Ages" to commemorate the end of the Rockhurst's first millennium, an all-junior yearbook staff worked until the middle of June publishing the largest yearbook ever. The 280 pages represent a 24-page increase from 1999, and 40 pages since 1998.

"With the burgeoning enrollment comes not only more faculty and staff and students to picture in each class, but more activities and teams to cover, according to Mr. Joe Fleming, Quarry adviser. The extra pages were paid for with an increase in senior baby picture ad revenue and a bonus from the yearbook printer.

Although the Yearbook Class included both juniors and seniors, the editorial positions, by design, are filled almost exclusively with juniors, because so much of the work happens after graduation and "seniors are seldom interested in this type of intense 8-hour-per-day work after receiving their diploma," Mr. Fleming said.

The class is available for most who have established a previous pattern of hard work and responsibility, but the staff positions are by invitation only after an application process.

"Those who experience this will not only have a great sense of accomplishment but will have a pretty nice item on their resume," Mr. Fleming said,

Several students contributed to the yearbook, including many taking the Photography Class. Senior Carlos Cabezas worked after school was out to complete the summary of senior activities and quotes, an expansion from the previous years. Helping with proofreading during the summer months were sophomores Diego Bustamante and Matt Laird.

"Editar Bessenbacher was a great choice to lead, I must say," Mr. Fleming concluded.

"I really feel that the students have learned so much more with the greater responsibility and control they have been given," Mr. Cilley said.








"It's been a growing experience for everyone. We work hard every year to be bigger, better, and bolder!"



Eight National Qualifiers add to exceptional year

The Speech and Debate program sent eight students to the National Tournament, the largest amount of students sent to nationals in its entire sixty-year history. Evan Mckay and Eric Garcia qualified for Team Debate, Jerry Sirna and Zach Thomas qualified for Lincoln Douglas Debate, James Hupp and Ed Shelton qualified for Duo Interpretation, David Finke qualified for oratory, and junior lan Merrigan qualified for humorous interpretation.

Finke reached the semi-finals in Expository Speaking, placing in the top 12 out of more than 300 schools nationally. He also reached the semi-finals in Prose Reading, in the top 12 of more than 350 schools participating.

Shelton and Hupp reached the quarterfinals in Duo Interpretation, which placed them in the top 24 out of 250 schools.

"This was an exceptional year because we usually have one to three qualifiers, but you couldn't ask for anything more with eight qualifiers," said Mr. Don Ramsey, director of the Speech and Debate program. The team consists of over 100 students competing at various levels. With 24 returning lettermen who provided leadership and helped cultivate young talent, the team competed in 12 invi-

tational including hosting the annual Rockhurst Invitational. The Varsity Squad competed very well in the district tournament, which consisted of all teams in the greater Kansas City Missouri area.

"This district could be considered top ten in the country and I was very pleased with the boys' performance," said Mr. Ramsey.

Jack Bondon was the Missouri State Champion for humorous interpretation and Shelton won the American Legion Missouri State Championship scholarship contest topping off the year.

The future of the Speech and Debate squad rests squarely on the shoulders of the members of class of 2003, which include Michael McShane, Roy Lightner, Matt Musina, Andy Osredker, Ryan McKallen, and Pat Allegri. The class of 2002 members Danny Martucci, James Poskin and Paul Camacho are also forcast to go far.

"They all are very talented and competitive, and I expect great things out of them in the future," said Mr. Ramsey.

In addition to day flights the club also participated in bi-monthly cross-country trips to Topeka, KS. which gave the more experienced students an opportunity to have additional time flying the plane.






outside and playing with and against your classmates," he said.

"We have a mission to the students and their families," commented Mr. Ruby, who was appointed Acting Principal by Fr. Pesci following Mr. Murphy's death on December 28,

"If we were to let down in any area a lot of people that needed us would not be well served," he said.

Since early winter, the staff has had to assume new tasks due to the worsening of Mr. Murphy's illness, especîally Mr Ruby who besides handling Academics had to take over all the duties a principal would handle.

"This year has been so busy that I sometimes forget everything that we

do," he remarked.

Mrs. Mary Ann Olson, Academic Coordinator and Registrar, and Mrs. Kathy Johannsen, Assistant to the Principal have also heeded the call to duty by accepting the positions that had become vacant.

"The faculty has been able to step in and offer their help where it is needed," said Mr. Ruby.

The Administration spent long hours in its nationwide search for a new Principal and in April the Board of Trustees, following a comprehensive selection process approved the hiring of Mr. David Laughlin, who had been the Dean of Students at Creighton Prep in Omaha, Nebraska.

As of now the staff keeps a positive attitude and continues to stay busy, according to Mr. Ruby.

"We just have to continue, keep building on all the good and not allow ourselves to slip back," he said.

Other senior instructors included Mr. Frank Griffin and Mr. lim Bascom, who both also taught freshman English.






The department offers a wide variety of courses ranging from Algebra I to Calculus II.







"I jumped on this offer because the restaurant business was too time consuming, and with this job I could spend more time with my family," said Mrs. Barnhart.







Huge advancements made in technology and facilities

here have been many revisions made to the school in the past year including new facilities and more advanced computer technology. This new day and age has compelled Rockhurst High School to renovate facilities, establish networks, e-mail, and internet access to keep up with the everchanging technology.

Recent additions to RHS technology include 35 new pentium II computers

running on Windows 98 in the computer lab, and six new Macintosh G3's in the journalism lab.

"We are capable of doing a lot more now that we have the newer, faster computers," said computer instructor Mr. John McEniry.

He hopes for new computer classes teaching different programs and possibly doing hands on work, such as building hardrives. Mr. McEniry forsees possible distance learning, similar to video-conferencing, of foreign languages where one could learn directly from a native speaker.

Internet access is available to both teachers and students alike. It may later become more accessible in school if it becomes completely secure. Computers contain valuable school information that could be tampered with if not kept safe.

"Security is always a big concern because you never know what could

happen and you can never be too safe," said Computer Technician Coordinator Mr. Kevin Campbell.

Mr. Campell was hired to help run the networks at RHS and help with troubleshooting. He taught Group Wise, the e-mail network at

RHS, to the administration and faculty. This network is also an organizational tool allowing teachers to keep track of tasks and appointments on the computer.

Tech-Net is the network of televisions and phones in the school, allowing teachers to take learning to a new level. Teachers are now able to view movies without having a VCR in their room. The VCR's are worked through the phone lines so that more than one classroom at a time can watch the same movie.

"Students in the distant future may carry around laptops like calculators. The next thing you know, you'll probably be able to buy them at the bookstore from Mr. Ptasnik," said Mr. McEniry.

Artistic creativity at Rockhurst has taken a leap forward with new addi-

tions to the landscape of the school. Significant changes to the Fine Arts Department, particularly the Drama Department, have given students

facilities that rival the region's best programs. According to Mr. Rodger Cilley, head of the Drama Department, many local theatrical groups would envy the additions made to Rockhurst.

Space for productions is no longer the problem it once was, with the transformation of the old art studio into an entire theater workshop. The room was stripped of its shelves and pottery wheels, and was replaced with a light and sound booth, a set construction area, and a room suitable for productions outside the

Rose. It is the hope of the theater teachers that the increased space will encourage more student productions and a greater overall student participation in drama.

The added space has also made the design and planning of productions easier. Sets can be conveniently constructed next door to the drama classrooms and the Rose Theater, allowing for easy transportation of flats and other scenery.

Classes have also benefitted from the changes. Mr. Bill Murphy, Tech Theater and Stage Design teacher, is pleased with the larger space and




School Bands Cover wide musical spectrum

Father Mark Daues S.J.

Completes his Tertianship in India

ou may remember Father Mark Daues, S.J. from his famous headlocks, his jolly demeanor or for the homilies he gave. Fr. Daues left Rockhurst last year to continue in his education as a Jesuit, and through correspondence, has kept ties to Rockhurst. He has lived in Calcutta, India, for most of this year while working on his Tertianship.

"Teritanship is the final stage of Jesuit formation when a priest takes time off from his work to spend time in prayer and reflection, deepening his commitment to religious life," explained Fr. Daues.

In India, Fr. Daues worked at Mother Theresa's Home for the Dying and taught at Shembaganur School. He described his time as enriching vet difficult at times.

While in India, Fr. Daues experienced Indian culture, which he described as very unique and diverse.

"The cultures of India are incredibly rich and diverse, over 2000 different languages are spoken. The culture from state to state is very different," he said. Fr. Daues also experienced the Indian caste system, which discriminates along social and economic lines.

"Dalits, what we would know as the untouchables, cannot pray in the same temples as higher caste Indians nor can they eat at the same restaurants or draw water from the same wells," explained Fr. Daues. "The Jesuits are doing a lot of work with the Dalits, a very oppressed group. In fact, the word Dalits means 'oppressed one'."

He also experienced some of the sparest of conditions when he was in India.

"I spent most of my time in a very small town in the mountains. We did not have any 'modern conveniences'. I bathed with a bucket of water, washed my clothes by hand, and I ate rice three meals a day. Besides rice, I ate vegetables and fruit," said Fr. Daues.

Despite the conditions and some of the aspects of the culture, Fr. Daues describes the experience as a good one.

"It was a comfortable existence. I had everything that I needed but not all the luxuries of the U.S.," remarked Fr. Daues. He described the Indian people as friendly and very kind. They were always willing to help me and invite me into their home.

"Watching everyone having such a good time at prom was probably the highlight of the event for me," Mr. Heringer said.



Mr. Moore, whose son Greg was a member of the graduating class, was recognized for his 20 years of service to Rockhurst's annual *Spectacular* Auction.



Able and appreciated assistance was provided by company representatives Nancy Hall and Julie Bogart. The theme of "Rock of Ages" was created and carried throughout the book as an inclass assignment. Besides the 45-minute class period, the editors listed below each spent nearly 60 hours following the end of the school year, finishing on June 14. The book is a fall delivery book so that all activities in one school year might be included within one bound edition. The cover, designed by the editors, is blind embossed, silk screened and foilstamped. Text type for the most part throughout the book is Garamond. Paper is 80# gloss enamel.






