

hat defines a student at Rockhurst High School? What makes him different from the majority of students at any other school? The dedication, the level of commitment, and the time put in are what make the Rockhurst young man different from those at other schools. Though the members of the science and math departments might argue the specifics, the Rockhurst community seems to perpetually be in motion from early in the morning to late at night.

The day at the Rock begins before dawn for many after someone from the maintenance department, usually Mr. Rudy Rodriguez, arrives at 6:00 every morning to

unlock the building.

Some students must work for the opportunity to go to Rockhurst, and a few of them arrive as early as 6:30 to begin work

and to get ready for the day.

Juniors Jon Adrian and Matt Moderson were in early one morning to take Chemistry tests. Junior Alex Fontana was in at 7:00 to tutor some students who were having trouble with Latin.

As the morning sky above the stadium begins to lighten, more people arrive to begin their days. Justin Rethmeyer comes in at 7:00 just to get a head start. Anthony

Dayrit arrives early to study and to get some homework done. Many others are quietly engaged already. Mr. Frank Lyngar, Mr. Mike Sullivan, Mr. Ron Geldhoff, Dr. Fred Campisano, to name just a few teachers, are in their rooms very early every morning to help students understand the opcoming lessons.

Sometimes the pitchers for the baseball team arrive before 7:00 to train for the upcoming season, and the swimming team, Pep Band and Chapel Choir often have early morning practices as well. By 7:30, the sun is inching over the treetops and beginning to lighten the white facade of the gym, and already there is a din of ac-

tivity in the commons.

The 8:00 bell rings, a prayer is said, and from then until 3:00 students scramble from class to class seven times with only five minutes of passing period between each. A short 30 minute lunch break and the occasional activity period are the only things that slow the breakneck pace of the Rockhurst school day.

The students scramble so to think, learn, socialize, take tests and quizzes, write essays, and listen to lectures until announcements and a final prayer mark the official end of the school day. First period seems like a distant memory.

he end of classes signals just a beginning for most, as there is still much more to accomplish. As soon as school gets out, the sound of weights crashing back to their racks emanates from the weight room, music charges out of the band room, debaters prepare arguments, and students help each other in the Student Success Center. Practices for sports or drama begin at 3:30 and continue until, and sometimes past, 6:00.

In the Fall, cross country runners can be seen jogging north and south down the middle of Ward Parkway as football players hit and grunt and soccer players drill

and drill and drill.

In the Winter, the sound of basketballs can be heard slapping against the gym floor as wrestlers pour their sweat and re-

maining energy onto the mats.

In the Spring, the crack of a bat sounds sharply from the cage, sprinters fly by on the track, and the lacrosse players fling the ball across the field while golf and tennis players have already left to find some-

place else to practice or play.

Past 6:00, with the sun now sinking below the Leawood trees, athletes trudge to their cars and notice the actors departing the Rose Theater. If any were to pass by the south side of the school on their way out, they might see that the lights in the *Prep News* room are still on as staff mem-

bers work frantically late into the night to meet a deadline.

On one particular evening, the hockey team was holding a banquet in the Barry Commons from 6:30 until 8:00, but some hockey players, like Adam Taylor, could not make it as they were playing in the Varsity Lacrosse game that was going on simultaneously under the lights in the new stadium.

On another, the Freshman Retreat Team was having a dinner to celebrate the success of the overnight event and, immediately afterwards, Mr. Sean Agniel and juniors Eric Snyder and Adam Davis met to discuss plans for the next one.

And those were just two evenings.

Something is always going on.

For most, after all of this, the activities are *still* far from over. After a long day of work and study and exercise, the Rockhurst student goes home to relax for just a few minutes and gets something to eat so that he might find the energy to fulfill the responsibilities that remain. He must write an essay and/or find derivatives and/or translate sentences and/or study for the big exam coming up before collapsing in a heap on his bed so that he might get some sleep to be ready for the next hectic day at Rockhurst. Whew! Is it a certainty that there's no such thing as perpetual motion machine?

Father Thomas Pesci, SJ, to hand Rockhurst reins to Father Terrence Baum, SJ, ending productive tenure

The Reverend Thomas A. Pesci, SJ, will leave his position as Rockhurst President in February. Replacing Fr. Pesci will be Father Terrence A. Baum, SJ.

Fr. Baum, an experienced Jesuit administrator, hopes to share his experience with the RHS community. He has served as Headmaster of Xavier High School in New York, Assistant Principal for Academic Affairs at St. Xavier High School in Cincinnati, and most recently as Headmaster at Loyola Academy in Wilmette, IL.

When Fr. Pesci came to Rockhurst ten years ago,

the school was a different place physically, religiously, and spiritually. Under Fr. Pesci's leadership, RHS has become known as one of the most respected institutions in Kansas City as well as one of the top Jesuit schools in the nation.

Since the beginning of his presidency Fr. Pesci has worked hard to improve not only the school, but the entire Rockhurst community.

The Capital Campaign has been an extraordinary success with more than \$19 million raised, even after several consulting companies said RHS would be lucky to raise \$8 million. Enrollment is at a record high following complete renovation of the facility and grounds. School spirit is strong with the success RHS has been enjoying.

"The school is at a wonderful high point," Fr. Pesci said. "We are now responsible for maintaining it."

Aside from the financial aspect, Fr. Pesci had a hand in the growth of several programs. He is especially proud of Kairos, having given the program direction and focus as to what it is about and should achieve.

"Fr. Pesci is responsible for the Kairos program as it is today," said theology teacher Mr. Tom Norman. "If he hadn't wanted to do it, it wouldn't have happened."

He has also supported the Faculty Ignatian Eve-

nings both financially and emotionally, helping them become a meaningful part of Jesuit education.

The Fine Arts Department has experienced major changes as all aspects of art, from singing to drama to painting, have been given greater emphasis.

"The fine arts here have really developed into a recognized program," said Fr. Pesci. "We are not known only for academics and sports anymore."

Fr. Pesci graduated from Saint Joseph's Preparatory School in Philadelphia in 1967. He attended The College of the Holy Cross and soon joined the Society of Jesus in 1968, becoming a member of the Maryland Province of Jesuits. He completed philosophy studies at Fordham University and earned his Masters in English Literature from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1974.

He returned to Saint Joseph's to teach English and to moderate yearbook and debate from 1974 to 1976. He studied theology at Weston School of Theology and was chaplain at Georgetown University Hospital and Loyola High School.

He served as Director of Vocations for the Maryland Province from 1984 to 1987 when he became Director of Development and Alumni at Scranton Preparatory School, Scranton, PA.

In 1993 he was invited to apply for the position of

President at RHS. After a visit, he liked what he saw, but having not been president of a school before, he was cautious about accepting the position. He decided to apply anyway and was subsequently appointed on July 1, 1993.

Fr. Pesci knew his stay would not be permanent but the original five-year assignment has turned into one almost twice as long. Fr. Pesci feels that now is a good time to leave because of the state that Rockhurst is in.

"Fr. Pesci's greatest achievements here will be how easy the transition to the new president will be, because his plan for the school was so well done," said Principal Mr. David Laughlin

According to most, the capital campaign is going strong, the faculty and students are happy, and the school in general is very stable. Fr. Pesci plans go on sabbatical before returning to the

. Maryland Province for reassignment.

Fr. Pesci hopes to leave Rockhurst in a state in which it can continue to thrive. It is his hope that he has "set the stage for great things." His advice is to not become complacent with success but always reach for the magis. He takes a great deal of pride in the school and what it has become.

"We are poised for the new millennium," he said.
"We have set the stage for great things and must keep working so they come to pass." Story by Marc Eskew







Superior General of the Society of Jesus makes landmark Rockhurst visit

Por the first time in its 82-year history, Rockhurst hosted the world's top Jesuit when The Most Reverend Father Peter Hans Kolvenbach, SJ, Superior General of the Society of Jesus, successor of Saint Ignatius of Loyola, visited RHS on his tour of the Missouri Province.

Fr. Kolvenbach is head of more than 30,000 Jesuits worldwide and supervises the many functions Jesuits carry out throughout the world.

"It was a great honor to have the boss at school, and it probably won't happen again for a while," said The Reverend Thomas Pesci, SJ, RHS President.

While in Kansas City for 24 hours, Father Kolvenbach visited Rockhurst University, St. Francis Xavier, and RHS in an attempt to clarify the Jesuit mission for the Jesuits and the lay people of the communities. Many from around the Missouri Province came to hear him speak during Masses at St. Francis Xavier Church and in the Rose Theater.

For 30 Jesuits, including the Reverend Frank Reale, SJ, Missouri Provincial, and the Reverend Frank Case, SJ, General Assistant for the United States Chapter of Jesuits, it was an opportunity to address the needs of people around the world.

Discussions ranged from a new university in Russia, to the Jesuits working in Vietnam, to working out peace negotiations between tribes in Africa.

The Friday Senior Class Mass, at which Father General presided, left an unforgettable impression on the students and teachers attending, challenging all to "harvest your gifts talents and opportunities."

"It was like having mass with the Pope. It was an unbelievable to have that honor," said senior Marcus Perry.

Fr. Kolvenbach, on a campus tour with Student Government Association President John Paul Nigro and and Senior Class Vice-president Scott Ferguson, stopped at the words Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam in the main hallway and asked what it meant.

"For the Greater Glory of God," said Nigro immediately, showing Fr. Kolvenbach the impact Jesuit education has on students around the world. Fr. Kolvenbach smiled and the tour continued.

Father General saw RHS as a great learning and teaching environment. He also noticed students who are working for the ideals of the Jesuit mission and striving for greatness.


"It was the greatest honor I received as the student body president and as a student," said Nigro.

he Donnelly family has contributed so much to the school," said the Rev. Thomas Pesci, SJ, Rockhurst President. "They make up the very fabric that is Rockhurst."

Since 1910, Rockhurst has been one of the most prestigious and successful high schools in the area. But without the help of certain families, like the Donnellys, Rockhurst would not be what it is today.

The Donnelly/Rockhurst connection began in 1960

when the first of four sons of Joe and Katholeen enrolled. Joe often spent over 20 hours a week at Rockhurst in addition to his full time job as a CPA. In 1972, he helped start the first Rockhurst auction along with President Fr. Carl Kloster, SJ. Joe's wife Katholeen was ever-present through her involvement in Mother's Club and Sale-O-Rama for over 35 years.

"It's obvious Katholeen really loved this place," said Ms. Judie Scanlon, Special Activities Coordinator. "She contributed her time long after her boys Joe and Katholeen Donnelly relaxed had left."

Another significant contribution from Mr. Donnelly was instrumental in the Donnelly boys is their creation of a scholarship fund for Rockhurst students. The Donnelly Family Scholarship was started in 1987 by the four sons and is supported by Joe and Katholeen Donnelly and their sons and grandsons. A memorial fund established in the name of Mrs. Donnelly's mother, Grace M. Denzel, was later merged into the Donnelly Family Scholarship Fund.

Aside from their contributions of time, the Donnelly family has been deeply rooted in RHS from 1937 to the current graduating class of 2003.

The first Donnelly alum, Arthur Denzel, Class of '37 and brother of Joe, became a Lieutenant in the Navy and died in a sabotaged airplane during World War II.

"Rockhurst offers the greatest education in the world," said Joe Donnelly. "My parents were not able to give me the opportunity to attend," said Joe. "But I made sure that each of my four sons had the opportunity to experience a Jesuit education."

All of Joe and Katholeen's children were actively involved while students at RHS.

Arthur, Class of '64, was the Sports Editor for the Prep News and graduated from Notre Dame and currently owns his own accounting firm.

"I have many memories from my time at Rockhurst. I especially remember the homecoming parades and

the friendships I developed during my four years."

Art and his wife Kathie were chair-couple for the 1988 Auction and served as President of the Father's and Mother's Clubs respectively while their sons David, Kevin, and Chris, attended RHS.

E.J., Class of '67, attended Notre Dame and worked under Coach Al Davis as a trainer for the football team and later, with a recommendation from Coach Davis, worked for a time as a trainer for both the Kansas City

> Chiefs and Notre Dame. He now practices in Pennsylvania.

George, RHS Class of '70, was a twoyear letterman in football and golf, participated in track and was a class representative in his sophomore, junior and senior years. His son, George Jr., Class of '95, is a graduate of Emporia State University.

"Rockhurst was definitely a positive experience for me," George said. "It prepared me for college and resulted in lifelong friendships."

A graduate of KU, George currently at the the 2003 Spectacular Auction. works for Cretcher Lynch. George served on the Father's Club for the four years his son George Jr. attended.

"I was in the Father's Club to meet the parents," said George, "and to maintain an active role at Rockhurst."

Joe, Class of '73, was a yell leader his junior and senior year, a two-year letterman in track, and set a city record in the 400-meter relay. He earned honors junior and senior years, and played football his freshman and sophomore years.

Arthur's sons David, Kevin, and Chris have helped to carry on the Donnelly legacy.

David, Class of '88, earned his Bachelors and Masters Degrees in Sports Administration at the University of Missouri and is a Manager of Rules and Competitions with the United States Golf Association (USGA).

Kevin, Class of '91, attended K-State, and is currently a food broker in The Kansas City area.

Chris graduated in the Class of 2003, earned his pilots license, was president of the Flying Club, and was as Co-Editor-in-Chief for the 2002 Quarry Yearbook.

Although Joe and Katholeen are currently retired from RHS activities, they continue to show their Rockhurst pride in their conversations with others.

"We still talk to our friends and neighbors about how great Rockhurst's academics and athletics are," reflected Katholeen. "Rockhurst has been a very wonderful part of Story by Bryan Murphy our lives."




















"My favorite act was the Late Night Catechism, which was also our most profitable show because it was sold out," Mrs. Scanlon said.











"Theatre Workshop was a great experience for me," said junior Lucas Villanueva. "It taught me about how much work goes into each production."



"Art is life and we live it to the fullest," said Mrs. Greany.





fter meeting with the Andrews-McMeel Company, which provides free publishing for the literary magazines of local Catholic schools, the Rock Collection staff set to work soliciting photos, artwork and writings from students to compile into the annual magazine. 

Freshmen were excluded from homecoming, but were provided a winter mixer in January.



Through Habitat for Humanity, members of the club built and restored living quarters for the homeless and less fortunate.


"The experience was unique in that through giving my time and talents, I received the satisfaction of helping others," said junior Joe Dunn.

"I feel that it is a good opportunity to put the 'Grad at Grad' ideas into action" said moderator Mr. Tom Norman. "It is an overall positive experience."





Amnesty's members demonstrated against the war in Iraq at Mill Creek Park with hundreds of people to show their disapproval of what some call a preventative war.




"The ribbons I hope really kept kids thinking of the danger of drunk driving," said Finn.





The Science Club, through hard work and lots of practice, was able to achieve things it never had before.



At the 24th annual Kansas City Area Teachers Mathematics (KCATM) competition in March at Raytown High School the Hawklets placed third overall. True, Sean Plott, Jeff Poskin, and Kevin Dalton placed first on the geometry team. The Advanced Math team consisting of senior Jeff Nagy, senior Nick Mabry, junior Henry Danaher, and junior Adam Bruetsch placed fifth.

In the Algebra 11 event Danaher placed second and Plott placed fifth. Sophomore John Nantz placed fourth in the Algebra EQ 10 event, while Poskin placed eighth. For the Algebra EQ 9 test freshman Jordan Jurcyk placed second, freshman Tyler Czinege placed fifth and Dalton came in ninth place.

In the Geometry 9 event, Dalton placed second, freshman Matt DeCapo placed fourth, and Jurcyk placed fifth. Danaher placed fourth in the Trig 11 test. In the Trig 12 test Mabry placed third and Yang placed fifth. Nantz

placed fourth in the WP placed third in the Calc test. Sophomore Joey Caudle placed eighth in the Graph 10 test. The mathletics team of True, Yang, and Nagy finished in first place.

At the MCTM/GPML Qualifying Contest in February, Dalton placed second in the ninth grade sprint round, Poskin placed sixth in the tenth grade Spring round, while sophomore Jason Dehaemers placed seventh. Danaher placed eighth in the eleventh grade sprint round.


The highlight of the trip, according to Mr. Elmore, was seeing the students learn that many preconcieved stereotypes are inaccurate.


TIE also made a difference in the community with a clothing drive in December, which encouraged students to donate clothing for St. Louis Parish.

"I found a good way to spend my free time after school," said freshman Phil Shapker. "I had a great time with the tournaments."









"We had a very effective year," said senior vice-president Jordan Bastable. "We sponsored a few functions and had a good time participating in them."


Taking on issues that meant a lot to both athletes and fans was a focus of the club, including student tailgating before varsity football games.



Team, the Hucklets, completed successfully, placing third in a nation-wide tournament in Nashville, TN, in April.







The number of medals and first places were the highest in the six years that Mr. Dierks has been the head coach.


"Can you create a family and still have the competitive edge?" he asked, to which he could not give a definite answer.






Led by seniors G.B. Klingler and Dan Boyd, the Rockhurst line was particularly fearsome with an average weight of 280 pounds.





"Sean was a great leader, he grew and improved throughout the season," said Coach Berg.


Running back Larson Carter had a notable season, stepping up to make big plays when the team needed them.


"The JV experience really helped players get noticed. That will hopefully pay off for next year's varsity team," said Carter.


The team beat the SM South C team, the University Academy A team, and the Bishop Meige B team.



"I really felt we should have won that game," junior Adam Kovac said. "We were close the whole game, but they pulled ahead near the end."


Coach Paul Ptasnik for three years has seen a lot of the players mature into better soccer players.







"It was one of the first times as a team we dominated from top to bottom," Mr. Winkeler said. "It was fantastic."


The swimmers are also optimistic for next year's Aquahawks.




O'Halloran, Poskin and Altomare were key contributors and will leave the team with holes to fill.

"Losing three very important seniors is hard, but I feel we have many young wrestlers that will work hard to fill those spots," said Coach Wikiera.






Experience was key to the team's success as the Hawklets had 13 with varsity wrestling experience, and the team was consistent in its performance despite the continual shifts in the line-ups.




Leaders included Steve Yanda, Peter Hannapel and Joel Hodes, according to Coach Rogers.

The Freshman Wrestling Team had several memorable moments, including winning the freshman Rockhurst Tournament and traveling to state to see many of the varsity wrestlers in action.








Elmer and Arthur also received special honors when Arthur was named an Academic All-American and Elmer was chosen to play in the North-South All Star Game.


"We lost to DeSmet because we were just worn out," said junior captain John Krebs. "They're a good team and we played our game. We'll get them next year."







"We maintained a quiet confidence even though our competition may not have been up to par," said Dayrit. "We never let up."


It was this attitude that characterized the season which was without any major disappointments. Though the year had many highlights, something more significant than any match or duel stood out to Coach Munninghoff.







Despite setting several new RHS school records, Hawklets falls short at state meet.

Surging towards the finish line, Varsity Track broke five school records including four in districts and sectionals. Sophomore D.J. 



Although football was an option, not enough players signed up to have a organized league.


"The football games were awesome," said junior Jon Adrian. "Playing on the new field was a ton of fun."



President's office and Trustees work toward change of command

One of the Board of Trustees' most important tasks during the 2002-03 academic year was to search for and select a new president to replace The Reverend Thomas A. Pesci, SJ, who will conclude his service after a 10-year stint as head of the Rockhurst High School community.

During this 18-month process, referred to as an Executive Search, members of the board approached 35 to 40 individuals about the position and selected Fr. Terrence A. Baum, SJ, Principal at Loyola Academy in Wilmette, IL. Fr. Pesci will stay at RHS until February 1, 2004.

The Trustees are the keepers of the vision and oversee the strategic planning and financial operations of the school, according to Fr. Pesci.

One of the Board's duties include the support for the Capital Campaign. In its final phase, the project's only remaining objective is the development of the Southland property, which will include a baseball and soccer complex as well as revised school entrances and exits.

Chairman Mr. David M. Knopke, RHS Class of 1966, who assumed the role in August 2002, heads the Board.






"Among the classes, there seem to be only a handful more freshman that apply for financial aid, but it is usually pretty even throughout," said Mrs.

Team of three facilitates sometimes daunting application process

The College Placement Offices worked hard to get students into the colleges of their choice by facilitating the communication between students, parents and colleges.

"Our job is to be a liaison officer between schools, parents, and students," said Mrs. Catherine Kelsey, College Counselor. "We are an information source, a resource, for the students so that they can find the school that is right for them."

Many students find the decision as to what college they attend to be a difficult one, and especially so this year as the class of 2003 was very competitive across the nation.

"The admissions process, in general, has become more competitive in recent years," said Mr. Rob Herald, Director of College Placement. "We help students with exploration, application and matriculation."

Doctor uses personality, heritage to convey his message He came from an uppermiddle class family in Cuba. His father put him and his brothers on a plane in 1961 to escape from the newly-installed Communist regime, leaving parents and all of their possessions behind.

He lived several months in Spanish Harlem in New York City with his aunt and after a short stay in Miami was reunited with his parents and his sister in Springfield, MO. He went to Pennsylvania for college at the age of 17, continued on to the University of Missouri where he completed his masters and doctorate degrees and he came to Kansas City where he answered a small ad in the classified section of the Kansas City Star that read "Teachers Wanted."

And so began the 18-year career at Rockhurst of "Doctor" Jorge Taracido.

While at RHS, Dr. Taracido has not only taught all levels of Spanish, but has coached Varsity Cross Country and Track for 15 years before stepping down at the end of the 2002 season and taking a position as an assistant coach. Rockhurst has been a perennial power in both sports,

He maintains connections with Cuba, as an aunt and an uncle still live there, and he has traveled back to his homeland twice, in the summer of 1999 and again in this past summer.

"I do forsee Cuba returning to capitalism but, from what I have seen, it will not be peaceful," concluded Doctor Taracido.

percent of all strokes take place in the brain-stem. Of this ten percent, six percent die, two percent are paralyzed and only two percent have an 85% to 90% recovery rate. Dr. Goben is part of the latter. With no visible scars, he still has the lasting memory and some disabilities.

While Dr. Goben was away, his position

was filled by both Mr. Larry Ruby and Mr. Jerry Stabenow. During the first semester, the two replacements kept the class curriculum the same as to not disrupt the year's goals. At the beginning of the second semester, Dr. Goben returned and began teaching his classes full-time.

"The stroke has changed my teaching methods because I am not able to go as strong as I have in the past," said Dr. Goben. "I am getting better every day and my unlucky students next year will see how I was before the stroke."

Mr. Mick Swanson, the only new teacher in the department, came from Chicago to teach World History and US History.






man. "But what really helped us out was the field which gave us a lot of extra space and freedom for games."




The Freshmen Class showed their leadership by designing and carrying out the inaugural Freshman Mixer which was scheduled because they were excluded from the Homecoming




"The Blue/White Mixer was a blast," said junior John Parsons. "It was fun to hang out with different girls."

"I have really enjoyed being here." said Mr. Tran. "I have learned to be kind and firm from the students here."





New look taps into

roots to revive old spirit

Many traditions separate Rockhurst from other schools, including excellence in sports, its high standard of education and possibly most important, its renewed care for incoming fresh-

At Rockhurst, freshmen are not "freshmeat," but are students, like the more than 750 others, only brand new, inexperienced, and needing help. The Brother Program was revamped after consideration by faculty and staff.

Formally called the Senior Brother Program, the Brother Program has evolved in its 15-year history. The original intent was to provide mentors for incoming freshman, but it gradually became a means of legal hazing and was abandoned. Under Mr. Larry Ruby, then a theology teacher, the program was revived.

"We needed the students, both upper and underclassmen, to get more out of the program," said Mr. Ruby. "The staff honestly believes these changes will drastically aid the experiences of all those involved."

The new program stresses stronger brother relations and an improved freshman retreat, to instill a sense of belonging in the freshman.

"This new and improved program ideally makes the transition for all Rockhurst students a positive experience," said Assistant Principal for Student Affairs Mr. Mike Heringer, who presently administers the program.

Originally a two day affair, the Senior Brother Program was shortened to one-day during Mr. Ruby's time in the pastoral office and before he assumed his new position as Assistant Principal for Academic Affairs.

"There was little interaction between brothers," said Mr. Ruby. "Obviously, this needed to change, not only for the experiences of the freshman but also for the upperclassmen."

Within the last two academic school years, the program shifted into a new direction. Changes included reviving the Brothers' conversations, which is the initial contact of the freshmen with the upperclassmen. Changes were made in orientation, the Freshmen Retreat, and by making the Brother position available to juniors as well as seniors.

The Freshman Retreat changed dramatically in 2001-02 after

From that experience, CORE group, the student designers of the retreat, decided the retreat would include an overnight stay at Rockhurst, an enormous bonfire, prayer, and reflection to provide an opportunity to get to know fellow classmates and upperclass-

"90% of all those involved last year liked it, according to a survey given after the retreat," said Mr. Agniel. "We hope that this year 100% will truly enjoy it."

Prior to these changes, some students thought of the Big Brother program as a waste of time moderated by seniors who were half-hearted in their intentions.

"I got nothing out of the Big Brothers Program," said junior John Adrian. "It had no impact on me whatsoever. It was pointless."

After hearing responses like these, Mr. Mike Heringer and the pastoral staff knew changes must take place.

What about the new Brother-Freshman relations? In the past, freshmen brothers were often ignored and a brother position was seen as just an item on a college resume. This, according to those presently designated Big Brothers, was going to change.

"I still say 'Hi' to my freshmen brothers and ask them how things are going," said senior Kevin Reidy.

"I usually give my freshman brothers advice if they need it and give them tips in certain classes that I have had," said junior John Krebs.

Changes in form of the Brother Program has helped in the experiences of both the upperclassman and the freshman, according to freshman and their mentors.

'The Freshman Retreat was really cool." said freshman Zach Dehaemers. "I especially liked when the girls came in and talked."

The first few weeks are crucial to the rest of that student's high school career," said Mr. Agniel. "I just hope the changes made in the program give freshman the opportunity for a great start and fruitful career at Rockhurst." Story by Mike Adkins

Eagle Scouts standout among Hawklets

A pproximately 50 Rockhurst students and six faculty members have earned the rank of Eagle Scout within the Boy Scouts, making up 6% of the school's community, a large percentage for one community since, on average, only 2% of those who enter Boy Scouts ever reach the rank of Eagle.

"I think that achieving the rank of Eagle shows what type of person you are – -diligent, hardworking and motivated," said senior Alex Singleton, who earned 41 merit badges before being awarded his Eagle in March, 2002.

Several Rockhurst Eagle Scouts believe that part of what being a Scout means is developing skills to help them aid others.

"Earning Eagle shows that you have a lot of people skills and an ability to help the needy," sophomore Drew Mirocke said.

Most believe that being a Scout also indicates that you have demonstrated the ability to stick with a program to the end.

"I think that it taught me a lot of things crucial to life; it is something that shows that I have determination," said sophomore Michael Guerin.

Eagle Scouts are typically not quitters but are, by definition, achievers. There is nothing inherently difficult about achieving the rank of Eagle. The skills that must be mastered are ones that any teenager can master. However, it takes sustained effort for nearly two years. The rank must also be achieved before a Scout turns eighteen, showing that the rank of Eagle Scout demands persistence.

"It was important for me to earn the Eagle Badge because the journey there represented a great challenge, and taught me to reach for goals that require a great amount of effort," said senior E.E. Keenan.

Many Scouts received constant pressure from their parents to acquire their Eagle.

"My father and his brother were Eagle Scouts and my dad wanted me to receive the award," said sophomore Ryan Smith. "He helped me with my project and gave me inspiration to

tive employee is an Eagle Scout.

"[Earning my Eagle] is important because many people hold you in a higher respect," said sophomore Vince Ismert. "I am very glad I did it because it was challenging, and I learned a lot."

Scouts realize that doors have opened because of their accomplishment.

"It will help me get into West Point so I am very glad that I did it," said sophomore Tyler Reed. "I think it definitely helped me get a job, because adults think very highly of guys that have achieved the rank of Eagle."

Eight Rockhurst Scouts came from two troops, three Scouts from Troop 30 at Christ the King Church, and five from Troop 84 at Country Club Christian Church. Several members of the RHS faculty and administration are Eagle Scouts, including the Rev. Thomas Pesci, SJ, President, Spanish instructor Mr. Rick Staihr, photography instructor Mr. Joe Fleming, biology instructor Mr. Mike O'Leary, and journalism instructor Mr. Michael Dierks.

"It is a sense of pride and with it came experiences of both a general understanding of the proper priorities in life and the details of how to do things." Mr. Dierks said. "I was expected to complete this task but I'm appreciative about that now."

Most students and teachers agree that being an Eagle Scout has made them a better person. The technical skills that they acquired on the journey — learning to be an accomplished camper, knowing something about first aid — are all nice things and a great side benefit of scouting. But many have also learned to be someone who respects and cares for the environment, community and individuals.

"Scouts have helped me to grow in admiration and respect of the individuals who shaped my life and how I treat the environment," said junior Charlie Caffrey. Story by Karl Lind






"I felt as though Rockfest had a successful year and I was happy to be able to be the head of the committee," said Mr. Hallett.

"The teachers here are passionate and they instill their passion on the students they teach, which makes it easy to learn."


Learning isn't the only thing that Jeff enjoys though.



John fencing Friend

John Friend is not a great scholar. He is not involved in student government. He has no letter in a varsity sport. His name is heard over the announcements only when he has a message in the office. But in certain circles he is a leader and an athlete. John Friend is a fencer. And in the world

of fencing, he is much harder to miss.

Friend ranked 9th in the nation in the Cadet Sabre Division last year. He placed in the top three in several prestigious tournaments, including the Junior Olympic Championship in Columbus, OH, and placed 12th at The World Cup Championship in Louisville. This year, he moved up a level and so faced a more difficult round of tournaments and opponents. He placed 66th in the world for his division. He competed in two World Cups, one in Frascati, Italy, and another in Logrono, Spain. He has won three gold medals. Fencing is based entirely on points gained from winning tournaments, so Friend was forced to participate in as many as he could in order to place as high this year as he did last year in order to impress college coaches.

"All the travel can be tough," Friend said. "But I've been to some interesting cities and been able

to see things I wouldn't have otherwise."

He plans to attend the University of Missouri at Columbia, where he will major in business. He hopes that while in college he will be invited to play on the United States Olympic Fencing Team, a squad which is quickly gaining respect from the European teams which have always dominated the sport.

Friend began his fencing career inadvertently in the 4th grade when he was late turning in an application for the baseball team that most of his friends were on and so was unable to play. Instead, his parents, encouraged by a friend who had been a fencer, placed him in a fencing class for beginners. Friend found that he was good at this sport.

"In my first tournament, I came in 3rd place," he said. "There were only four fencers competing, but it was still ex-

citing.

After that first year, Friend decided to stay with fencing. His family supported him and his fencing until the beginning of his 8th grade year, when he was forced to make a decision. He could either come to Rockhurst, a high quality school with tuition in the thousands of dollars, or he could continue

with fencing, an expensive sport. The family did not have the money for both. He chose a good

high school education.

"It wasn't an easy decision," he explains. "I knew that school had to be my first priority, though."

For a time, it seemed Friend and competitive fencing had parted ways. But late in his freshhis way

man year, he made a deal with his fencing coach, agreeing to teach classes for the fencing club every week. In exchange, the club would waive the fees he owed.

But he would still have to pay for all his own travel. And in fencing, there is a lot of traveling in order to compete in the tournaments held every month all over the US. In order to cover these costs, he got a job working for his father's bakery. Every Saturday or Sunday as early as 3 a.m. he is out in a delivery truck. Friend looks at it positively.

"It seems like a bad time to be working," he said. "But it fits into my schedule with my weekday afternoons being taken up by practices. I don't have a lot of free time. I hate having to cut my weekends short to go to bed so I can get up

early."

Friend's first coach was Vladimir Nazlymov, the head fencing coach at Ohio State University, and Friend hopes eventually to fence under his former coach again. He is currently coached by four-time National Champion coach, Kelly Williams.

Friend is a hard worker. He has had some tough choices to make, though. He spends up to 20 hours a week with fencing and so has little time for many extracurricular school activities and has even had to drop honors classes because he lacked the time.

Friend finds some free time, though, to spend with his friends. He is a member of the Disc Golf Club and was a section editor of the 2002 Quarry Yearbook. He does not want to let fencing take over his whole life.

Despite the stresses, though, Friend has a lot going for him. He is a graduate of a prestigious high school and a renowned fencer. Slowly, he is becoming noticed in the country for his dedication to his goals and talent for his sport. Story by Adam Davis





"This year was my first Iron Man," said Mr. Ed Hendry. "It was a lot of fun. I even snuck into a few games."


Without many problems, the Junior Iron Man competition was successful in providing a good time but increasing bonding with classmates.





While the requirement to be a commended student was scoring a 199-214 on the PSAT, the semifinalists and finalists needed a 215 or above.

"It really shows they have great potential and a natural testing ability," said Mr. Rob Herald, Director of College Counseling.

Offering a PSAT prep class for the Class of 2003 may have had an impact on the students who achieved National Merit status.

"The PSAT prep class helped by familiarizing me with the exam," Koenen said. "This made me comfortable while taking the test."

Other than looking great on a college resume, National Merit status gave students a chance to receive scholarship money.

"It has opened up many opportunities for me, perhaps even more than I can keep up with," Mattione said.

But the semi-finalists had to work to become one of the 8,000 finalists. They had to turn in their SAT I scores as well as other academic information, including an essay about major contributions to the school and community, personal characteristics, activities, plans, and goals.



Seniors concentrate on others in service projects

ockhurst Senior Service originally began in 1972 with Fr. Pedro Arrupe, SJ, the former head of all Jesuit schools. The program he created was intended to give the senior class a chance to face the realities of the disadvantaged and to recognize its calling to help them.

For the 31st year, Rockhurst seniors dedicated part of their high school career to repaying the community by volunteering at day care centers, nursing homes, and grade schools.

"I learned a lesson about the value of children and how their education shapes their future," stated Jimmy Malezewski. "It really opened my eyes to the disadvantages many children face."

Directed by Mr. Frank Griffin and Mr. William Munninghoff, the seniors were excused from their classes to spend time working with those in need. They completed just over 70 hours of service in 12 days, a reduction from 15 hours from past years because of senior teacher's concerns about class time.

"It was a compromise between our department and the teachers concerned about class time," said Mr. Munninghoff. "But I feel we have reached an agreeable solution to the time spent away from school."

The seniors' experiences varied widely as almost 90 agencies were served. B.J. Fagan went to Don Bosco Senior Center where he assisted the elderly with daily activities including recreation and dining.

"At first I thought it would be an exercise in physical assistance," Fagan said. "But it turned out they needed someone to talk to."

Many agency directors were impressed with the students. Mrs. Marie Helen, an assistant principal at Christ the King Grade School, was greatly impressed with the seniors.

"The students are more helpful every year," she said." The seniors showed a great dedication to helping others and made a huge impact on the students. They were very popular."

The program's smoothness has varied from year to year. Some organizations had seniors doing more paperwork than people interaction, but there were no major problems.

"There were a few brushfires, guys needing to make up time and such," said Mr. Griffin. "But overall it went by the Senior Service Handbook-very smoothly. I also give credit to our seniors' maturity and a sense of continuing the tradition."

Upon completion of the project, the seniors returned to school to reflect in small group discussion. Most of the students reported having very positive experiences and stated that they had a new view of what it means to dedicate oneself to helping others.




The pre-prom activities, food and dancing all added up to what was described by many as a wonderful night.





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
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
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Colophon

The 2002-03 Edition of the *Quarry* Yearbook was published entirely by a first year yearbook class with the help of four first year photography classes. Editorial positions were filled from the yearbook class after an application and selection process. All layout and design was accomplished on six Power Mac G-3s, one Power Mac G-4, three iMacs, and one eMac at the end, using Adobe Pagemaker 6.5. Approximately 40% of the photos were taken digitally with an Olympus Camedia C-3030 Digital Camera with 3.3 megapixal resolution. Most other photos were taken with conventional 35-mm fully adjustable cameras. Adobe Photoshop 6.0 was used to manipulate all digital photos. 1150 books with 320 pages were printed on 80# gloss enamel and bound at the Herff Jones Company, 6015 Travis Lane, Shawnee Mission, KS. Assistance was provided by Mrs. Nancy Hall and Mrs. Julie Bogart. The book was completed on June 14 for delivery on or about September 10, so that the entire academic year could be included.
