The School Board, led by President A. A. McElroy, was again faced with the ever present problem of a school housing shortage. This year, however, the problem was complicated by the plumbers strike, which slowed the contruction of the Smith-Hale Junior High School until none of the school facilities could be utilized during the 1967-68 school year. Consequently, both Ervin and Baptiste Junior High School faced unusually crowded conditions.

Consolidated District #1 received \$304,661 in aid as a result of the form 874 Federal Aid cards. This money enabled us to finish the Smith-Hale Junior High School, and to begin construction of the new secondary school, Hickman Mills High School.












Mr. Rankin smiles at a comment made during discussion of an algebraic function.

While completing his fifth year in the district. Mr. Clark helped coach the wrestling teams. His hobbies are hunting and fishing.



Biology courses were instructed by Mr. Ray, Mr. Lewis, and Mrs. Payne. Besides sponsoring the Science Club, Mr. Ray is chairman of the C. T. A. Insurance Committee. Teaching at Ruskin for eight years, Mr. Ray has given new insight to many students concerning science. Science, guns, and sports are among Mr. Lewis's many varied interests. For five years Mr. Lewis has taught science and been a coach of the sophomore football team. Mrs. Payne has completed two years of teaching at Ruskin. She enjoys outdoor sports, especially canoeing.

Mr. Maupin's attendance in night classes at the National Science Institute gave him additional information to relate to his chemistry and physical science classes. He has taught here for twelve years and also sponsored the science club.



Mrs. Lewis stated, "We're trying to improve their writing abilities, reading skills and through discussion, their interpretative powers."






Sponsor of the Spanish Club, Mrs. Dowell, has taught Spanish to Ruskinites for fifteen years.












Among the guest speakers at the club meetings were a student nurse, an x-ray technician, and a medical doctor. They discussed their jobs and hospital procedures.



The girls purchased "football" sweatshirts with "R.G.A.A." and the year they graduate printed on them.









On Ruskin's outdoor fields workmen screened new backstops for softball games and padded the football field with new grass for the coming year.









The Ruskin Eagles opened their 1967 basketball season November 28, with an impressive 53-41 victory over the Lee's Summit Tigers. The deciding factor for Ruskin was the 24 field goals made as compared to Lee's Summit's 16.

The Eagles claimed the first place trophy in the Grandview Basketball Tournament for the sixth year in a row. Defeating Belton with a 19 point margin qualified Ruskin for a championship play-off match. The title game with Grandview was a squeaker. With only three seconds to play, Mike Simpson made two free throws, putting the Eagles out of the reach of the Bulldogs.

Mike Simpson's long-range sharpshooting in the second half pushed Ruskin past Liberty, 64-57, giving the Eagles their fourth straight victory of the season.






Distance Runners Jog To Outstanding Season

The Class was reunited in September, 1965, their enrollment numbering 670. Sophomore class officers included Roger Zirbel, president; Lloyd Arnsmeyer, vice-president; Barbara Wright, secretary; and Mary Ballard, treasurer. Margo Rogers was chosen to make the sophomore pilgrimage to Jefferson City, Missouri, Junior varsity cheerleaders included Martha Carrier, Carole Holmes, Barbara Wright, Diane Fisher, Mary Kiely, and Cora Biggerstaff. The all-

school musical for that year was *The King and 1*, and *The Mouse That Roared* was the all-school play.

Nancy Cooper was chosen sophomore Homecoming attendant. Cora Biggerstaff and Barbara Wright represented the class at the annual Snowball Dance, with Karen King acting as sophomore attendant at the Sweetheart Dance.

The foreign exchange student was Virginia Hannaford from New South Wales, Australia. Thirty-four members of the sophomore class were inducted into the National Honor Society at a formal evening ceremony which was followed by a tea given for the members and their parents. Larry Hill ranked number one in the sophomore class.

Junior class officers for the class of 1968 included Lloyd Arnsmeyer, president; Pam Johaningsmeir, vicepresident; Barbara Wright, secretary; and Mary Ballard, treasurer. Mickey Chalmers was elected vice-president of the student council. Cora Biggerstaff and Carol Holmes were varsity cheerleaders.

The class set a record for high sales in the Junior Stand.

Carmen Martinez, Ruskin's sixth foreign exchange student, was from Madrid, Spain. The all-school musical was *Bye Bye Birdie*, with junior Linda Mathews obtaining one of the leads.

As seniors the class of 1968 began by teaching the sophomores the art of "polishing the eagle." Ellen Blosser was elected by her classmates to receive the DAR award and was awarded second place in state competition. Margo Rogers was one of two Missouri high school seniors to receive the Senate Youth Award. The class had the most National Merit finalists ever to qualify at Ruskin. The Class of '68 also set a record for the largest number of Certificates of Recognition awarded from the University of Missouri. Twenty-two seniors were honored as Quill & Scroll members. Five seniors were varsity cheerleaders.

There were two foreign exchange students at Ruskin this year. They were Tomika Namba from Japan and Ivonne Vallejo from Chile.





Publications is a class designed to teach students journalism, while also producing Ruskin's yearbook the *Mirage*. A yearbook is a history of the year's events. As editors we have tried to accomplish these goals; we worked toward a year-round record of school events published in a sound journalistic fashion.

The theme of the 1968 Mirage was "Qualities," a degree of excellence we should all try for. Because of the intangible value of "Qualities," we used the "crescendo and decrescendo" to illustrate the theme. In the division page copy we used daily instances to show what, perhaps, indicated "Quality." The Ruskin Crest appears on the front endsheet and the division pages as a symbol of Ruskin High School. Again the Ruskin Crest emphasized "Qualities," for each arrow within the Crest represents a specific trait—Responsibility, Unity, Service, Knowledge, Initiative, and Nobleness of character. When the first letter of each of these "Qualities" are combined they spell Ruskin.

Planning for the 1968 Mirage started as early as January, 1967. We worked on this edition of the Mirage over a year's time. That "perfect idea" was often written down during midnight hours, or a page completed after Ruskin was long abandoned by the daily participants. For a year, we thought, slept, and lived with "our" book.

As this book is finished and is in your, the reader's hands, we must give up our claim of ownership for the 1968 Mirage is now indeed your book. It is our very sincere hope that you like your book, for nothing pleases us more than to have the students accept the product of our work. We cannot hope to please everyone in every instance but we have tried.



Colophon

Mirage 1968 containing 256 pages, is the largest yearbook in the history of Ruskin. Copy is in Bodoni type with 8 point type being used for captions, 10 point type for page copy, and 12 point type for division page copy. Headlines were in Century Schoolbook with 24 point type for page headlines, and 36 point type for division page labels. Italics were used for accent. Produced by Inter-Collegiate Press, the Mirage was printed with linotype on 80 pound enamel paper. 1630 Mirages were printed. Copies of the Mirage were sold for \$5.75 or \$6.00 if two payments were made.
