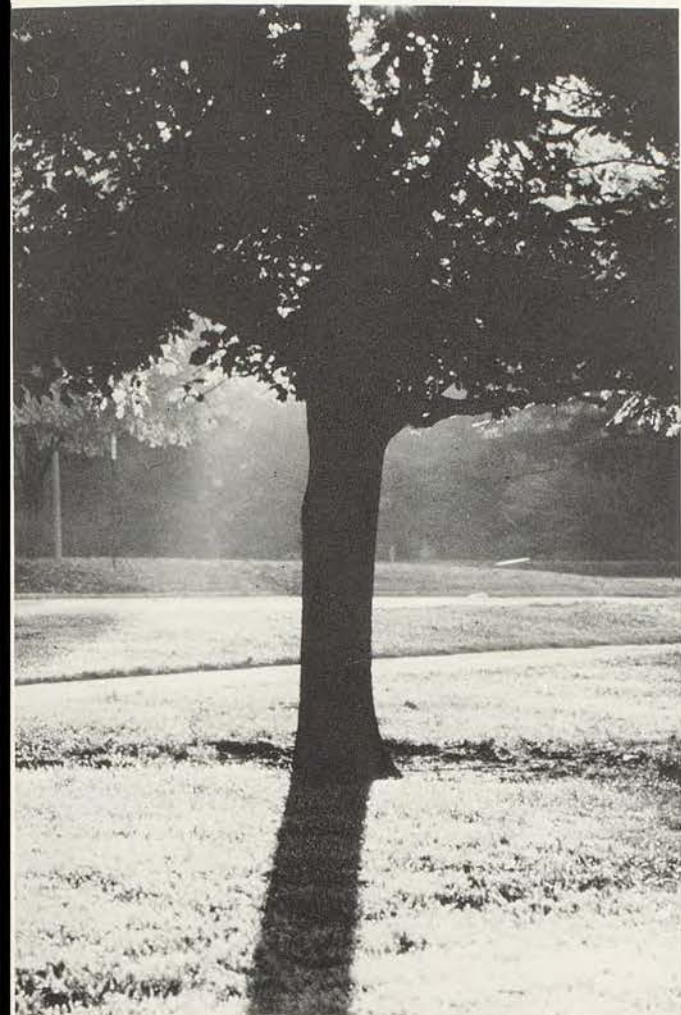
In the silent brilliance of a rainbow

For though I wade through memories, I know I'm just beginning

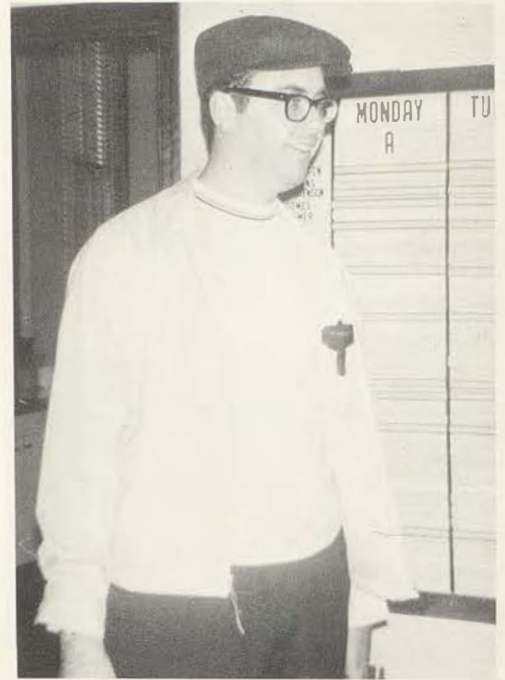

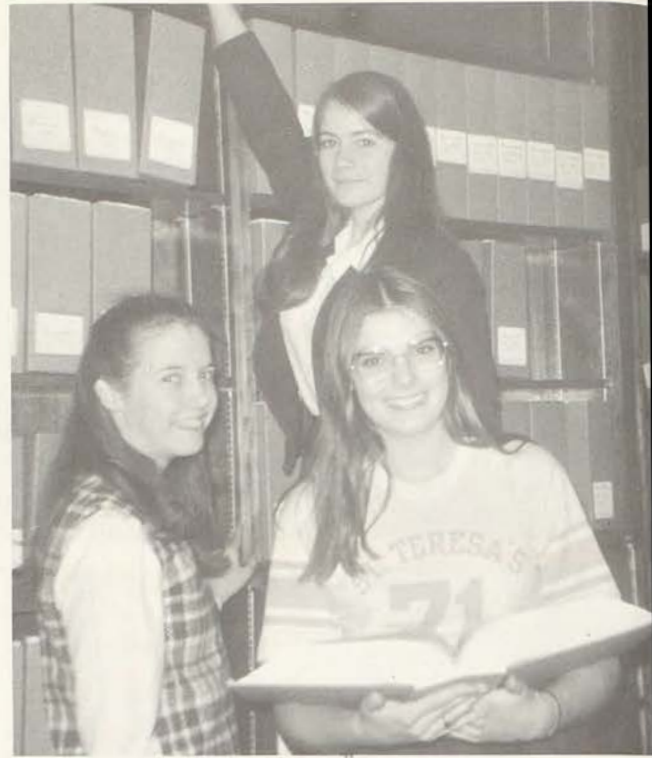

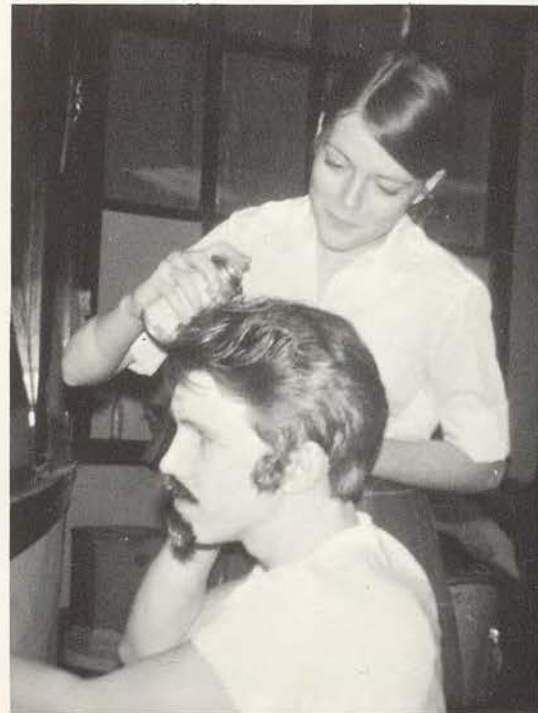
