unique architectural features.







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




- 1941 --Donnelly Hall is erected, named after Father Bernard Donnelly, and the college of St. Teresa begins a 4-year curriculum.







Activities at Unitown retreat leave a lasting impression on participants and STA community

Instead of meeting in the fall, the annual Unitown retreat was held March 3 and 4 in the Goppert Building on the STA campus.

The event, which is sponsored by the United National Conference of Community and Justice, is designed to bring awareness to younger people about the prejudices that exist in our society. This is accomplished through a variety of activities, including role playing, surveying and reflection.

Students who participated in Unitown gladly gave up a portion of their weekend, since the retreat runs from 3:00 p.m. Friday until 3:00 p.m. Saturday--24 hours of bonding and self-examination.

"I felt like it was time very well-spent, since participating in Unitown gave me perspective," said Sophomore Mary Nguyen. "It was nice to be able to relate my experiences with other classmates. Even though Unitown lasted only a short amount of time, I was able to develop lots of friendships."

Kirsten Engebretson, another sophomore said, "I liked Unitown because I saw and heard what other people thought about racism. I realized how just the little mindless things can hurt someone so much. It made me realize that everyone must constantly think before they act."

"I think it's really important that we keep doing Unitown at St. Teresa's," said Sarah Aylward, sophomore. "It's important to try to get as many people as possible involved so we can work again racism, ageism and sexism at STA."

The Unitown experience seems to stay with participants for a long time.

Junior Erica Neumann, who attended Unitown as a sophomore and the week-long Anytown a year ago, says participating in the retreats has changed the way she will always look at things.

"Even though I'm not a racist person, I realized I sometimes unknowingly used terms that could offend others," she said. "Now I'm much more aware of what I say and how I say it."

One of the lasting legacies of the Unitown program has been the implementation of an annual Cultural Awareness Program each January on the STA campus. This event features a variety of students signing, dancing, telling stories and sharing their culture and heritage with the community at large.

Mr. Mark Fudemberg is the faculty sponsor of both Unitown and the Cultural Awareness Program. Fudemberg, along with Juan Rangel of the United National Conference of Community and Justice, has acted as moderator of Unitown at STA for the last several years.

Fall Musical Provides 'Fantastick' Entertainment

The 1999 STA fall musical lived up to its name--it was truly "fantastick!" The "Fantasticks," with music by Harvey Schmidt and book and lyrics by Tom Jones, consisted of a fairly small cast of only 12 members, including seniors Katie Kalahurka, Megan Price, Brie Alley, Lindsay Jackson, Brengyei Katosang, and Brie Manakul, juniors Danielle Fowler, Cody Proctor, and Brain Sears, and sophomores Angela Johnson, Annie Kalahurka, and Abby Curry. This year's musical was directed for the first time by Jay Coombes who had previously only choreographed the STA musicals. "Jay, the director, was definitely interesting to work with. This is the first STA show I have been in that was not directed by Mrs. Murphy. I learned a lot about different directing styles from working with Jay, " commented Senior Katie Kalahurka.

The musical portrayed an abstract view of young love. Louisa and Matt, the two lovers, are manipulated into a relationship by their mothers who realize that the only way the two young adults would marry is if they know their parents disapprove. After overcoming many obstacles including a sword fight and a suave thief, Louisa and Matt's relationship survives.

Through song and comedic dialogue, the musical touched on a delicate subject--rape. However, in the context of the play, "rape" means 'to kidnap or abduct,' rather than the more violent, vulgar definition that most people are most used to. Curry said, "The term 'rape' in the play had a completely different meaning. Because it was made so clear, I think the audience really saw the humorus side of it and therefore found it much more easier to enjoy the show."

Even though many members of the audience enjoyed the uniquely comedic show, the abstract approach confused some of the audience with its subtle symbolism and fast-paced plot. Sophomore Taylor Triano, who worked alongside Kristen Walker as assistant directors and stage managers, stated, "It was a very 'off-the-wall' show and took close attention. It took a lot of imagining. It was like a dream world that took a lot of the audience's imagination to understand the concept. Overall, it went great!!"



This part of the play was well-liked by many, but the favorite scene of the majority was the final one.


"This scene is so great," says Murphy, "because it bridges what they've done for women."







Finding a dress was an ever tougher job for some of the STA seniors.




stadium," said Megan Price. "It was absolutely magical."













The volleyball team showed their strengths and their dedication throughout the 1999 season.




