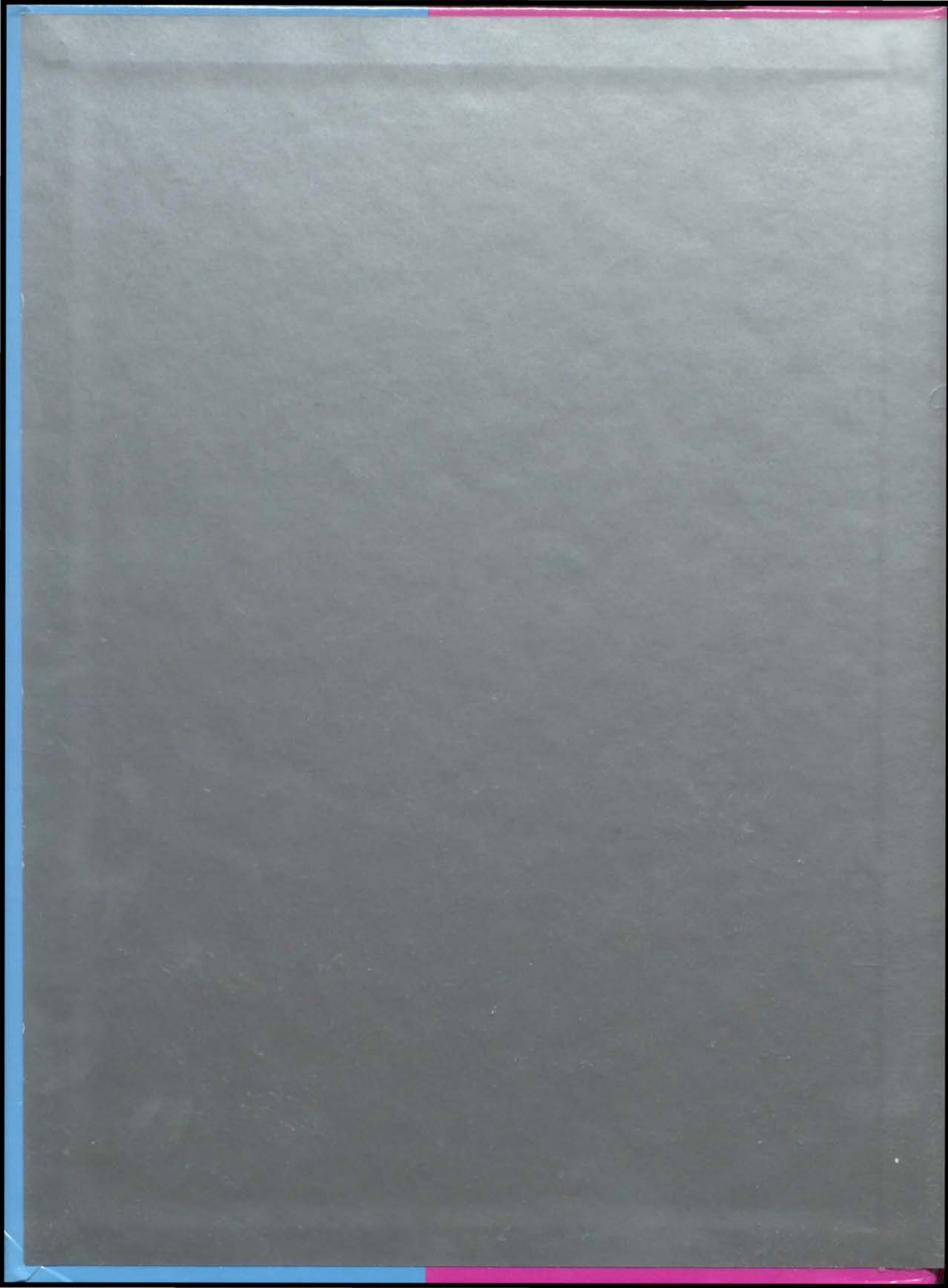
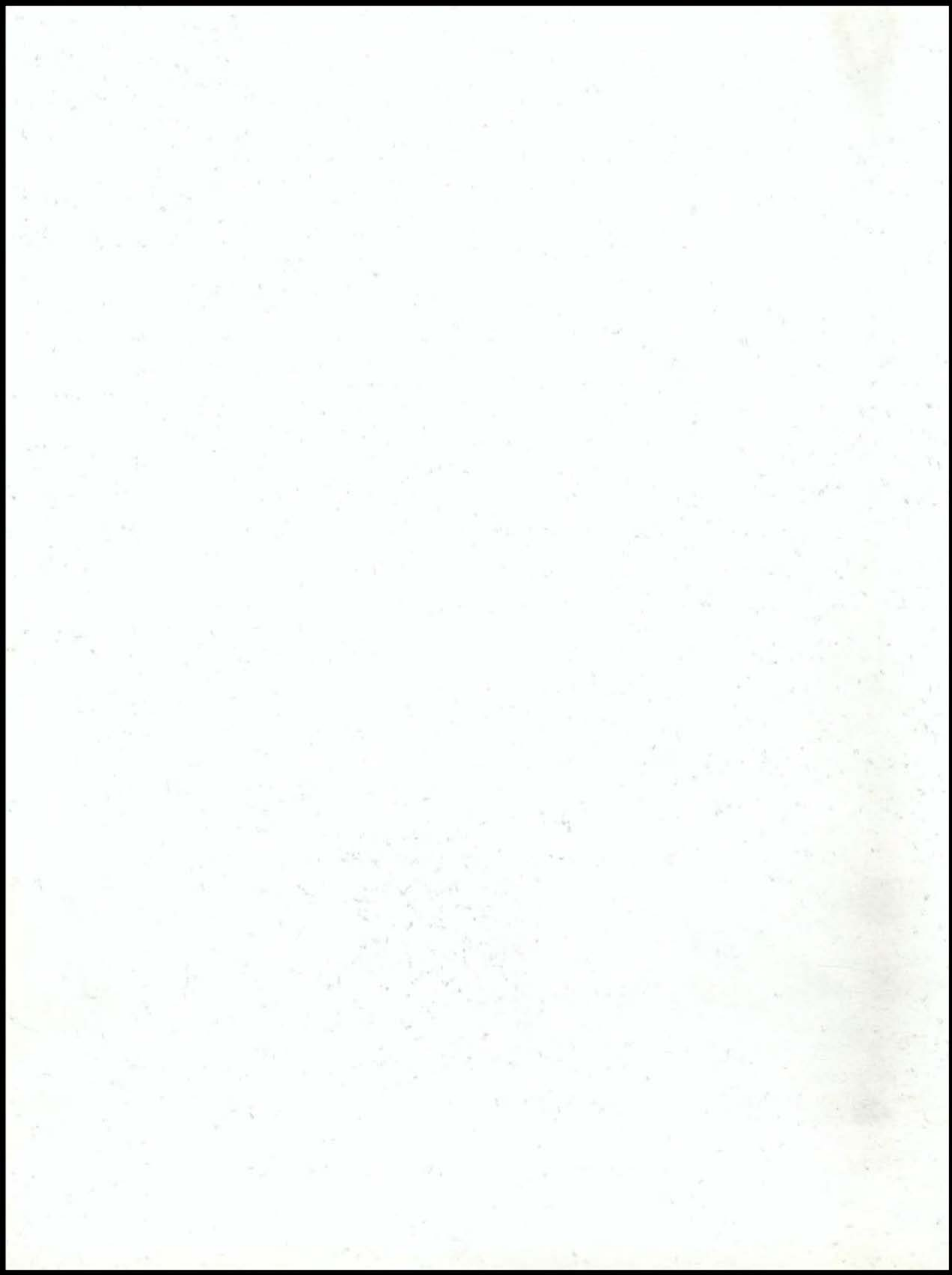




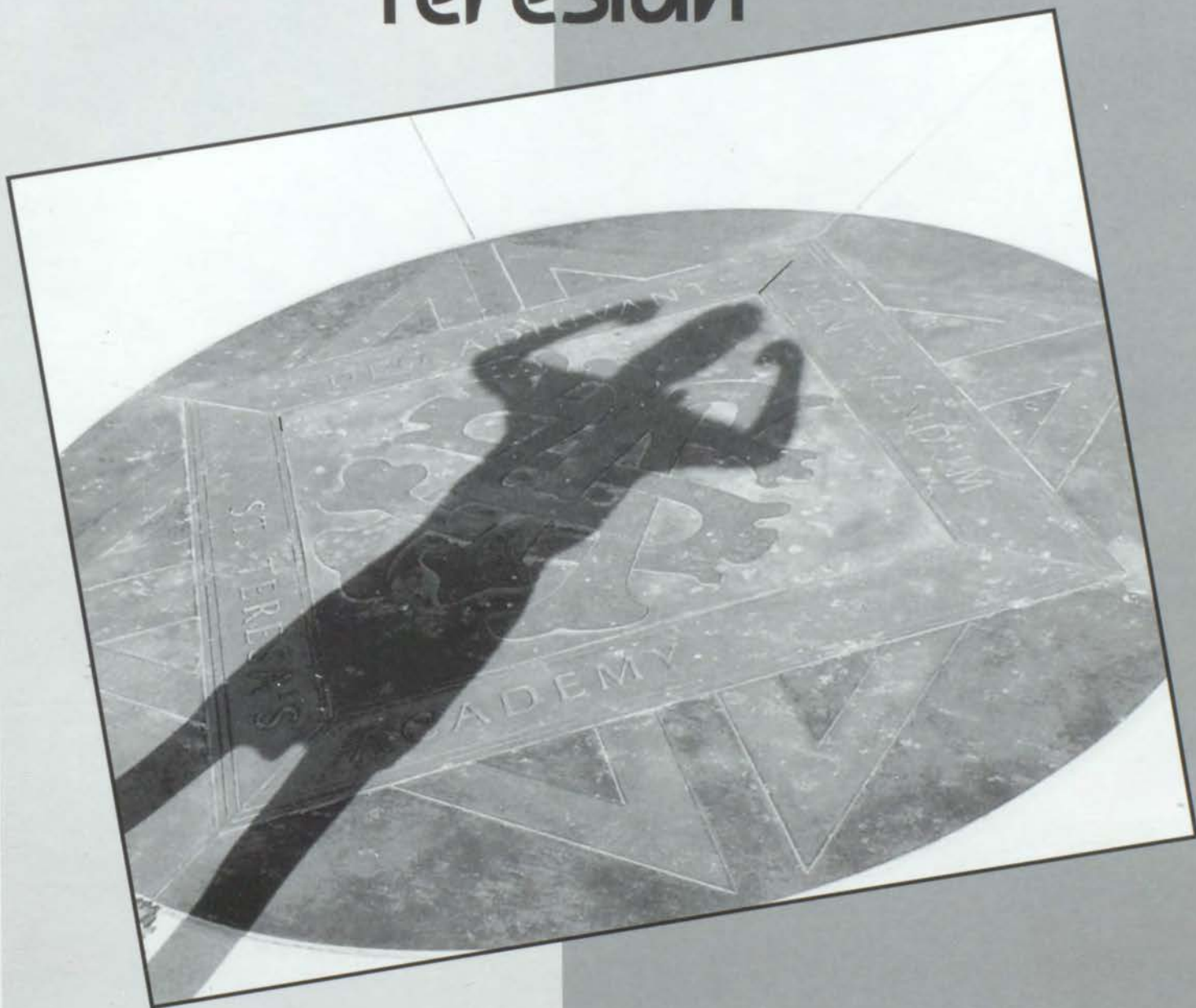

As St. Teresa's students returned to school last fall, our world continued to evolve. On campus, construction of the third phase of the capital campaign continued. The updated and expanded Goppert Center was dedicated on October 15, 2001. Plans continue for the renovation of the Music and Arts Building.

City officials presented a makeover for downtown Kansas City that would include a new fine arts center, residential areas, updated parks and business space. Mayor Kay Barnes supported the idea for the "So-Lo" (South of the Loop) project.

St. Teresa's students, along with millions of fans all over the world, anticipated the November 2001 release of the first Harry Potter film, "Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone." The two-and-a-half hour movie set a box office record, grossing more in its opening weekend than any film in history.

American cyclist and cancer survivor Lance Armstrong made athletic history, winning the Tour de France for the third consecutive year. The Williams sisters met in the final match of the US Open, the first interfamily championship in the tournament's history.

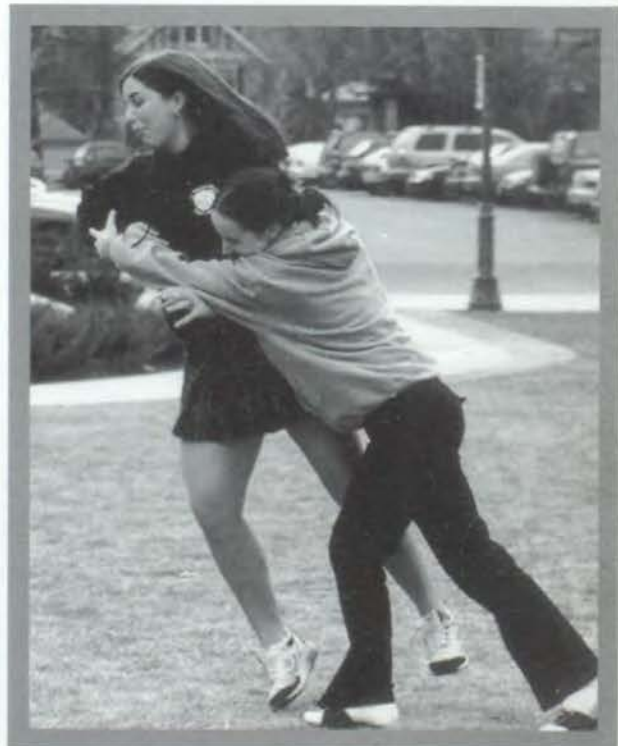
a Community in search of Balance

a Historic Day

By 9:00 am September 11, 2001 all major networks had defaulted to live coverage; cable stations followed. As the planes crashed and the towers fell, newscasters reported the events with shock and uncertainty, hardly believing what appeared on screens before them. Split screens between the Pentagon, Manhattan and rural Pennsylvania provided haunting images of the worst terrorist attack of all time.

That evening, press conferences, a presidential address, accounts of survivors and footage of the destruction replaced primetime programming. The amber glow of the buildings' remains accompanied by the small flames of candlelight vigils glistened through smoke and rubble, catching the eye of viewers as night fell.

A Community not separate from the outside World

For most, September 11 was an exception. Corporate and government employees evacuated buildings, flights were grounded, sporting events cancelled. Colleges called off classes, elementary and high school students across the nation tuned in to broadcasts, and some let out early. Shortly after 9:00 AM on Tuesday, September 11 an announcement was made at St. Teresa's Academy: A plane had struck one of the World Trade Towers and another had crashed in Washington, D.C. At 9:24 students filled the halls. Then it was 5/6 and everyone needed to get to class.

As this landmark day in the history of Western Civilization continued, a few teachers allowed students to witness events as they unfolded. Campus ministry dedicated a brief prayer to victims during mid-day announcements. Most students remained sheltered from the day's events until they departed.

On September 12 students arrived at St. Teresa's with residual images of the horror thousands had experienced the day before. Stories of heroism, and rumors of failed attacks filled the school. Each advisory received a candle to be lit each day during prayers.

On Friday, September 14, teachers cancelled meetings and students sacrificed study time to congregate in the quad and join the rest of the nation in prayer and remembrance.

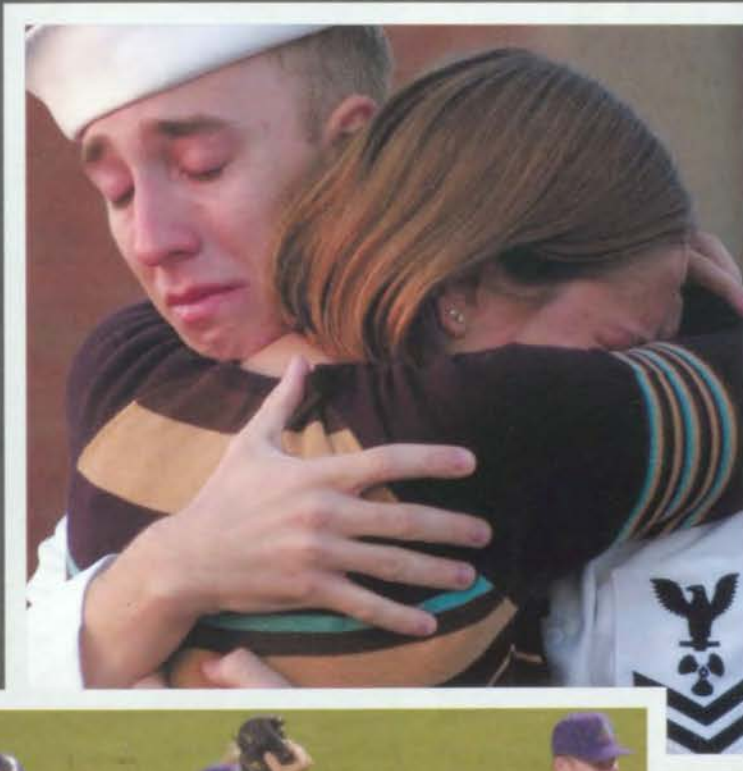

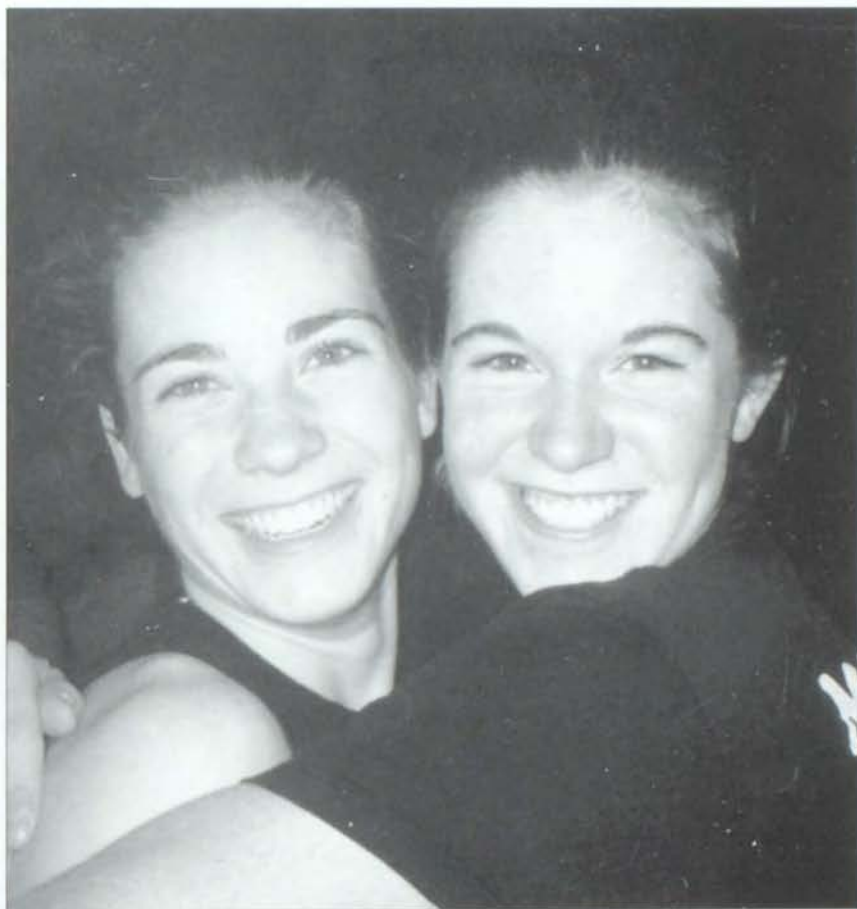
"It was a big surprise and I was really excited when I found out that I won! It was great!" said Jackson.

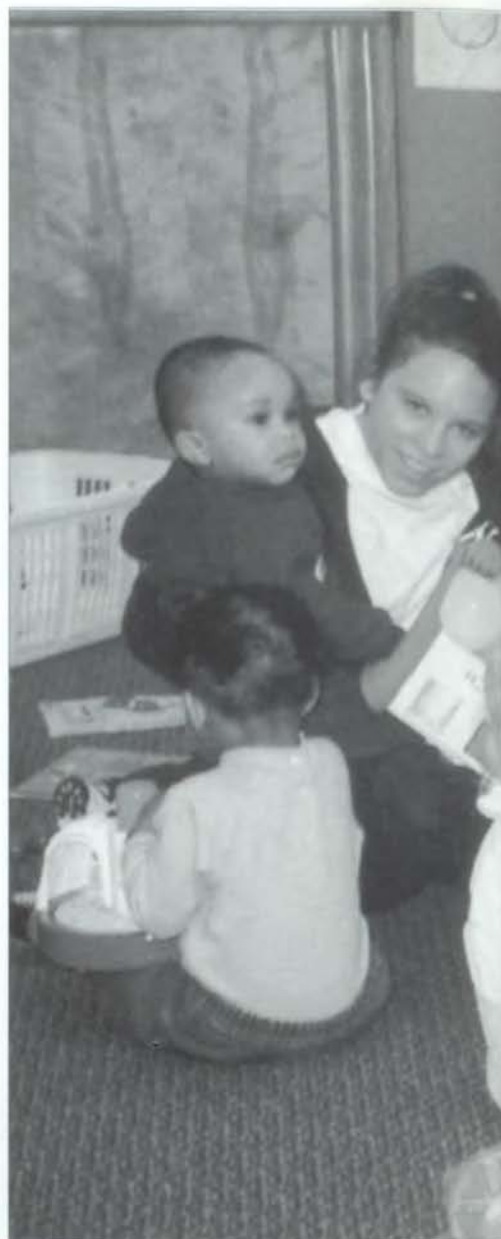


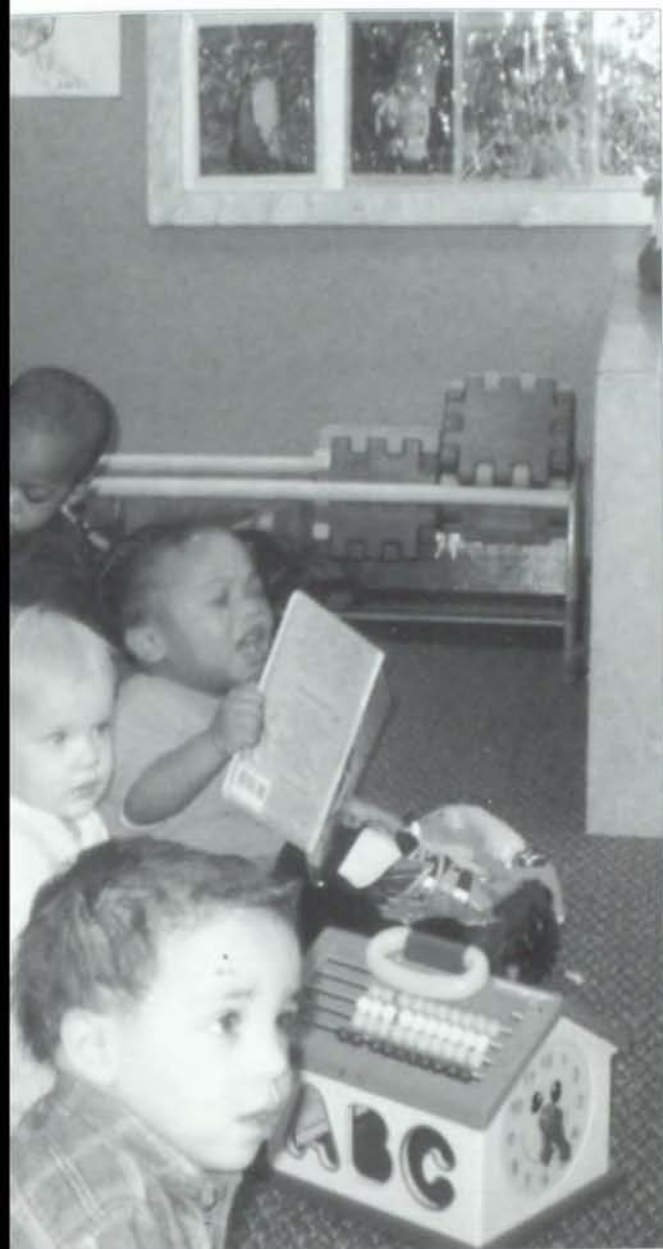

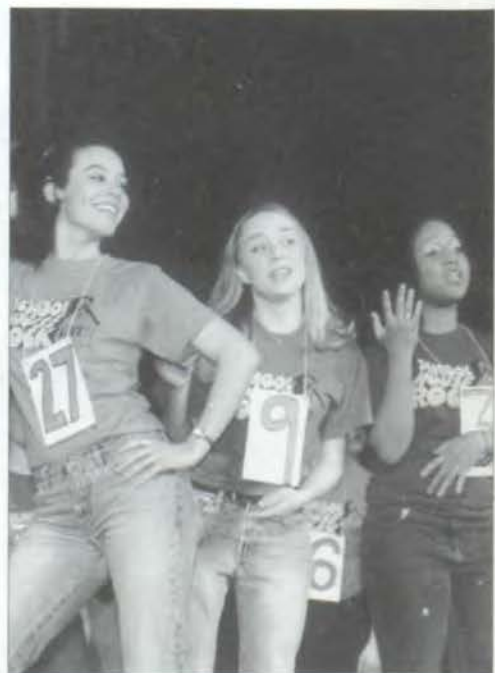
The show got rave reviews from STA students also. "This show was entertaining and really well done," said Ashley Brookman, junior.

"The whole time I was in Italy, I just kept thinking how lucky I was to have such an educational spring break trip," commented Senior Sarah Gettino, with a grin.

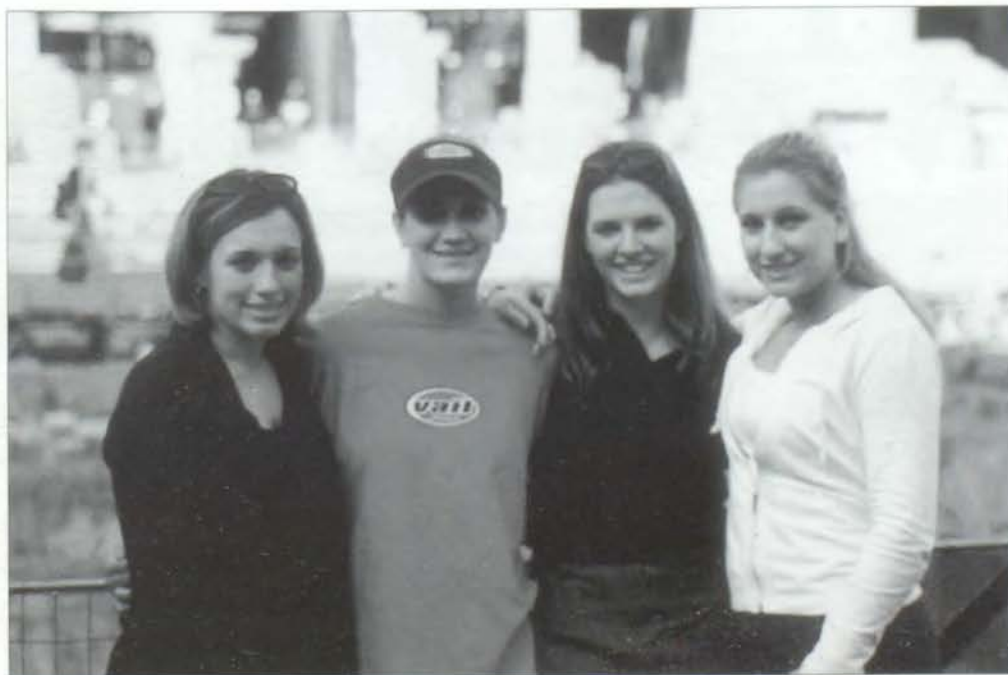

Prom events make for an unforgettable night

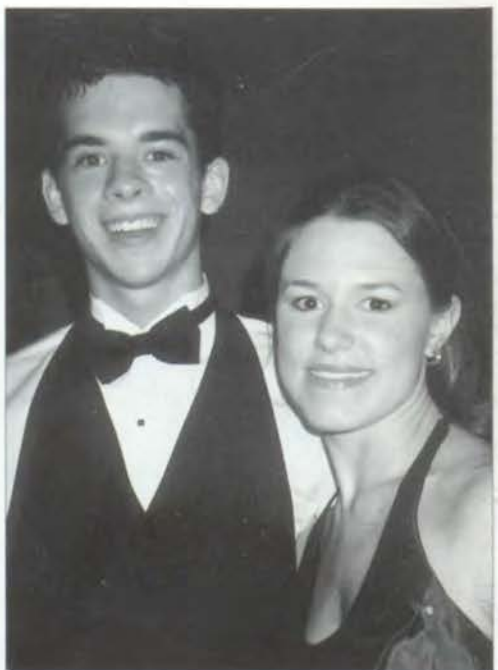

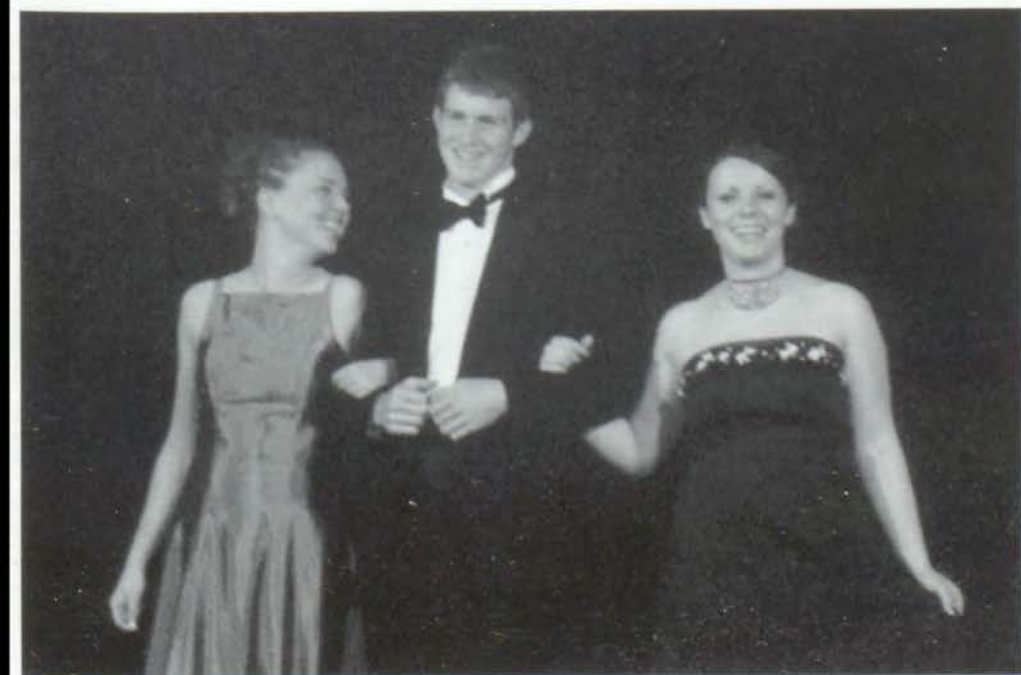

COMPUTER CLASSES HELP STUDENTS IN THE REAL WORLD

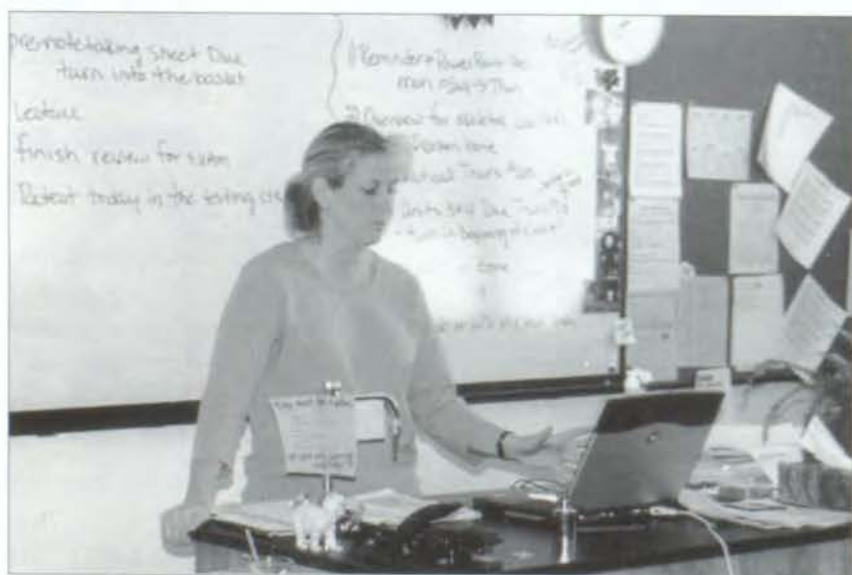

FOREIGN LANGUAGES HELP ADD SPICE TO SCHOOL OFFERINGS

Students were able to witness how the country became united after adversity. Everyone pulled together; donating time, energy, money, blood and other essentials.

"My Current Events class has become an outlet for students to express their emotions and concerns about the attacks," says Mr. Jack Garvin.

Possessing a knowledge of geography helps people better clarify the events and tragedies that occur throughout the world. 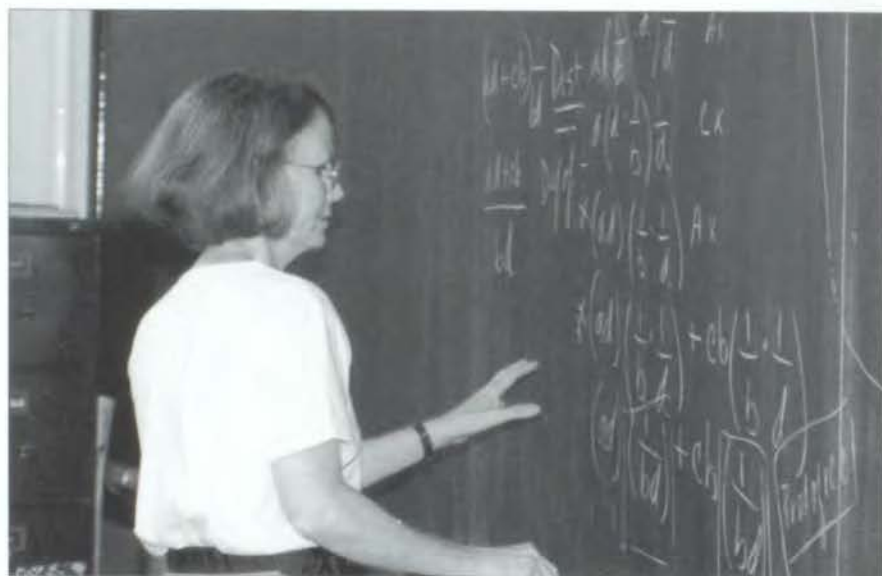

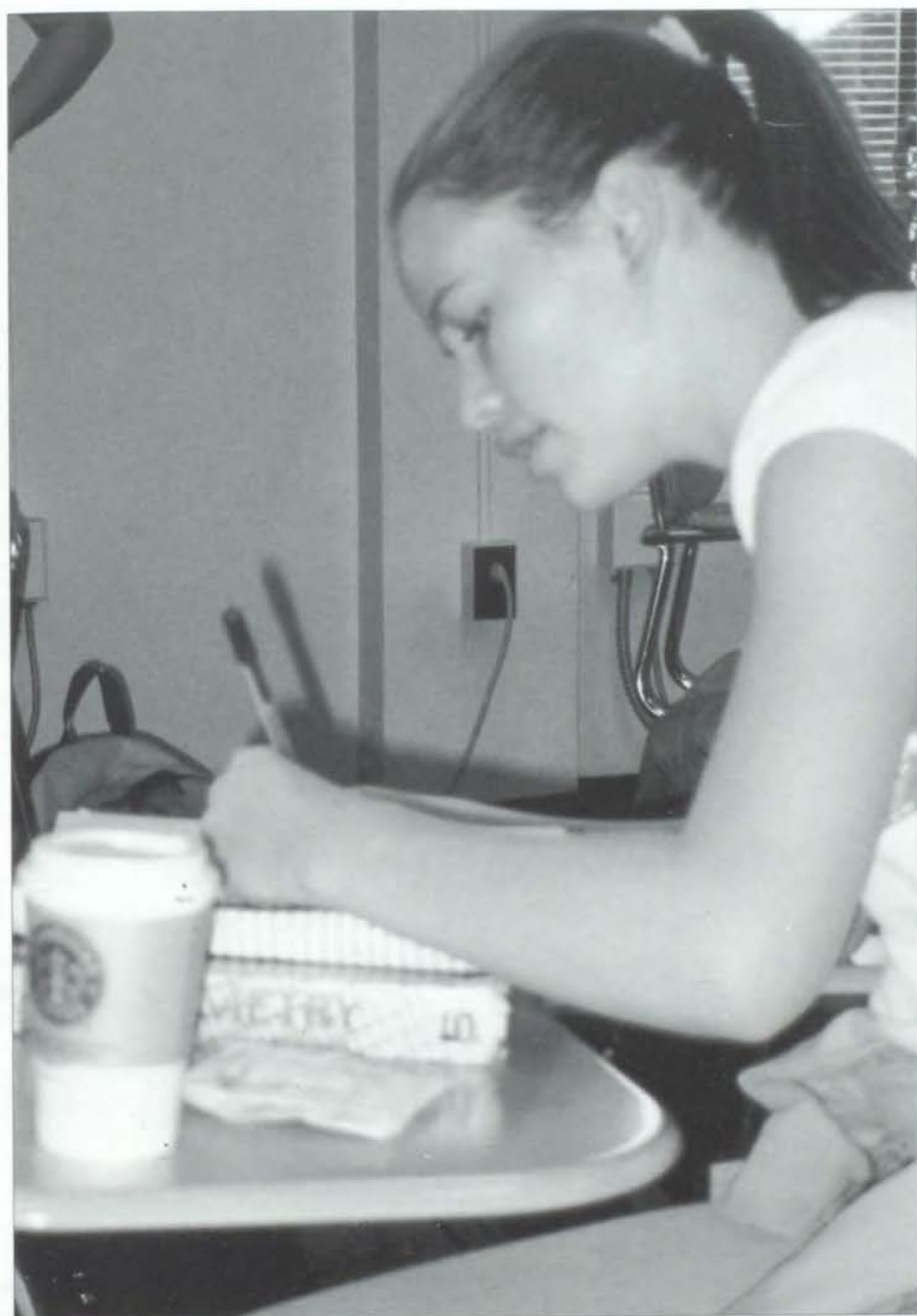
"Math is the foundation for day-to-day reasoning," stated Leah Smith and Tara O'Connor, longtime friends

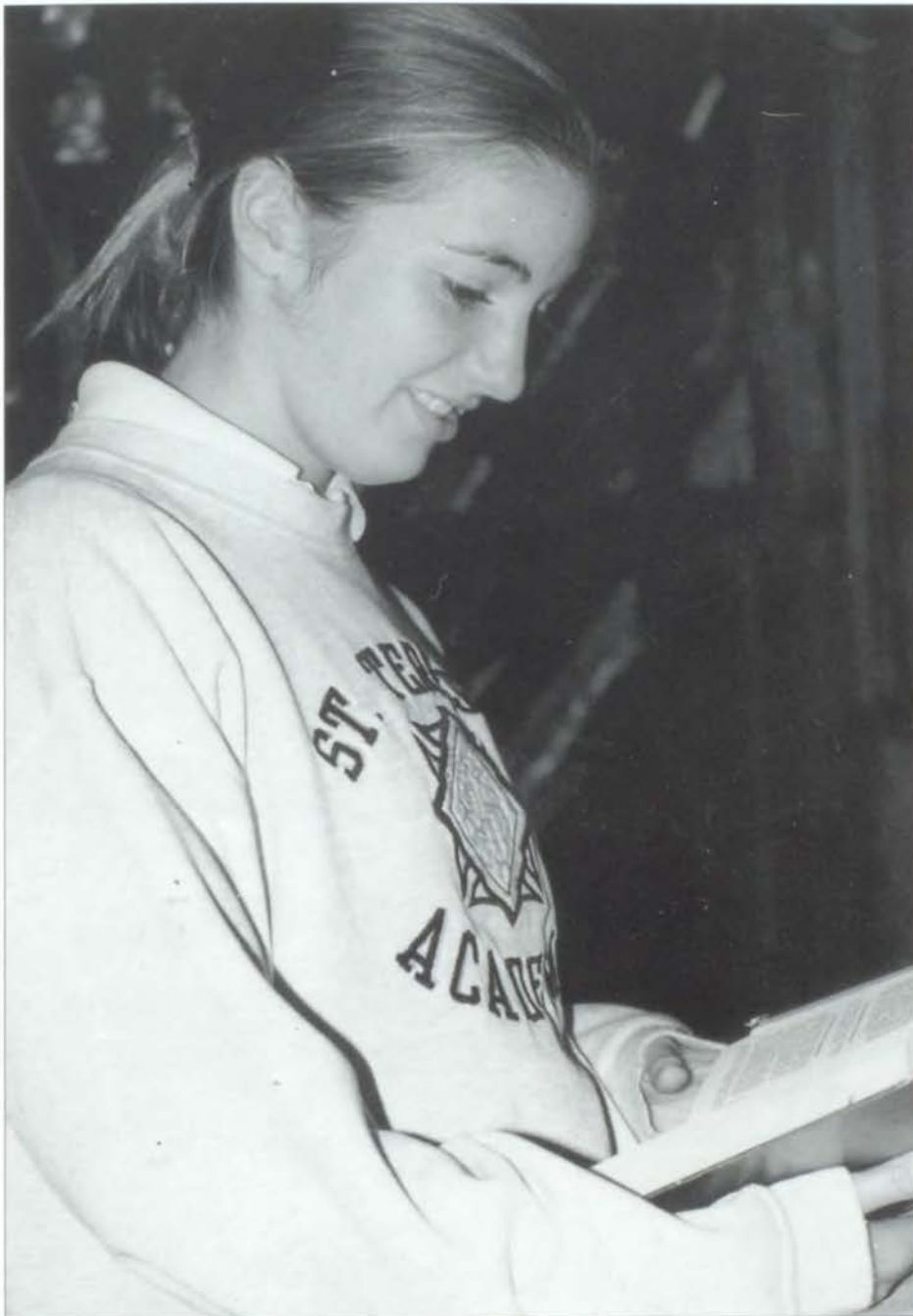

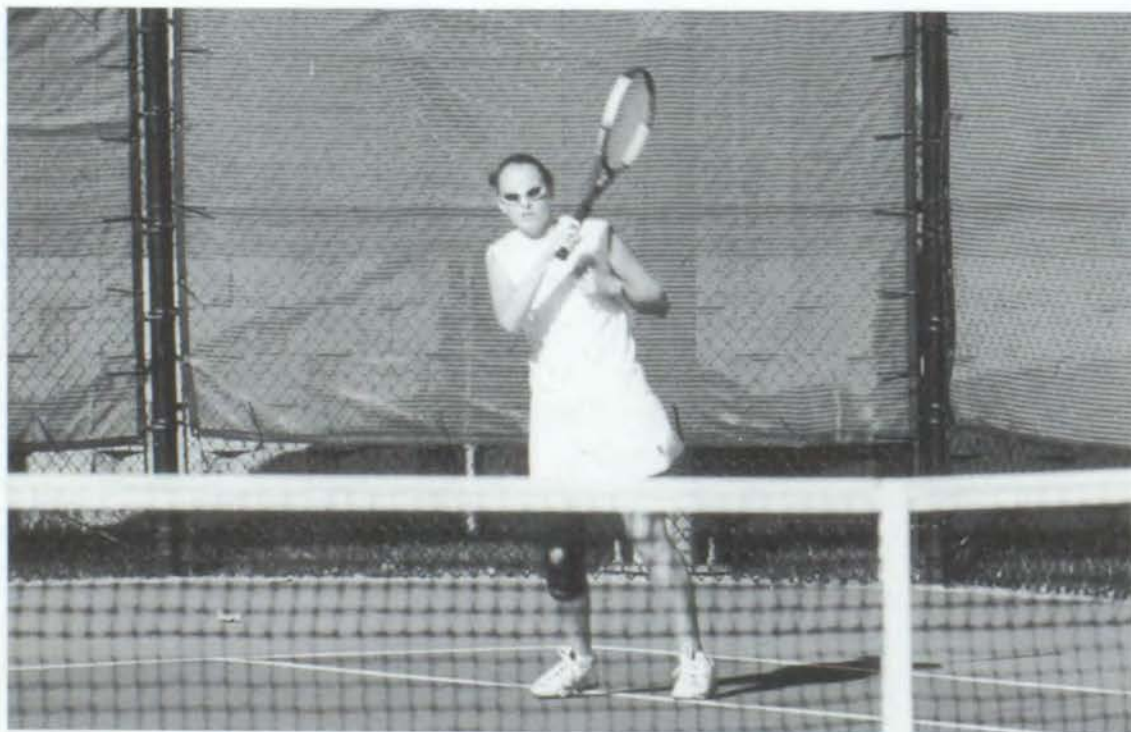

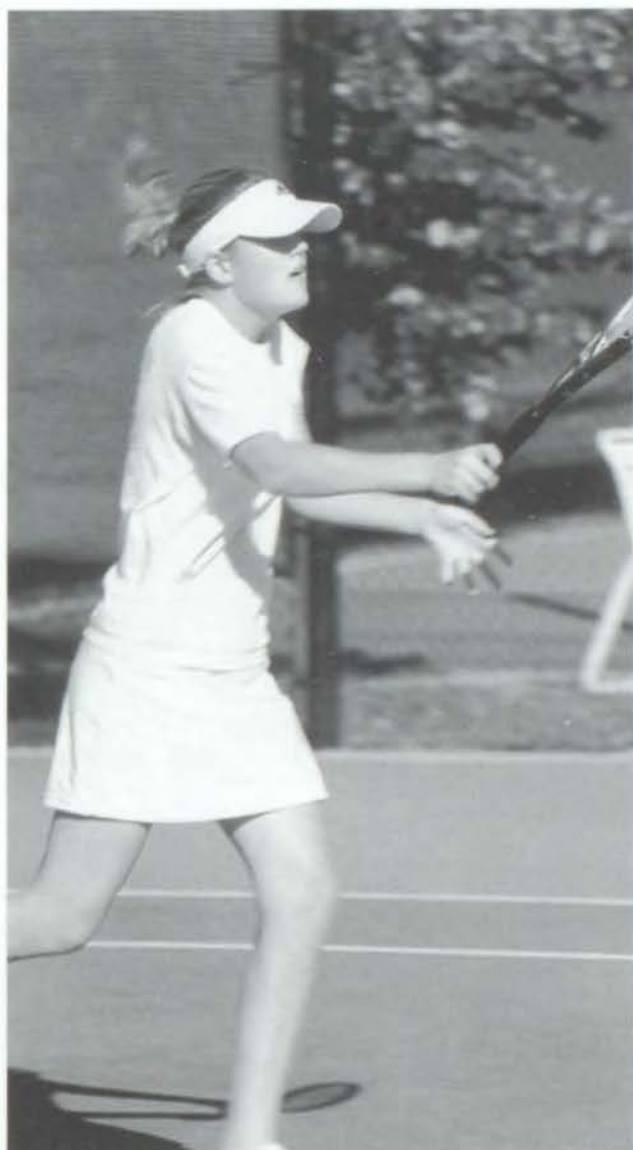
In addition to team practices, all of Stars' home matches were held at the Plaza also.

Being a sophomore means experiencing new things, getting more privileges and becoming another year wiser. Many students at St. Teresa's will have their 16th birthday as sophomores. "Sweet 16" grants a big change in a teenager's life, as one becomes old enough to receive her DRIVER'S LICENSE.

"My favorite thing about being able to drive is having the freedom to do whatever I want, whenever I want," says Katie Gillis.

The little plastic card that allows girls to drive also gives girls freedom. They will no longer be the one who always shows up with their parents behind the wheel.

Many of the sophomores will fall under the Missouri Graduated Driver License Law. This allows them to get their instruction permit

at age 15. With this permit, they can drive only when their parent, grandparent, legal guardian or driving instructor is with them.

When they finally turn 16, and the girls have had their permit for six months, they can get their intermediate driver license. This grants girls the freedom of driving on their own.

One of the few restrictions on this level is that the license holder cannot drive between the hours of 1:00 and 5:00 a.m, unless they are driving to or from a school activity or job.

Two years later, on their 18th birthday, the girls can finally get their full license. With this license, there are NO restrictions.
