


The world events during the 2002-2003 school year were filled with news of tragedy, war and invasion.

In an address to the nation on February 1, 2003, President George W. Bush announced that the space shuttle Columbia and its seven passengers were lost during re-entry on approach to the Kennedy Space Center. Numerous pieces of debris landed in Nacogdoches and Palestine, Texas. Neither NASA or White House officials had any reason to believe that this accident was terrorist-related. Among the seven passengers was the first Israeli astronaunt, Ilan Ramon.

Since September 11, 2001 Americans had been on hightened security with the looming prospect of war. Peace and pro-war advocates rallied all across the world. Then on March 19, 2003 the United States, without the approval of the U.N., launched the first missile on Iraq in an attempt to kill Saddam Hussein.

The occupation of Afghanistan continued, while the United States maintained security by searching people possibly associated with the Taliban.

Despite a year filled with depressing stories and events, Americans still hope that these tragedies, wars and invasions will eliminate terrorism and promote peace in 2004.












"The Osbournes showed America what it was like to live in a dysfunctional family," said Senior Jill Raybould. "But it did help Kelly with her singing career."


Many reality shows put people into the spotlight, even after the show had ended. Both Kelly Clarkson and Aaron Buerge kept their fame long after their shows were over.

"If you have better information, you can make smarter decisions," he said. "Ask yourselves if we are the liberators or the exterminators in this war."

Later students could express their opinions by answering "yes," "no" or "maybe" to the question by posed by posters in the cafeteria: "Should the U.S. invade Iraq?"

Other girls posted current events and propaganda on their lockers so that their peers could obtain information between classes. They read *Time* and watched CNN. They *cared* about this war, their president, American ideals, justice. They asked, "Why?" Perhaps politicians and conflicts will come and go. But it is certain that when this generation is running the world, they will find a way to change it.

"After collecting tickets, Cady Senior Ali Mullin. "There were a lot of laughs and it will definitely be a night I will always remember."


The Holiday Ho-down was

"My friends and I went iceskating at Crown Center and I drank my share of hot-chocolate," said Freshman Danielle Yeager.


The break from school also allowed students to spend more time with their loved ones.








Academics are valued as the most important element of St. Teresa's. Our school is known as one of the academics most

New to the English department, Ms. Megan Filipowicz and Mr. Eric Thomas taught seniors to appreciate the world of writing.


Although diagramming sentences and writing papers are not always enjoyable experiences, it is crucial to have great English skills to be successful in the future.


as with each other.

With books, formulas, equations and notes, math is a subject that will be applied in the future.


"With the math skills I gain in high school, I will excel in many more subjects in the years to come," said Junior Rachel Tipping.

"The challenge is making history interesting and relevant to today's teenage students," said Sirridge. "But I love it."




Religion can be interpreted in different ways. The diversity of religion classes at St. Teresa's helped students come in contact with many different beliefs.

"We work under the premise that God is limitless," said Denise Walters. "Therefore it stands to reason that there are limitless ways of understanding and worshipping God."


Another class that added to the diversity was Women in Theology. Through this class, students learned about the women that came before them and how they interacted with their society.

"Computer graphics is a fun


way of learning how to use other aspects of the computer," said Junior Katie Monaghan.

A physical education class may be a break from the everyday classroom routine, especially for freshmen.


"I really enjoy P.E. class because I get to spend time with my classmates in a fun environment," said Freshman Kathleen Heermann.

"I don't actually play them; I test them," said Bode-Rodriguez. "If I were to play them, they wouldn't stand a chance."


In the third quarter, students learned about health. The information the girls acquired helped them lead healthy and active lives.

"As long as I've taught, I've never walked into a class unprepared-not that I couldn't," she said with a smile. "But I need a plan or an outline."







"The girls always showed up ready to play," said Freshman Coach Jason Watermann. "Good heart is what really counts."


The girls worked hard throughout the season but they also enjoyed a lot of laughs.

With only one junior, the rest of the team could possibly play together again in the 2003-2004 season. Thus, the future looks bright for next year's JV Stars.






Senior STA choir members were given the opportunity to display their talents. Singers choreographed and directed compositions sung by their peers.

The annual event featured four comedies and one drama. Actresses represented every class.


"This is the greatest number of directors we have had and they made it amazing!" said Junior Lindsee Acton.



Junior Madison Garcia was a part of crew for three years.


"I joined to be a part of the fine arts department here," she said.



Spirit Club managed to connect the student body by providing many opportunities for the school to become involved in activities throughout the school year.





"As the club moderator, I enjoy being able to share my knowledge about the Hispanic culture with the girls," said Bernal.



"I wanted to work with young actors and let them experience the theater for themselves," she said.


Teachers also appreciated the dedication and talent of STA students.

"[The STA students] are bright, eager, inquisitive. Generally, the students here care and they usually give a good effort," said Mr. Craig Whitney.


Many teachers stayed at STA because of the students. The dedicated teachers and staff provided girls with irreplacable knowledge and experience.
