



As each of the TEN STAR STUDDED YEARS fades away, students find themselves looking back to see what activities they participated in at Schlagle High School.










Each step we make to get involved brings us closer and closer to our goals. The support of our teachers and counselors and fellow students gives us more enthusiasm to go that extra mile.






# King Louie

With the increase in students enrolled, many were expected to attend. Only 400 tickets were available for over 1,000 students.




Rhonda Pawloski, sophomore, was asked how she felt about King Louie Night, "I had a pretty good time, but it was slightly overcrowded."

Buying clothing and staying in the "fad" seems to be very important to many people this year. They want to stay in style, even if they have to spend a fortune.







Another SHS band is the Orchestra. This band consisted of instruments such as the violin, cello and violo.


The Stage Band or Jazz Band provided basketball fans with the enjoyment of music during home basketball games and also aided the Drill Team in their performances.



The members also sponsored a hospitality room at SHS's wrestling tournament.






Drama Club went to Waldo Astoria in November. There they watched the actors perform "Charlies Aunt."

# Photography Club


Schlagle High School's Photography Club is one of the smallest clubs, consisting of under 20 students.





The boys were divided into groups of 15 and each group then became a city. Each city was then com-


bined to form a county which consisted of four cities. Eight to ten counties were then united to set up a state.



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
The lOth annual Schlagle High School Invitational Wrestling Tournament was held on Jan. 8, 1983. Competing against eight schools, SHS took sixth place.




Timothy Holloway, junior, placed fourth in the I26pound division saying that he could have done better if he had concentrated more.




The 1982 Schlagle High School Stallion football season, while not achieving great studies in the win column, made tremendous progress, said Head Coach Randy Westfahl.





The varsity squad was competitive at all their meets even though the scores didn't show it. "They worked together and we were competitive against every team they played," second-year Coach Connie Harms said.


"Our overall record does not indicate the individual as well as the team improvements which were made this year," Mrs. Harms said.










Coach Minor emphasized playing as a team instead of playing as an individual and felt there was improvement in this area.












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### Boys' Basketball





The 1982-83 Girls' Basketball teams are "by far the most balanced of all the teams Schlagle High School has had," said JV Coach Herb Marble.


"Having beaten or tied every record in the IOyear history of the school they know what it takes to be the best," he said.





The Schlagle High School baseball team started the season March 23 with eight returning lettermen.




"I enjoy coaching baseball very much for two specific reasons, for the enjoyment of having the contact with the players and baseball's tradition of being the number one sport in America."

"This year should be proven as a successful season," Mr. Lysaught added.





"I think I could have done a lot better if I had kept my mind on my match instead of what the others were doing," Holloway said.


Holloway did a lot of extra wrestling with team members from SHS and worked out a little more often than he normally did to get ready for state competition.



### Librarians



English may be our country's national language, and the study of it will bring a variety of benefits.





# Student Pet Peeves


Teasing, embarassing, lecturing all hour and giving too much homework are all teachers' actions which Schlagle High School students dislike.


Not answering your questions is a dislike of Kim Humpert, freshman. "Some teachers just sit behind their desk and never answer your questions," said Humpert.

"Many students forget their home training, a simple 'thank you,' 'pardon me,' 'excuse me,' etc," Mrs. Strader, librarian, said.






### History


# Mr. Bob Murphy


Mr. Bob Murphy, history instructor, spends his summers working as a speaker and coach at basketball camps. Recently he was invited to work at William Jewell College.

# Mr. Steve Gering


After being unsuccessful at playing football, Mr. Steve Gering, science instructor, decided to change sports. The sport he changed to was running.


Projects that were done in the science classes this year included: making a cell-like system and dissecting grasshoppers.

The computers enabled students to learn on their own and made an advancement in the SHS teaching methods.






Mrs. Carolyn Jones, French teacher, said, "It gives you a lot of practice in speaking to others.

#### Art



"It inspired me to make another project to put in the scholastic awards exhibition in the 82-83 school year," said Beason.













If one were to walk past the Special Services room they might see a student working on a computer. It is the new Apple II Plus Computer with 48K memory.






