PTA COMMANDS MYSTIFYING COMPETENCY

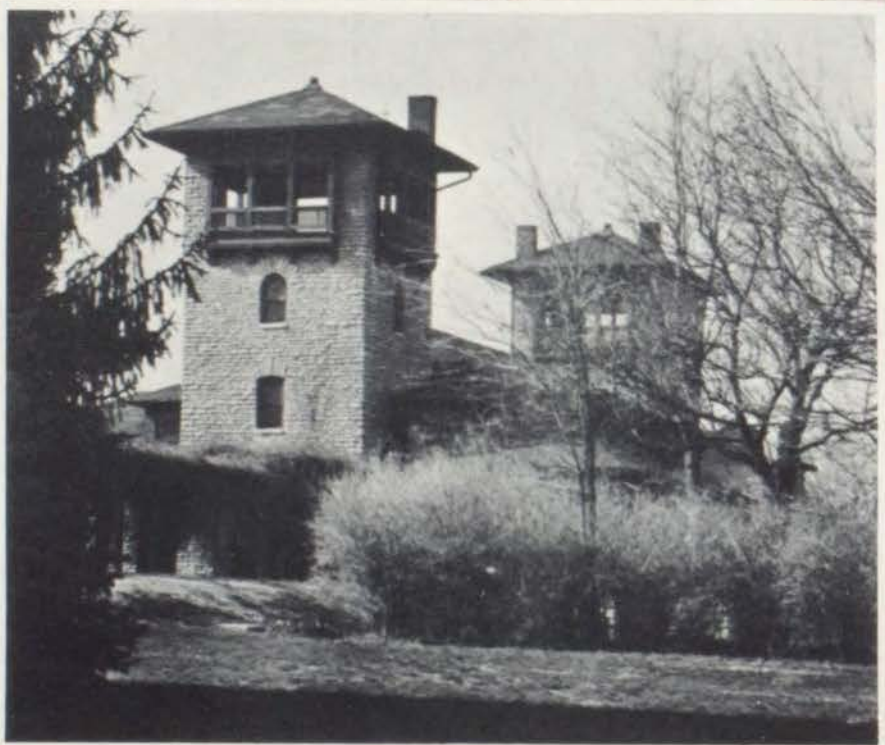
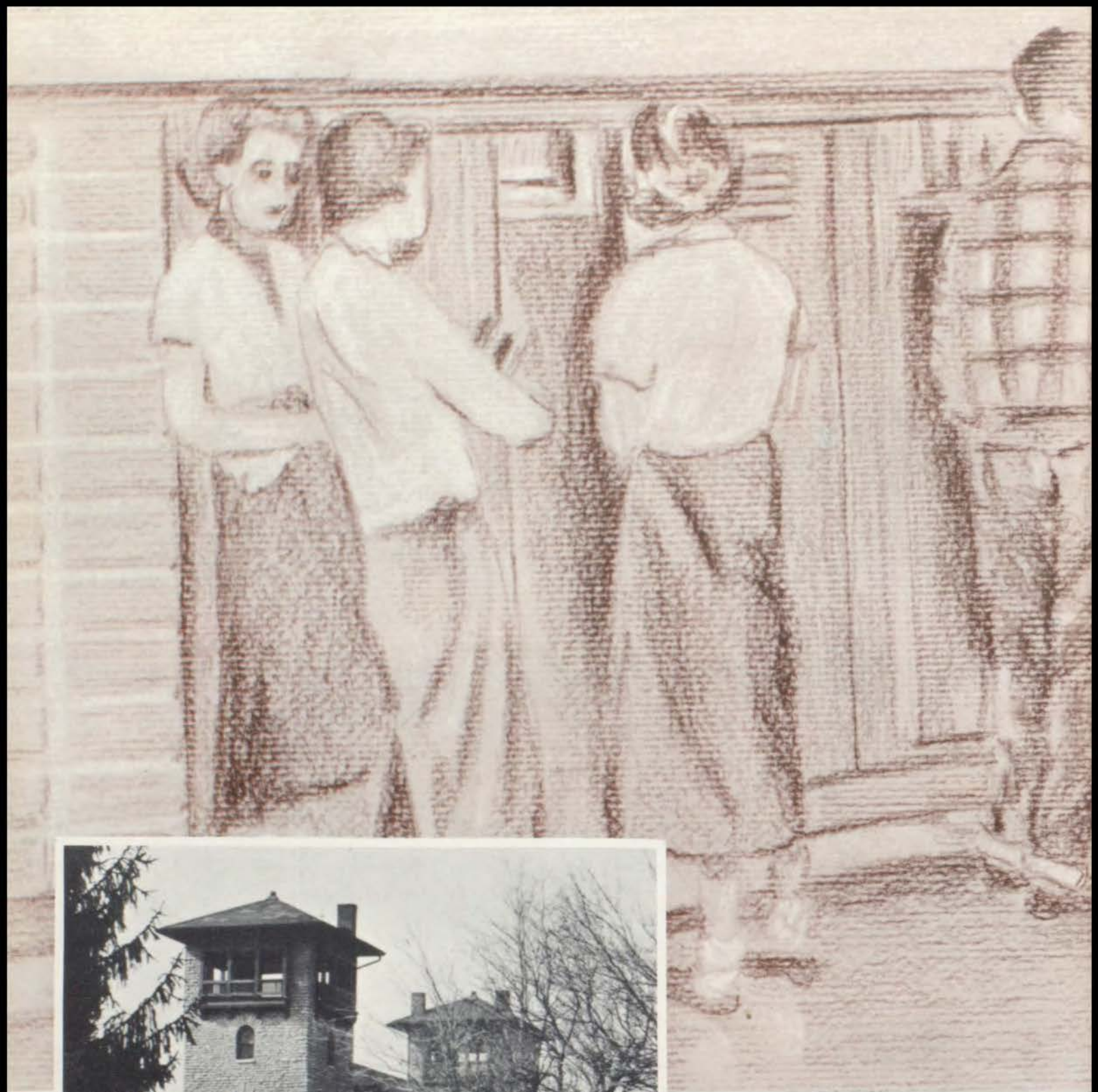

COMPETITION ENCOMPASSES ACTIVITIES

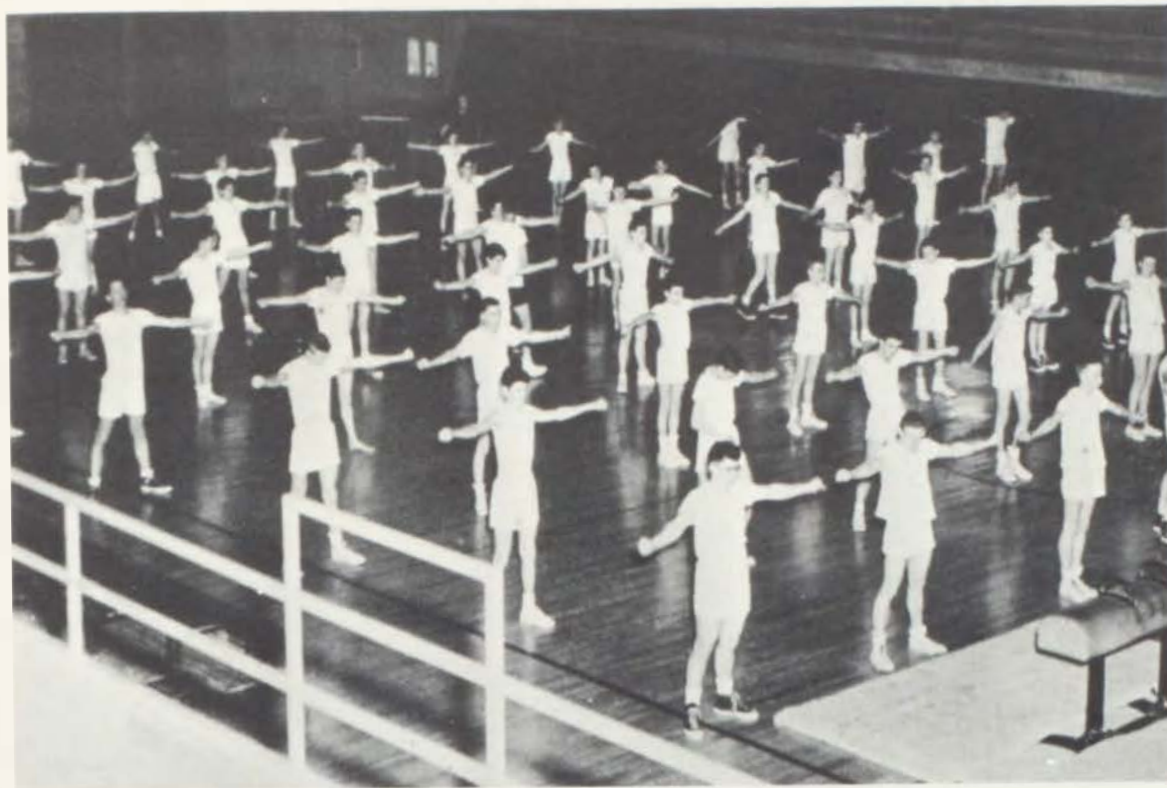

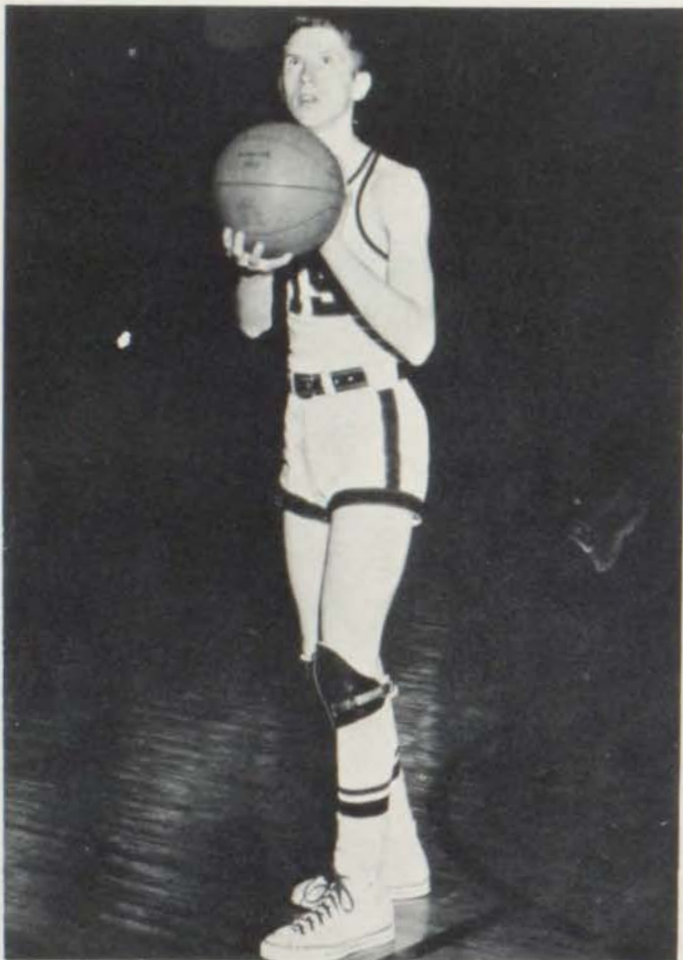

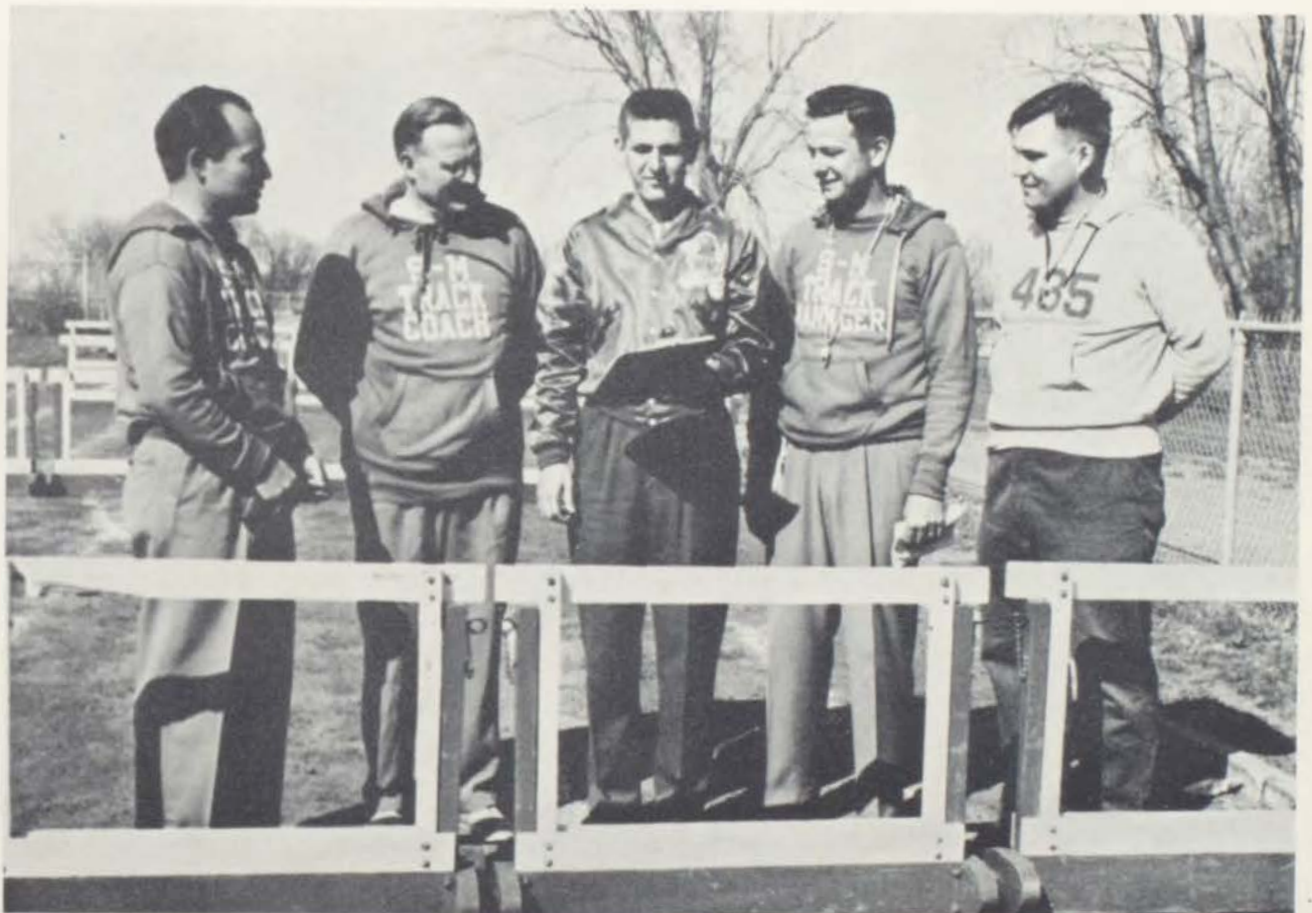

NETMEN CAPTURE FIVE STRAIGHT

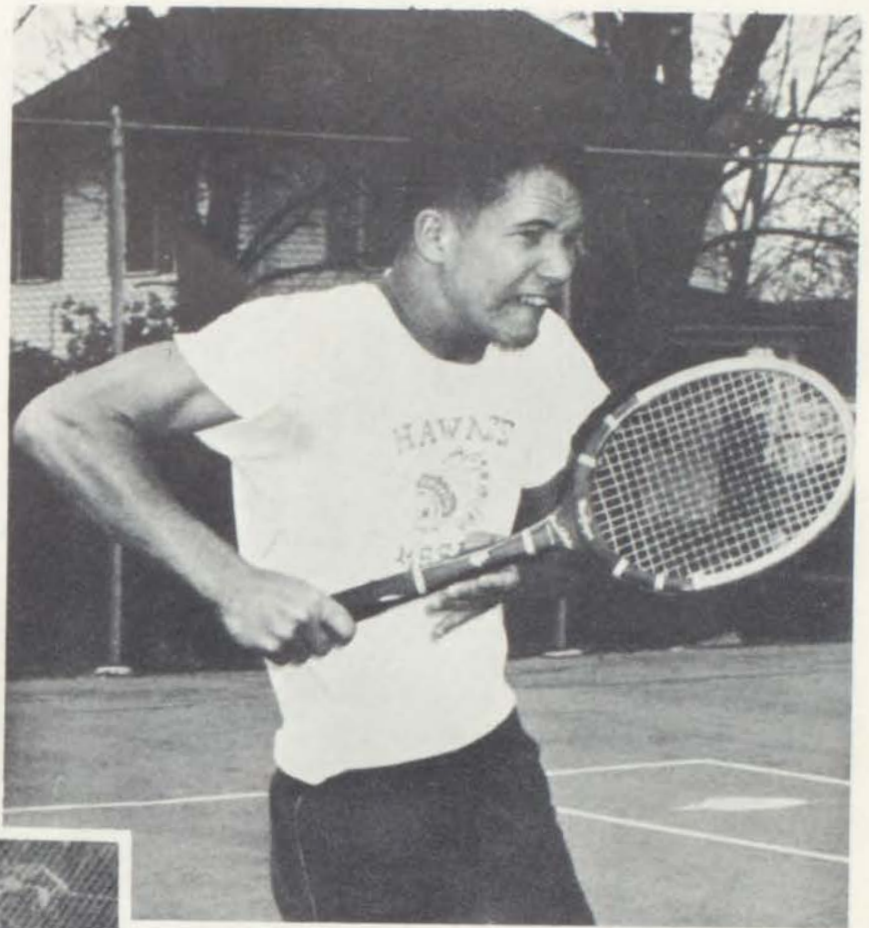

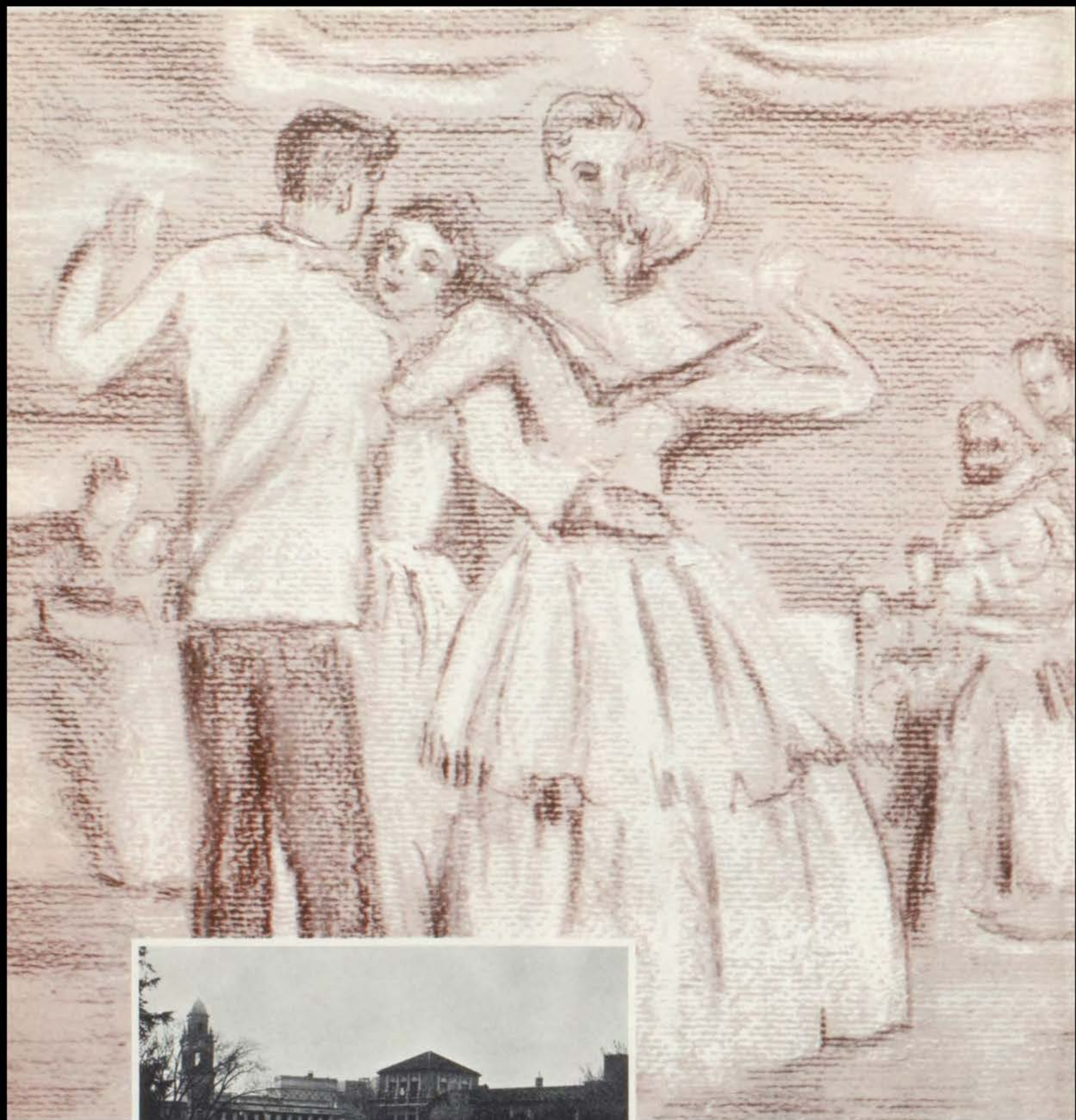
