














As little kids we dreamed of being knights and princesses, living in a faraway castle and having all of our cares and worries locked outside the palace yard. It made us happy . . . for a while.
















As the novelty of our fantasy wore off, our thoughts slowly turned to achievement. To have someone say "Hey, you've done great!"












Although it is sometimes frightening to realize the choice is ours and we must make it by ourselves, other times the feeling of total independence is too exciting to be fearful.














Soon, we will all go on our own separate roads, and our daily committments will multiply with each new adventure we try.


Whether to get married, go to college, be a professional or a skilled laboror, have kids, buy a car, rent or buy a house are all decisions that will confront us shortly.











The Musical **Camelot** is a backward travel in time to the age of chivalry and magic. **Camelot** centers around the characters of King Arthur, Queen Guenevere, the sorcerer and Arthur's teacher Merlin, the evil Mordred, Morgan Le Fay and the Knights of the Round Table.

Hard work and many hours of practice were put into **Camelot**, beginning in January with tryouts for the cast and crews and ending with the performances on February 15,16 and 17. **Mr. Gerald, Snider** directed the play, with **Miss Sharon Wiber** designing and supervising the choreography and **Miss Marie** Lerner leading vocals.

Camelot opens with King Arthur telling his future wife, Guenevere, his wish to be the best and wisest king in history. The play ends with Guenevere and Lancelot duLuc, the most gallant Knight of the Round Table, falling in love and the dramatic consequences it brings about.

Crews create romance



Heritage honors top six seniors


and her court for Sweetheart and presenting the musical Camelot, the 1978-1979 Yearbook staff busied itself with singling out 20 candidates of its own, from among more than 700 seniors, to compete for positions as Heritage royalty members.

Heritage Royalty is unique at South, not because we are the only school which recognizes outstanding achievers, but because it is virtually unknown. "So few students are aware of the qualifications it takes to be nominated," said one yearbook staff member, "that it lessens what is a great honor."

In the midst of choosing a queen candidate must have been involved in at least three major activity area (ie, athletics, scholorship, fine arts, etc.) and an achiever in each of them. Unfortunately though, only about 90 seniors could actually meet these requirements, since most found it difficult to excell in three different areas.

Two Heritage staff members had the difficult job of weeding through each senior summary, cutting off names and quotations and assigning numbers to the top 40. Then the remaining juniors on the staff each voted individually on the 20; 10 guys and 10 girls. Altogether, the process took more than two weeks, the staff felt it was worth it.






Romans come wrapped







Well, I suppose the main thing they have in common is a wish to assist and help others.





Close encounters of an American kind









Vast information aides in winning season


Girls make no waves with boy's swim team


applied to the junior varsity, but an extra special duty was added to the agenda. It was the JV squad who cheered third quarter at the games, replacing the varsity squad.



Helping to promote school spirit the eight yell leaders added their voices and creative stunts to all the football games. Both groups were sponsored by Mrs. Linda Segebrecht.
















"Heh, what are you talking about coach? There has not been a hole in our defensive line the entire playing season. Am I correct?"








The past continues on






ROTC inspires pride




Unity the goal for choir

It was a year of adjustments, but also one of festivities as all three choirs continued to keep their social committees busy.





















Talk jocks attempt to move the world







Top notch students receive recognition











Semi-finalist more than just brains








Standards set for rookies


Injuries were a common problem for the team. To gain the experience




Stairwell Gang reigns


Going for the gold!

For what seemed endless hours and days, mile after weary mile, the varsity road-runners pounded just about every surface imaginable in preparation for their fifth State Championship in 13 years. Even sharp downhill grades and the steepest of hills were subject to the relentless determination of those seven harriers, who ran harder and faster as the season progressed while the rest of the team struggled just to keep pace.

Keeping pace was all anyone could try to accomplish this year though, as the Raiders literally breezed to victory 65-93 and 62-127 in the boys' and girls' respective State Championships in Manhattan, becoming the first team in Kansas history to win both in one year.

That accomplishment wasn't the only first for this team though, as **Brent Steiner** became the first junior ever to go undefeated through an entire season. Brent, whose seven meet and four new course records included a blazing 9:05 clocking at State, was backed up consistently by State runner-up **Steve Smith**, also a junior. Other fine performances during the season were turned in by seniors **Scott Williams** and **Chris (Critter) Miller** who, together with the rest of the squad, gave **Coach Verlyn Schmidt** his fifth undefeated cross-country team in his coaching career.

The season couldn't have looked much brighter for the harriers. After all, for some teams clouds hide even a silver lining, but for South's road-runners, gold is all there is, and it looks like they finally made it over the rainbow.







With a record like theirs, South will probably be hearing more about the girl netters in the future. Certainly they brightened the pages of the Raider Record books with their achievements.





As she planted the tee firmly in the ground, she thought of all the months of hard work, discipline and determination that went into this moment. Thus was the life of a girl's golfer.





With a loud shout of "Oopalay," meaning good luck, the huddled crowd of girls traditionally threw a towel into the air, signifying the opening of another volleyball season.








Sophs build potential as season wears on











JV moves into spotlight







Although the JV was in a shadow, this year the team set a record that brought the JV team out of the dark and into the spotlight.









The thrill of victory ...




Fresh talent promises solid JV, Varsity team


Sophomores dominate Junior Varsity court




'Fish gotta swim... Birds gotta fly'











Anonymous coach deals with school travel hassles




'Coaches-who needs 'em?'






SOPHOMORES Soph budget bulges






Kids romp in woods






Meet me in the park







East pulls snow job




How time files ... JUNIORS







Acting is not all that goes on in the Little Theater. Friendly shouting and chicken fights occurred in order for actors to develop team spirit and get to know one another.


"Everyone got along reasonably well from the beginning, which is unusual," said **Mr. Gerald Snider,** director of the fall play **Androcles and the Lion.**








Cheers pep up band








Nichols finds time

























But out with the old and in with the new. The eighties are just around the corner and there are many roads waiting for us to travel.
