Miss Pryde opens the hotel for guests on a wild stormy night when the activities of a gang of racketeers operating along the coast reaches a climax. One by one strange characters arrive at the hotel. Miss Pryde meets many people but not the type that she

had expected to meet. Among them are Patton, the local leader of the band of gangsters, and his confederates, Dr. Russell, and his wife, Gail. Miss Pryde is compelled to dispose of several of the gangsters single handed. Even the local constable and a famous FBI agent, Matilda Janeway, are impressed by her ability to cope with her "guests".

Throughout these encounters with murderers, secret agents, and corpses, Belinda is strengthened by the presence of Commodore Towser, a friend for twenty years, who she hopes someday will have the courage to propose to her. She meets Mame Duncan, the original owner of the hotel, Mame's son Bill, and many other guests who appear and disappear very mysteriously. The climax of the play comes when Miss Pryde discovers and captures the real leader of the gang.

"Ramshackle Inn" probably ranks as the best play ever produced at Southeast High School. It was highly entertaining. Congratulations to Miss Fetter and every member of the cast.

The C. O. E. vocational program was added to the Southeast curriculum this year. Juniors and seniors who can meet the educational requirements and who are over sixteen years of age may enroll. There are now twenty-two seniors in the class. The first three hours of each school day are spent in class work, after which all C. O. E.

members leave Southeast to work at their place of employment for which they receive regular wages. A minimum of fifteen hours of work is required on each job per week. For this "on the job training," full high school credit is allowed by the school. This credit is accepted by most universities.

The C. O. E. is under the direct supervision of the co-ordinator, Mr. Cecil Coombe, who obtains the jobs, visits the C. O. E. members on their jobs, and works with the employers to obtain better working conditions and improved relations between the students and their employers.

The Reserve Officers Training Corps

MISSION: The mission of the Junior Division ROTC is to lay the foundation of intelligent citizenship within the student and give him such basic military training as will be of benefit and value to him and to the military service, if he becomes a member thereof.

COURSE: The Junior Course consists of formal military instruction of a general type applicable to the Army as a whole. This will require class work of three hours per week for three academic years of not fewer than thirty-two weeks each year.

SUBJECTS: During the three years of the Junior Course the student is taught the following subjects: World Military Situation; Military Organization; Courtesies, Customs, and Rules of Conduct; Leadership, Drill, and Exercise of Command; Physical Development Methods; Individual Weapons and Marksmanship, including the M1 (Garand) Rifle, Browning Automatic Rifle, Carbine, Pistol, Hand and Rifle Grenades, Rocket Launcher (Bazooka), Pyrotechnic Projectors, Snipers' Rifle and Machine Guns, both Cal. .30 and Cal. .50; Hygiene and First Aid; New Weapons and Developments; Communication; Maps and Aerial Photographs; Small Unit Tactics; Military Teaching Methods; Military History of the United States.

COMPETITIONS AND AWARDS: A student may be awarded badges and medals for various achievements; namely, Scholastic Badge, Theoretical Badge, Neatness Badge, and Marksmanship Badge. Silver stars are awarded in lieu of second awards. On Field Day, held toward the end of each school year, medals may be won in competition with all ROTC Units in Kansas City. Medals are also awarded by the Heart of America Legion Post to the three outstanding cadets in the first and second years.

RIFLE TEAM: The Battalion Rifle Team enjoyed a highly successful season, firing the highest score in the Hearst Trophy Match among all high schools in Kansas City. This was also the

highest score fired since 1941 by a Kansas City team. The team finished in third place in the City Match. R. G. Ozias fired the highest score of all competitors entered in this match. Appropriate medals and trophies have been awarded to this team and to R. G. Ozias.

Letters were awarded to the following Rifle Team members: W. E. Wilson, R. A. Duggan, J. C. Schnebelen, R. G. Ozias, J. G. Beck, and R. Anderson, manager.

The Blue Hills Post of the American Legion has sponsored the Battalion in membership in the National Rifle Association and are awarding shooting coats each year to the letter winners on the Rifle Team.

GOVERNMENT INSPECTION: Near the close of each school year, the school is visited by officers detailed by the War Department, Washington, D. C., for the purpose of inspecting the unit. All schools which meet the requirements, both in theoretical and practical instruction, are designated as honor schools and each cadet is authorized to wear a red star on the right sleeve of the blouse or battle jacket.

REGULAR ARMY OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN: Officers and enlisted men are assigned for the purpose of conducting and supervising training in all ROTC Units throughout the United States. Lieutenant Colonel B. E. Edwards has been assigned as Professor of Military Science and Tactics, Kansas City High Schools, and Master Sergeant G. J. Kerr has been assigned as Sergeant Instructor at Southeast High School.

CADET OFFICERS: All Cadet Officers are from the senior class. The Battalion Commander is Cadet Major P. E. Glinn; the Company Commander, Cadet Captain D. L. Smith; the Adjutant, Cadet Second Lieutenant W. E. Wilson. Commanding the First Platoon is Cadet Second Lieutenant H. N. Gardner; commanding the Second Platoon is Cadet First Lieutenant R. T. Ells.




