mental actors, frivolous chorus girls, and a distraught director added to the hilarity of the act.




Girls' Gym Classes








An important phase of school life for many of the Southeast boys is athletics. During this year the boys' physical education classes have provided a variety of sports for their interest. Included in the curriculum are football, soccer, basketball, volley ball, ping-pong singles and doubles, and softball. After learning the rules, rudiments, and finer points, class teams are chosen. The teams compete in a double round robin and the winner is presented a small letter, known as a shield. The all-star teams, chosen from each hour, participate in an elimination tournament until only one team remains. These

winners are awarded K's and are known as school champions.

Two large chenille letters, one for first place and a smaller one for second, are awarded to the two boys who have accumulated or scored the most points. Through a point system, each boy is able to work toward these awards. Two points are obtained by winning a class championship, being a captain of the winning team scores one-half point extra, winning the school championship scores five points, and being a captain of this winning team scores an extra point.

Reserve Officers Training Corps



MISSION: The mission of the Junior Division ROTC is to lay the foundation for intelligent citizenship within the student and give him such basic military training as will be of benefit and value to him and to the military service, if he becomes a member thereof.





