LARRY DEAN AULT—Larry entered Southeast his junior year from Northeast. His favorite subject is science. He plans to become a printer. Larry will work next fall.

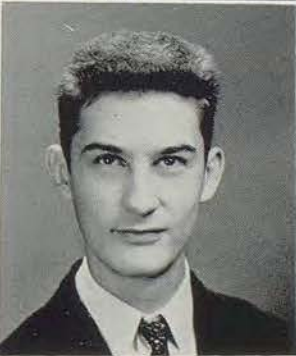

“Down to Earth” is a play of subtle humor and quiet charm, blended with Bettye Knapp’s inimitable light-hearted touch. The Prologue starts with two angels descending to earth to pick up a couple of elderly souls. Their mission is complicated when a mischievous would-be angel, Pilone with only one wing, joins them in a kind of heavenly hitch-hike. The real angels, Wilfred and Agnes, never doubt that Pilone has been sent with them by The Higher Authority for a purpose. He gets into so much mischief that it looks as if the angels might be stranded on earth—the worst fate that could befall them.

The elderly souls who were supposed to be picked up are Augusta Applegate, a wealthy and sarcastic spinster, and Herman Howell, a kindly retired sailor. Herman is ready to go; but Augusta has spent a lifetime accumulating her wealth, and she naturally hates to part with it.

Orpha Teel and Millie Bromsley try vainly to interest their Aunt Augusta in giving her money to them. Orpha is a social climber and a widow with designs on a rich husband for her grown daughter, Ruthie. The other niece, Millie, has an inventor-husband whose inventions have never found a successful market. All that Baxter and Millie need in order to make millions on the gadget is Augusta’s capital—they hope.

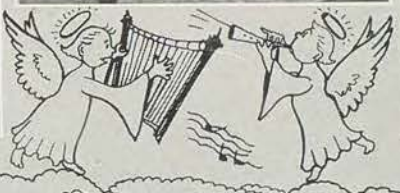
June, the daughter of Millie and Baxter, is engaged to marry Richard White. They want Aunt Augusta to lend them \$1,000 so Richard can buy into a pho-

tography business and thus start them on their two-lane highway to married bliss and financial independence.

Pilone, in his mischief-making, eventually manages things so Augusta gives her money away at just the right moment, but not before he gaily manipulates the romances of three couples involved. He discovers that he has been granted a very special power. He is able to make people fall in love simply with a kiss. When Pilone tests his power on Ruthie, who falls in love with Richard (June’s fiancé), the situation really becomes tense. He later sets things right by kissing Ruthie again, this time making her fall in love with Robert Hanley, the rich hypochondriac; thus, the threads of romance are woven into a happier pattern.

Pilone really puts himself and the two angels on a spot when he kisses Augusta and Herman and makes them fall in love with each other. Augusta and Herman take a stronger grip on life, thus leaving Agnes and Wilfred earthbound until they can find two souls who are willing “to go.”

Diana, Augusta’s frustrated maid, who has just been jilted for the eleventh time, suddenly and dramatically qualifies as an angel. Pilone, who has fallen in love with Diana, comes to a very important decision—that of taking on full-fledged angelhood so he may always be near Diana. He is rewarded with his other wing. The final curtain closes on four happy angels, concentrating with all their might on beginning their return to heaven.

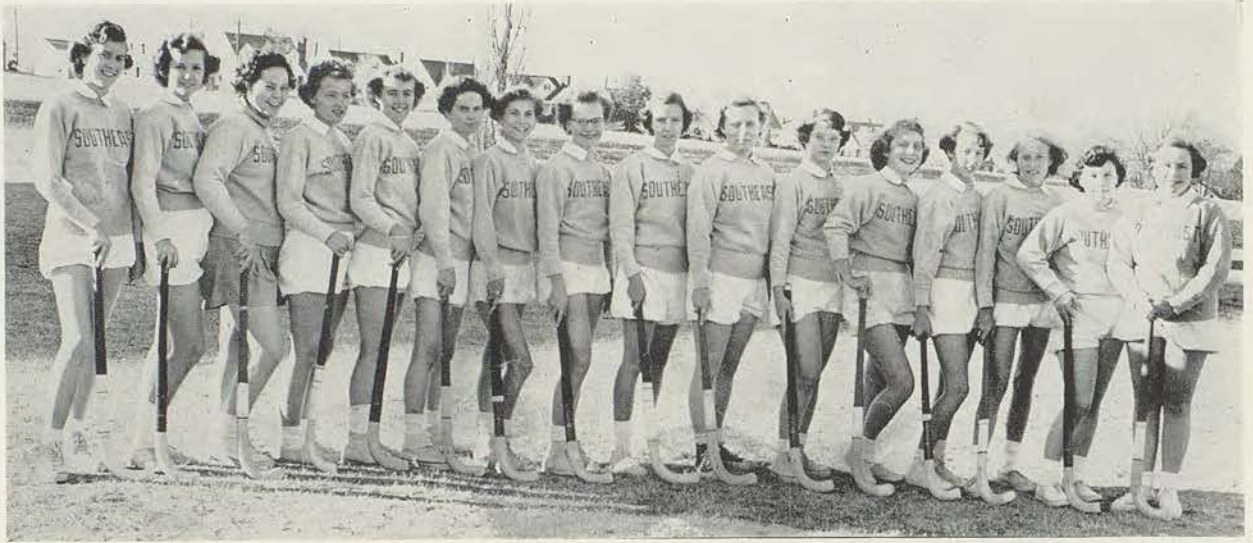
