The courageous loyalty of Knights is truly reflected in the football team of '53. A résumé of the games will best give the criteria of their glorious victories.





in the second quarter, and the reserves took over in the third and fourth quarters. The Hornets managed to score in the final period and the game ended in a 39-13 Knight victory.





Right from the start our boys showed their superb ability by running over their first eight non-conference opponents. Entering the League with eight victories and no defeats, the

The 1953-54 team had the best record of any team in the history of Southeast. They were a wonderful group with a desire to cooperate, train, and win.


Next November the seniors will be missed, but the underclassmen, Hymer, Stanley, Phillips, and Davis will be the nucleus to build another great team.



Teams are organized in each gymnasium class, and these teams compete with every team in the same class of touch football, soccer, ping pong singles and doubles, light and heavy weight basketball, volley ball, and soft ball.

All-star teams are organized in each gymnasium hour. The all-star teams compete against each other. Teams winning class championships are awarded a shield and given two points; also, teams winning

school championships are awarded K's and given five points.

At the end of the year, the boy accumulating the most points is awarded a large chenille shield, and the runner-up is given a smaller chenille shield.

We have the two letter systems in the boys' Physical Education Department-one for the eighth grade and one for the upper classmen with the same system of awards for both groups.

Southeast's Dreams Come True

An audience of parents, teachers, and students gathered on the northeast lawn of the campus to witness the long-awaited groundbreaking ceremony on Tuesday, November 10.

After the invocation by Dr. W. Ross Edwards, Mr. Ray O. Joslin, president of the Board of Education, delivered the address. Then he turned the traditional first shovel of dirt which is symbolic of the beginning of construction, although actual construction began on October 29.

The work is being done by the Winn-Senter Construction Company, the Plaza Electric Company, and the A. D. Jacobson Plumbing Company. The total cost of the construction will be \$811,128. The addition will include an art room, a science laboratory, a drafting room, a large study hall, six rooms for English and social studies, two girls' rooms, storage space, lockers, dressing rooms, a swimming pool, and a balcony for the auditorium.

The addition will be built to conform to the present Southeast style of architecture. The classrooms, however, will be modern in style with a varied color scheme for the walls.

In the northeast wing, our new gymnasium will be built to meet the needs of our growing school and make it possible for sports events to be held here at Southeast. The outside area of the gymnasium will be 104 feet by $86\frac{1}{2}$ feet which will include the actual playing area and room for 1228 spectators to sit. The actual

playing area will measure 84 feet by 45 feet. A movable partition will divide the gymnasium in half. Thus it will be possible to have two areas for physical education classes and one large area for sports events.

Underneath the gymnasium will be a boys' locker room, a drafting room, and the woodshop extension. The girls will use the boys' present dressing room and their own present one as well. Also, the northeast section of the ground floor will provide a new drafting room. The old drafting room will become a vocal music room. The wood shop will be enlarged to the north of the present room.

The inside area of the swimming pool will be 60 feet by 21 feet which is the standard size for the establishment of contest records. The pool will be surfaced with blue-green ceramic tile, and it will be equipped with a diving board. A girls' new locker room with shower facilities and electric hair dryer will be built for use with the pool.

There will be a balcony added in the auditorium which will seat approximately 500 people, thus making the total seating capacity of the auditorium 1592. Fire doors and an extra exit from the cafeteria will be built to conform with fire regulations.

We of Southeast are very grateful to everyone who has made this addition possible. We realize the tremendous effort and expense involved in it, and we will do our best to prove worthy of our fine building.
