


Stephens Gains Five Yards









The Southeast B-Squad went down in their opening game of the 1955 season to the North Kansas City Hornets by a score of 13-6.

Defense was a must, and boys like J. Sheffield, R. Skates, W. Fuqua, and J. Church, never let the team down.


The highlight of the season was the 6 to 6 tie against the Southeast sophomore team.




