May the SPIRIT of Southeast remain with you.

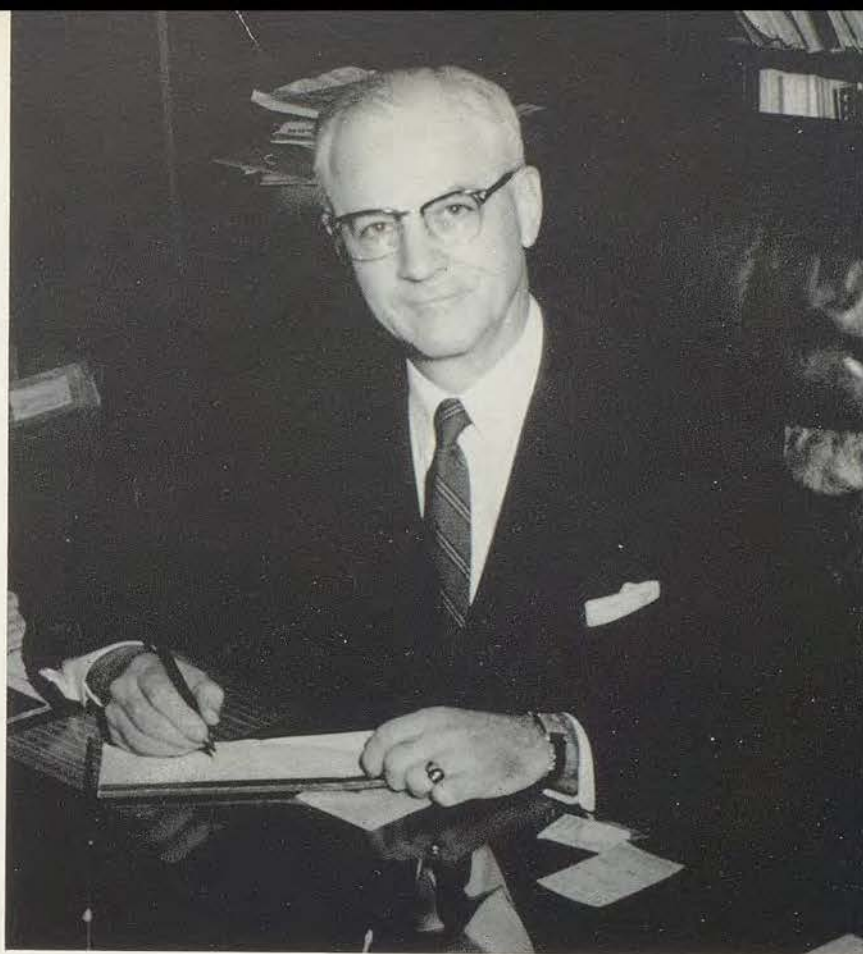

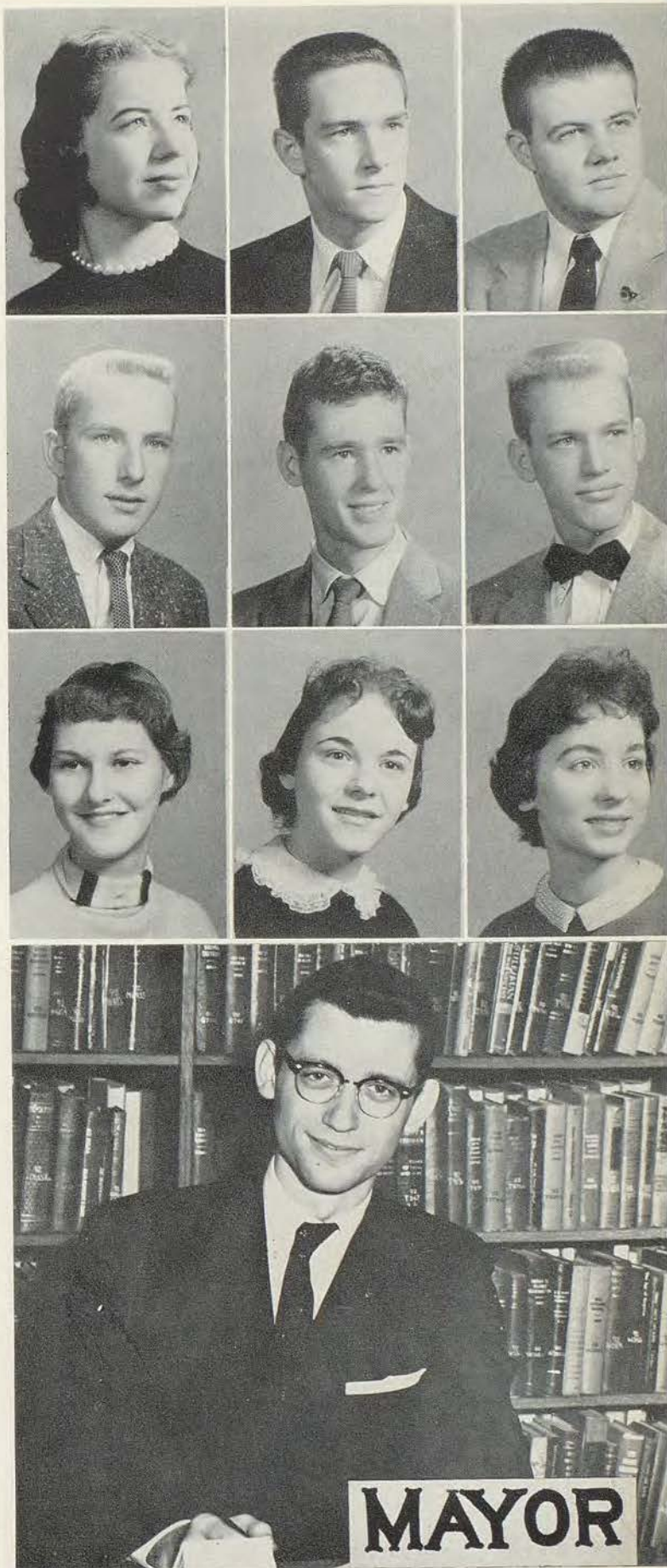
Mayor for a Day

the third was on a North Kansas City fumble with Snyder going over the goal line. The final score was 20-14.

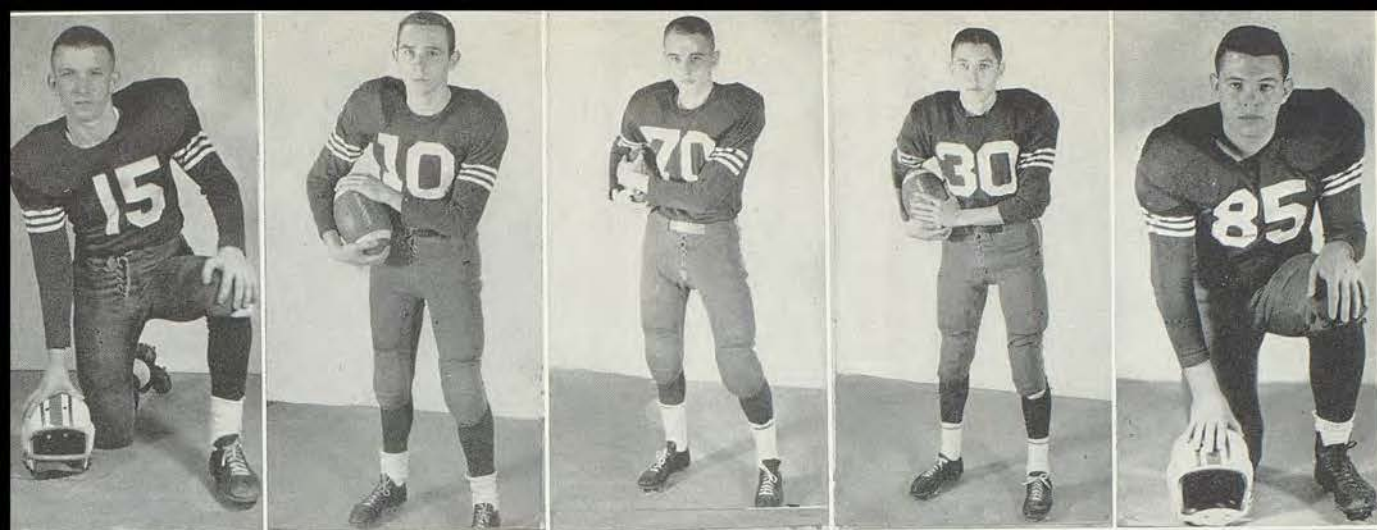

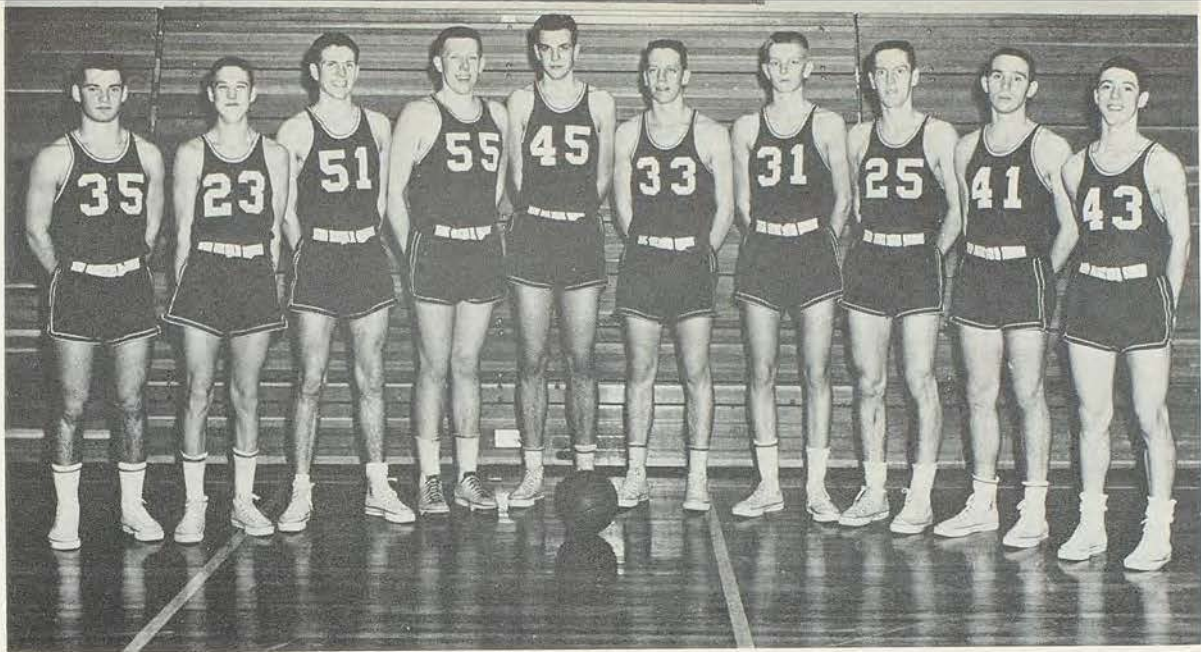

Ron Durns and Skip Snyder were elected as

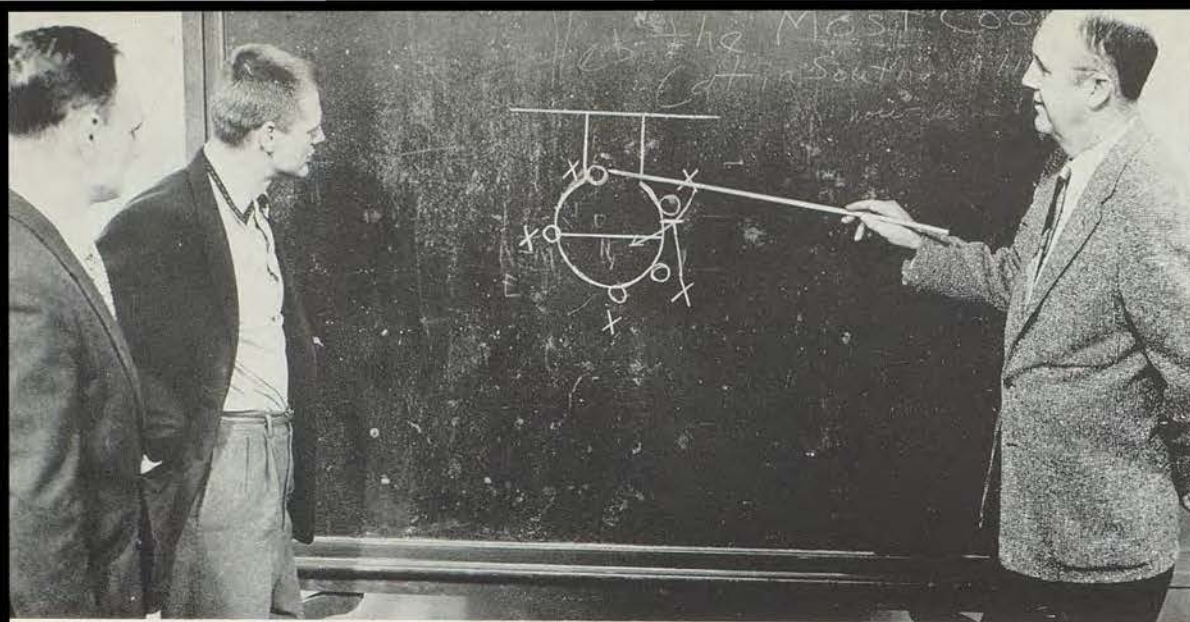
honorary co-captains at the end of the season.
