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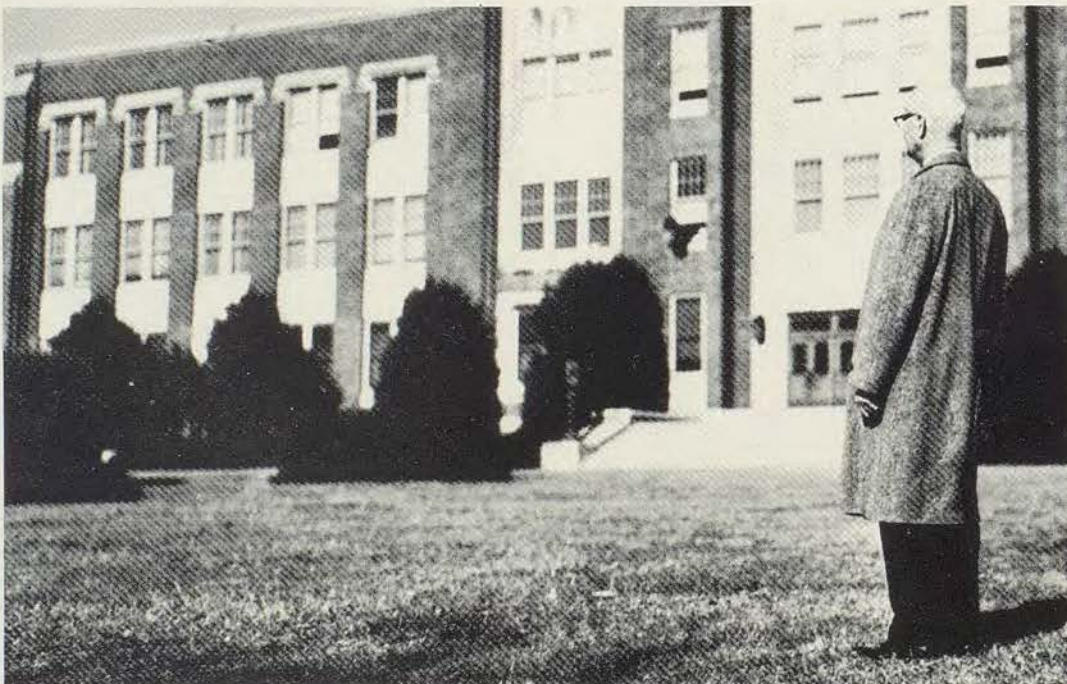
In Memoriam

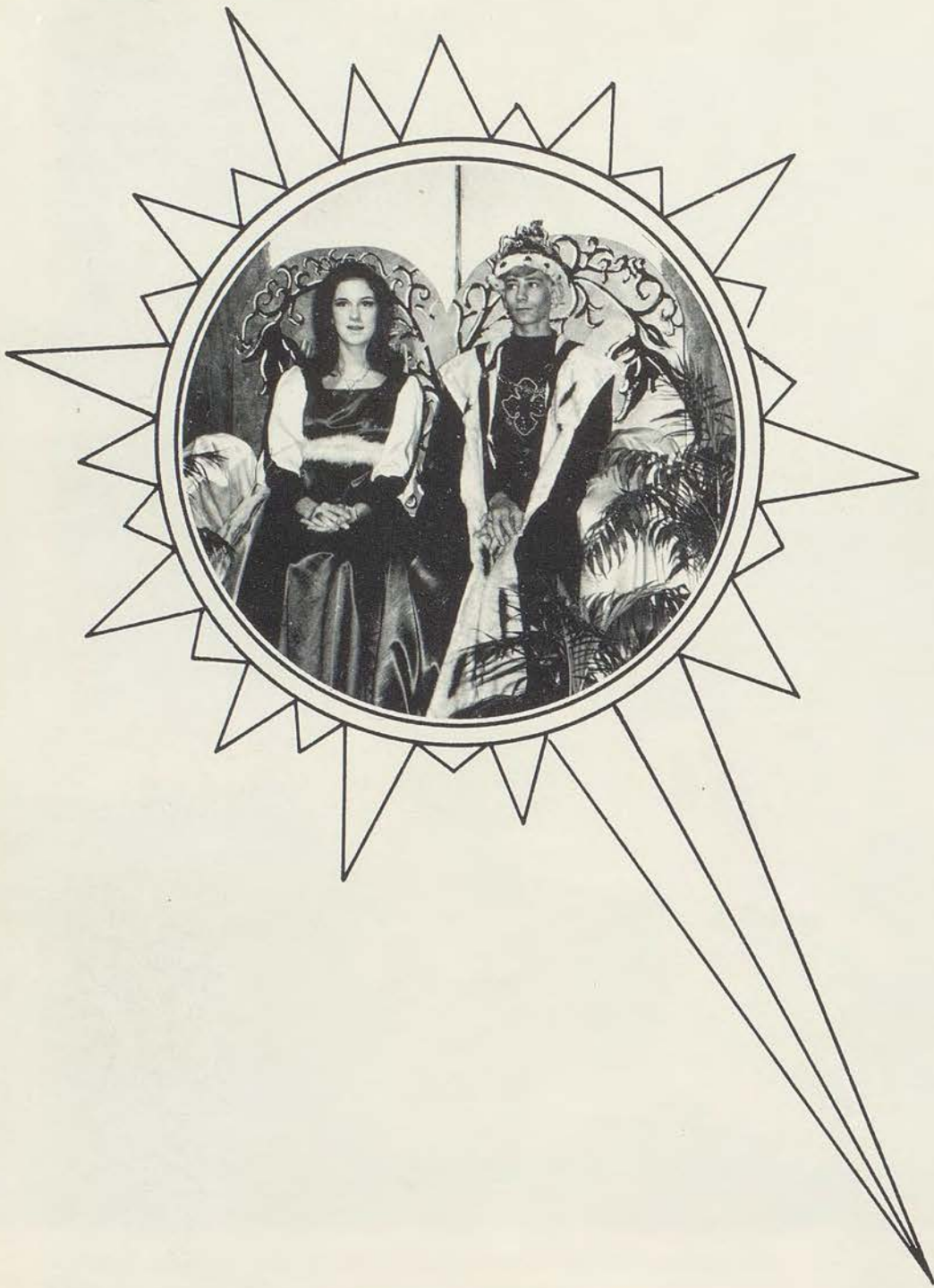

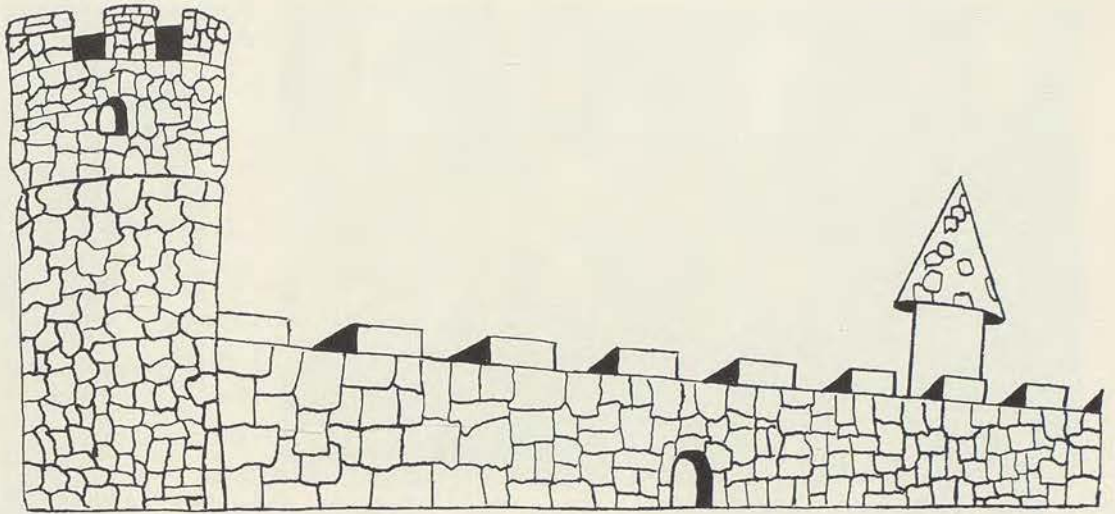
"Senior Couples" was a mixture of *Rowan and Martin's Laugh-In* and *Mission: Impossible*, and characters ranged from cowboys to girls.

The annual Christmas assembly was displayed December 20, just before the beginning of winter vacation. Tepa was presented a Christmas present from the school.

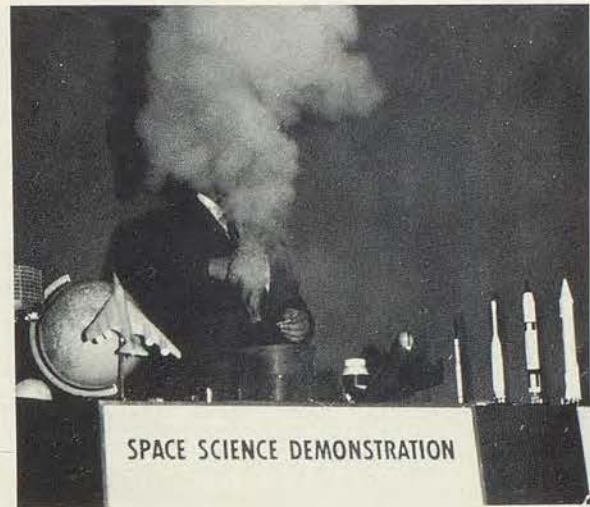
Southeast's first science assembly was received this year by an enthusiastic student body. A lecturer and demonstrator from NASA gave an enlightening talk about America's space program.

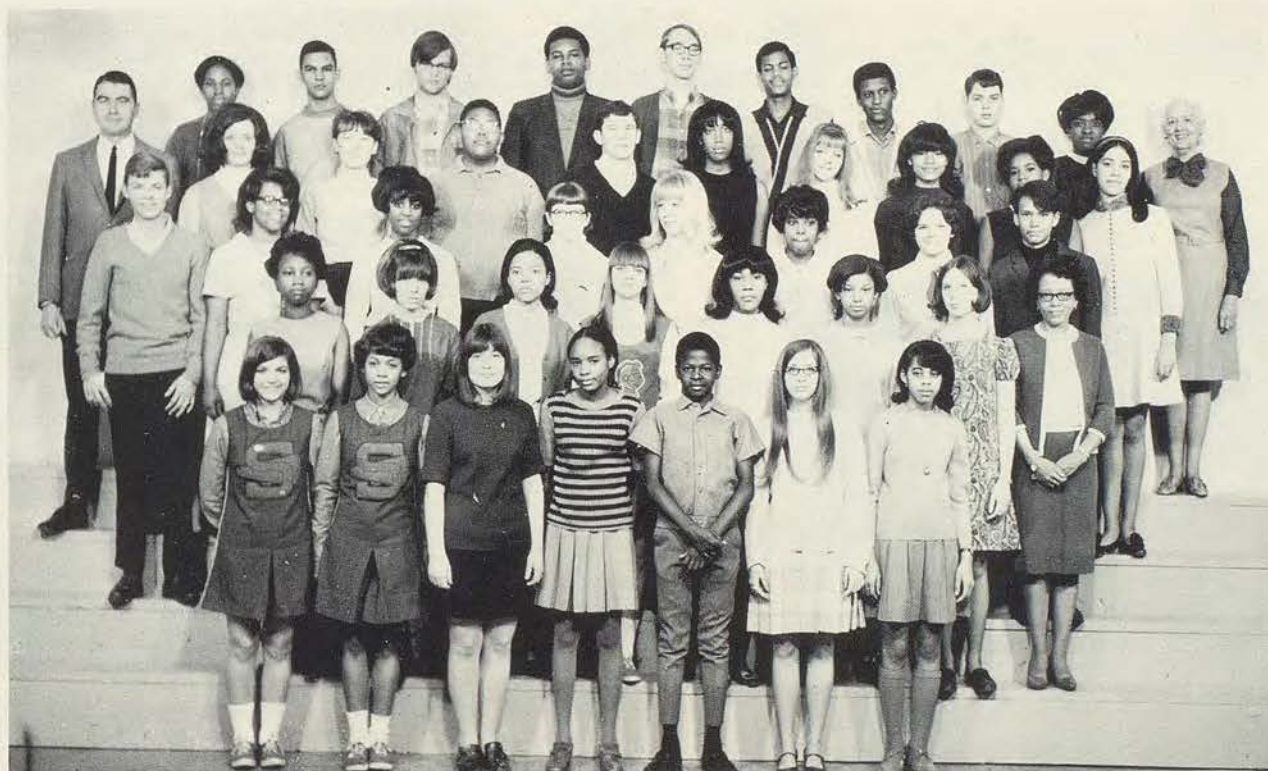

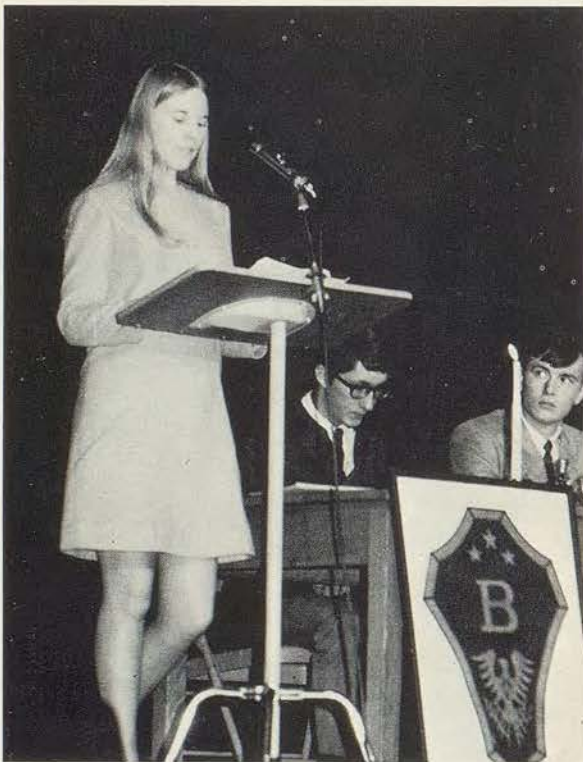

The Southeast ROTC drill team won a first place in city-wide competition, and the Kansas City Star Award has been acquired by Southeast for the past seven years.

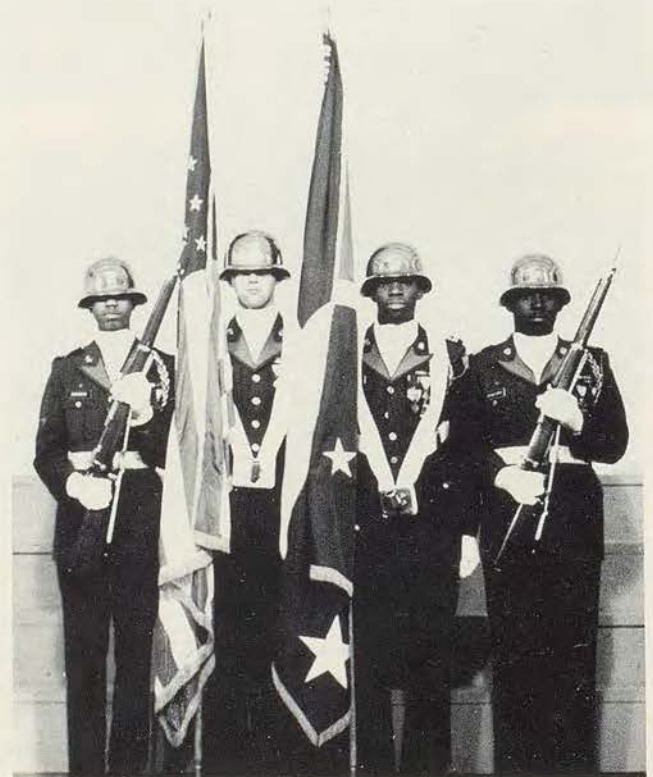

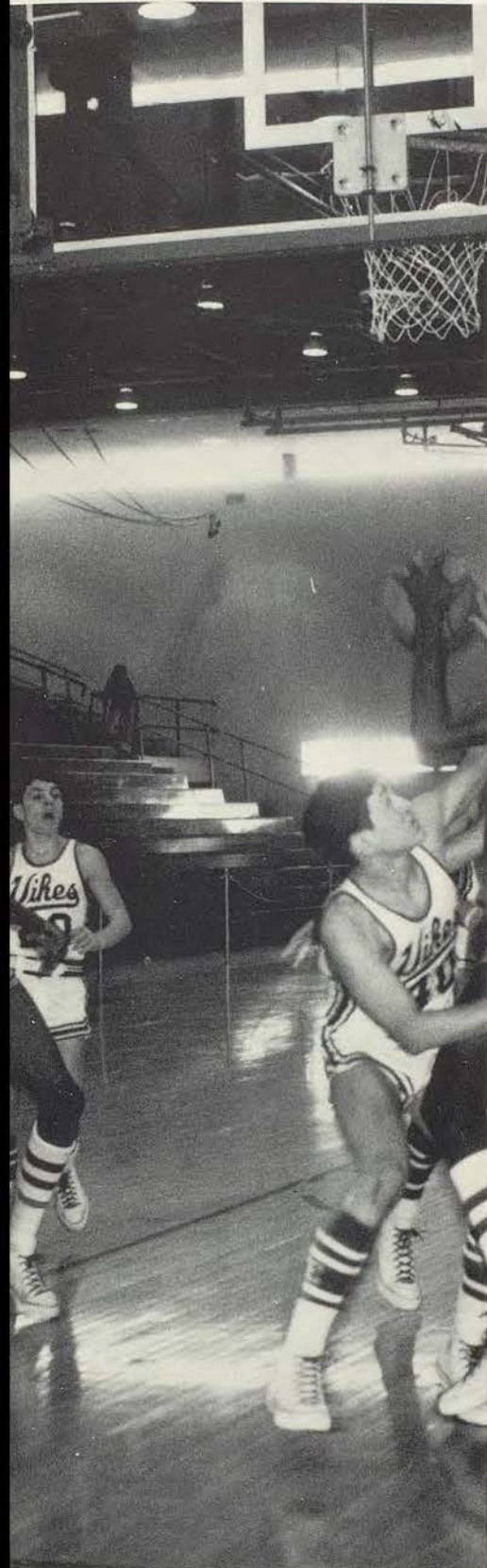

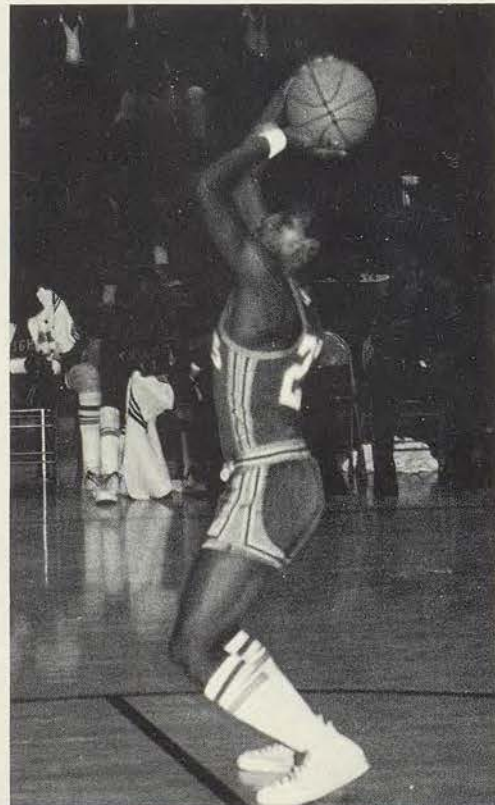

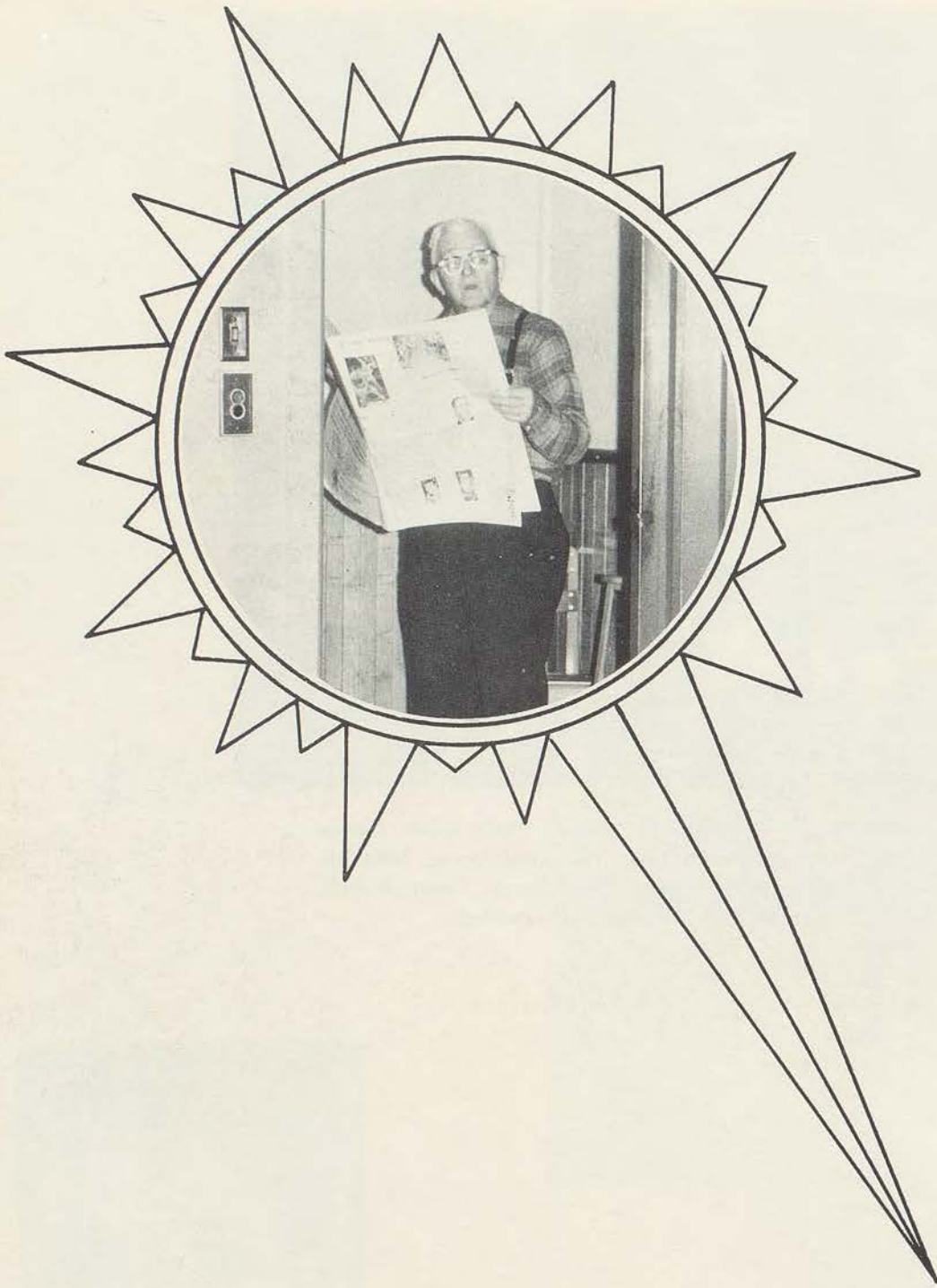

Science Inclusive with Experiments, Discovery

The two required units in science may be acquired through various courses.

General science is useful in helping the student decide which area in which he wishes to specialize.

Human science and biology involve the study of all various forms of life.

The study of the body as a working machine and the organization of each part is the program followed by those studying human science. The BSCS program of study for biology encourages experimentation through laboratory work. Dissection plays an important role in this work in both first and second year biology courses.

To help to further develop the ability and desire to experiment, chemistry is available and recommended for those planning to attend college. Use of the laboratory gives the student a chance to put theories into action and make his own discoveries. Chemistry texts and lab manuals are changed frequently to keep up with the latest discoveries.

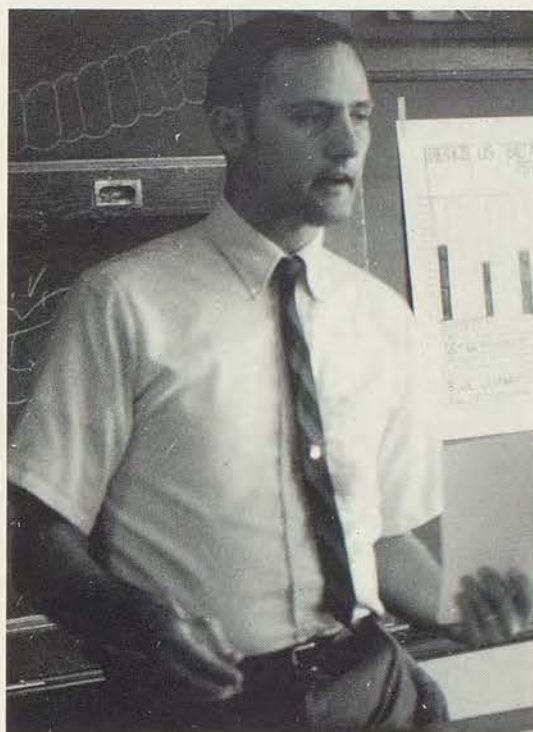

Six Mathematic Levels Prepare Computing Students for Future

The mathematics department at Southeast is designed to serve all the students. Courses ranging from general math to college math give the students a wide selection and the advanced student the chance to acquire a high degree of mathematical skill.

The freshman may start his math education with general math, which reviews basic skills, or he may go on to learn a new approach to math equations in Algebra I.

He may then proceed to geometry, in which he learns theories and properties of plane figures and uses them to prove other theories and calculate measurements of other plane figures.

In Advanced Algebra the student becomes further involved with mathematical equations and formulas. He also uses trigonometric functions and logarithms in working problems.

If his interest is great enough, the student is given the chance to take an even more advanced class, trigonometry. The truly ambitious student may take College Math, which will orient him with the problems he will encounter in college math classes.

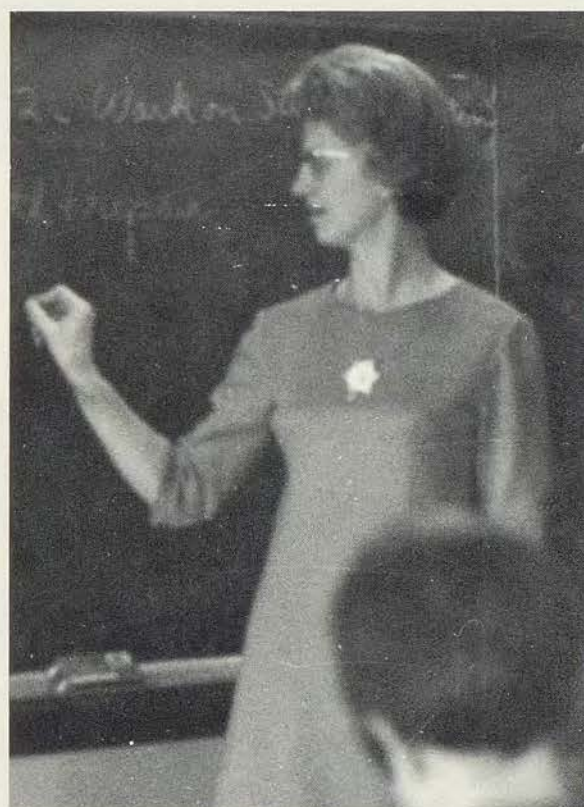

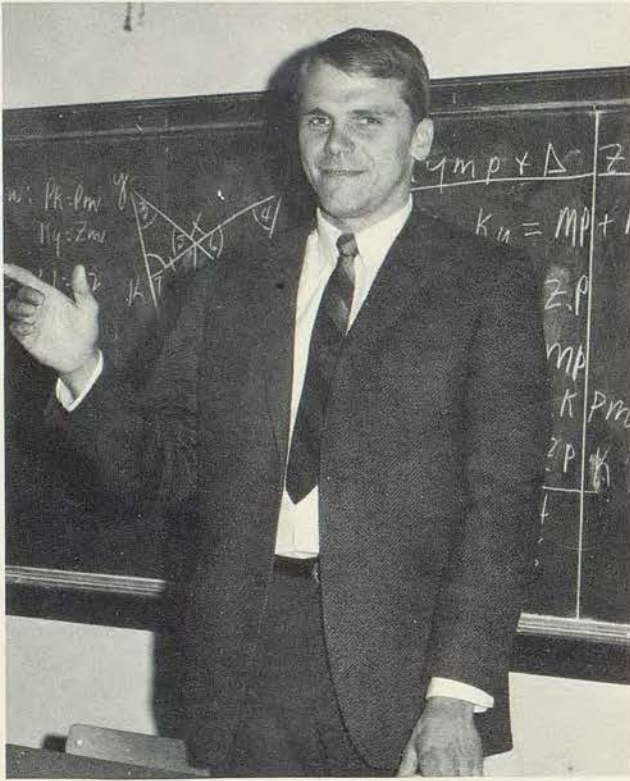

Composing the industrial arts department are drafting, wood, metal, art metal and electricity classes. Sometimes leading to future jobs and hobbies, these courses develop the manual skills.

Aided by modern workshops, wood, metal and electricity students produce various projects, ranging from household items to commercial furniture.

Art metal, unlike other industrial arts classes, is frequented by girls.

After learning the fundamentals of drafting, students can enroll in technical, mechanical or architectural drafting. In these classes they learn advanced principles of drafting, including house planning and machinery assembly.

Home Economics and Business Lead to Careers

Through the study of home economics courses and business courses, the student prepares for future life, whether it be domestic or business.

Home economics includes foods, clothing, child development and home decoration. Homemaking, composed mainly of freshmen, gives girls an over-all view of various aspects of living. In foods students learn to prepare and serve nutritional but inexpensive meals. Although taken mostly by girl students, a few boys venture to learn cooking for their own personal benefit. Creating a neat wardrobe at a moderate cost, as well as developing a sense of accomplishment, is the goal of clothing classes.

Child development and home decoration further prepare the girl for her role as a homemaker. For those girls with no previous home economics training, senior homemaking provides a broad view of the field.

Business courses, including business, accounting, stenography, typing and clerical practice, teach students the practical application of skills in business. The use of skills gained through these courses prove to be of help in school as well as in business.
