

#### Southeast Takes League Title 52-48

Stevie Burks scored five of his 29 points in the last 1:45 Saturday to lead Southeast High School to a 52-48 squeaker over Lincoln for the Interscholastic League championship.

Central High overcame a 33-16 halftime deficit and dumped Paseo 73-60

for third place.

Burks, who was awarded the George Taylor Memorial award as the game's most valuable player, led all scorers. Tony Snow had 16 points for Lincoln.

Lincoln pulled to within one point with 44 seconds to play when Brian Harris, who had 10 points on the night. sank two free throws and made it 47-46, Southeast. Burks came back eight

seconds later to hit a field goal and pull Southeast away. He added one from the charity stripe with 17 seconds to go to make it 50-46 and put it virtually out of reach for Lincoln.

Dr. Barbara Fulton, career educa-tion specialist and counselor in behav-ioral studies at the University of Mis-souri-St. Louis, told teachers and ad-ministrators at the Kanasa City School District's career education workshop that such programs are not only for junior and senior high school students. Dr. Fulton has been helping educa-tors prepare and improve career edu-cation programs since 1971. She has served as counsel to Sidney Martind, former commissioner of education, and advised administrators on how to include career education in their pro-grams.

grams

The main objective of career education, Dr. Fulton vaid, "is to teach students what the responsibilities of different professions are and to help them choose occupations that they will be happy doing for 20 years or more.

She mentioned a need to involve career education in all classes, not just the ones that are geared for students going into business or bound for college.

Career education helps educators as well as students, she said, because it teaches them of students needs and helps them asked educational reclaim.

In addition, project coordina-tor Dick Wright has led weekly history sessions on Young, Coltrane, Charlie Parker, Count Basie and Billie Holliday, drawing on his rare film collection of jazz artists.

The entire school got a taste of what was going on in the music department

through assemblies held during "Black History Week" featuring the Kansas City Jazz Quintet, a local group that performs exclusively for Young Audiences.

"The basic idea," explained B.J. Bucker, executive director of Young Audiences, "was to present to a crosssection of high school students the rich Kansas City jazz heritage plus the current jazz scene, as well as to allow young aspiring instrumentalists to work with professionals in clinic situa-tions." She said Southeast was chosen because an excellent jazz and stage band program led by Charles Dorch already existed there.

# Raging Waters Kill 18

A ravaging flood, one of the worst natural disasters in the area's history, has killed at least 18 persons in Kansas City and surrounding areas and devastated many areas of the city.

Police in Kansas City were searching for as many as 40 missing persons. Suburban police departments were searching for dozens

The plush Country Club Plaza area was among the hardest hit last night and early today. There, damage was caused by both the raging waters of Brush Creek and a massive explosion and fire that destroyed most of the 600 block of West 48th.

Robert Kipp, city manager, contacted Mayor Charles B. Wheeler in London today, telling him, "The physical destruction is disastrous beyond description."

City officials said today the flooding along Brush Creek was at the so-called "500-year level"—meaning that it is the kind of flood expected to occur once every five centuries.

Tales of heroism and human suffering abounded as heavy thun-derstorms moved through the area, knocking out electricity, telephones and natural gas service. Thousands of homes were damaged by rearing waters from usually tame creeks and drainage ditches. Basements were inundated by water pouring in from outside or by belching sewer lines backing up.

Hundreds of persons had to flee their homes and seek shelter from the rising waters.




Cleanup






### The Visit To Atlanta, Georgia Provides A Picturesque Setting Of The South For Southeast Underclassmen
