Southeast Takes League Title 52-48

Stevie Burks scored five of his 29 points in the last 1:45 Saturday to lead Southeast High School to a 52-48 squeaker over Lincoln for the Inter-scholastic League championship.

A Night of Jazz at Southeast

Students at Southeast High School who normally spend time with Bach and Brahms have been making the acquaintance of Lester Young and John Coltrane in the classroom these days.

through assemblies held during "Black History Week" featuring the Kansas City Jazz Quintet, a local group that performs exclusively for Young Audiences.

The occasion has been Young Audiences' Jazz Intensity Project. A new undertaking for Young Audiences (the local chapter of the national organization that brings musical programs to schools), the results of the project go on public display at 7:30 p.m. Thursday when Southeast's jazz and stage bands join six well-known area musicians in concert at the school.

"The basic idea," explained B.J. Bucker, executive director of Young Audiences, "was to present to a cross-section of high school students the rich Kansas City jazz heritage plus the current jazz scene, as well as to allow young aspiring instrumentalists to work with professionals in clinic situations." She said Southeast was chosen because an excellent jazz and stage band program led by Charles Dorch already existed there.

Clinicians Milt Abel, Ron McCurdy, Tommy Ruskin, Danny Embry, Bob Ousley and Bill Drybread have been working with Southeast groups since Jan. 23. In addition, project coordinator Dick Wright has led weekly history sessions on Young, Coltrane, Charlie Parker, Count Basie and Billie Holliday, drawing on his rare film collection of jazz artists.

Specialist's Advice

Career Education for All Ages

Career education should begin the day students enter kindergarden, a career education specialist told school officials Saturday.

Dr. Barbara Fulton, career education specialist and counselor in behavioral studies at the University of Missouri-St. Louis, told teachers and administrators at the Kansas City School District's career education workshop that such programs are not only for junior and senior high school students.

Dr. Fulton has been helping educators prepare and improve career education programs since 1971. She has served as counsel to Sidney Marland, former commissioner of education, and advised administrators on how to include career education in their programs.

"The main objective of career education," Dr. Fulton said, "is to teach students what the responsibilities of different professions are and to help them choose occupations that they will be happy doing for 20 years or more."

She mentioned a need to involve career education in all classes, not just the ones that are geared for students going into business or bound for college.

One of the keys to a successful career education program, Dr. Fulton said, is giving students the chance to associate with and talk to various vocations.

"One of the ways to do this idea is to teach students to interview people in the day school," she said.

Children learn most about employment opportunities and related responsibilities by asking questions of people they meet at grocery stores, banks, schools, department stores and other places they visit, she said.

Dr. Fulton said one popular misconception about career education is that it is only for the slower high school students or the ones who seem as if they'll never amount to anything.

"However," she said, "people who are under this assumption are wrong, because career education is for all students, whether or not they are smart or dumb, rich or poor, or ambitious or unmotivated."

Career education helps educators as well as students, she said, because it teaches them of students' needs and helps them avoid educational redundancies such as "learning about the hazards of tooth decay and the effects of the Civil War seven times in their primary education."

Raging Waters Kill 18

A ravaging flood, one of the worst natural disasters in the area's history, has killed at least 18 persons in Kansas City and surrounding areas and devastated many areas of the city.

Police in Kansas City were searching for as many as 40 missing persons. Suburban police departments were searching for dozens more.

The plush Country Club Plaza area was among the hardest hit last night and early today. There, damage was caused by both the raging waters of Brush Creek and a massive explosion and fire that destroyed most of the 600 block of West 48th.

Robert Kipp, city manager, contacted Mayor Charles B. Wheeler in London today, telling him, "The physical destruction is disastrous beyond description."

City officials said today the flooding along Brush Creek was at the so-called "500-year level"—meaning that it is the kind of flood expected to occur once every five centuries.

Tales of heroism and human suffering abounded as heavy thunderstorms moved through the area, knocking out electricity, telephones and natural gas service. Thousands of homes were damaged by roaring waters from usually tame creeks and drainage ditches. Basements were inundated by water pouring in from outside or by backing sewer lines backing up.

Hundreds of persons had to flee their homes and seek shelter from the rising waters.

ris A. Yale, 29, of Blue Springs, whose body was recovered near a creek 1/4 of a mile from R.D. Miss Road and 6th Street in Blue Springs.

Earlier in the day the body of the Rev. Harold A. Thomas, 62, of 4010 W. 98th, Fairway, was discovered at U.S. 30 and Benton in Kansas City, almost 4 miles east of where he disappeared Monday night. He was a pastor of the Linwood United Church.

As the search for victims continued, hundreds of city employees, utility company workers and private contractors worked around the clock to bring some semblance of order to the chaos created by the flood.

Electricity, natural gas and telephone service were gradually restored to most customers, the utility companies said yesterday, and only the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company reported any major problems.

A spokesman for the phone company said 10,000 phone connections had been repaired or replaced since the flooding Monday night, but as fast as crews could replace the lines they discovered new problems. The spokesman estimated that 12,000 phone lines still must be put back in service and said the problems are spread throughout the metropolitan area. Some lines, he said, may not be back in service before tomorrow.

Most major roads closed by the flooding were opened by rush hour yesterday, with the major exception being Chouteau Trafficway in Kansas City, North. That road was closed because of damage to the dam at Winwood Lake, just south of I-35 a half-block east of Chouteau. Chouteau was closed last night from I-35 south to Parvin Road.

Officials said the dam at the 14-acre lake was so weakened that the lake was being drained, perhaps spelling the end for the old private lake that once was a popular swimming spot for thousands.

Schools and businesses that had been closed because of the flooding

were open in most areas, including the General Motors Assembly Plant in the Leeda area, where workers were told to report for duty yesterday afternoon.

Electrical power to the G.M. plant was disrupted Monday because of flooding at the Kansas City Power & Light Co. Leeda substation at 4155 Raytown Road. Don Landes of R.C.P. & L. said that the substation was being cleaned of mud and water yesterday and that six circuits had been restored, giving power to the G.M. plant and to the nearby Harry S. Truman Sports Complex, where about 18,000 persons attended the Kansas City Royals Oakland A's doubleheader last night.

Landes and Al Singer of the Gas Service Company both reported that service had been restored "to most customers who have requested it," but about 1,000 customers of each company were unable to have power restored because of standing water.

Robert Wheeler, Kansas City superintendent of schools, yesterday toured six schools damaged by the floods and announced that Leeds Junior High School, 3441 Fremont, would reopen today and that transportation schedules would be back to normal there. All schools in the district will be open today, he said, but school will be out tomorrow for teacher workshops.

Cleanup

Officials reported that cleanup operations throughout the area are going smoothly, although police broadcast an appeal for persons to stay away from the Country Club Plaza area so operations there could continue without interruptions.

City officials said a traffic plan for the Plaza would be worked out so that shoppers going to the Plaza stores still in operation could come and go without interrupting cleanup operations. Shoppers were asked to leave the area directly after finishing their shopping.

Robert Kipp, city manager, said city employees, many of whom were pulled off their regular work details to help in flood cleanup operations, will go through the Plaza today to make sure safety hazards such as loose wires and open manholes are removed.

Glen Hopkins, deputy city manager, was assigned to supervise assistance to other flood-damaged areas.

In the flooded areas along the Blue River from 13th Street south to 68th, extra plastic trash bags were being distributed.

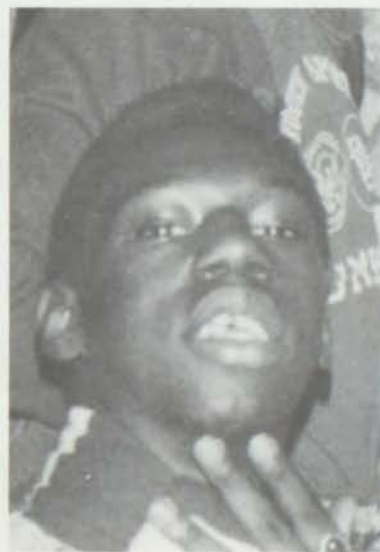
This year's Varsity basketball team under the superb coaching of Lee Durham, finished the season with a 15-6 record.
