

Seniors lined up for the group picture. The Class of 1999 will have 183 graduates, the biggest class in over fifteen years.



CNA stands for Certified Nursing Assistant. Students work with the goal to earn certification by graduation. The CNA certificate gives students a head start on their career plan to enter the medical field. These students have plans to be pediatricians, LPNs, RNs, etc. As part of their training, CNA students go to nursing homes where they assist with making beds, giving baths, feeding residents, or just talking and having fun with patients. Latrice Adams said "The first day at Park Place Nursing Home I experienced the death of a resident. It was scary!" Irene Ruiz said "It was scary and I was nervous." "It was informative and I loved it." said LaShonda West.

WHAT IS CPR?

CPR must be learned by taking a course from a certified instructor. Students learned CPR from their teacher, Ms. Sharbel. According to the American Heart Association two-man CPR is no longer used by basic-emergency care providers; however, at Southeast students learn the two-man method and receive certification. They are taught how to use a mouth guard to protect themselves from the transmission of AIDS. Southeast students are now certified and prepared to save lives using CPR.

"The students have been thoroughly wined and dined at Park Place. They have been accepted with open arms to do their 100 hours of clinical training which could lead to a job second semester through co-op education," stated Mary Sharbel.
