### Greetings: new students, faculty and the "village" HARAMBEE Southeast: the first African-centered high school in the USA

African-centered education, ACE, is a way of life at Southeast in 2000-2001. Students apply the Code of Ma'at and the Nguzo Saba to their lives and their studies. Regular Harambees help unite students and remind them of their heritage, as well as recognize students for outstanding academic performance.

A new course taught by Danny Hinds created the Ngoma Performing Arts Ensemble, a group of drummers and dancers. Each Harambee began with drumming. They enjoyed the opportunity to learn and perform.



The Libation is an ancient African Ritual done at the beginning of every important event. The Libation is a symbolic practice to show respect and reverence to the Ancestors, who left us their legacy, struggled and sacrificed so that we could be where we are now. The Libation signifies our oneness with the Ancestors, and with all African people, past, present, and future. Tierra Turner led the Libation. She said, "The Libation is a good way to remember our ancestors and what they did." Southeast has twice-monthly Harambees. Principal Sandra Beasley leads the faculty into the auditorium to open Harambee.





## Jambo! Ngoma Performing Arts Ensemble brings drumming and dance to Southeast

After just a few weeks in Mr. Hinds' class, girls danced for the students. They had learned basic steps and put them together for their performance. DeAudra White is most excited about this class because it challenges her physically and she likes to be in Harambee.





Junior James Armstrong paid close attention at the first Harambee. Students responded favorably. Jessica Huggins likes going to an ACE school because she learns about her heritage. She said, "That's real important to me. More students should be educated in their culture." Tiesha Brown concurred. She said, "I like to learn about my heritage and I learned that it is true you don't always have to be taught by a book to learn."



Harambee begins with drumming. Danny Hinds demonstrated the power of the drum called a Djembe. Hinds, a native of Barbados, teaches drumming and African dance which he learned first in the community, later in a professional setting at Yoruba Foundation. He said, "Training in African dance and music promotes discipline, enhances learning skills and provides a connection of thought and action."





#### **Kimberly White**


