



The staff of the Southwest SACHEM dedicates our 1989 yearbook to art teacher Ben Ireland. Mr. Ireland, known as Big Ben to at least a couple of members of the SACHEM staff, has been a part of the Southwest faculty since 1964. Room 404, where Mr. Ireland stands tall (pun intended), has been the scene of much activity over the years.

From 1976 to 1983, Mr. Ireland served as coach of the girls' swim team, and from 1977 to 1983, he was also coach of the boys' swim team. During these years and even now, he is an avid fan of cross-country, track, football, basketball, vocal music, instrumental music and anything else that Southwest Indians participate in. He has always been, and continues to be, a supporter of the SACHEM and TRAIL. Serving as a Chiefs' car parker, he also assisted groups in raising money to support extracurricular activities when that money was not forthcoming from the District.

Throughout the years, he helped design and create backdrops and props for Redskin Revels, the all school plays. senior plays, and operettas. Homecoming signs and signs for parents' nights at athletic functions were also created by Mr. Ireland and produced by his art students. Many of the murals over the doors and around the building resulted from planning by Mr. Ireland. His most recent project in this area is the mosaic in the cafeteria.

As a college student, Mr. Ireland played basketball for Kansas State University (then known as Kansas State College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences). In 1951, he married Patricia Darby and subsequently became the father of four children. Of course, these children all became Southwest Indians and graduated from Southwest High School where they distinguished themselves as school leaders. One little known fact around Southwest is that one Mr. Ireland's paintings. "Crystaline Structure" chosen to be sent on a tour of America South as representative of fine produced in the United States. This painting today hangs in his home where it is enjoyed by his friends.

Mr. Ireland is known around school for his good nature and humor as well as his artistic talent. At one time, when the

SACHEM still voted the equivalent of a "teacher ballot", Mr. Ireland was consistently voted "most humorous". His dry sense of humor is still widely appreciated today by those students who are privileged to spend time in Room

His service to the Kansas City Missouri School District began in 1956, and during the first thirty years he taught in the district, he only missed one day of school due to illness. The last couple of years have not found him in quite such good health. During the 1987-88 school year, Mr. Ireland underwent triple bypass surgery and was unable to finish the school year. This is his final year of teaching and those of us who will still be here next year will miss him. We will miss his good teaching, his jokes, his support, but most of all, we will miss his caring about us and our big and little successes. We hope, Mr. Ireland, that your retirement years will give you time to visit your grandchildren, paint, and enjoy all those things that a busy teacher's schedule rarely allows you to do.

reunions.









The season started off slow against Truman- losing 14-12 in the first game of the season. The loss was one of only two in the regular season. The other loss coming against Springfield Kickapoo, 21-18. At the time of the game, Kickapoo was ranked fifth in the state in 5A. SW was the only team in Kickapoo's first five games to score more than once and to hold them to only three touchdowns. Two bus loads of SW students made the journey to cheer on the Indians.

After Truman, the Indians started Interscholastic League play against Van Horn. SW shut down Van Horn 36-0. The strong victory gave the Indians momentum for the next three non-league games against Bishop Ward (SW 12-BW 7), O'Hara (SW 22- O 21) and Kickapoo. SW came back to league play with an easy victory over Lincoln Academy 45-8 and a struggle over Southeast 6-0, making SW the "Southside Champs"

Due to the new playoff system, the first seven games of the season do not count in District play. The last three are the games in Districts that qualify the team for Sectional play. SW had Westport, Paseo, and Central left. SW clenched the District #15 title by beating all three teams. The three victories also made SW the Interscholastic League Champions, with a record of 6-0 in League play.

Sectional play took the Indians to St. Joseph to play Lafeyette. SW beat the Celtics 12-7, which advanced them to the State Quarterfinals against Center. Center beat the Indians 29-18, ending the '88-89 football season.

SW's starting defensive shut out the entire Interscholastic League. Senior Vincent Banks was elected as the Most Valuable Player in the I.L. for offense and defense.





The SW Cross Country team opened their season on September thirteenth on the Blue Valley course with only four men to run. The showings were good. Placing fifth was senior Vince Silvey; fourteenth, senior Doug Ingerly; fifthteenth, senior Craig Booker and sixteenth; Terry Scott.

In late September, the team acquired Kevin Jones giving a full team of five. SW was at a disadvantage because they had one of the smallest teams in the Interscholastic League. When one runner couldn't make it, the team had no chance of placing.

Coach Samuels said that the runners worked hard in practice. Each Varsity runner would usually run six miles a few times each week and occasionally Varsity Cross Country more. runner Vince Silvey "Intervals proved to be especially taxing on the runners, but the runners didn't show signs of weakening when Coach Samuels

would say: 'Okay, fellas, only thirty seconds." Intervals were shorter runs of a mile and less that were assigned a certain time for resting

and running.

The Cross Country runners expressed a need for fans. Varsity runner Terry Scott said: "The team definitely needed more fans to cheer them on. Few fans came to our meets and the ones that did come boosted our performances." Varsity Cross Country runner Craig Booker said: "There was only one person that we knew that went to Southwest that came to one of our meets."

A few of the teams' runners talked running with Coach Samuels at Godfather's Pizza on November second. Coach Samuels said: "I don't want anyone to leave without being filled up."

The All League Banquet was held at the Kansas City Technical School on November twentieth. All League runners from SW were: fourth, Craig

Booker; eighth, freshman Varsity runner Johnny Roberts; and tenth, Doug Ingerly.

SW did not have a Varsity Girls or Junior Varsity Boys team. A few freshman girls ran but not enough to make a team. Overall, the season was good and a few runners had personal bests. The Southwest 88-89 Varsity Basketball season started with a game against Raytown. Starting the season off right, the Indians won 62-50.

The first tournament was the Blue Valley Tournament at Blue Valley High School. The Indians in round-robin competition defeated Shawnee Mission East, 50-43, Blue Valley, 55-50, and Turner, 71-55 winning the tournament.

Interscholastic The League tournament was the Indian's next test. It started with a game against Van Horn. Indians man-handled the Van Horn Falcons 84-39. The Indian's next opponent was Paseo. This proved a more difficult test. In a game that came down to the last ten seconds, the Indians were defeated 56-60. This snapped the Indian's hope for an undefeated season. Southeast was the next opponent for the Indians. During the Southwest game, two of the starters were injured, Jason Irvin with tendentious and Mike Clark with a separated shoulder. The Indians overcame the losses and won the game, 69-68. tournament concluded with a game against Westport. The bad luck continued when Daren Stevens went down with a thumb injury. Unable to overcome the losses the Indians went down in defeat, 61-63.

The William Jewell tournament was next. The Indians played without the three injured starts. The team played hard but was eliminated from the tournament by losing to St. Joe Central and William Christman.

The Indians then started the Interscholastic season with a game against Paseo. With the three starters still gone, Southwest was no match for Paseo. Helped by the return of Clark, Irvin, and Stevens, the Indians again made victims of Van Horn 69-59.

The next game was against Rockhurst. The game was close but a last second shot fell short, and the Indians lost 70-72.

Interscholastic The season continued with a game against Lincoln. The Indians won a hard fought, double overtime victory 82-81.

Springfield Glendale was the next stop. Glendale, at that time, was ranked fourth in the state. The Indians were looking for a win to make the long bus ride worth it. Southwest, however, was defeated.

The next game was Southeast. against rival Southeast again proves no match, and Southwest goes on to win 81-70. The victory was not with out a stiff price. Jason Irvin went down with a season-ending knee injury.

O'Hara was Southwest's next game. O'Hara was the only undefeated team left in Kansas City, and the Indians were looking to end that streak. After a hard fought game at O'Hara High School, the score was 60-67, O'Hara.

The Indians were looking for revenge when they played Westport. It was close, but the Indians pulled it out in the end, 73-71. winning Interscholastic games continued with games against Northeast and The Indians lost to Northeast 69-84 and beat East 78-71.

Southwest then went to St. Joe to avenge the William Jewell tournament loss to St. Joe Central. This quest was in vain, however, as the Indians were sent away with a heart-breaking loss 59-60.

The Indians ended their Interscholastic season with a game against Central. The game was close, but the Indians failed to pull it out in the end, losing 64-66.

Determined to snap the two game losing streak, the Indians played Bishop Hogan. Hogan proved no match, and Southwest went on to post a 70-67

The regular season ended with a trip to Springfield. The trip proved no better than the first, with the Indians suffering a loss to Parkview.

The Regional tournament started with a game against Center. The Indians easily handled Center and moved on to the next game against number two seated Rockhurst. This game did The Indians not go as well. struggled against Rockhurst's taller team, getting behind early and were unable to catch up. The

loss ended the Indian's season. The Indians ended the year with a 13-13 record overall. They were 5-3 in the league, tied

for third place.



a scholarship.





#### Southwest's Amnesty Club First in the KCMO District

During the 1988-89 school year, Southwest welcomed a brand new club. This year Jon Freeland and Eric Haar organized and an coordinated Amnesty International Club. Huehnergarth sponsored the club and held the meetings in his room after school on Mondays. Club operated on Amnesty International's three primary mandates: (1) All prisoners of conscience will be released from prison as soon as possible. They will be allowed to express their personal beliefs pertaining to politics, religion and racial equality; (2) That all prisoners of conscience will be able to have fair and prompt trials; (3) All tortures and executions of prisoners of conscience will be ceased immediately. The group used these three mandates most often when writing letters. Amnesty most effectively spreads their message of awareness through letter writing. Students involved in the group wrote letters to the oppressive governments asking for the release of prisoners of conscience. During the year, students in the group learned about the countries they worked on, as well as learning about public awareness. They learned how to take responsibility and speak out against oppression. They worked during the second semester on selling Amnesty Tshirts, sponsoring another school fundraiser, and planning ahead for an awareness week. The week would include petitions for release of prisoners, videos and films of worldwide violations of Amnesty's beliefs, and speeches by former prisoners of conscience.



Miss Donnelly, a senior English teacher, has been teaching at Southwest since 1985. For the past fifteen years, Donnelly has served as a substance abuse counselor. Now she brings her many years of experience to Southwest. The program started this year with Donnelly counseling students in group sessions for drug or alcohol abuse. The administration asked her to take on this job.

Miss Donnelly counsels students every Monday after school for about an hour. Her program is based on the twelve step program sponsored by Alcoholics Annonymous. It is not, however, used exclusively for alcoholics. It can be used for anyone with a problem with any form of substance abuse. Donnelly realizes what she is up against: "It's easy for people to throw away their families, jobs, and everything, because they say they don't have a problem. These twelve basic steps of the program help kids with a duo-addiction. Part of the disease is the denial on the part of the user."

In her counseling sessions, Donnelly hopes to break the ice by discussing any problems that come up: "If students want to work on coping, we can." When asked how important it is to help kids with their problems, she responded, "The most important thing we can teach kids is how to survive successfully in a very complicated world."

Often, people on the outside do not understand or are not aware of the growing problem. Donnelly informs that many suicides are the result of drug or alcohol abuse, or at least related. She said that the greatest problem educators have is public relations and the victory will increase when the public is aware of what is going on. "My greatest frustration is people who think that nobody cares or nobody understands their problems. Everyone is in the same boat," said Donnelly.

Miss Donnelly's counseling efforts strive to help broaden Southwest's potential as a magnet school in the 'years ahead. Involving certain skills in her group sesions, such as managing skills, coping with anger, and dealing with self-conceit and conceit in others, will help build the project. Miss Donnelly says, "If you can help one person, you have made a difference."





On September 30, 1989, the National Aeronautics and space administration launched the first United States space shuttle since the tragic CHALLENGER crash of January 28. 1986. Forest McCartney, director of the Kennedy Space Center, said, "It's great to be in NASA administrator James Fletcher simply said, "Its been a long wait." Finally confident with the redesigned booster rockets on the shuttle, all of the United States and NASA watched as the shuttle DISCOVERY climbed through the high pressure zone where its predecessor had broken up. Fair weather actually delayed the flight. Due to dangerously high cross winds early in the day, it was deemed unsafe to launch until winds went down to a more acceptable level.

Soviets to evacuate

21, a Soyez space capsule carrying two Soylet carrying two Soviet cosmonauts and a Frenchman splashed down only sixty miles outside the Balkonur Space Center. crewmen had been in space for 384 days, only eighty hours short of a full year. The American record of only eighty-four days, set in 1973, doesn't even come close. The Soviets, Musa Manarov and Vladmir Titov, were in space since December 21, 1987. Soviet authorities say that space endurance is vital to their planned first manned mission to Mars, some time after the turn of the century.

In January, Margaret Thatcher, celebrated her 3,164th day in office, making her the longest continually serving prime minister in the twentieth century.

On December 7, a collosal earthquake killed an estimated 50,000 in the Armenian republic, leaving an additional 400,000 homeless. Countries from all over the world volunteered manpower and money to help get the small Soviet providence restarted. Fidel Castro of Cuba sent construction crews to help rebuild homes and cities, American president Ronald Reagan offered humanitarian help, and Britain, France, and Italy all dispatched thier emergency action teams. Two days in a row supply planes carrying rescue items crashed. killing everyone on board and destroying all the supplies. With the help of the rescue teams only one survivor could be found. However, 509 bodies were recovered from the rubble. After much deliberation, Armenia decided to officialy eliminate the celebration of the Christmas holiday for 1988 (January 6 in Armenia) as well as new year. Instead, the entire country recognized a state of mourning.

The games of the XXIV Olympiad were held in Soeul Korea, Saturday September 17, to Sunday October 1. The United States took on the world's best athletes. Dave Silvestri of the U.S. baseball team, Wendy Williams of the U.S. diving team, and Mary Koboldt of the U.S. field hockey team all hailed from St. Louis Missouri, (as well as Ken Flach, born in St. Louis, currently of Southern Illinois.) On the U.S. Rowing team was Ann Seaton of Manhattan Kansas, and on the U.S. bowling team was Mark Lewis of nearby Witchita.

The most outstanding performance of a United States athlete was undoubtedly by Florence Griffith Joyner, who shattered the world record for the

200 meter dash. Joyner ran the distace in 21.34 seconds, beating out the old record of 21.74 held jointly by Marita Koch, and Heike Dreschler of West Germany. Joyner said, "I wanted that record," and she was succesful, capturing her second gold of the games.

Unfortunately, not all went smoothly in Soeul. Problems with equipment, general ill will to the American athletes, as well as other various small problems made the news. A Korean boxer wouldn't believe he was the loser (he lost because of foul points) and a fight ensued between judges, referees, and coaches. The boxer refused to leave the ring for almost an hour after the match, simply sitting in the darkened arena. Another problem was steroid usage. Ben Johnson of Canada was forced to return his gold medal after positive traces of the drugs were found in his system.

> Sunday, October 15 to Thursday, October 20, 1988 saw the Oakland Athletics go up against the Los Angeles Dodgers in the World Series. The Dodgers won by what some call a "Fluke of luck" four games to one.

Forest fire greatly damaged the Yellowstone park throghout the months of June, July and August 1988. Destroying 1.38 of 2.2 million acres of the nation's oldest national park. In September the worst damage was done when several buildings in and around the park were destroyed. The fire could not be stopped, but burned out on its own, leaving the park all but destroyed. Experts agree that the park will never be the same.

On Monday, December 2 during the morning rush hour, three trains collided killing as many as fifty-three according to British Transport police record. 115 passengers were taken to nearby hospitals, and several were treated at the site and released. Fortunately, no serious injuries occured and casualty count stayed low. Trains were expected

to be delayed twenty minutes to two weeks.

Hurricane "Gilbert" had a great effect on both Mexico and Texas during September. Texas was hit with thirty-nine tornadoes in five days. Mexico did not come out so well.

On September 16, Mexico was hit with some of the worst flooding in modern history. The Coast Guard dispatched fifty members to help locate Mexicans lost in the flood waters. Even after the guard's arrival, Mexico received another ten inches of rain brought in by the torrential winds. 150 were known dead and 200 additional missing, and feared dead. Damages amounted to more than \$10 billion dollars, the largest amount of damage ever incurred by an Atlantic storm. Bodies of the dead washed away in the flood were found as far away as Cadaryeta, thirty-five miles from Mexico City.

Ice floes trapped three Humpback whales in Alaska for a week in October. America and the Soviet Union both rushed millions of dollars worth of manpower and equipment to aid as much as they could. Both countries admitted it was a large amount of money to spend to free the creatures, but the whales are becoming so greatly endangered. conservationists felt no other choice remained. Although one whale died before they could be freed, the other two were released in relatively good health, and headed for the open water.



presidential campaign of 1988 may go down in history as one of the greatest "mud-slinging" campaigns of all Massachusets governor, Democrat Michael Dukakis, versed Vice-President of the United States Republican George Bush. Both parties permeated the airwaves with their television commercials, debates and campaign speeches, as well as putting out flyers, posters, billboards, yard signs and other media to bring forth their strong points (or more likely their opponents weaknesses) into the

Both parties were equally ruthless in the race for the Oval Office. Name calling, finger pointing, and all sorts of dirty ideas and schemes lead many Americans to decide that it was a

matter of choosing the "Lesser of two evils". Others simply did not vote. When the mud finally cleared, our new president was George Bush, Vice-President for eight years under Ronald Reagan (the most publically popular president ever; polls showed he would have won for a third term were he legally eligible). And after a long and tiring campaign, President-elect Bush invited loser, Micheal Dukakis, to the White House as a gesture of respect and good will.



#### Six Killed in Explosion

The single most tragic event in Kansas City history this year, perhaps in the citys history hap-pened on November 29. Slightly before dawn, two explosions at the construction site for the Bruce R. Watkins Memorial Drive killed 6 Kansas City Missouri firefighters when 45,000 pound of ammonium nitrate ignited at the site. This chemical, usually used for construction purposes, caused the most tragic firefighting incident in the past two decades. After two entire trucks lost radio contact to the station, the fire chief decided it was necessary to check the trucks location. He had an unpleasant welcome. shockwaves of the second explosion blew the entire front windshield out of his car on arrival. Though the explosion injured niether of the men in the car, the captain went into shock and had to be taken to the emergency room. Investigation proved both trucks had been completely destroyed, and all the men onboard both trucks had been lost. After a long dark evening of searching, all of the bodies were recovered.

The city mourned the six men as heroes: Capt. Gerald C. Halloran, age 57. Firefighter Thomas M Fry, 41, Capt. James H. Kilverton Jr., 54, Fire apparatus operator Robert D. McKarnin 42, and firefighter Micheal R. Oldham, 32. They died trying to protect Kansas City, and will never be forgotten. Days later the story continued. Questions of arson had arisen since the day of the explosion, police investigators were given the case immediately, and began the investigation as soon as the site was declared safe. The explosion caused such a flurry that it made Star/Times front page headlines for more than a week! The U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms arrived after two days to take their own look at the site, and determine arson possibilities. The two burned out hulks of fire trucks were loaded onto flatbeds and taken to the police department, pending further investigation. In the aftermath,

Independence mayor Barbara Potts declared an official state of mourning, and in Independence, Kansas City Missouri, and Kansas flags were ordered to be flown at half mast.

The city of Independence offered a \$35,000 dollar reward for information leading to the solution of this unusual case. The firmen, who had been called to extinguish a burning pickup truck, failed to notice that another truck containing the explosives was already engulfed in flames. Then it was over.

The men were buried on the 2 and 3 of December, with a city-wide memorial on the 4. During 1988, there were 135 homicides in Kansas City, the second highest total in history. An interesting twist, however, is that 83% of these homicides were solved.

#### Robert's Chevrolet Burns to the Ground



On December 12, 1988 at about 5:30 a.m. Roberts Chevrolet, at 115 West Gregory, burned to the ground in a three alarm fire. Although the fire caused no injuries, it did destroy the sales building and the showroom which contained 10 vehicles (including a pair of Corvettes with a combined value of over \$75,000 and a Camaro IROC-Z convertible). All that remains is the overstock lot accross the street and the used car lot. The owners have not as of yet decided whether to rebuild. But it looks like the land will be up for sale.

# Magnet Construction Delayed

The SW building improvements scheduled to occur during the 1988-89 school year have been delayed. The students have been divided and distributed among the building for the specific reason of avoiding "men at work". However, the Parent Task Force, asked to give input on the building construction, had a conflict with the company hired and their work. Apparently, the early stages of Phase One of the plan did not follow some of the requests made by the Task Force. The company's work was stopped for discussion of the conflict and renegociation.

The company claimed that

some of the requests made in the plan were not possible. example, the Task Force asked for strong improvements in the auditorium. The construction company claimed a neccesity of more funds for such improvements. The same company, however, purchased rather costly light fictures of possibly unneccesary quality using the funds already available. Also, some improvements made did not specifically follow instructions. For instance, musical practice rooms were requested sorrounding the instructor's desk in order to give her visual access to the students practicing. The practice

rooms were built, but did not give the instructor the visual access.

Despite the complications, the improvements are scheduled to begin again by April 1,1989. Dr. Ruffin, principal of SW, stated " I think it will be great once it gets started. It is unfortunate that the original schedule was delayed, but there were some very significant problems that needed to be worked out." The Task Force has compromised and has created a new plan which will be up for bids. A company will be hired and the building improvements of the new SW Science and Math Magnet High School will be on the go again!

Southwest began the 1985-86 year school year with Barbara Lusk. the 1986-87 school year with Barbara Guinn, the 1987-88 school year with David Griffin then Evelyn Belser ant the 1988-89 school year, with of course, Doctor Ruffin. Kansas City Royals owner Ewing Kaufman decided this year to fund "project choice" at Westport High School. It's a program that will award students \$50 a semester for attending school on a regular basis. The program will also help send a few lucky freshman to college.

On November the 28, former Kansas City, Kansas mayor Jack Reardon died of heart failure. Reardon had received a heart transplant in February of 1987. He was only 42.

The year, in the Movies. . . .

Movies for "88 both held back and delivered on what they promised. Controversy ran through the theaters and brought about a few laughs as well.

The single most talked about (and actually rather uneventful) movie of 1988 was Martin Scorseses' The Last Temptation of Christ. The movie, which isn't actually based on the gospel, but on the work of a Greek fiction writer, Nikos Kazantzakis, is a perception of what Christ might have felt. more than what is documented to have happened. The movie first opened across the country this summer, although it didn't show in Kansas City until September. It was met with anger and protest of the film's purpose and what it was trying to say about Christ.

The movie's most critical enemies, however, had not seen the film, and the protests seemed to be greatly overblown. The controversy over the film probably proved to be its greatest advertisement.

#### **IMAGINE**

Novelist Albert Goldman presented Lennon as a heroinsnorting bisexual schizophrenic. Yoko Ono said this was an unfair tactic since Lennon had been deceased for nine years and therefore could not answer the allegations. Following this Yoko Ono, Paul McCartney, Julian Lennon, George Harrison, Ringo Starr, and Beatles' producer George Martin contributed to a movie with an accompanying book titled IMAGINE John Lennon. a film admitting Lennon's drug problems but also showing his recovery and hope before his assasination on December 8, 1980.

#### RATTLE

The socially conscious Irish rock band, U2, finally released their long awaited concert film, U2 Rattle and Hum. The film was both praised and chastized for its high point and its flaws. Some saw the film as simply mediocre, capturing the feeling of U2 but not really saying anything. November 4, the Kansas City "Star Preview" newspaper supplement, asked, "Who are these guys?", "What makes them so good." This was a question posed about why the film focused on the music and not the men. The film met an early demise, showing in the theaters for only a few weeks. U2 fans didn't let the reviews bother them; this is their band and they don't care what anyone else thinks. U2 said what they wanted to say. Wasn't that the point? CHILD'S PLAY

Child's Play is a little flick about an innocent little doll that becomes possessed by the spirit of a dead murderer and causes all kinds of problems. A little boy is infatuated with getting a new talking doll. His mother, as a surprise, decides to give him one. Does she go to to the local toy store? No. of course not. She finds a man selling these dolls in the alley behind the toy store. This man is a little, well...odd. However, the mother takes the doll home to a very happy son. That evening! The boy's aunt is babysitting the boy and the "Chucky" doll. Since the boy is asleep, the doll goes out into the living room and proceeds to throw the aunt out the window. This goes on, and on, and eventually the boy is put away after telling so many people that the doll is the one perpetrating the murders. As the plot proceeds, the doll visits an old friend, a voodoo priest, who brought his spirit back. priest tells Chucky he is trapped in the body of the doll unless he can find a human to possess. He also finds out that the longer he

stays in the doll's body the more he becomes human. And he can feel pain! The mother finally realizes that the situation is real. (after the doll tries to ice her) and goes to free her son before the doll gets to him. She finds all she has to do is shoot the doll through the heart (the part that is rapidly becoming human). She gets a policeman (Chris Sarandon) to help, and the doll, after many fires, knife battles, etc. is finally shot. And, the grueling experience is over.

Another for the "dog" list is Kansas, starring Matt Dillon and Andrew McCarthy. This film was shot on location about the greater Kansas City area and has actually been called by some critics, "one of the worst films of all time!" The script was poor; the plot was lame, and there wasn't any excuse for the grueling dialogue. It played in theaters for even less than its initial week run, and left two fairly notable actors a laughing stock.

#### THE YEAR IN CONCERTS

Once again, superstar extrordinaire, Michael Jackson, started his second major tour in Kansas City. (This was his first tour without the support of his brothers who traveled with him on the Victory Tour.) #### **RUN DMC**

Run-D.M.C. played Kansas City for the fifth time in four years on July 17. The band's popularity was a bit on the wane; many fans thought that their new stage show with lighting, explosions and all paraphenalia got away from their street image. The show was satisfactory, but the tour wasn't very successful for Run-D.M.C. However, newcomers Public Enemy and D.J. Zazzy Jeff and the Fresh Prince got good exposure and seemed to enjoy being together.

Sting, former Police vocalist turned solo success, (through an almost complete change in style) played to a standing room only crowd of 8,000 at the Starlight Theater on August 6. This was only two weeks before Sting and his colleagues joined a tour that didn't come here but is definitely worth mentioning: The Human Rights NOW!! tour. Along with Sting, Bruce Springsteen, and Tracy Chapman, many artists played to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the universal declaration of human rights. The tour even played The Ivory Coast singing its message against apartheid and racism, as well as freedom for prisoners of conscience.
