Headed by Mr. George Berkemeier, president, members selected Dr. Guy Carter as superintendent of schools. Mr. Edward Shelton, director of secondary instruction; Mr. Emory Parks, deputy superintendent; and Mr. Paul Landers, assistant superintendent in charge of business services; assisted Dr. Carter.

Responsibilities designated to Dr. Carter included preparing the budget for the school system, formulating plans for the construction of new buildings and administering the policies set forth by the group.

Dr. Carter received his B.S. in Education from Southwest Missouri State College. He obtained his master's and doctorate from the University of Missouri. Prior to serving as superintendent, Dr. Guy Carter taught elementary and high school classes and served as a high school principal.

With increased enrollment this year at Truman, cafeteria and maintenance workers acquired additional duties.

Mrs. Lois Bridges, Truman's new cafeteria manager, hired three new cooks supplementing her staff of 24 to assist her with lunch room responsibilities. Cashiers, cooks and dishwashers kept busy serving 1,730 students in four 20 minute lunch groups.

The maintenance department, headed by Mr. Lee Austin, also hired three people. Truman added a full-time man, a third floor custodian and a maintenance mechanic, who tended to the building property and its operation.

The seven general custodians dealt with the various problems that arose daily in addition to their regular duties. Working with the custodians, Mrs. Mary Pursley began each morning at 7:00, conducting her duties as school matron.

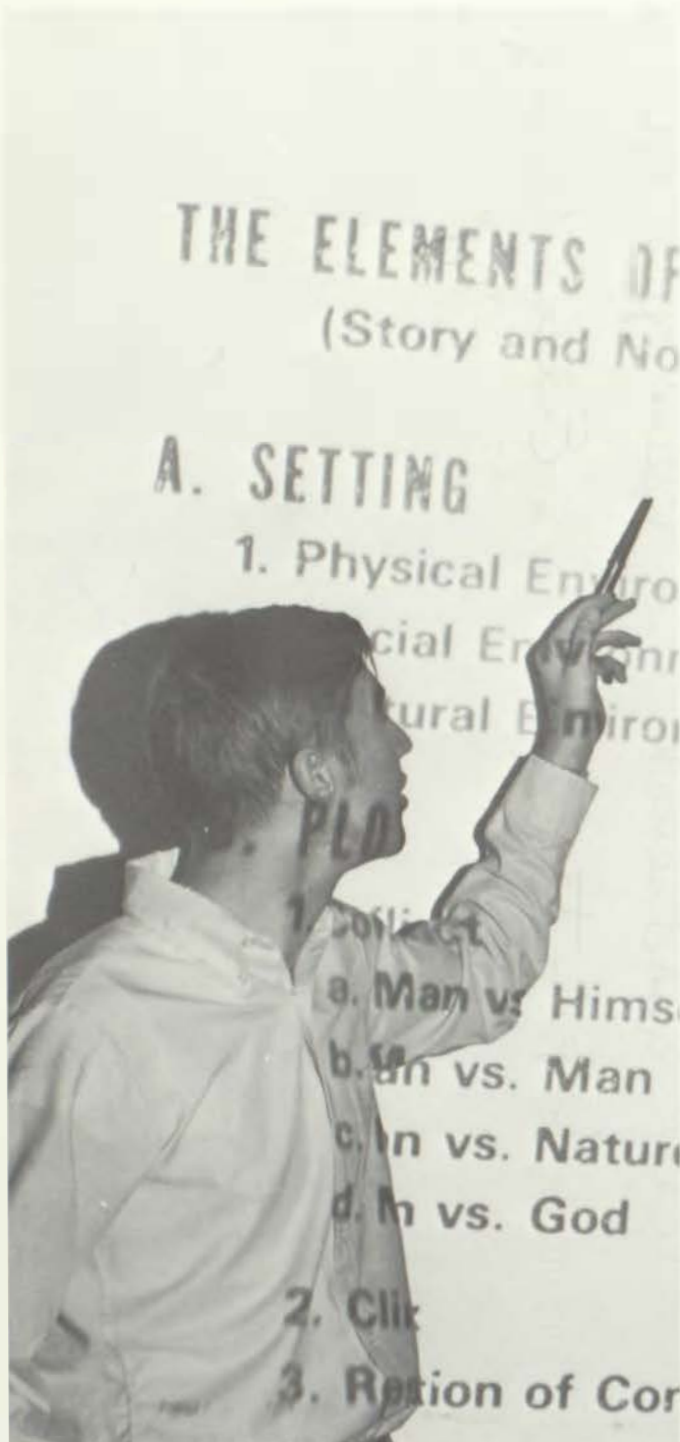

Library program institutes new center



OVERHEAD PROJECTORS SUPPLEMENT students and teachers in class lectures and discussions.

Developed through the library program, a resource center aided English courses.

A new system of cataloguing equipment and materials made the center readily available to teachers and students.

A plug-in telephone with an amplifier enabled classes to obtain speakers. This device proved beneficial for it permitted pupils to talk with experts unable to visit Truman.

Four listening booths, equipped with stereo headphone sets and projectors, supplemented English II's study of English language usage.

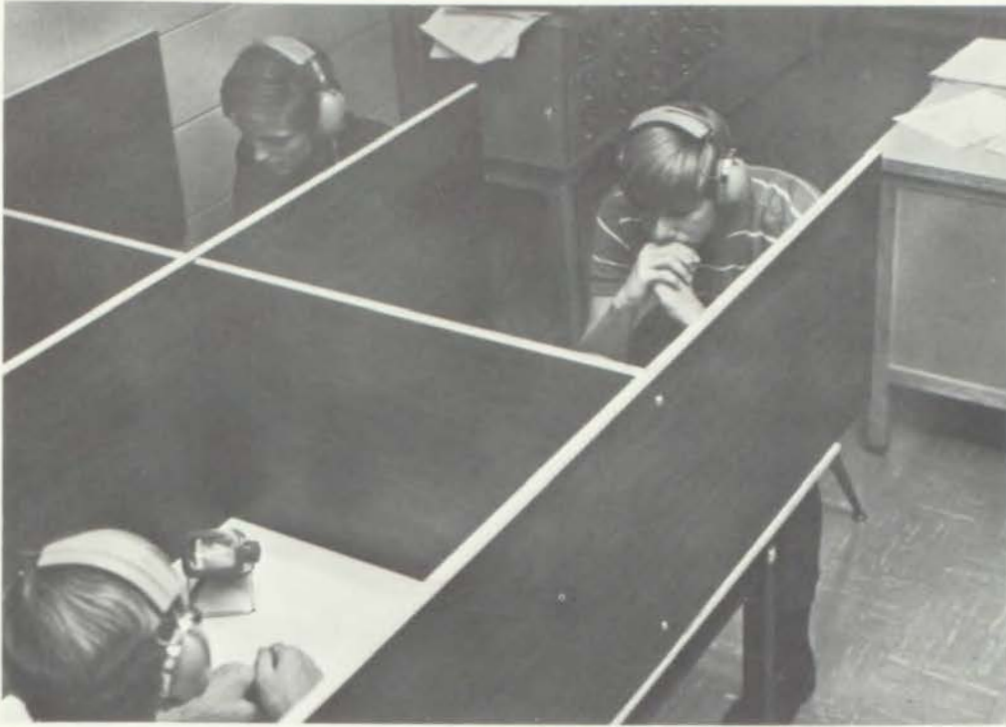
English III classes highlighted a basic American literature study with single concept films, overhead projectors and a large supply of transparencies.

Arranged according to subject matter, 50 filmstrip and record sets allowed English IV students to gain a better understanding of literature and composition.

In addition to new equipment, English courses utilized over 800 films rented annually.



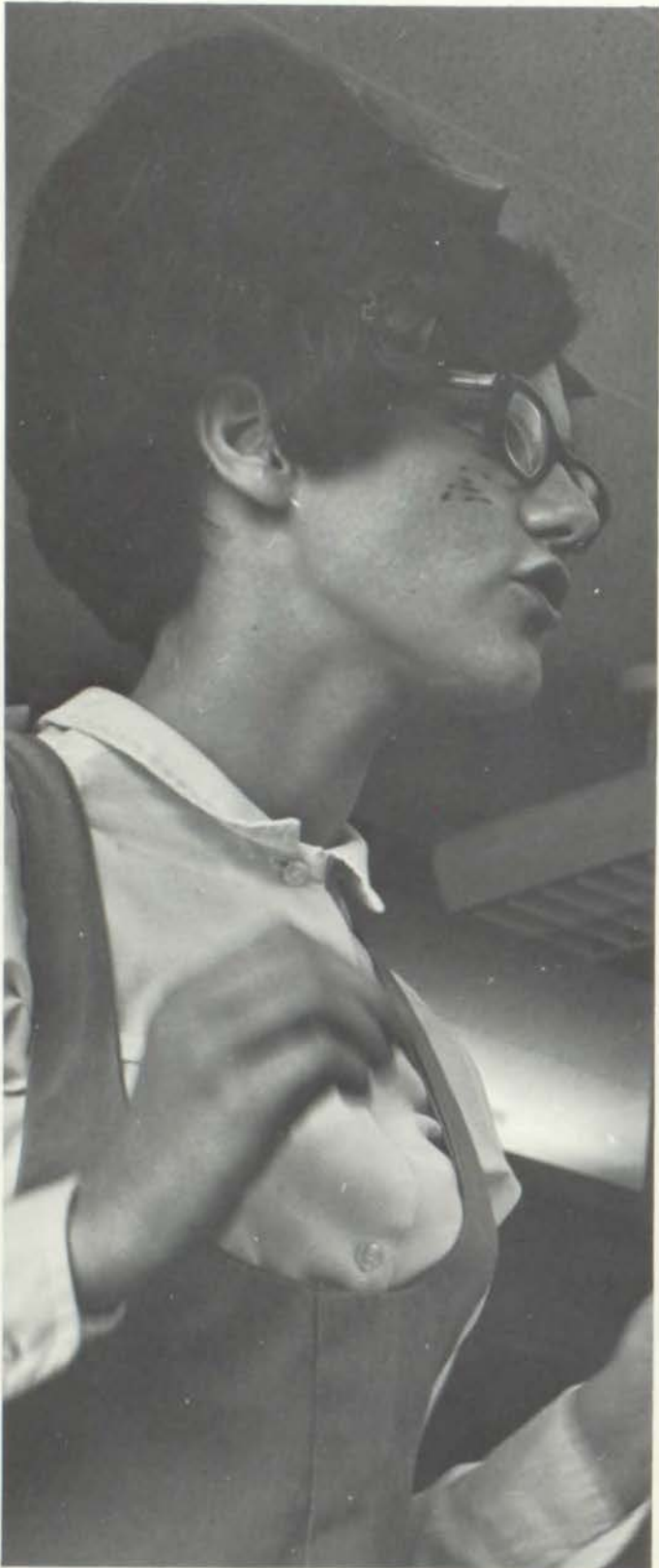
MRS. FRANCIS STRIKES a typical pose during class.



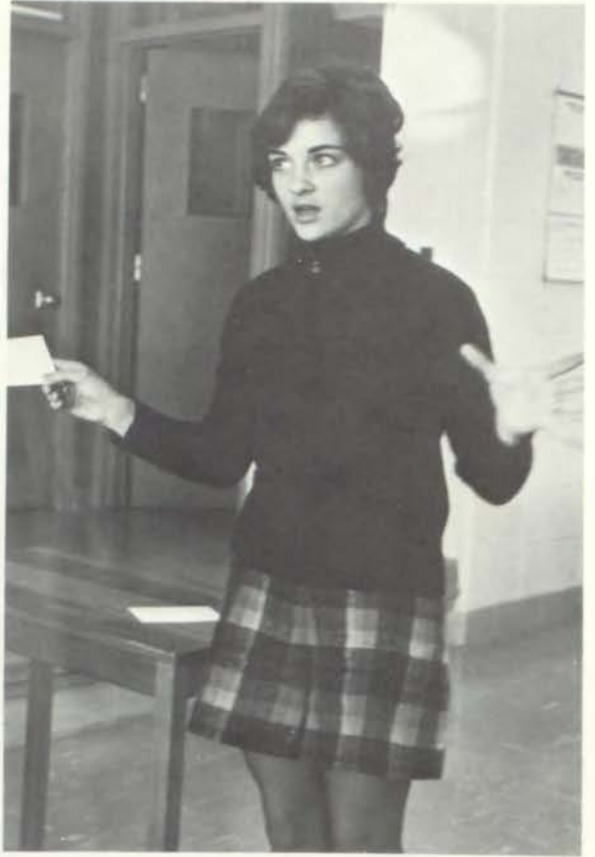
NEW LISTENING BOOTHS provide English students with a variety of filmstrip and record sets.



STUDENTS EXCHANGE DIFFERENCES of opinion while carrying on a group discussion in English III class.

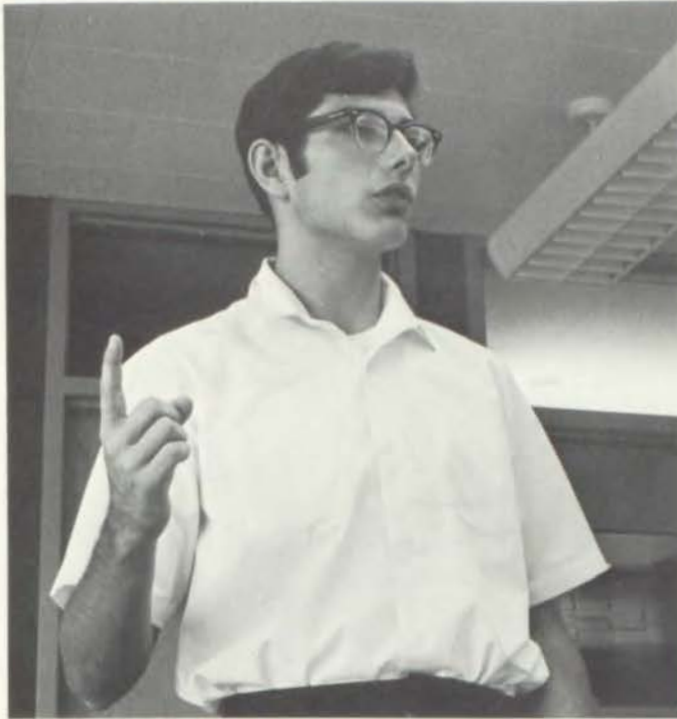

Debate entails investigation, organization

Debating entailed many hours of research, planning and organization as both affirmative and negative cases on the proposition required investigation. Not knowing which side they would support until the day of the tournament, debaters needed to understand both sides of the argument.

Information from periodicals, pamphlets and books broadened the student's knowledge of current events.

Clear, logical thinking and the ability to relate facts and ideas to the audience served as the basis for judging.

Debaters also participated in original oratory, extemporaneous speaking and dramatic interpretation competition. Various tournaments held at area schools gave students the opportunity to apply classroom fundamentals and techniques.

Dramatists gain new instructors, methods

The dramatics department gained two new instructors this year. Mr. Everett Haney and Mrs. Leslia Van Biber introduced several new methods in theatrical arts at Truman.

Truman's first production of the year, "All My Sons," employed new concepts in stage design. Casting, centered around the under study system, allowed more students the opportunity to gain valuable acting experience.

Dramatics students learned how to communicate with their audience through pantomime, oral interpretation, facial expression and voice variation.

Pantomime helped students overcome stage fright permitting them to portray believable characters. Beginning actors developed vocal variety, enunciation and poise through the interpretation of poems and plays.

Through improvisations, students acquired the ability to think on their feet. Utilization of motivating forces aided the audience to identify with the characters.

Field trips during the year enabled students to attend various productions throughout the greater Kansas City area. Plays attended by students included "Man from La Mancha" and "Spoon River Anthology."

Films and filmstrips gave students a better understanding of countries, their history and their people. In addition, pupils received a better interpretation of their language by listening to various native speakers employed in films and filmstrips.

Teachers spoke in the studied language to second year students, allowing little English used in the classroom. This offered an opportunity for additional practice.

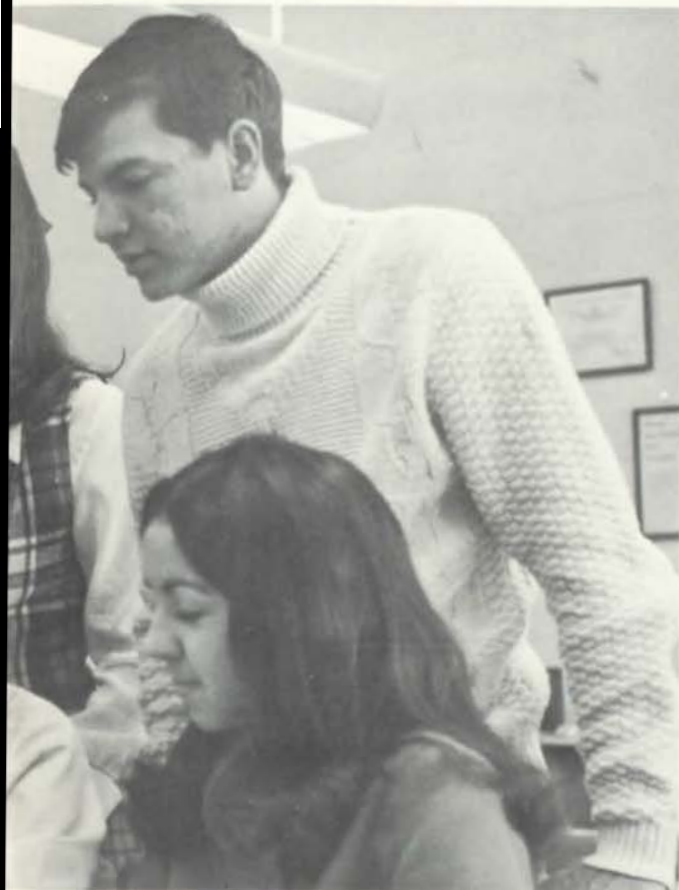

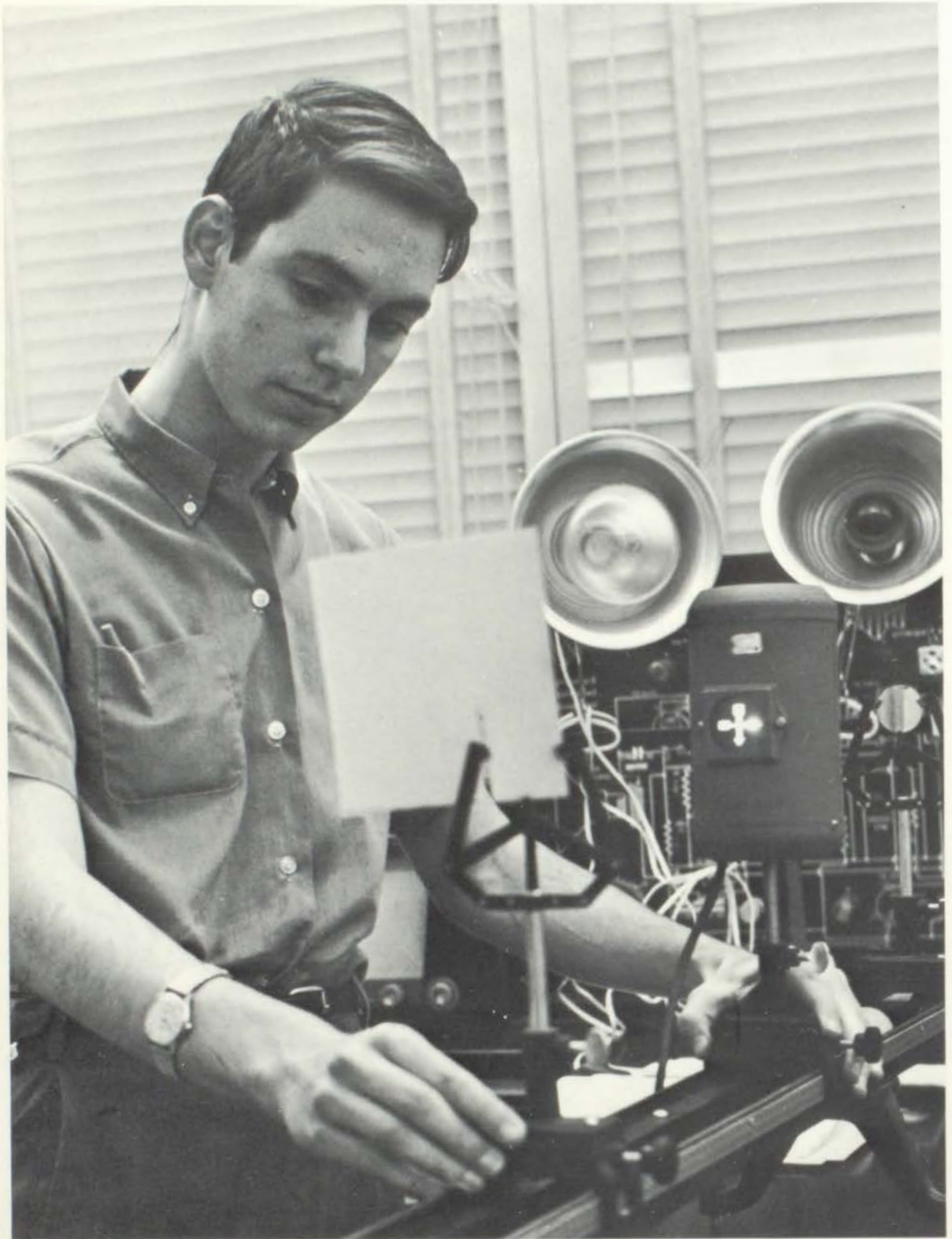

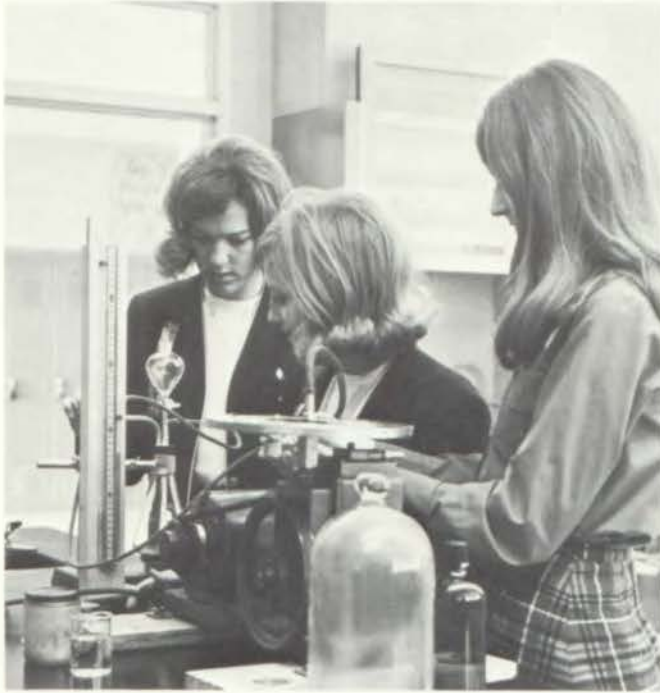

New equipment, films aid science classes



CHEMISTRY REQUIRES PRECISE measuring and close observation.

New laboratory equipment and supplementary films aided students in learning concepts.

General science marked the beginning of a science career for many students. This course included various phases of chemistry, biology and physics.

Biology, both general and advanced, offered students a closer look into life and its complexities. Study and organization of species constituted the basic curriculum. Dissection of animals and field trips to local laboratories enlightened regular class study.

Through individual experimentation and research, students enrolled in physics studied magnetism, electricity and atomic energy. An additional study in 'Solid State Structure and Reactions' highlighted the course.

Chemistry, also an advanced science course, involved lab experiments, study in molecular structure and individual research. Intricate weighing devices, problem solving and experiment calculations tested the students accuracy and intelligence in this course.

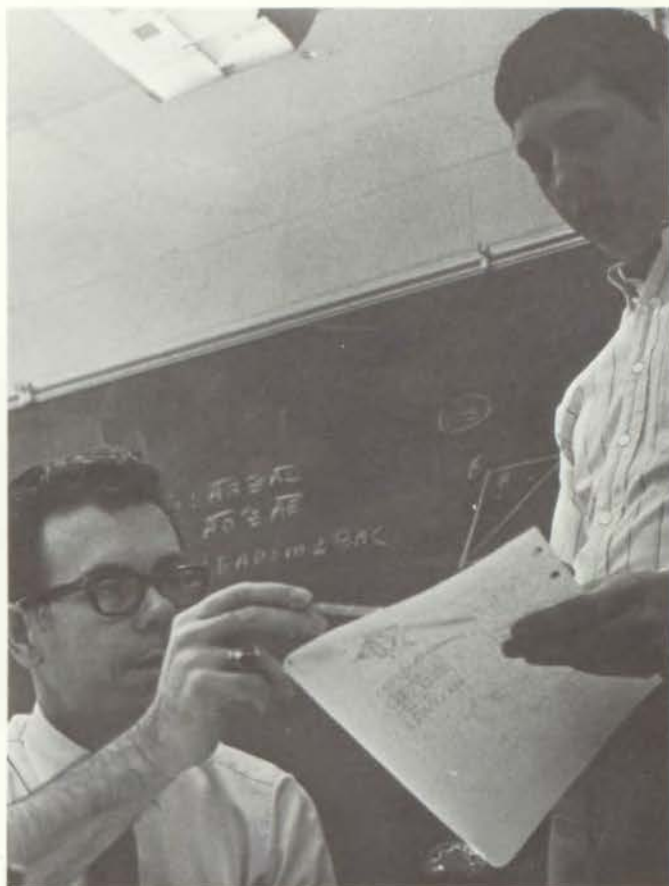
Math classes utilize computer facilities

The mathematics department expanded this year to allow room for additional programs. Introductory calculus and computer programming joined the standing curriculum of Algebra I and II, geometry, math analysis and trigonometry.

This year, for the first time, senior math students enrolled in calculus as a regular course. It provided a preliminary class for further college study.

Terminal math developed into computer programming instruction. Mr. Charles Naudet taught this innovation in hopes of offering slower math students better preparation for the demands they will face after high school. Cardboard computers supplemented workbooks students used in class and also provided practical learning experience.

The knowledge gained from these innovations and the regular mathematics classes provided added insight into today's technology.

Business courses offered at Truman served as vocational keys to office jobs and opportunities for students.

Typing, basic business, bookkeeping and shorthand provided training for the business world. These classes prepared students for concentrated two hour courses.

Aimed at expanding students' commercial knowledge, both clerical and secretarial practice developed essential skills for office help. In clerical and secretarial classes students practiced with dictaphones and electric typewriters.

Shorthand equipped students for the daily dictation confronting many office secretaries.

Typing classes consisted of 548 students utilizing workbooks and typing to music. Typists strived for speed and accuracy, important aspects stressed in typing.

Basic business prepared students for the outside business world. Supplementary books explained budgeting, banking, taxes and other related topics. Speakers created a new dimension in classroom study which allowed students the means to comprehend business law and organization.

The class in metals provided broad experiences in fundamental metal working. Assignments in bunch work, weld casting, forging and use of machines kept students continually occupied.

Both the metal and woodworking classes participated in the Industrial Arts Contest at Warrensburg, Missouri in April. Students submitted projects exemplifying above average craftsmanship, skill and accuracy.

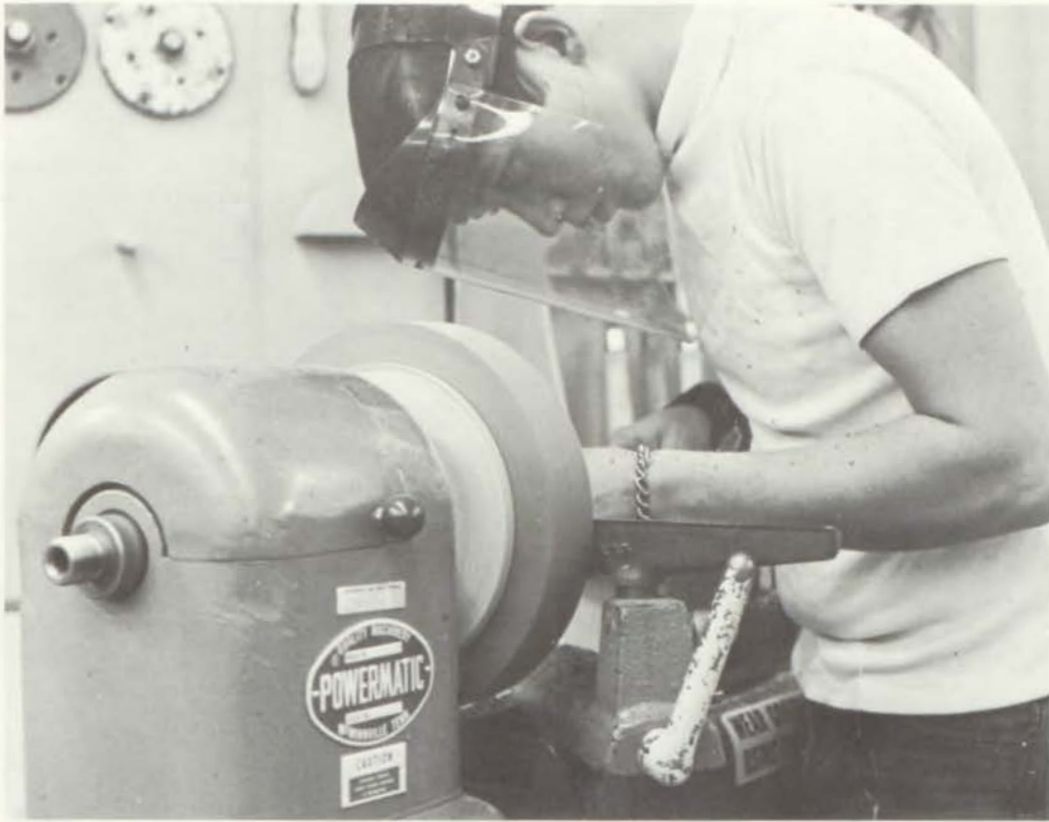

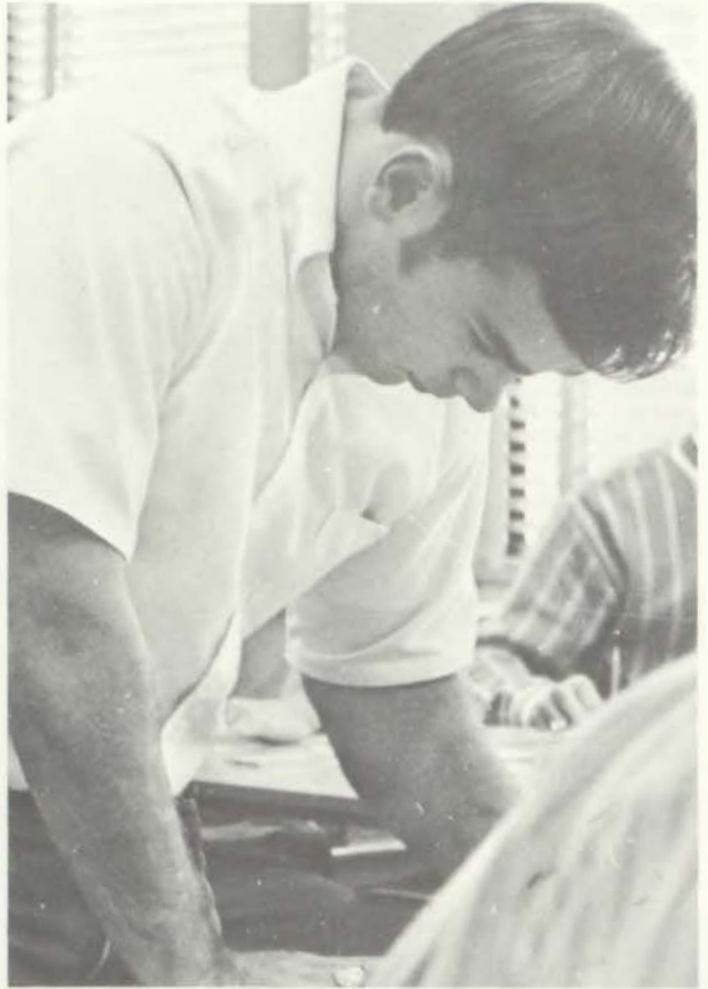

Photography, a semester course added to Truman's curriculum, provided the study of various photo techniques. Students enrolled in this class learned the fundamentals of taking, developing and printing pictures.

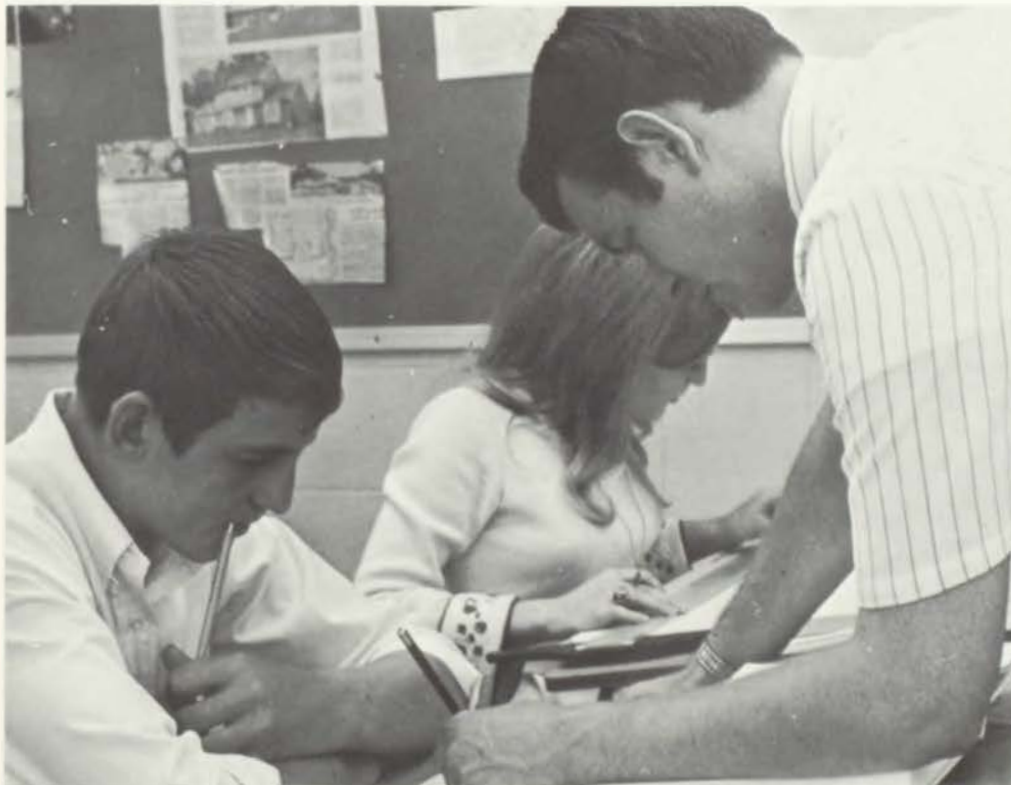
To fulfill the needs of this course, the school purchased five thousand dollars worth of necessary equipment. The purchase included Yashica cameras, enlargers, dryers and a lighting system. Students working in the darkroom found this new lighting system to be quite beneficial.

Drafting I, preparatory class for architectural drawing, taught students the basics of drawing, reading and analyzing various drafting structures.

Architectural drawing challenged those students interested in constructing, housing and designing. Students also learned how to draw both floor and house plans. The final project of the year centered around designing a house of their own style and preference.

Clothing and foods extended its classes this year. Tailoring promoted imagination in clothing, as students used wool to make a suit or coat. Foods II motivated students toward creativity with cooking.

Gourmet cooking, including turkey, leg of lamb, fresh crab salad and foreign foods added new interest to class work. These new semester classes applied to those girls who previously completed Foods I or Clothing I, as a prerequisite.

Two mannikins, added to the home economics department, helped stress essential clothing schemes. Both cooking and sewing classes participated in the window display and arrangement.

Housing and interior design, family relations and contemporary living provided girls with understanding of household and marital duties. With the addition of the two advanced courses, Foods II and tailoring, home economics stressed involvement for future housewives.

Department stresses gymnastic programs

With the emphasis on gymnastics, the physical education department opened its field to variety.

New equipment such as still rings, uneven parallel bars and men's archery bows gave students the opportunity to test their agility and body coordination. A knee exercise table, purchased by the Truman Lettermen Club, aided the development of leg muscles. In addition, boys worked out on the weight machine and several other exercise facilities.

Girls, as well as boys benefited from the physical fitness program. Folk dancing, balance beam routines and trampoline stunts instilled self-confidence in the girls.

Both boys' and girls' P.E. classes involved volleyball, basketball, soccer, and field hockey. Competition between class enlightened the course. Intramurals enabled the students to compete outside of class.

Each semester, physical fitness tests allowed the teacher to examine the student's progress more closely in such areas as the fifty yard dash, sit-ups and broad jump.

The addition of a window partition between the driver's education rooms provided a new dual-classroom teaching system.

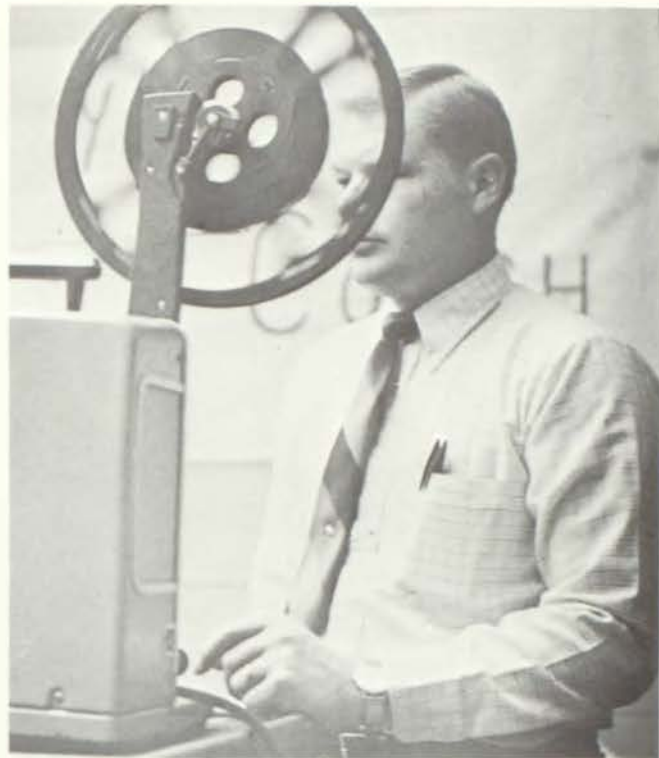
This innovation proved beneficial for both students and teachers. While one class viewed educational films, the other studied.

Students studied the basics of driving in a classroom situation before actual behind-the-wheel-driving. A practice steering model and reaction time device tested the driver's ability and accuracy.

Piercing noises echoed throughout the cafeteria while orchestra members tuned their various instruments.

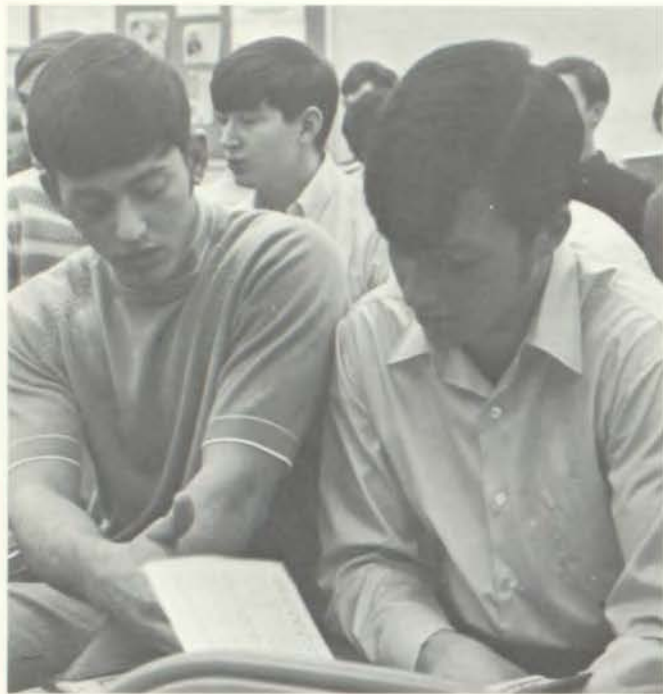
The orchestra, comprised of eighty-six students, spent time practicing their instruments to contribute toward a better orchestra. Their past efforts proved worthwhile during performances.

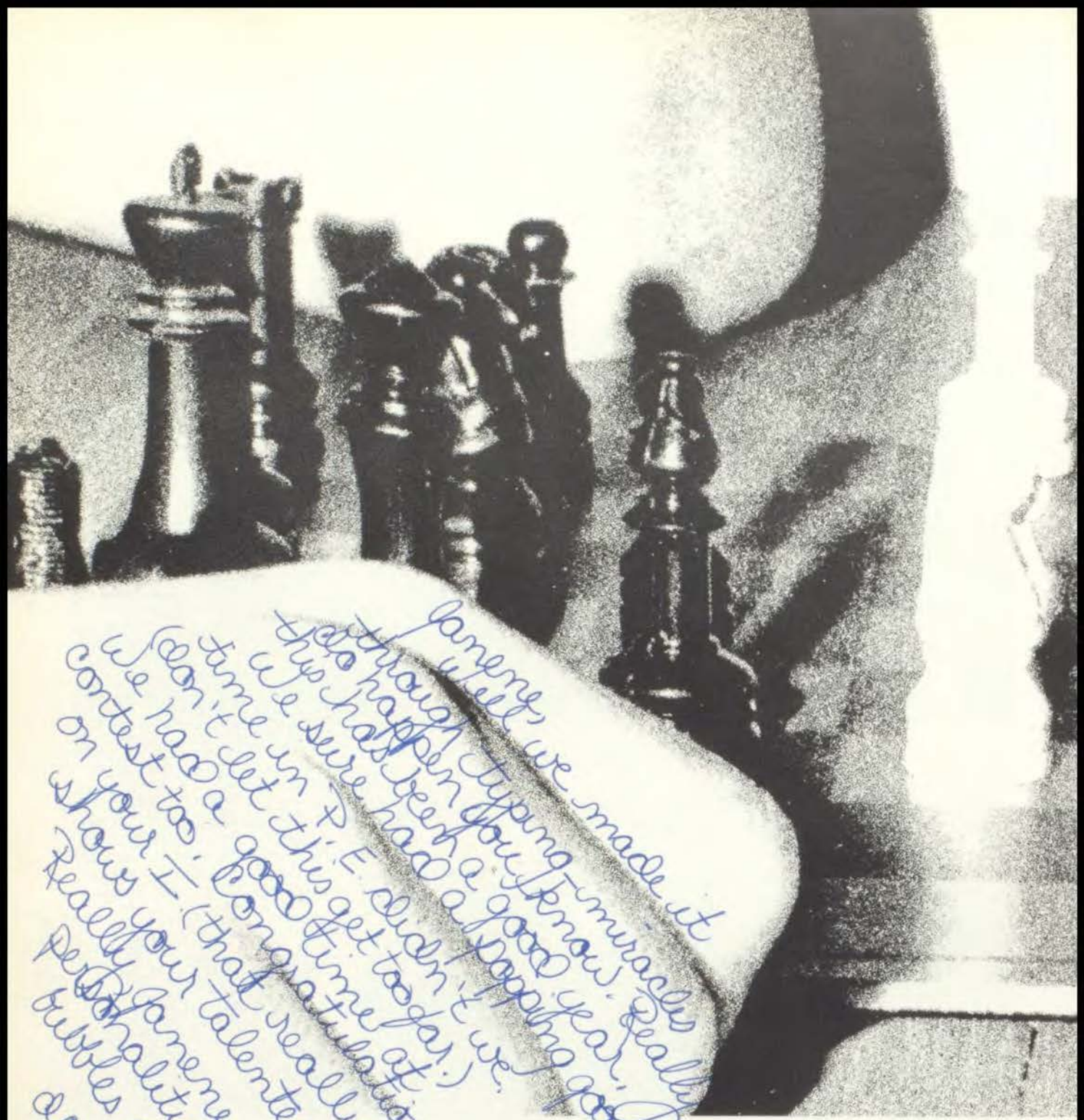

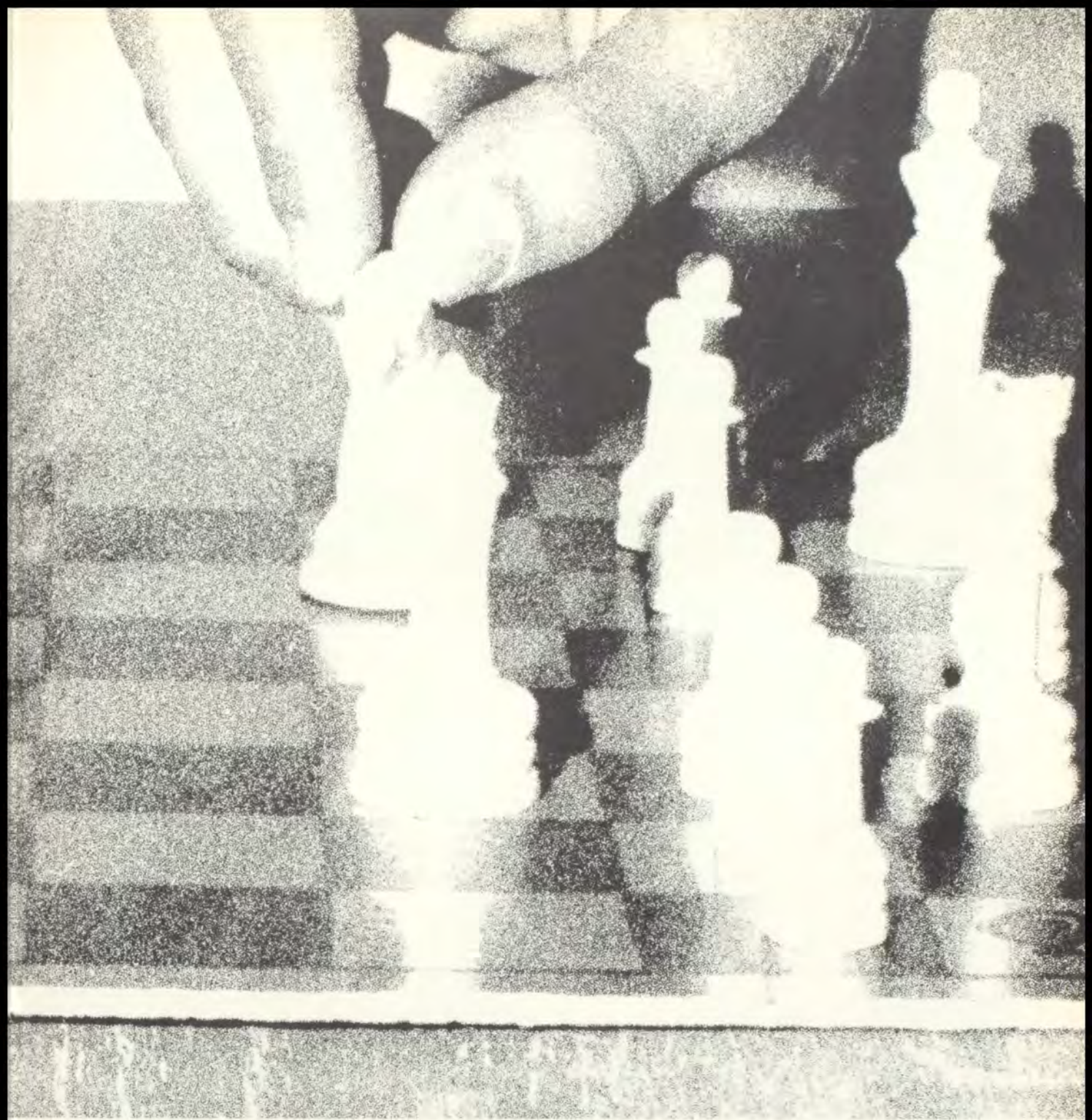

TWIC forms trip to Washington, D.C.

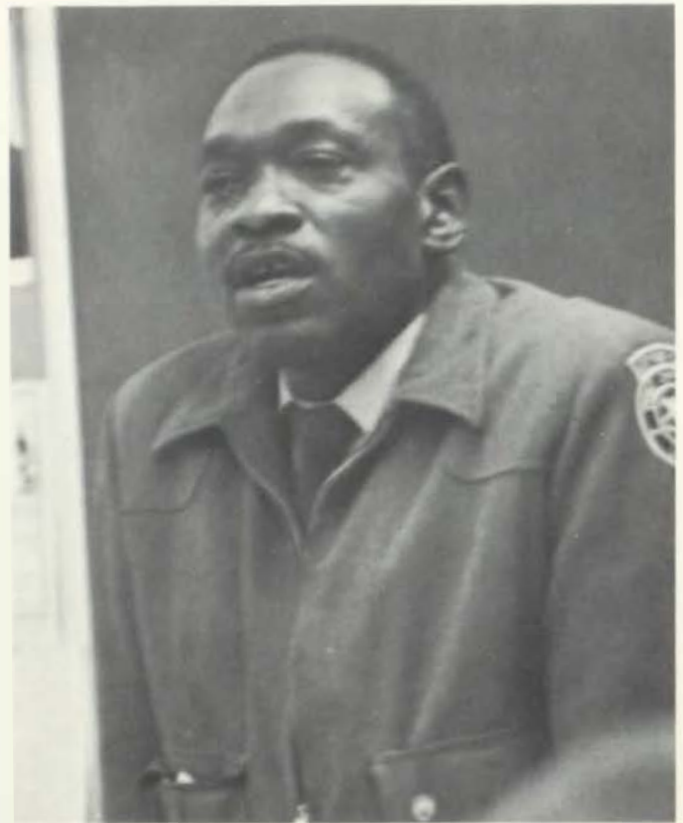
The History department initiated a new club, Today's World Investigation Club, which strived to concern students with various problems confronting Independence and the rest of the world.

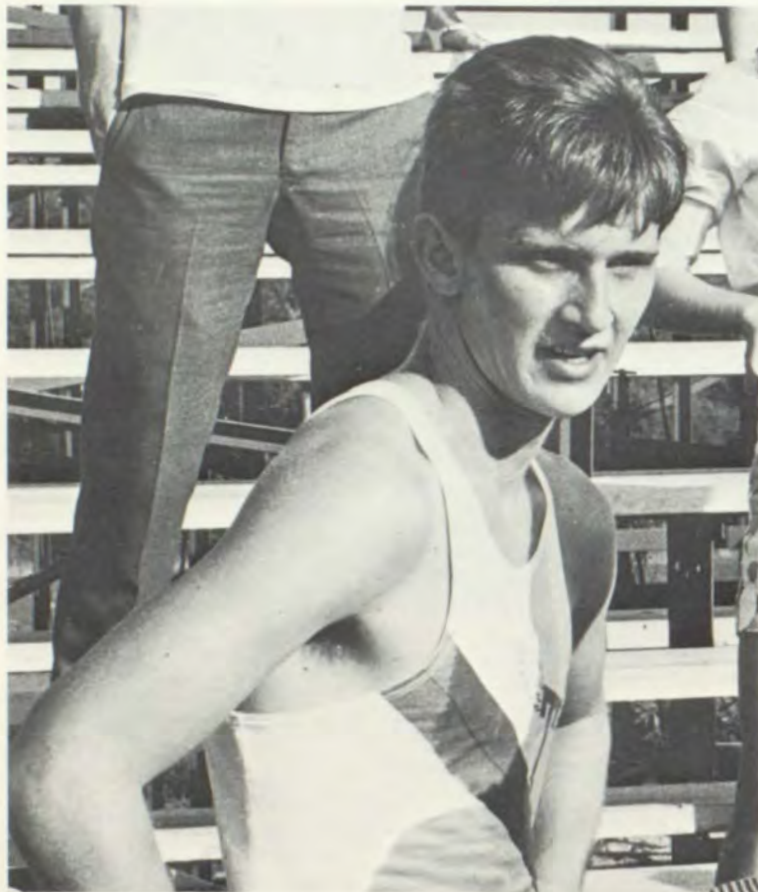

In the battle for the Wagon Wheel Trophy, Truman came out on top as they defeated arch-rival William Chrisman 28-7 ending five weeks of Patriot defeat.

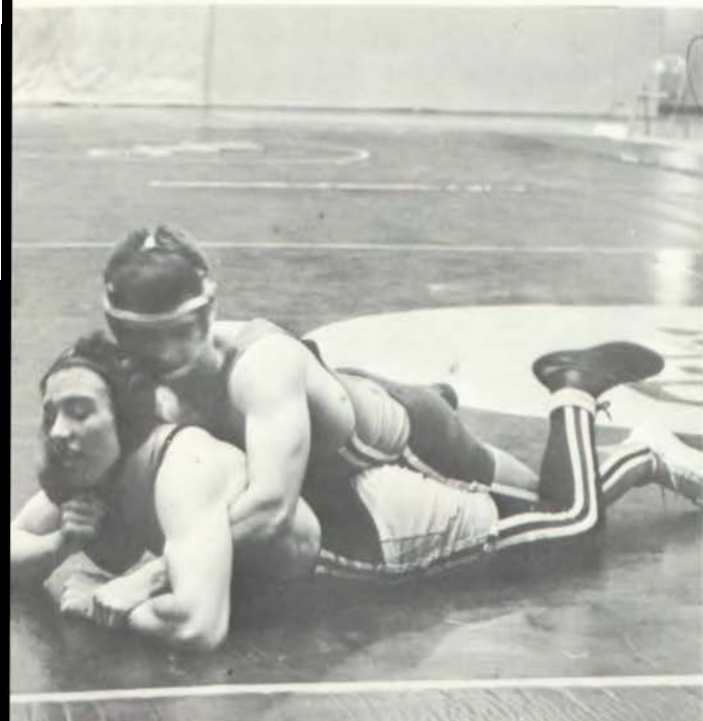

Inconsistent varsity posts 8-14 record

Truman rolled over Southwest 52-50 and Raytown 65-61 to capture the first annual Truman Christmas tournament.

The Patriots split their opening season, defeating the De La Salle Titans 68-66 before losing to the Hawklets from Rockhurst 72-61.

Entering the North Kansas City tournament the following week the Patriots bagged fourth. Defeating Oak Park 68-54 in the first round moved the Pats up against unbeaten Rockhurst who won 67-55. Chrisman squeaked by Truman the following night for third place.

Moving into conference play the Patriots humbled Center 64-55. Following a 66-44 defeat from Raytown South, the Pats rebounded for a 46-43 victory over the Oak Park Northmen.

The William Chrisman Bears upset the Patriots 57-49 to send the Pats back to a .500 record of 6-6. The Pats derailed the following night losing to Ruskin 68-66 after leading al-

most the entire game. The next night Truman blasted Raytown 76-68 to end the first round of conference with a 3-4 record.

Beginning the second round the Patriots again lost to North Kansas City 59-50. Oak Park bounced the Patriots to continue Truman's losing ways. Truman forced Raytown South, "The Kansas City Star's" second-ranked team, into double overtime before falling 58-53.

Before a capacity crowd the William Chrisman Bears upended the Pats by a score of 62-54. This marked the 11th defeat for the Patriots.

In closing the conference play Truman bowed to a hot-shooting Ruskin team 96-67. Raytown also defeated Truman the following night 86-69. This ended conference play with a 4-10 record.

Truman again hosted a regional for the state play-offs. The home court jinx hit the Patriots again as they lost to the Paseo Pirates.

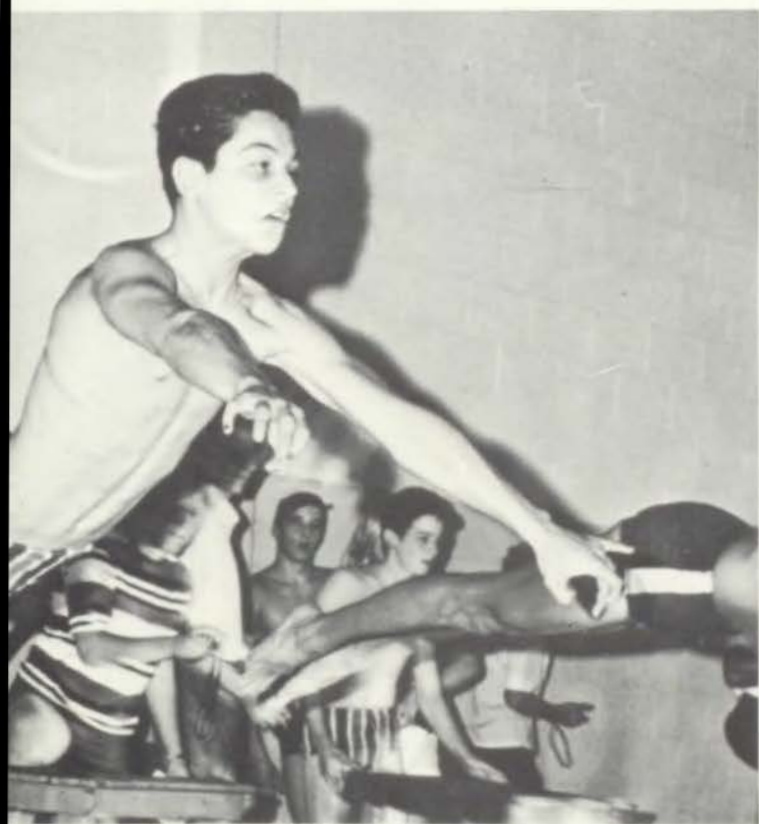

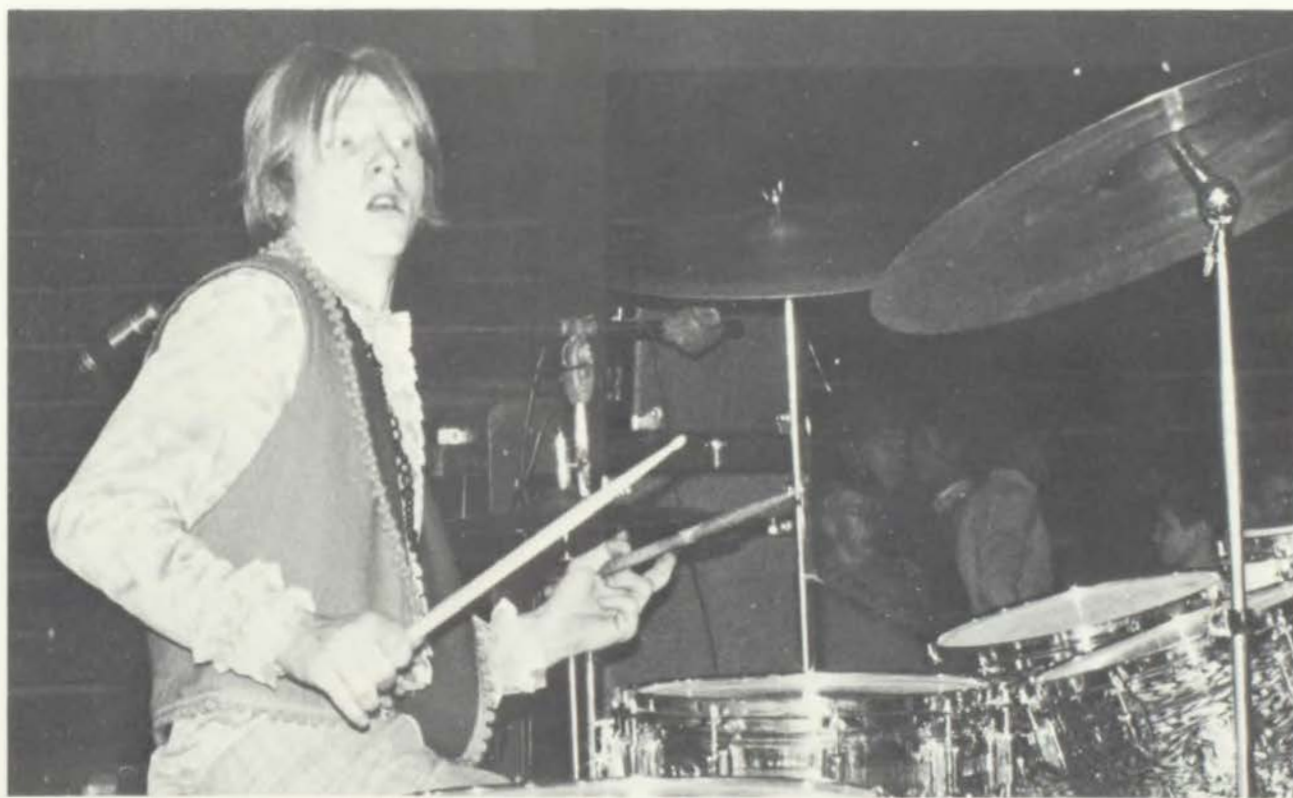

We, as seniors, prided ourselves in that the underclassmen turned to us for leadership and cooperation.

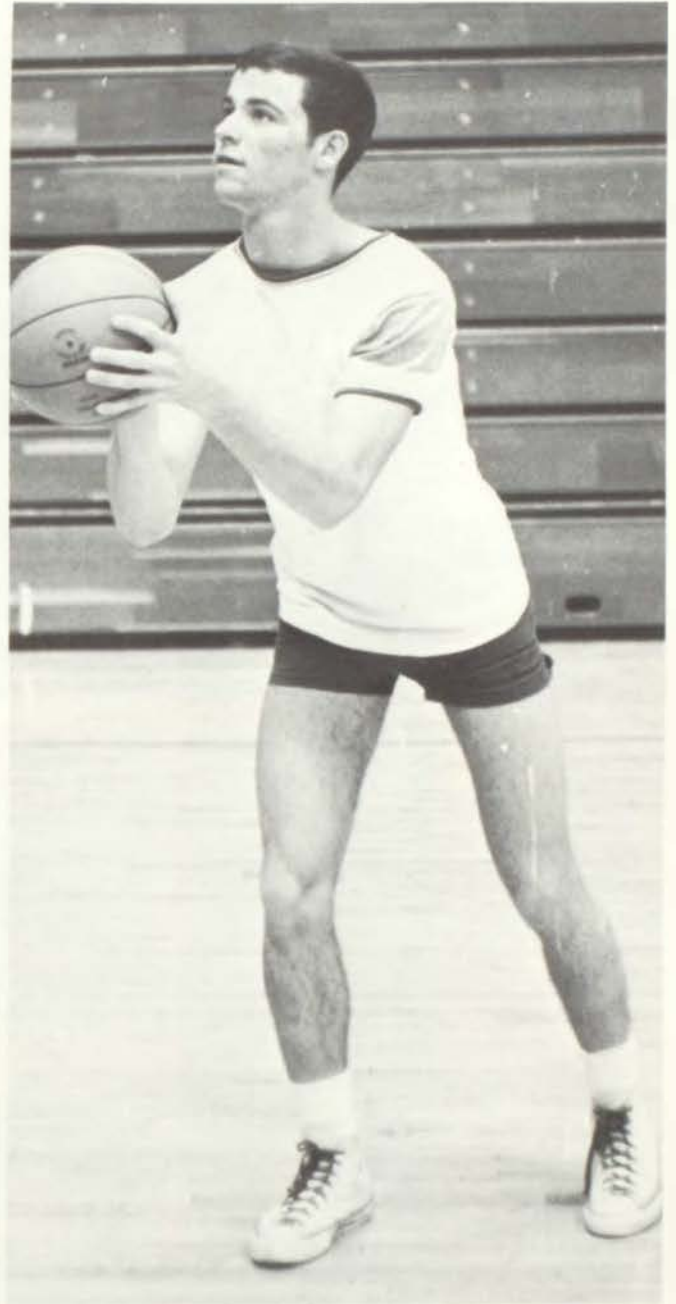
We regretted term papers, college entrance exams and awaiting responsibilities, but laughed when we realized that we had met the challenge that the juniors had yet to face.

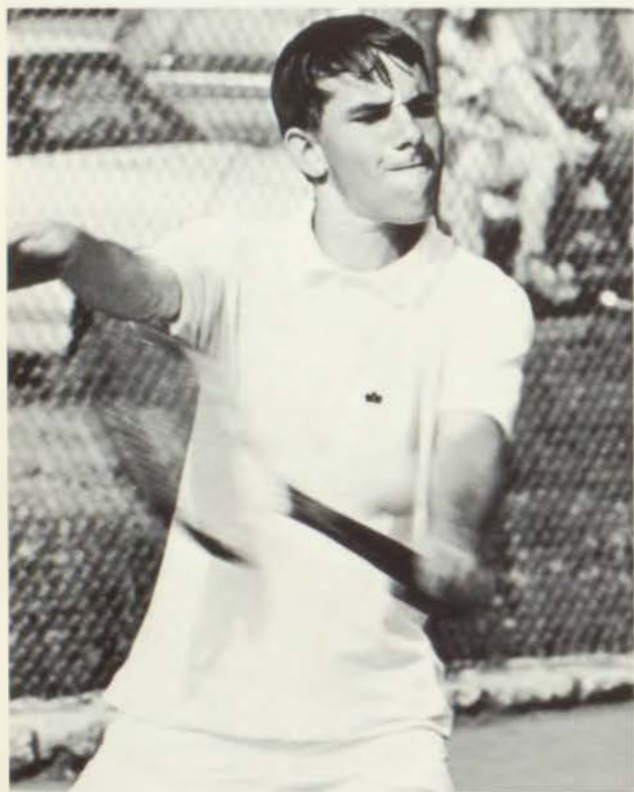

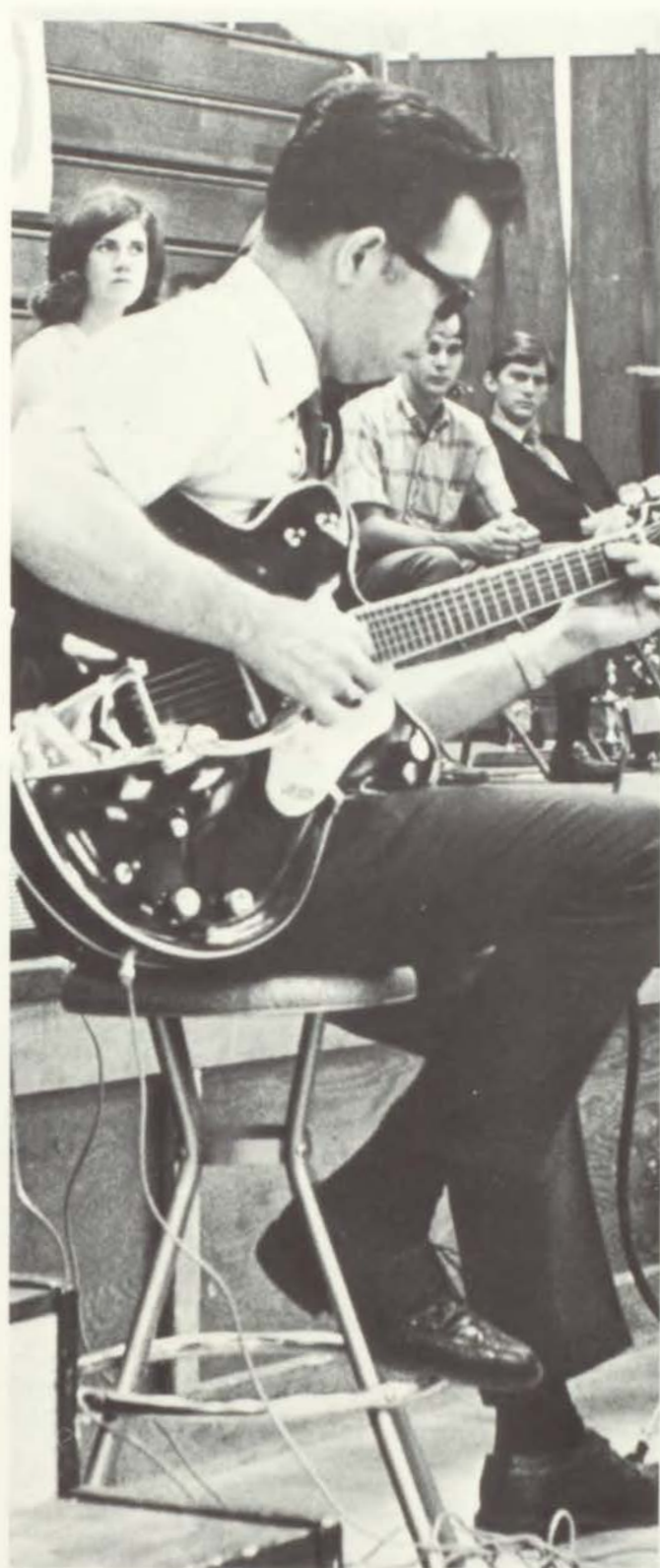

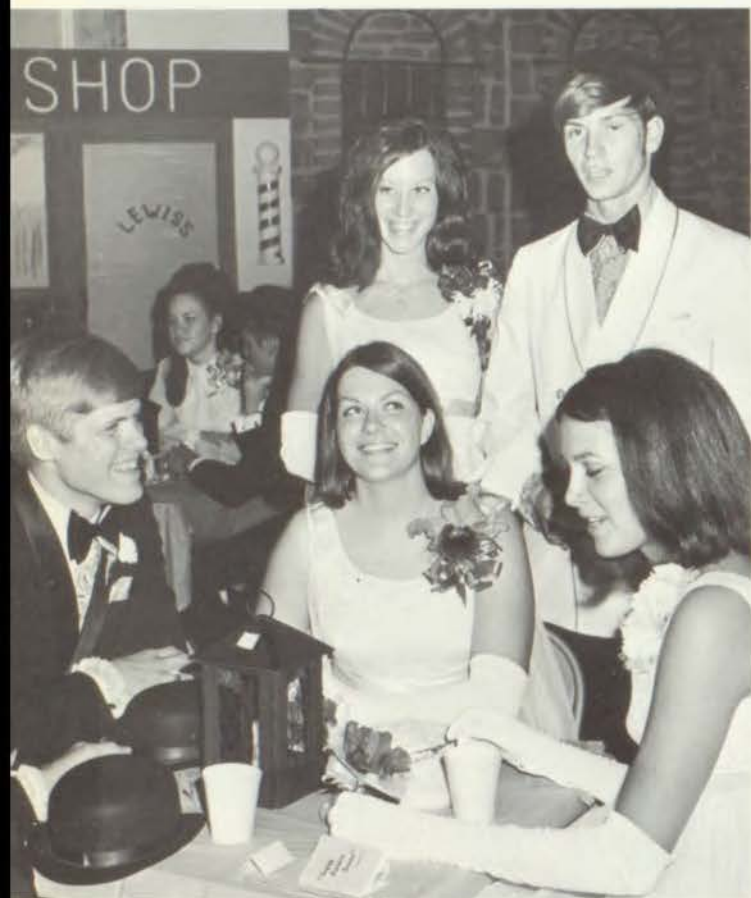
