"The District had a one time opportunity for the movement of the center, along with construction, and Truman was the best place for it due to the location allowing some privacy," Principal Kristel Barr said passionately.



Senior Nico Hall was crowned King and the crowd went wild.


"I felt like I had a lot of friends and I was the center of attention," Hall said.

had come together to support the needy families and do every thing they could to make their Christmases happen.




> After all the fun of the tournament most players were planning on playing again next year and were hoping to improve their game.

"We're going to get the team back together next year," Diveley said. "We played as a team and represented the sophomores well."


The final whistle blew and cheers filled the gym at the end of the game. Hands were shaken and pictures were snapped of the teachers with their plaque.












The final notes of "Sincere" were drowned routines and for Lewis and Wilson becoming out by the laughter, the lights dimmed and







"Reading is so important because that is how information is passed from one generation to the next," Neal stated.


Minutes passed and eventually the teacher ended SSR, making the readers slowly come back to reality.





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



"He does Target Lady the best," senior Madison Greco said.


He dreamt of going to France to live in a big castle. He was fluent in French and loved saying things to

Although his friends did not share the same affection for his favorite genre of music, they enjoyed having him around.


"I don't really like alternative, but if it works for him I am okay," sophomore Andrew Muelleman said.







determined wrestler. "He is hardworking and never quits trying to learn and improve his wrestling ability," Miller said.




Sitting in front of his computer, freshman Blake Marriott stared intently at the screen during 1st block.

Clark worked well in groups and brought humor to the classroom.


"She listens well when we need to get down to business," science teacher Levi Goes said.





"We decorated the entire gym," Eikenbary said. "They really deserved it."



For the younger girls just being on varsity was a big accomplishment.


"Being on varsity this year was the best, since I was on junior varsity last year," Willits said.

"He usually gives you a reference of what he wants you to do and he makes sure you understand what you're doing wrong," Dominguez said.

















With sweat dripping down their faces and arms, the boys huddled up to end practice knowing that they were progressively getting better with each and every day.




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


"It was fun making it to State, but I did a lot better at Conference," Schoneboom said. "I just always try to do my best and improve my previous times."


"It's fun and easy," junior Taylor Porterfield said.


Freshman Brandie Simon was in World Geography at the school and loved it.





The sounds of the room gradually diminished and the students went on with their day envisioning their next big story or thinking about their recent interview.



junior Derek Kern said. "He wants projects like absolutely perfect. He has a weird grading system. He can just look at it and see if it is good or not."








"Humorous interpretation, dramatic interpretation, and duo are the most difficult and my favorite to coach, watch and critique," Ms. Lenger said.



"I am really proud that the students are taking ownership in their strengths and weaknesses and working to be the best that we can be," Ms. Ross said.



Score and the High Visual Award. Even though being a part of band and fall guard took dedication, students made everlasting memories.


> "My best memory from band was the Washington D.C. trip," senior Mike Eldridge said. "It's just fun being with all of your friends."




Not only are the class curriculums and the pictures that are taken different but the teachers, Ben Merithew and Aaron Starek, are different as well.
