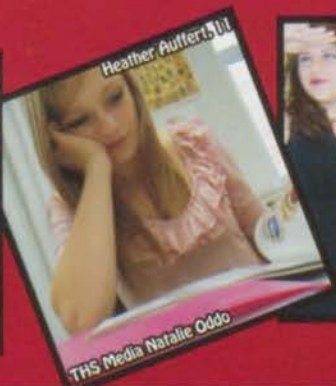

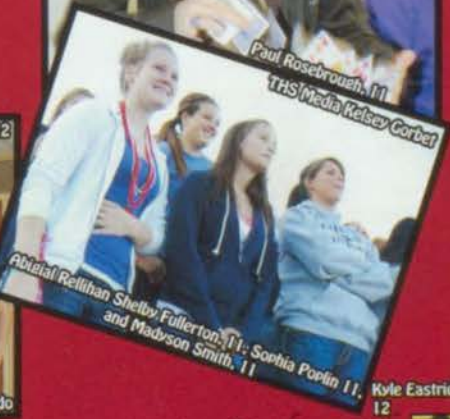

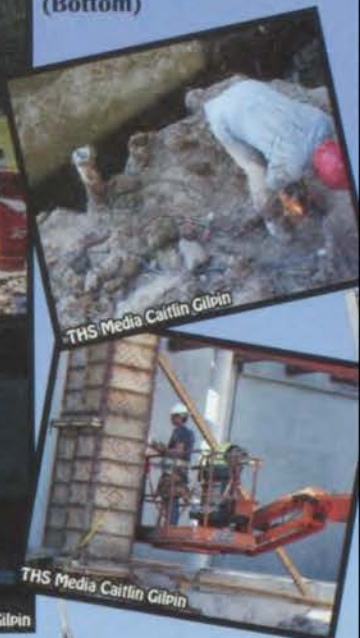

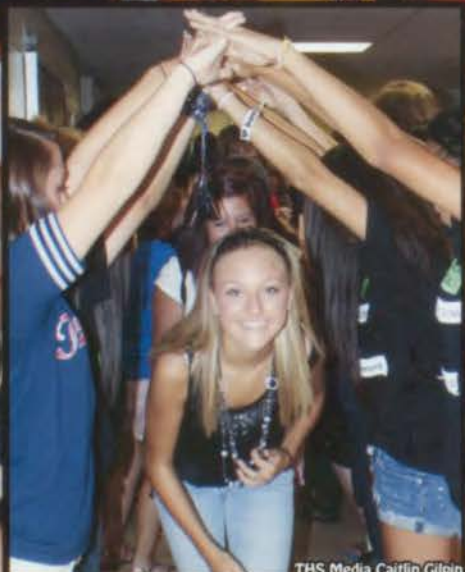

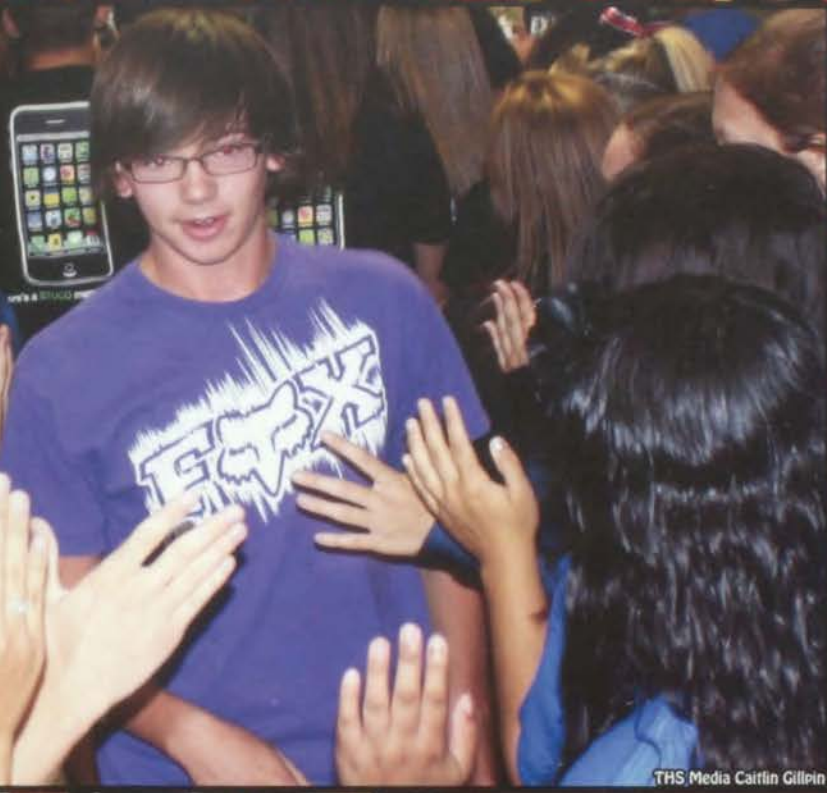

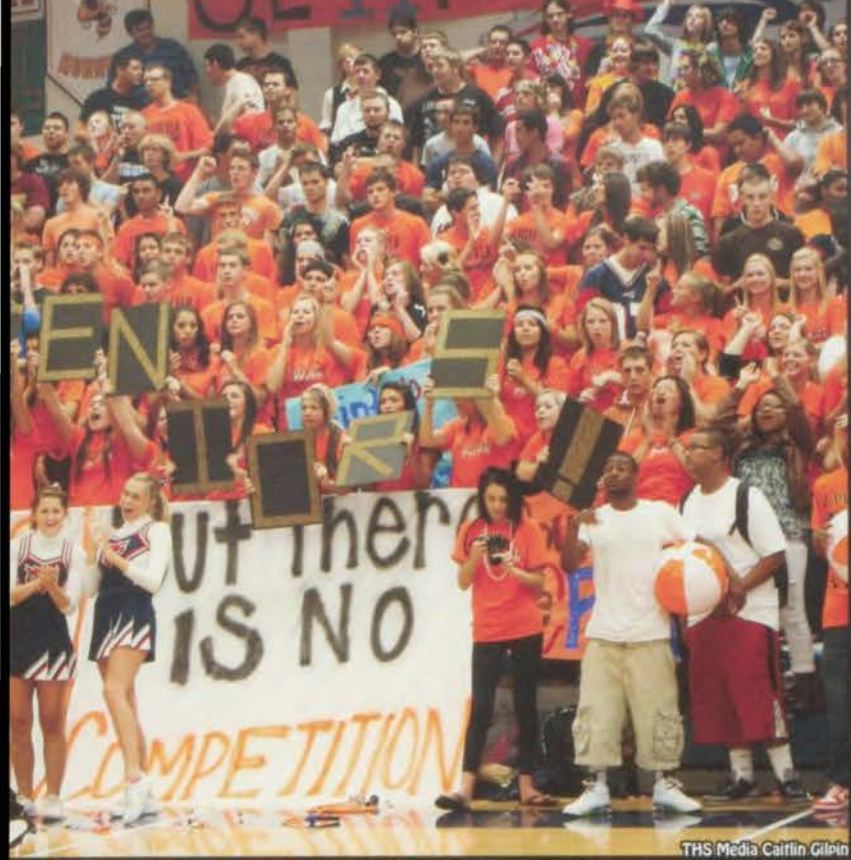

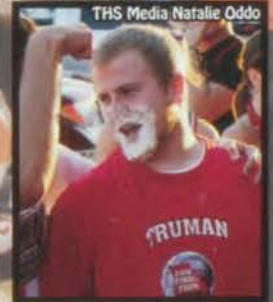

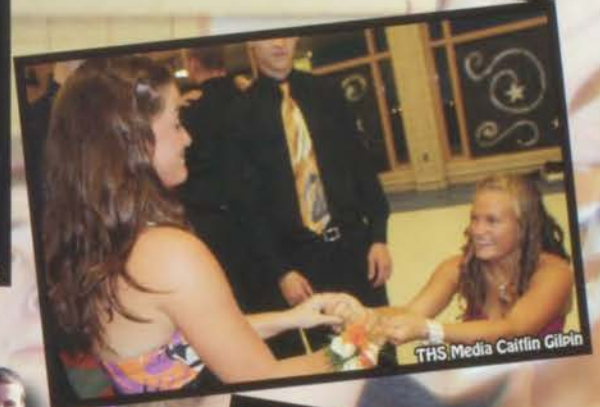

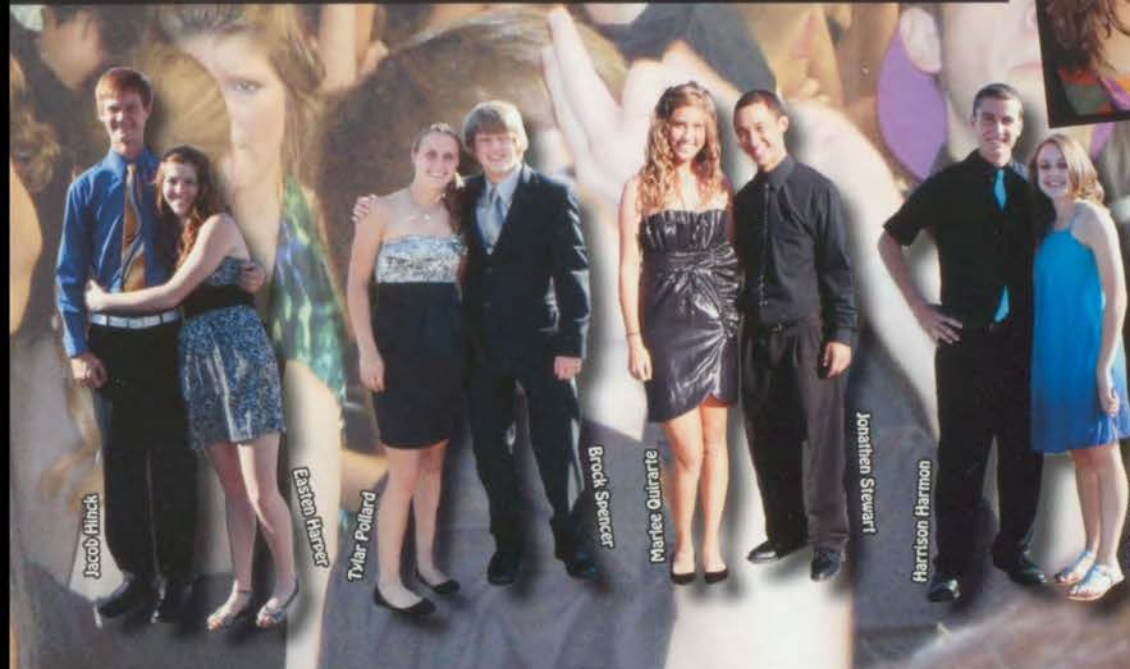

Although the script might have been tough to act, theatre teacher Ron Meyer found that the meaning was most important for his students to grasp.

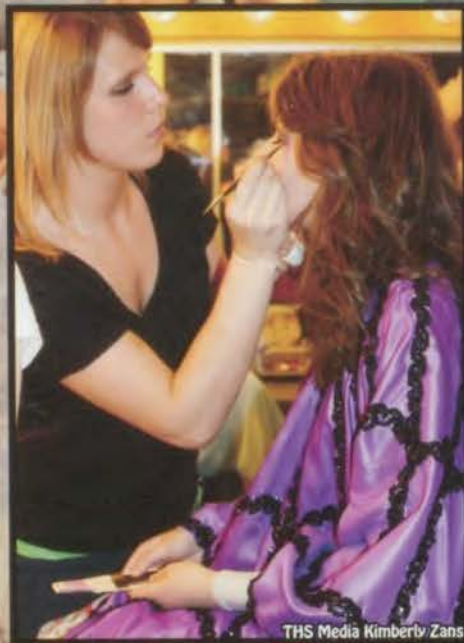

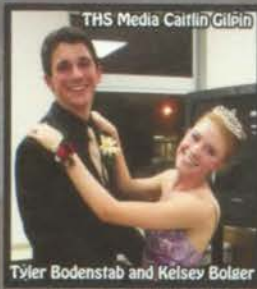

"The funniest is her driving skills," he said.

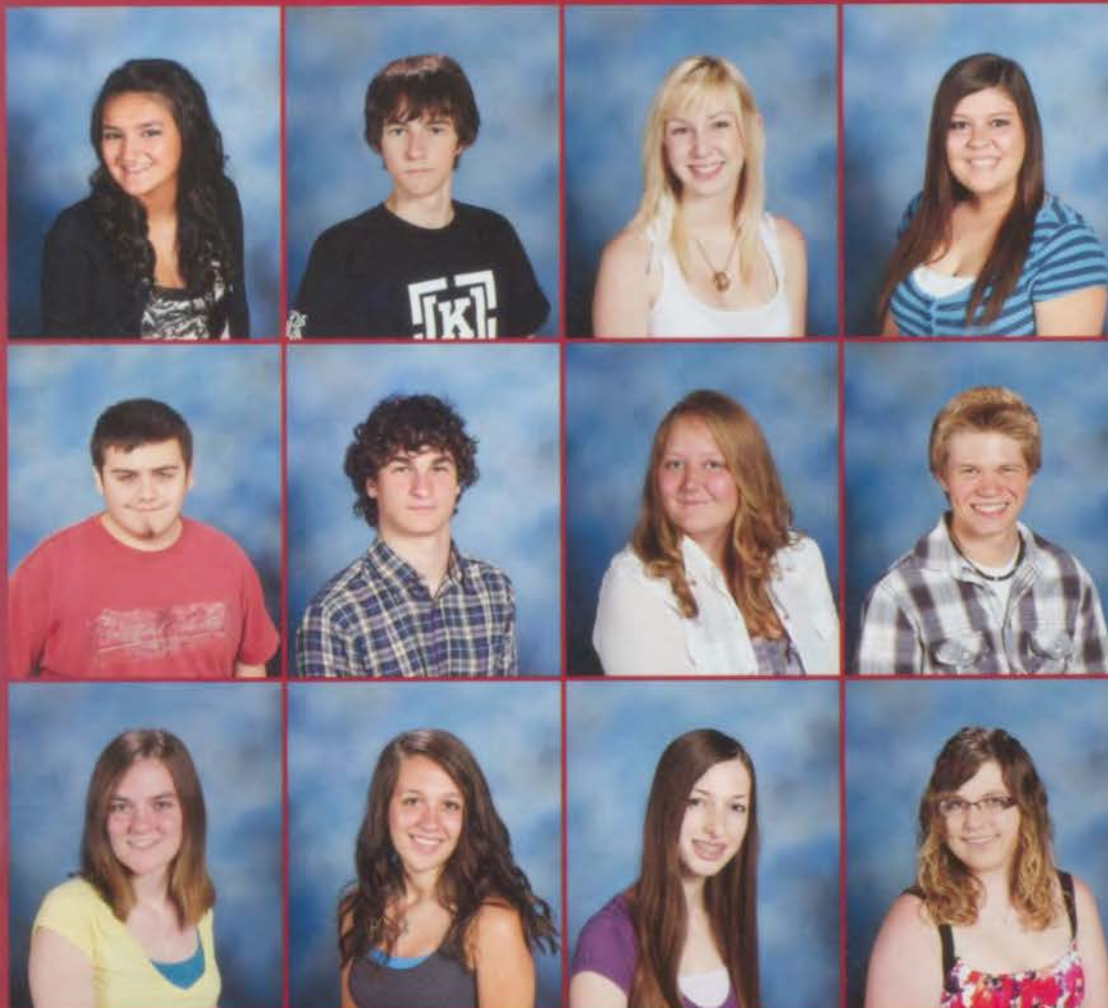
Dani had her own stories to tell about her brother. "He's a lot weirder than you think."

Even though the girls have a strong relationship, the girls can annoy one another fairly easily.

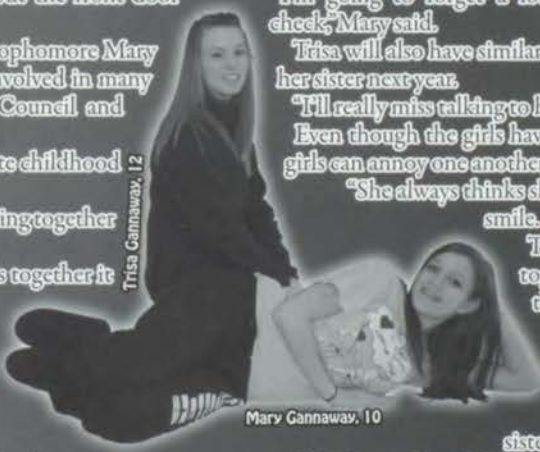
"She always thinks she's right," Mary said with a smile.

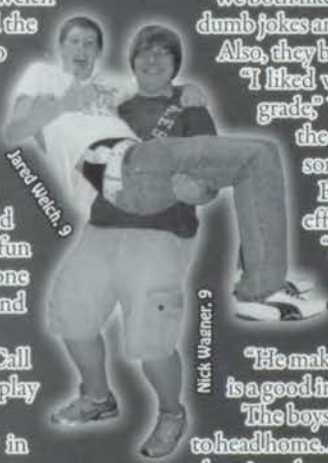

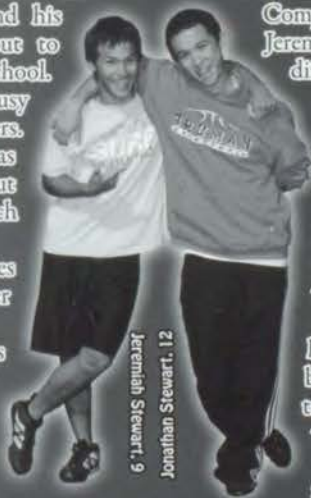
Jonathan and Jeremiah Stewart

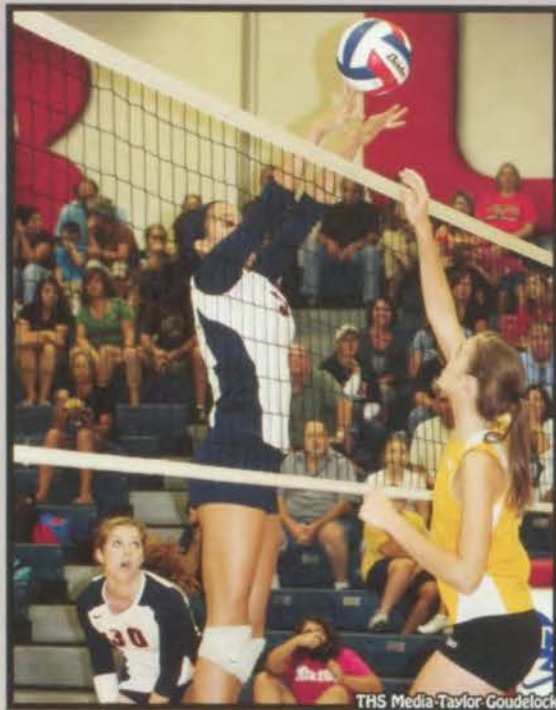

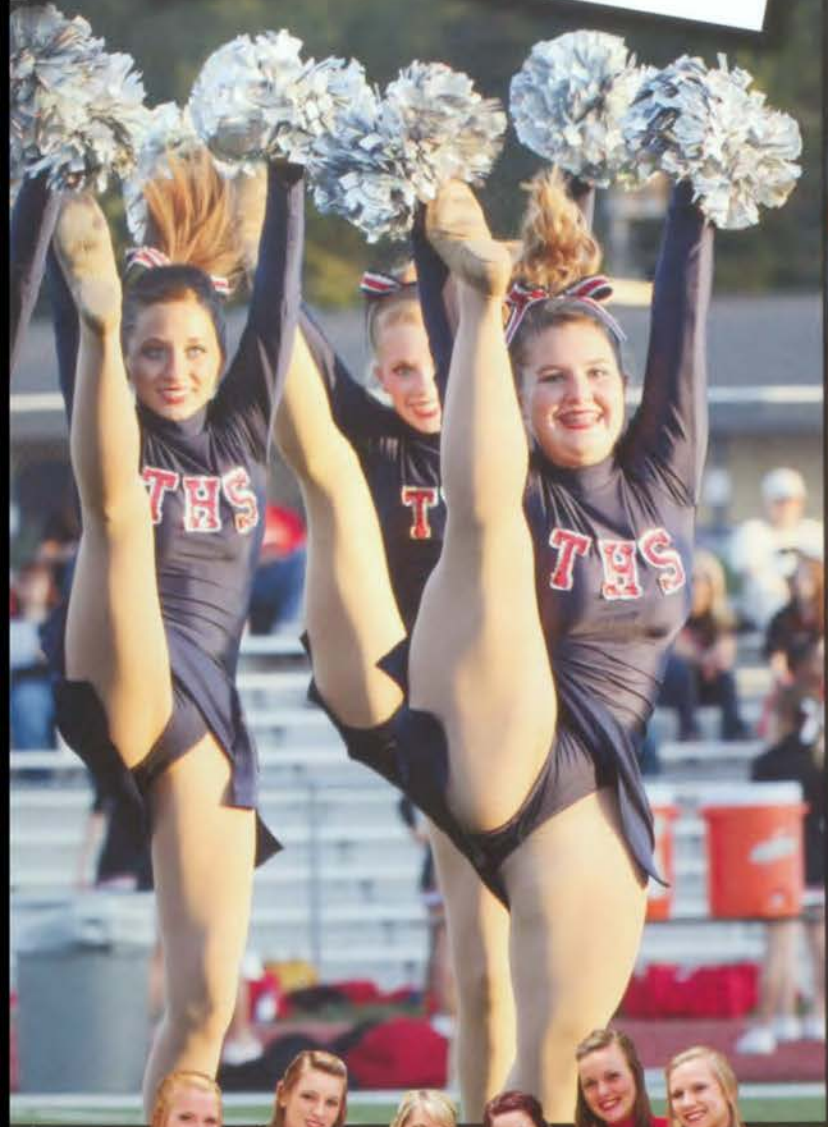

The team worked very hard throughout the season to get to the State game, and many supporters came to cheer on their favorite softball team every step of the way.

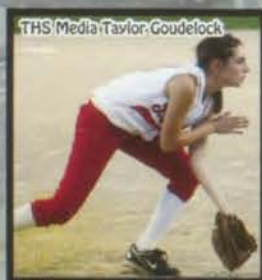
"Every little thing counts in games like this," Coen said. "It was the best feeling and I enjoy Truman's softball team."

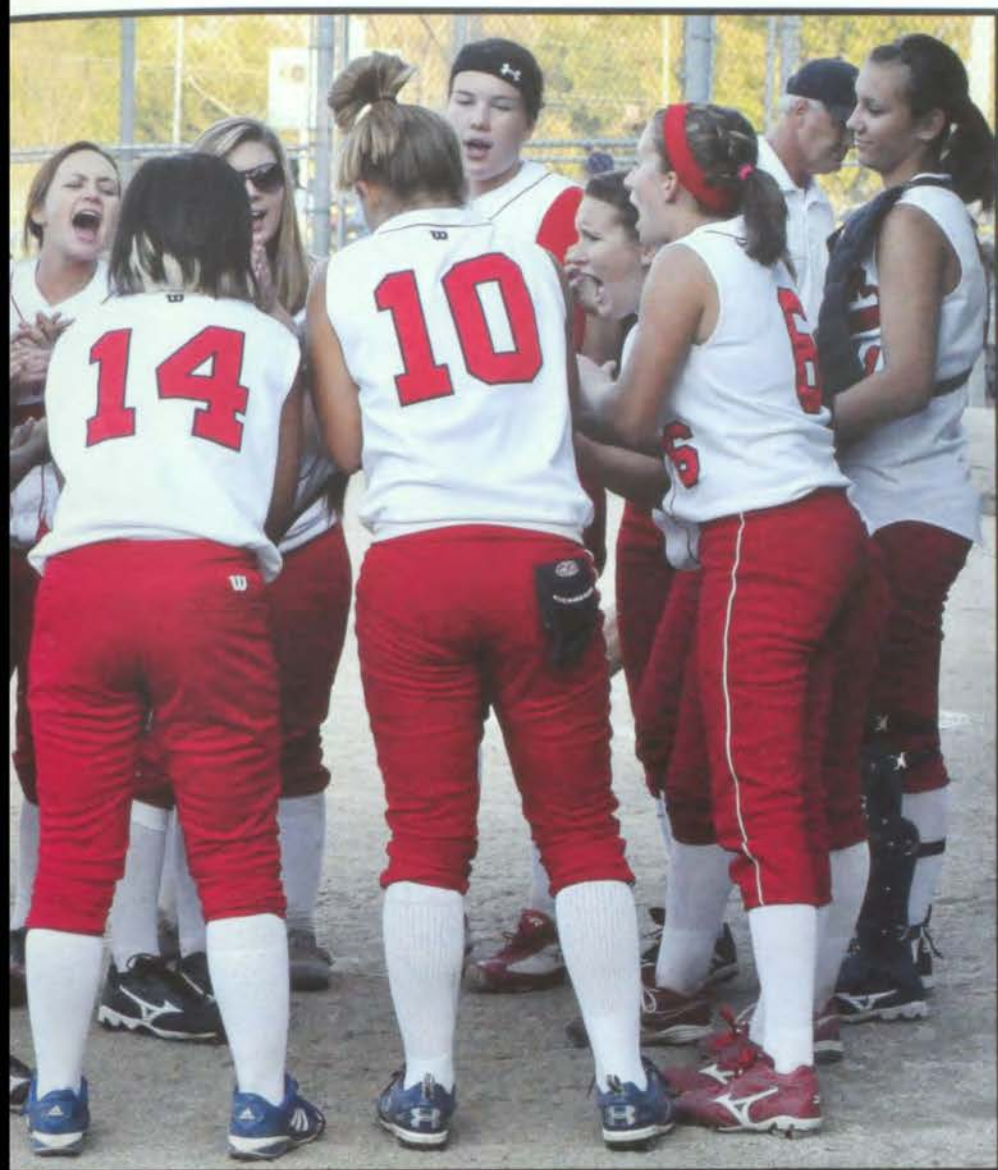

Besides the strenuous practices, the time was still enjoyable.

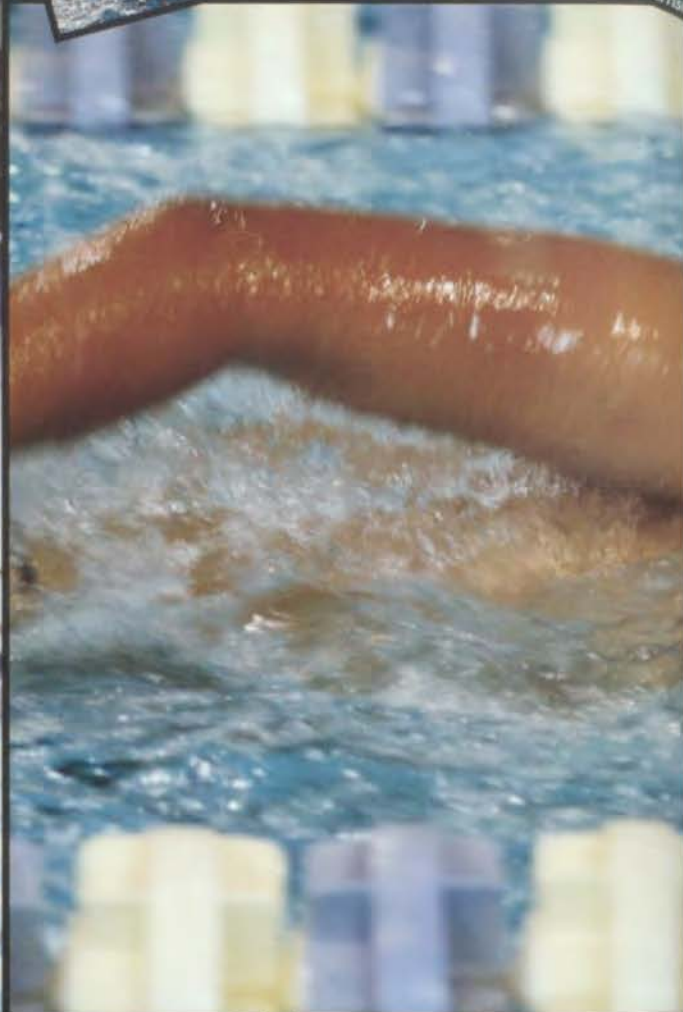
"We could all be ourselves around each other," Boman stated. "There were a lot of crazy antics at practice."

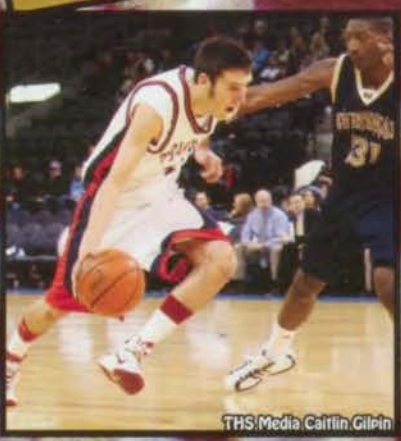

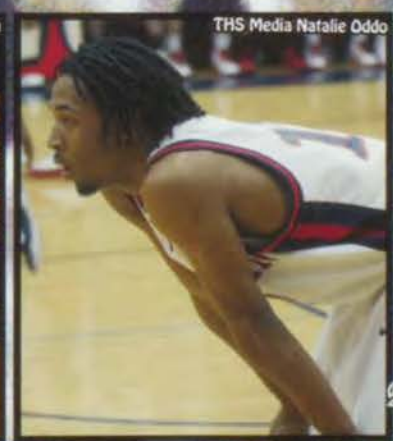

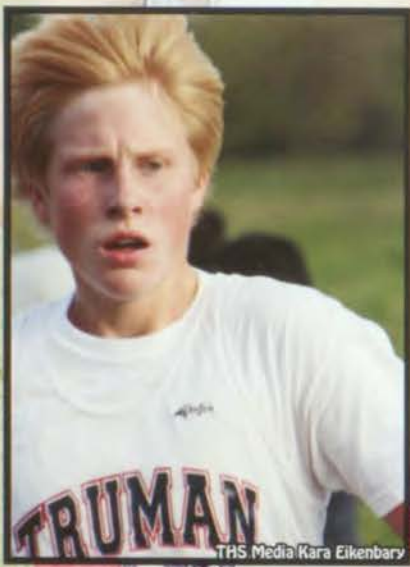

Sophomore Stuart Lauber also played on the JV team. He liked that he got a lot of playing time in the games.

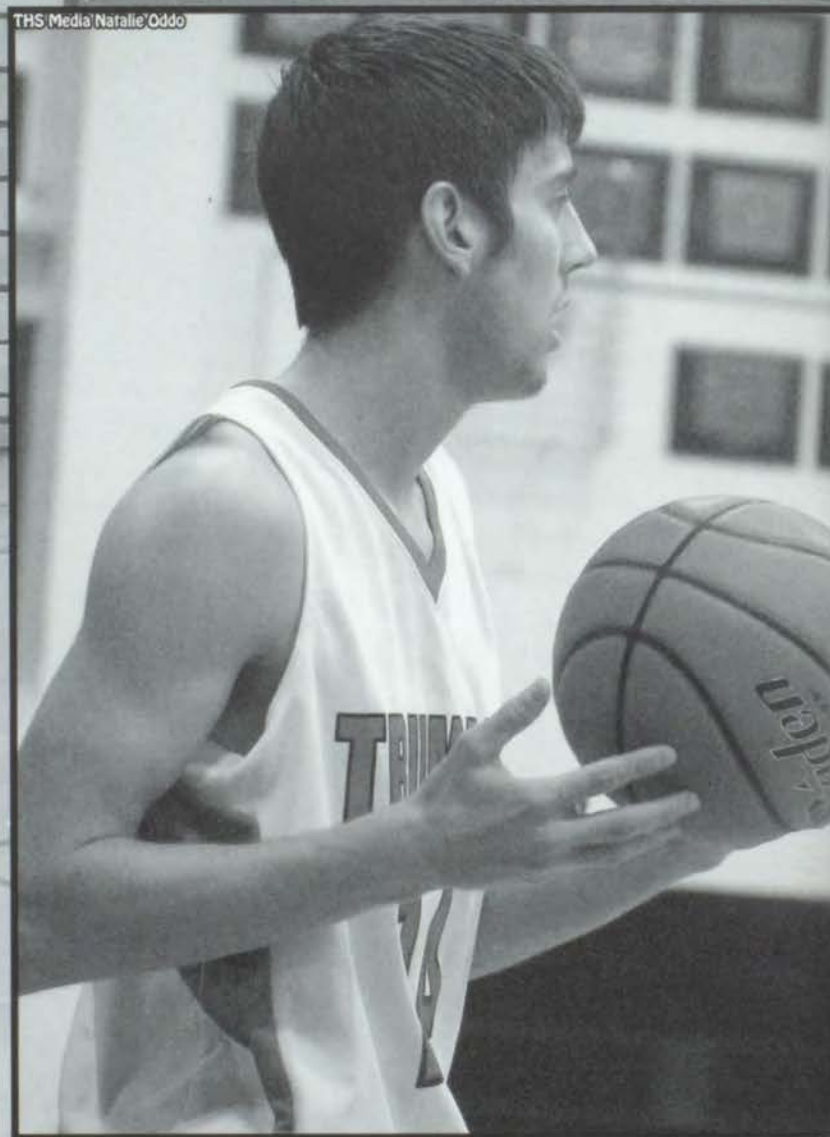
"Even though the season didn't go that well, it was a good learning experience and I got better," Lauber said.

Another factor that contributed to the season was the coaching. Head Coach James Page helped make a difference.

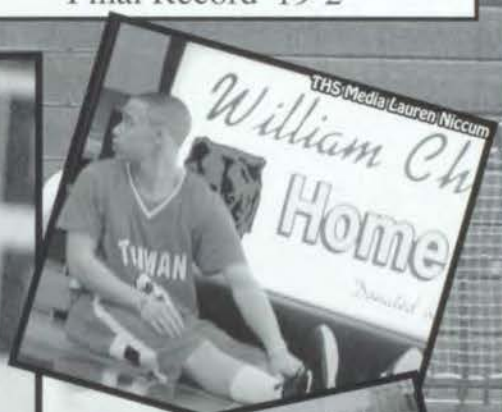
"He was really good at getting his point across without being mean," Tomlin said.

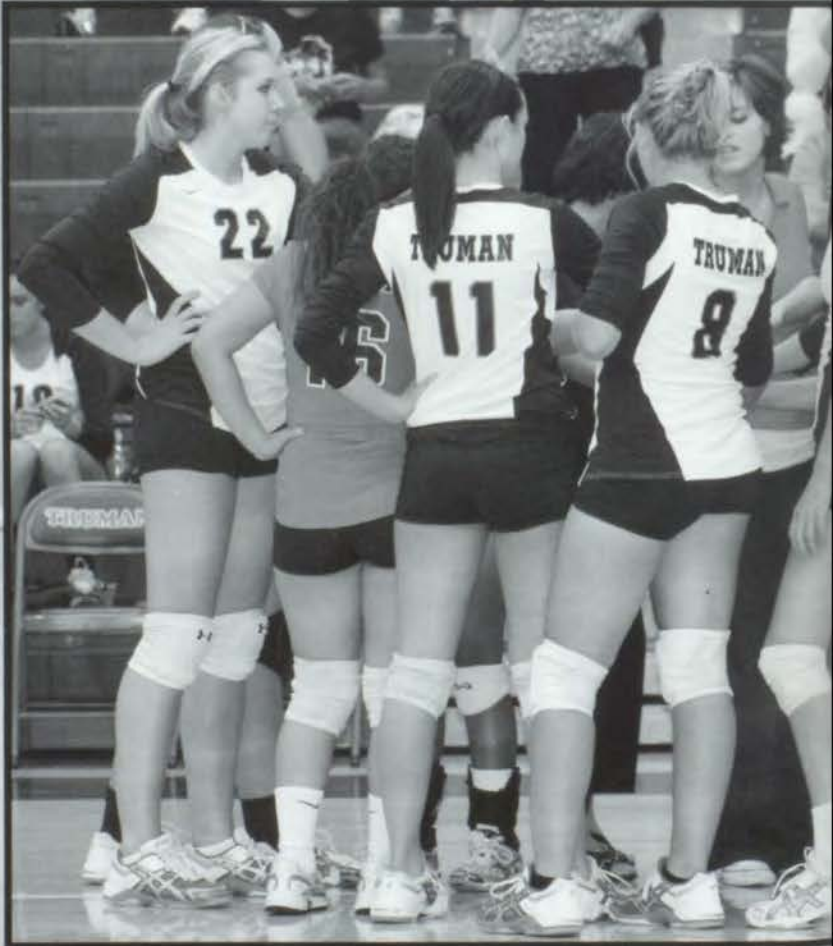
Schroeder thought differently. "The hardest thing about playing was trying to communicate and play together well," Schroeder said. "I am very competitive and hate when we are losing."

The teams walked along the net and slapped hands with their opponents. They headed to their respective benches changed out of their gear, and got some food from the concessions, ready to watch the varsity game.

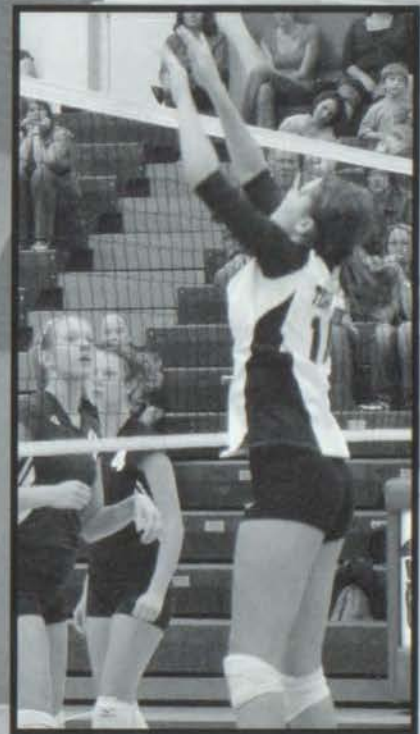

By the end of the season, the girls were all confident in their ability to win games. They felt proud to have progressed so much as a team.

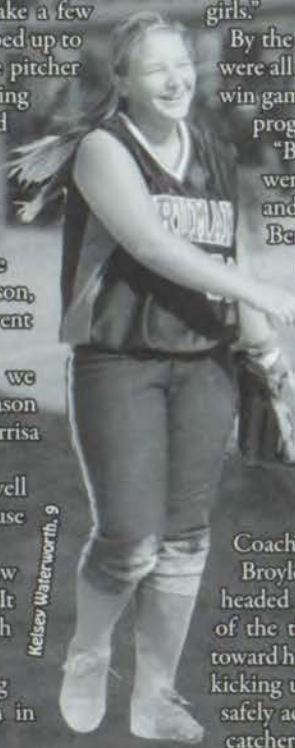
"By the end of the season we were able to play teams tough and sometimes win," Coach Berg said. "I saw great gains in the JV team."

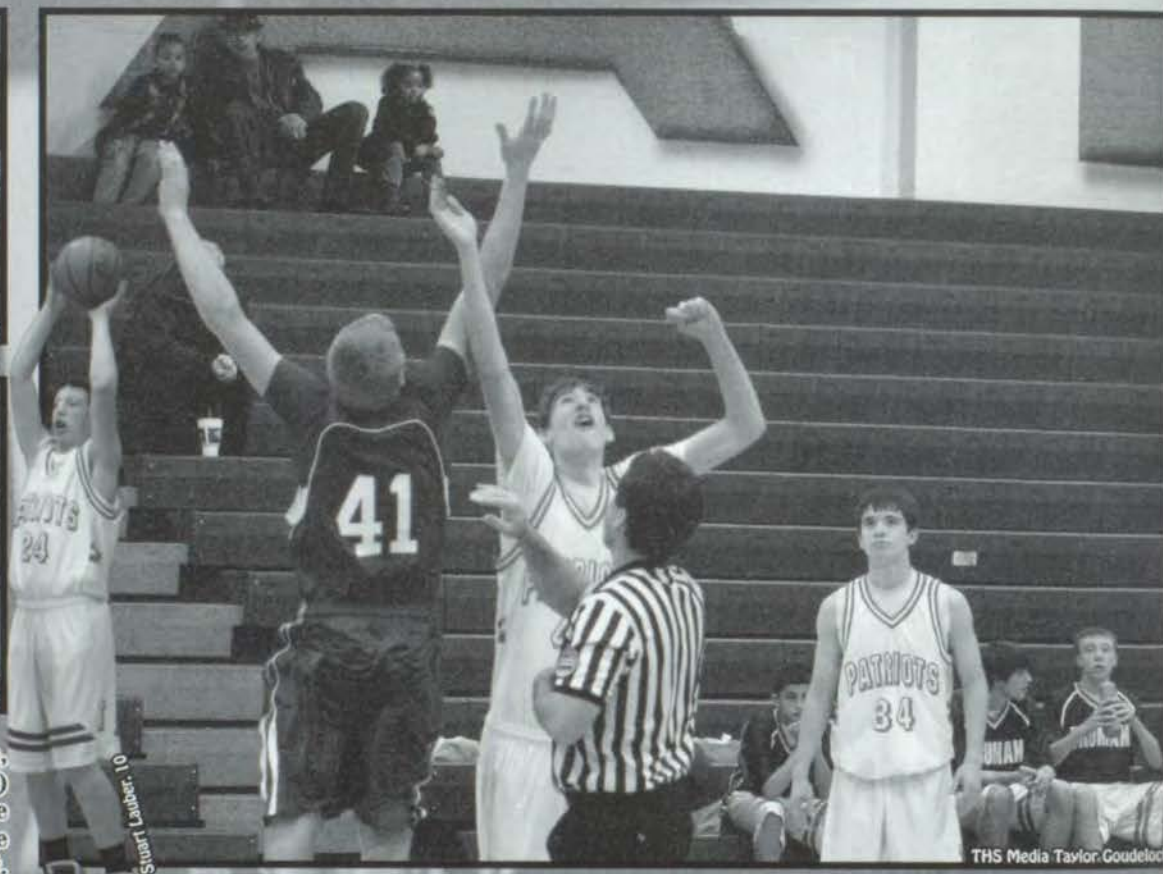

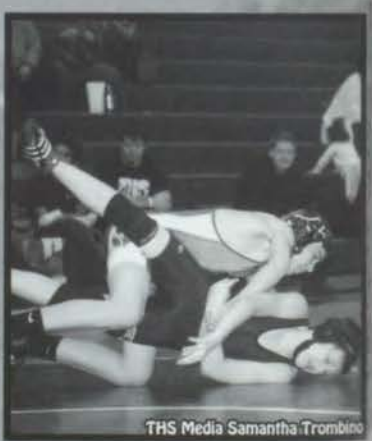

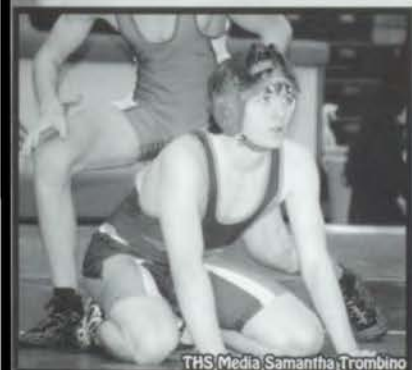
"I like that it was an individual sport," Hicks said. "But you also wrestle to get points for your team."

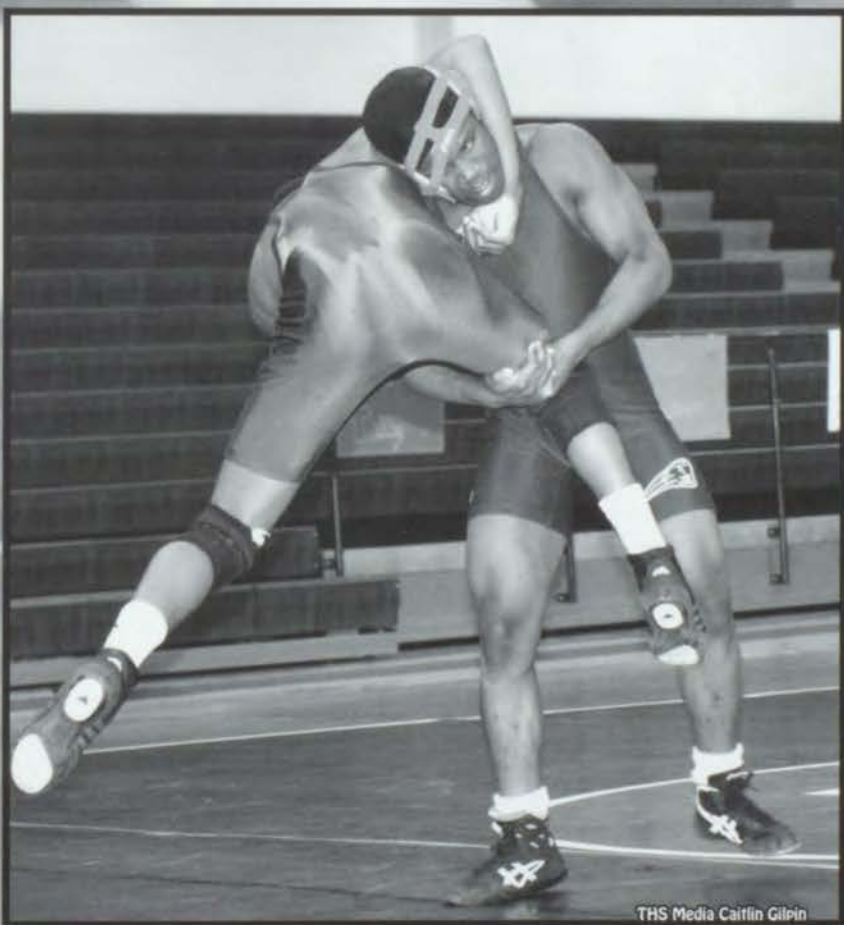

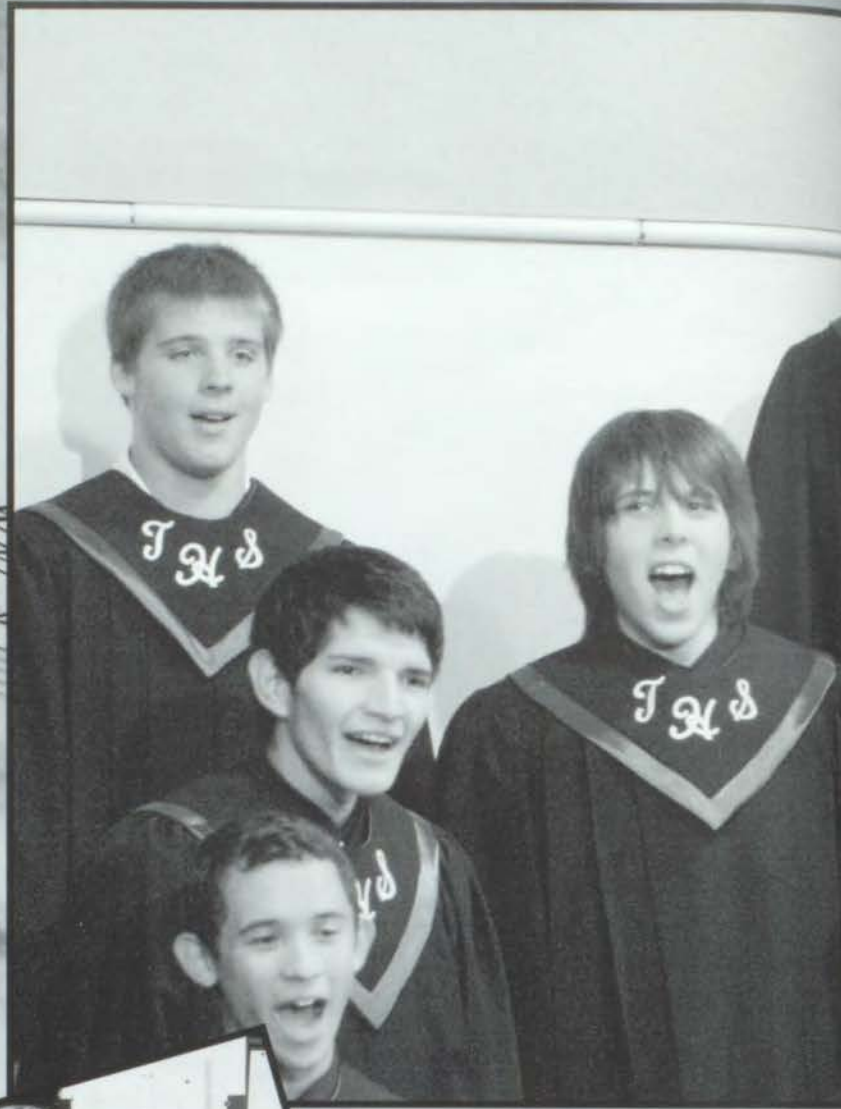

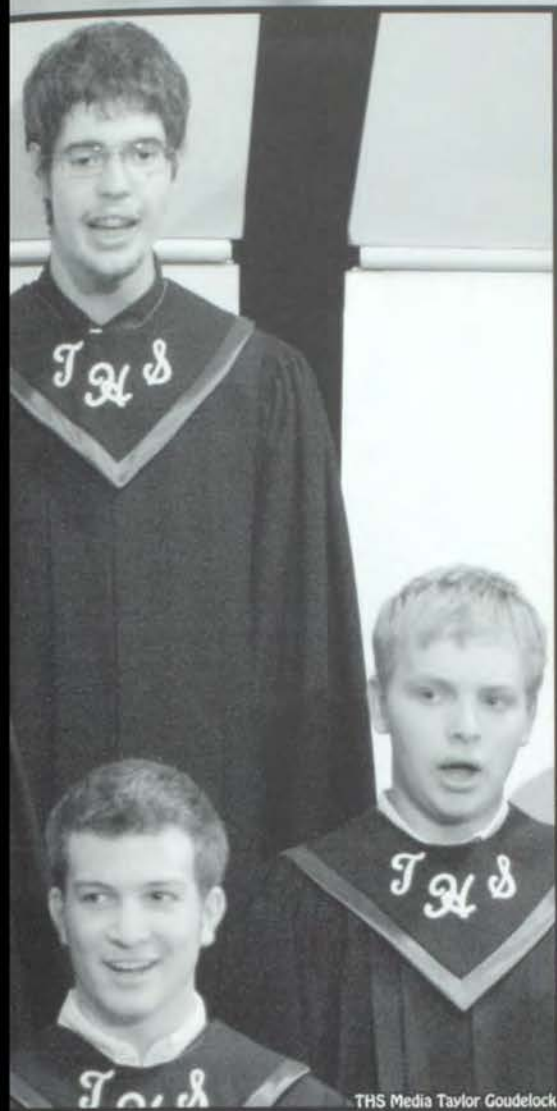

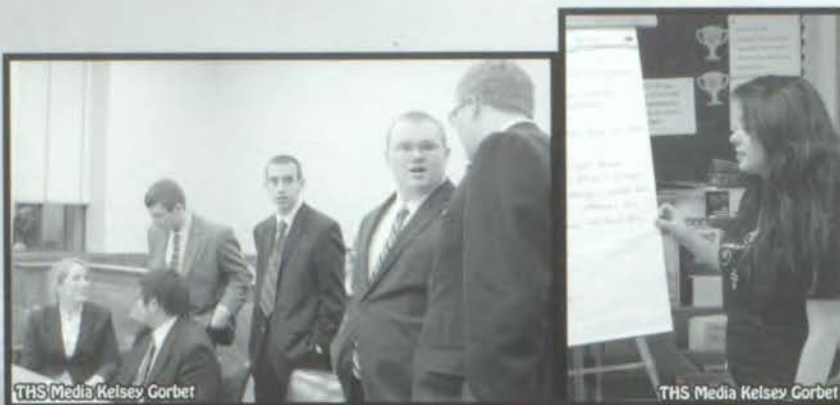

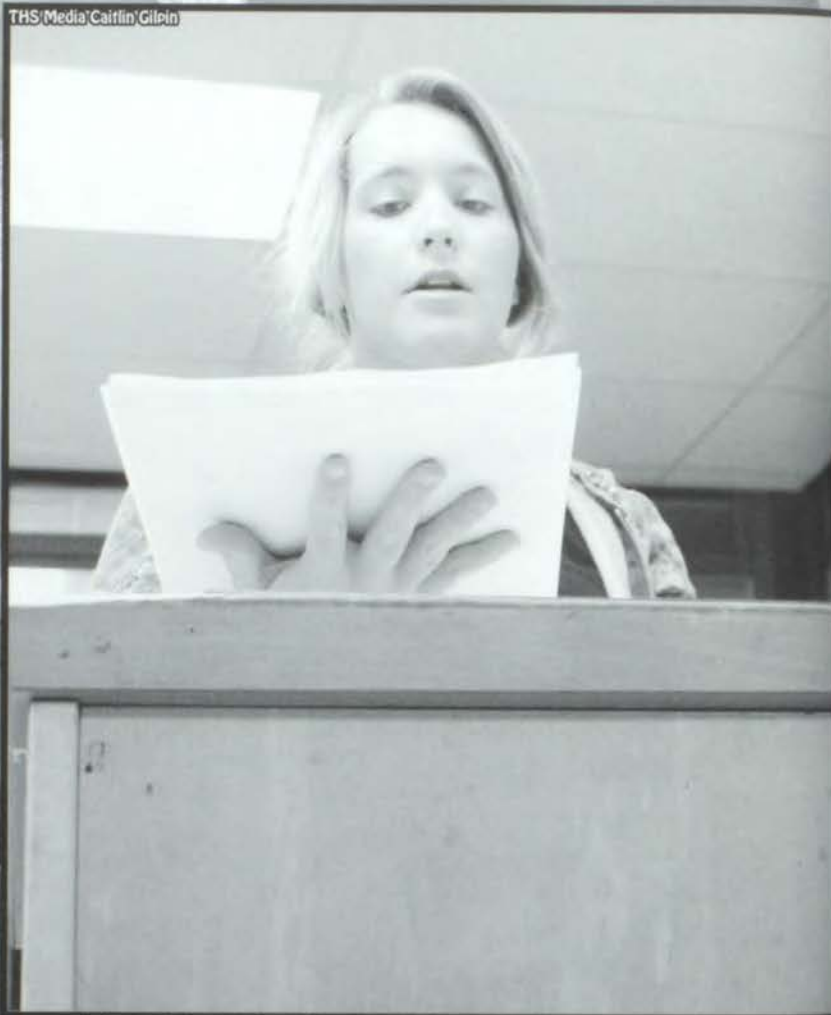

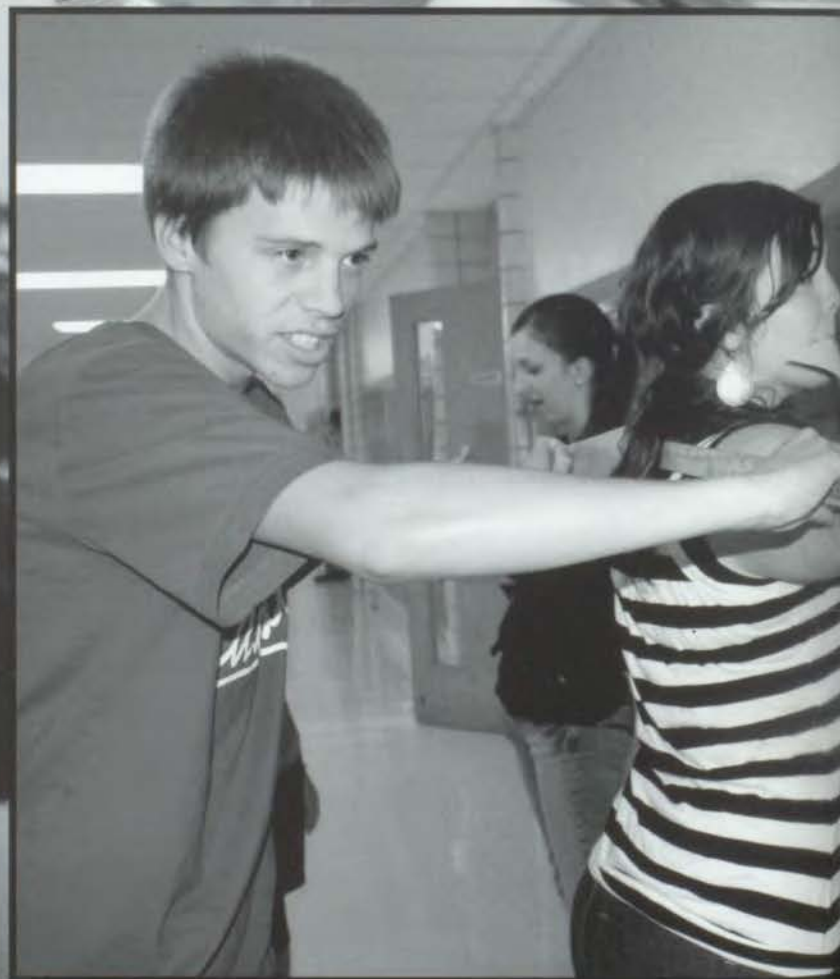

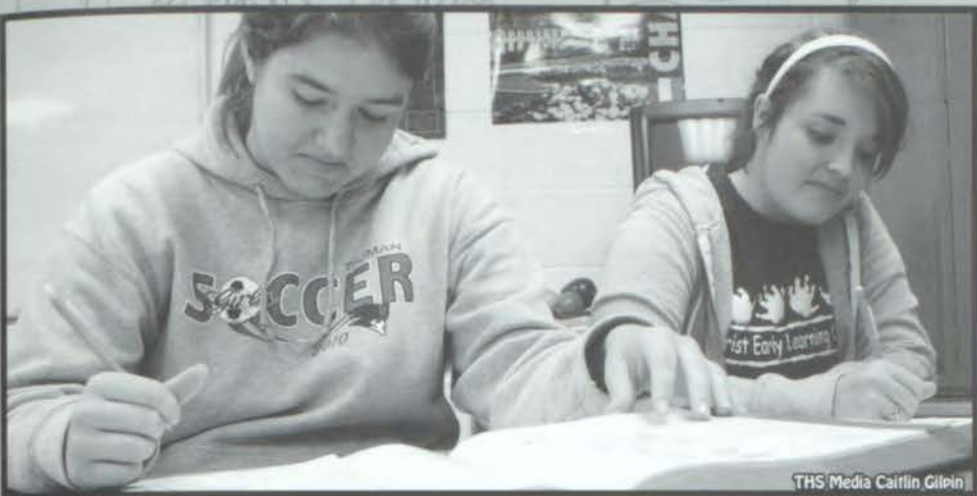

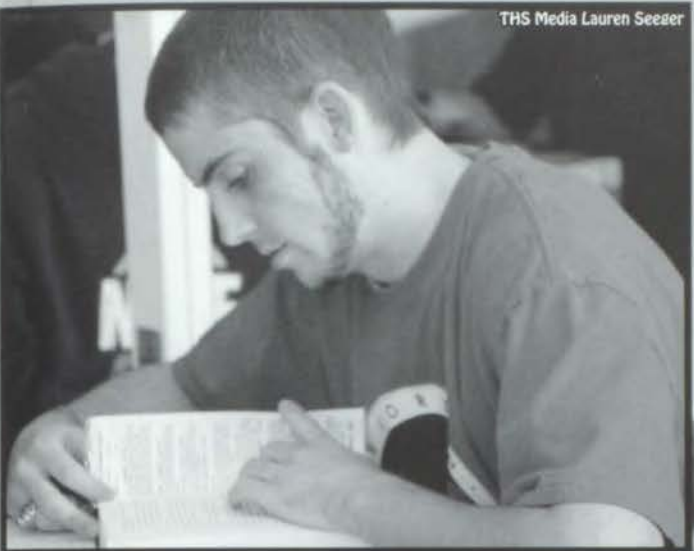

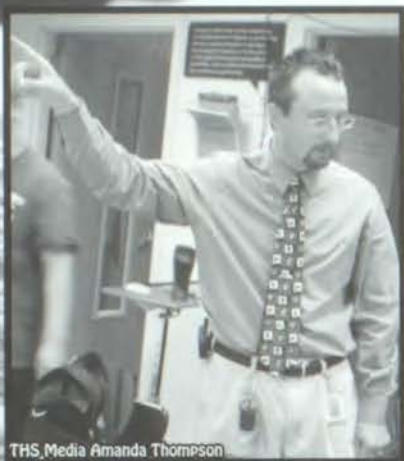

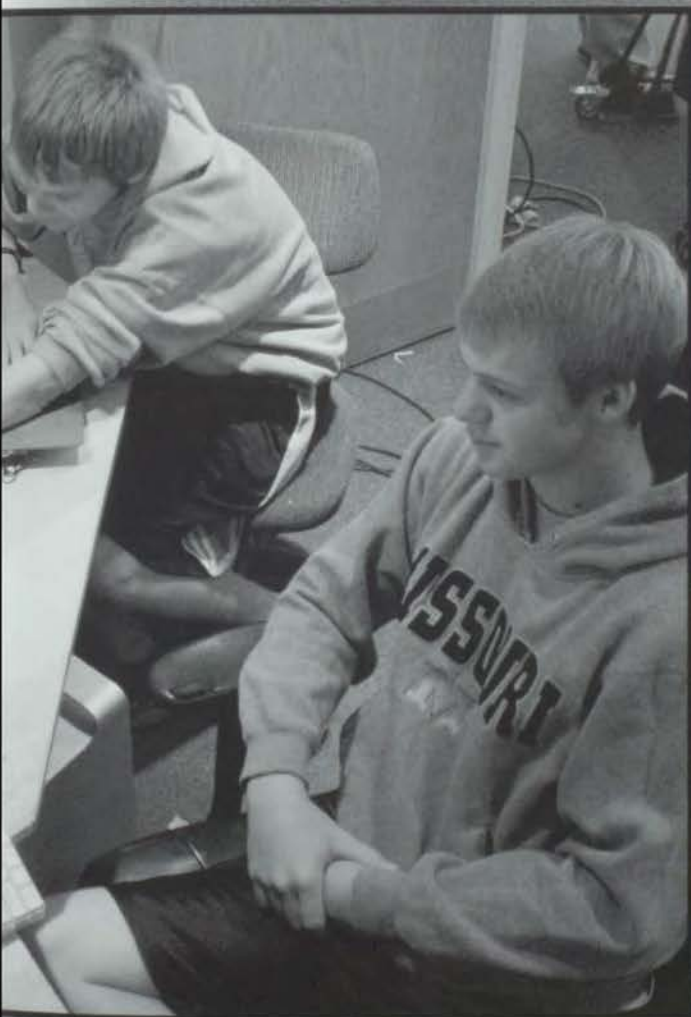

Outside of class, Cappuzzo focused her camera on the woods in the distance. Finally satisfied, she took the shot. The next day found her back in the dark room developing more great photos.

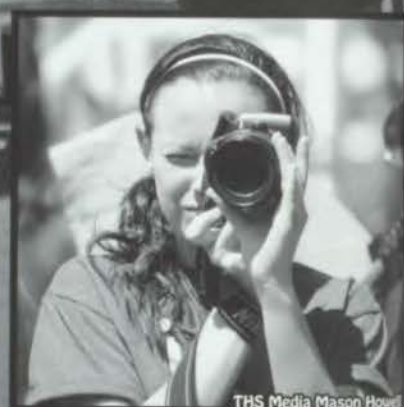

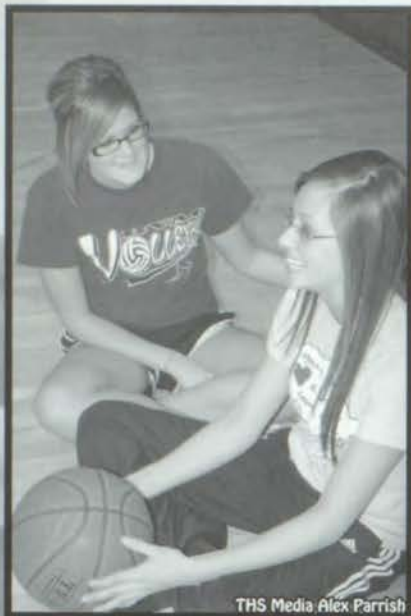

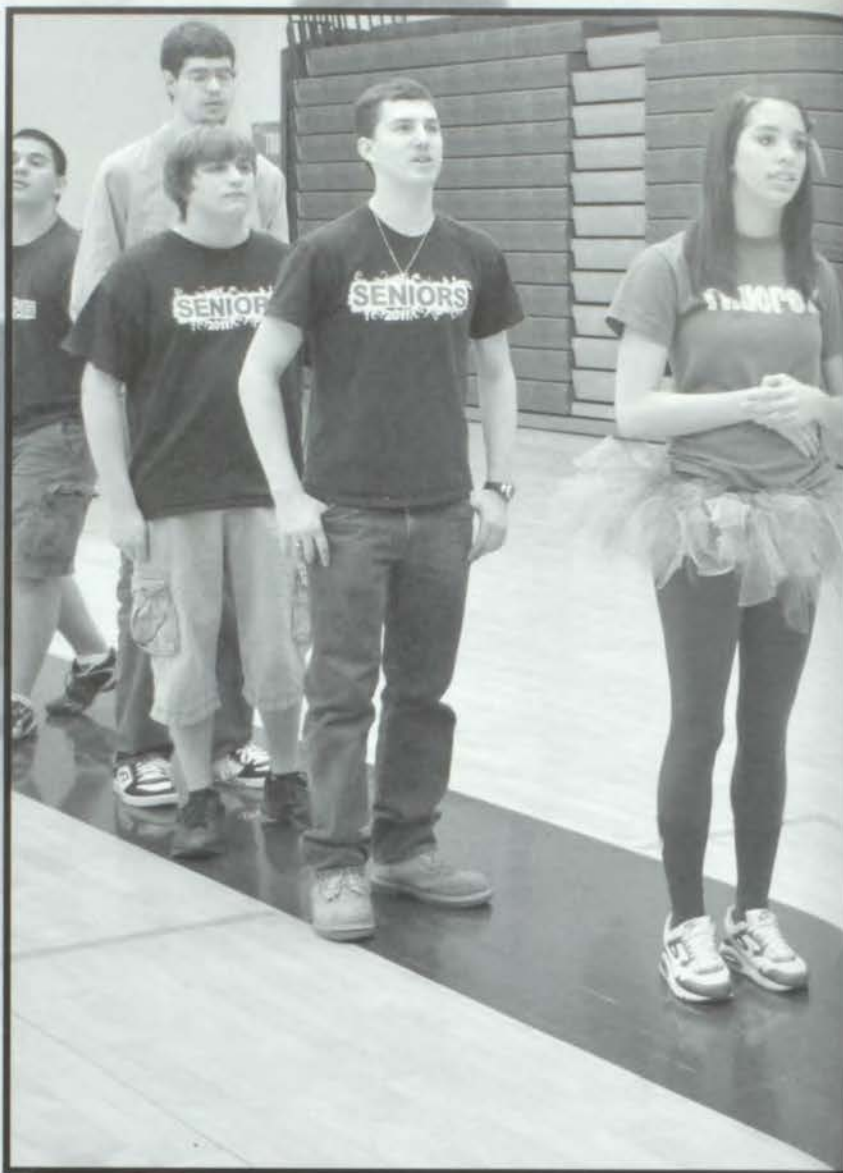

"We get to listen to interesting guest speakers," Brown said. "The teachers are also great."

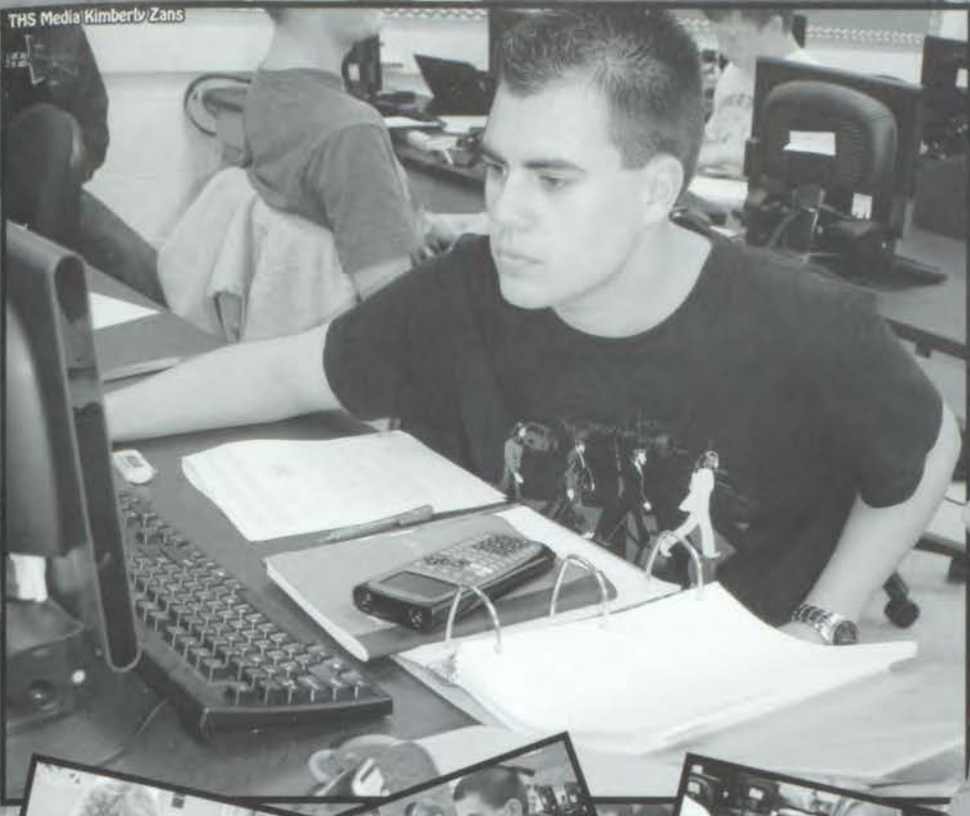
Debra Brueck and Dr. Russel Clothier both teach at MPI, as well as at the school. Both like teaching at MPI and think that students benefit from it.

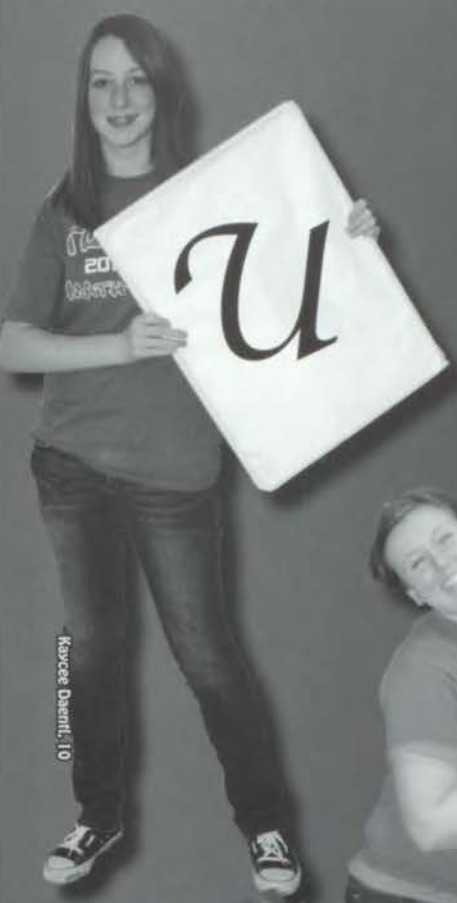

"I love to read the classics and I can memorize authors of novels easily," Woods said.

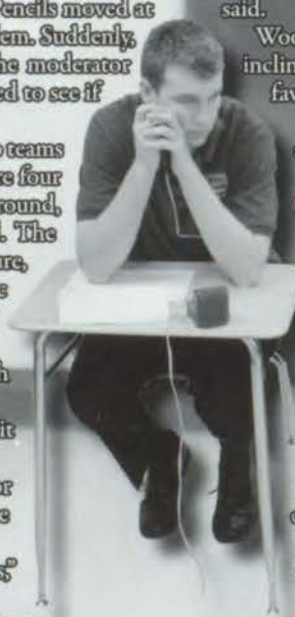
Art teacher and Varsity Scholar's Bowl Coach, Ms. Jean Luzader enjoyed her experience with the team and seeing them grow in academics.

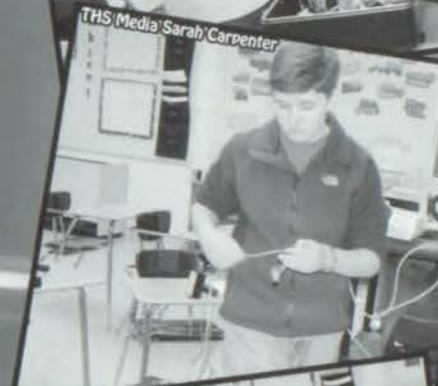
"Our best wins were playing several teams in quads and we doubled their score," Gravely said.
