



Foreword 1908-1933

Historical Highlights of Westport High School . . .


HE name was derived from the former name of Kansas City which was Westport.

The first building of Westport High was the old George B. Longan School, situated at 39th and Warwick Boulevard.

In the fall of the year 1908, on September 7th, the present building of Westport High School opened its doors for classes. In that first year there were approximately 1500 boys and girls enrolled. It was considered the finest school in the United States, and people from all over the country came to see it.

In those early days the school was well known for its famous football and basketball teams. Its football team won victories for four consecutive years. During the World War it did meritorious work by buying bonds, working for the Red Cross, and adopting Company I of the 3rd regiment which later became a part of the 35th Division. Over 400 of its graduates enlisted, eleven of whom died in active service. Many notable persons, including Theodore Roosevelt and Nicholas Murray Butler, have appeared in its assemblies. Westport has always excelled in scholarship. From Westport there have been six Rhodes Scholars.





To the teachers and halls we all loved so well.


To our tears and our joys,

Bill Malone, the vice-president, starred in basketball and track. This "red-head" was called "Flash" during the track season because of his prowess in the dashes.


Bill Duke, the secretary, was the Art Editor of the Herald for two years. He was well known around school as an "About Town Man," and he left many broken hearts at Westport.

The only business-like person in the room was Don Fairhurst. But even Don had his weak moments when he succumbed to the influences of his environment.



STANDARD REQUIREMENTS FOR THE HONOR ROLL

A student must be taking four solids, or the equivalent, to be eligible for the Honor Roll.

A student who has received for a semester two solid E's and one solid S with no grade below M is placed on the Honor Roll. Two non-solid E's equal one solid E. When a student has received these grades for two consecutive semesters, he becomes an Honor Student

For two consecutive semesters on the Honor Roll a student receives a bronze pin and for four consecutive semesters a silver pin. A student returns his honor pin when he has earned a higher one.

The Distinction in Scholarship Roll made up at graduation time recognizes three groups of superior students. For this purpose only senior high school credits are considered. If a student has a scholastic index of 3.35, he is awarded a gold pin with one pearl at graduation. If his scholastic index is 3.55, he receives a gold pin with two pearls. If his scholastic index is 3.75 he receives a gold pin with three pearls.

These awards are indicated on the commencement program by stars beside a student's name. One star signifies a gold pin with one pearl; two stars, a gold pin with two pearls; and three stars, a gold pin with three pearls.




The tellers met together about once a month and formulated the policies and practices to be pursued in school banking at Westport. The group decided to give a banking play. The faculty banking committee, consisting of Miss Wheeland. Mr. Whisamore, and Mr. Fristoe, was less enthusiastic to the idea; but they finally agreed. Mr. D. J. Conley, representative of the National Thrift Service, submitted a play, "The Redemption of Johnny Average," that was sponsored by the National Thrift Service. The name is taken from Clio, the goddess of music and history. The charter requires no less than twenty-five and no more than forty-five.


At one time all the charter clubs in the school but two were disbanded. Clionian was one of these two.





Tennis



Westport has had a long and enviable record in tennis which extends back to the first years of the present Westport building. The earliest record of tennis competition that could be found was an article about the tennis team of 1911. It stated that the Westport team won the Missouri Valley Championship at the "High School Day" held at Lawrence, Kansas. This was a brilliant beginning for a wonderful record in this sport. Westport won the championship again in 1912 and 1913, making it three straight for our team. In 1916 the first city tennis tournament of any importance was held here in Kansas City. From that time on the tennis team consisting of boys and girls won at least one event in each tournament. This continued until 1924 when they won everything in the tournament, including boys' and girls' singles, boys and girls' doubles, and the mixed doubles.

In 1926, however, the physical training instructor decided that girls would compete only among themselves in their own school. From then on the boys had to keep up the reputation of previous years. Increasing interest in tennis during the next few years resulted in a strong team for 1929. Sterling Cutlip was the outstanding player. Nelson McIninch, then a sophomore, also displayed unusual ability. McIninch and Kiley were the outstanding players for the next few years and kept the singles crown at Westport.

The players on this year's team are: Horn Bostel, McCauley, Worrell, Colburn, Reynolds, Sartain, Jarvis, and Sutorius. The doubles team of Worrell-McCauley gained the semi-finals at the state meet in Columbia, but were then defeated. As the city tournament has not been held yet, we can only prophecy that this team will keep up the Westport reputation of the past years.





Art Department

The chief event of the year was the Herald Contest. This was to develop individuality in the year book as well as to show the student originality. It is customary for the Commercial Classes to spend two or more weeks on the Herald Cover, every person being required to submit his design. There were sixty or more designs entered. The judges that chose the original design were: Cordelia Jinneth, R. R. Mapleson, and David Charno. The winner and designer of the Herald Cover was Lucille Frederick, president of Jules Guerin. Visits to the Art Institute have been interesting features of the work of the department. Each class endeavored to go once a month if the weather permitted. The students became acquainted with the different types of painting and with present day artists. They also learn to appreciate different color harmonies and various methods of technique. The knowledge will prove invaluable in later years.

The senior craft classes was a most interesting class. The students showed good craftsmanship and advanced work. The class made the plans and stage settings for individual stages. The best were used in the mid-winter dramatic performances. Two craft students, William Duke and Harry Horn-Bostel, gave valuable assistance in the stage management of the production of "A Scrap of Paper."

Commercial classes designed many posters. In addition to their many business problems was an illustration carried out by the spatter method, which proved to be one of the best problems of the year.

Costume designing was very helpful to all girls and boys. This class gave the opportunity to design and originate one's own wardrobe according to well accepted art principles.

Interior decoration, another important subject, acquainted the students with the principals governing good home decoration. They studied most of the types of historical furniture by visiting some of the stores. Their acquaintance with best types of furnitures was in this way reinforced.

Also we had the 1, 2, 3, and 4 drawing and designing classes. These had to be taken first, before entering the more advanced classes. Perspective lettering and color harmonies were a few of the most important branches of art that were taught to the above classes.

The federated clubs of the state of Missouri invited the members of Westport as well as the members of the other high schools in the state, to submit their art examples at the annual state convention in St. Louis.

Unselfish devotion to not a few, but all of his students; leadership shown not in precept, but in example; and a fine appreciation of all that was genuine and sincere in field of speech arts—these qualities have made a generation of students think reverently of him as teacher and friend.

Debate Teams

Seventeen students have taken part this year in inter-city high school debates upon the question of taxation. The Senate plan of discussion debate put two teams of eight members each into the field early in the season. After class room skirmishes, teams met Wyandotte here and Manual there in discussions before the assemblies. The right of interruption frequently exercised made possible direct clash of opinion and brought out a spontaneity and adaptability often missing in the more formal debate.

During the second term return debates were held with Manual here and Wyandotte there. The Westport team was composed of Charles Mauze, Willard Ethridge, John Lyon, David Skeer, and Roger Campbell, the latter a new member of the squad. The Wyandotte debate was held before the freshman assembly; the Manual debate before the public speaking and expression classes. By the end of the season the debaters had developed into veteran parliamentarians, and handled themselves affectively in this type of debate.

A twin bill with Rosedale featured two-man teams, using, however, the same question. Beverly Flater and David Skeer represented Westport on the affirmative and Charles Mauze and Jack McEvoy upheld the negative. This debate, held before members of the public speaking and expression classes in the Westport Auditorium, gave members of the squad an opportunity to prepare a longer and more carefully worked out discussion of the taxation question than is permissible by the Senate plan.


Public Speaking and Oratory

The leading event on the calendar of the speaker's year is, of course, the contest on orations on the Constitution, sponsored in this territory by the Kansas City Star. Six speakers competed in the Westport final contest, Jack McEvoy, Willard Ethridge, David Skeer, Hugh Wherritt, Charles Mauze, and Beverly Flater. The decision of the Judges, James Britt, attorney-at-law, David MacLean, attorney-at-law, and the Reverend Oliver W. Brackett, assistant pastor of the Westport Presbyterian Church, gave Charles Mauze first place and thus the right to represent Westport in the Convention Hall contest. Charles's inegibility, incurred because he was carrying too many outside activities, caused the committee to declare him ineligible for further participation; and the mantle fell upon David Skeer with Beverly Flater second. David's speech, "The Human Rights of the Constitution." was well received at the contest in Convention Hall the night of April 7th, although he was not ranked in the first three places.

Two other activities deserve brief mention. In the Speech Arts oration contest David Skeer won first place, with Charles Mauze and Beverly Flater tying for second. In the public speaking contest open to all members of the public speaking classes, David Skeer received the decision of student and faculty judges, with Virginia Bergin second, Ruth Todd third, and Beverly Flater fourth. The winner received a copy of "Cyrano de Bergerac," presented by Dr. Reid.
