


A Prayer

No American metropolis has shown a more rapid and vivid transformation than has your wonderful Kansas City.






Tennis



ENTIRE FACULTY RESIGNS

Faculty Indignant At Domineering Attitude of Students.

HOLLOWAY SAYS HANDS ARE TIED

August 5, 1934. (Dissociated Press)—The most startling announcement since the suicide of Mr. Miller, former vice-principal, was forthcoming from the Westport High School, Kansas City, Missouri. The entire faculty, consisting of teachers, handed in their formal resignation from their duties early this morning.

Several and varied reasons were advanced for this unprecedented action. Probably the most authentic was that given by Mr. Holloway, Principal at Westport for a number of years. Mr. Holloway, who was not among those revolting, gave the reasons for the strike as follows: "The faculty of Westport High has been under considerable strain for the last few years. Since the advent of the unbearable faculty activity limitations, forced on us by hard-hearted students, our liberties have been cut to extremely strict degrees. One of the most disgraceful rules was removing the rockers and backs from chairs in our teacher's library and limiting our time there to ten minutes a day. Only one dessert was served each of us and our private beer kegs were discovered and thrown out. Student pickets barred us from neighborhood hamburger shops during

lunch hours. Locks were removed from all our desks and all ink was diluted with water for economy. Our cars were not allowed within five blocks of the school. No bobbed hair was tolerated and the faculty was even forced to eat in the cafeteria with little blue bibs, at a table with its legs sawed to a length of six inches.

"But the greatest humiliation came when activity points were counted for the very teaching of classes. Points were counted: 6 for a senior class, 5 for a junior class and 3 for a sophomore class. We were limited to 11 points without exception.

"After these countless outrages, we have appealed to the student council for a hearing. Reid and I are all that remain of the staff. We have no points against us. My hands are tied! We hope an arrangement can be made soon.




