Could the tiger that snarls in his superior way Be sneering at the people who pass him each day?


And the comic giraffe with his head in the air . . . Is his far away look just a day-dreamy stare?

But whether they think or just stand and chew, Both students and monkeys have fun in a zoo!






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Dedication



CO-OPERATIVE EDUCATION

The Co-operative, Occupational, Education course is open to juniors and seniors, sixteen years of age or over, interested in specific job training. Mr. Shelley Peters, the C. O. E. co-ordinator, helps students in selecting jobs that will coincide with their interests and abilities.

As for credit received, two units of credit per year are earned through C. O. E., one for "on the job" and another for class work. A minimum of fifteen hours per week is required of each student. Those enrolled must also attend school for two or more hours per day, thus getting in their required English, history and mathematics. The hour per day in the classroom with Mr. Peters is spent studying insurance, buying, selling, standards and labels, credit, leisure time, consumers research, and many other subjects.

Jobs vary with the student. Office work, nursing, clerical work and merchandising are a few of the many jobs at which they are trained. A regular pay check helps with school expenses.

C. O. E. presents a new type of education and one that has, through many experiences, shown its value.

HEALTH CENTER

"Service with a smile" characterizes the selected girls who manage the health center. In giving up their study hall time they gain experience in caring for ill fellow students, thus giving service to Westport.

They do such things as take temperatures, make students comfortable, apply first aid, notify parents, file and keep records. They learn practical home nursing and facts about health which will be useful to them later in life. Under Miss Cecilia Burke's supervision they learn how to make and apply good bandages, what to do for burns, cuts, bruises, sprains and broken limbs. In after school classes they discuss and learn about such problems as cancer, heart disease and poliomyelitis.

Westport's health center assistants deserve the thanks and appreciation of all the students.





The play was double cast. The cast and play were chosen by Miss Wheeler, Miss Gales, Mr. Ward, Mr. King, and Miss Brubaker.





R.O.T.C.

The Westport R.O.T.C. unit has grown remarkably during the year, under the supervision of Captain Charles W. Green. By his pleasing personality and untiring effort, he has inspired the cadets with a desire to exert themselves to the highest degree. Under the capable leadership and instruction of the sergeant instructors, Master Sergeants William A. Story and Ralph L. Parker, a wonderful spirit of cooperation now exists between the cadet officers and cadets.

No matter what phase of R.O.T.C. training is presented, the cadets show an active interest and strive for the best results.

In practical drill, they give their time and attention to developing a battalion that is clocklike in its precision of movements. In theoretical study they are diligent and acquire knowledge that develops quick and accurate thinking as well as a store of essential information.

Rifle marksmanship is particularly stressed in the R.O.T.C. training at Westport. The cadets fire on a regulation fifty-foot range in the basement of the school. The Westport Rifle Club is affiliated with the National Rifle Association in Washington, D. C. Awards for shooting are provided by the Association for those cadets who can meet the requirements. The medals range from Pro-Marksman to Distinguished Rifleman, furnishing the various stages of becoming an expert with the use of a rifle. Two of our riflemen qualified this year as Expert Rifleman, namely Sergeants Clinton Newman and David Bucknam.

At the annual R.O.T.C. circus held in the Municipal Auditorium, April 2, Westport presented a number that placed the battalion as one of the outstanding units in the city. The presentation of our crack drill squad, the *Tiger Twelve*, in the most spectacular and most intricate movements in special drills, evidenced the fact that this unit is a superior drill organization and is quite capable of comprehending the most involved features of tactical operations.

This year, the Westport rifle team and crack drill squad were sponsored by the Cummings-Leeman American Legion post number 130. This financial support purchased jackets for the rifle team, and special uniform equipment for the drill squad.

The highlight of the R.O.T.C. social year was the annual ball, held at the Athenaeum, May 6. Music for this affair was furnished by Jimmie Lenge and his orchestra, with Martha Savage doing the vocals. This ball marked the first time in the history of the Westport R.O.T.C. that invitations were extended to school circles other than military.

Although by taking military training in high school, the cadet becomes better fitted to serve his country in case of a major emergency, he is under no greater obligation to enter the service than is anyone else. The real mission of the Reserve Officer's Training Corps is to awaken in the student an appreciation of the obligations of citizenship, and to prepare him to discharge his duties as a citizen. In order to accomplish this purpose, the drills and lectures are especially designed to give the cadets strong, healthy bodies, to develop leadership, to encourage respect for law and a readiness to help enforce it, and to build character.






