
When asked his feelings about Kansas City, Dr. Medcalf said, "It's one of the few liveable cities left."

Counseling at Westport High has been basically unstructured and has offered a freedom of service very necessary to the youth of today. Foremost has been the willingness to help students at all times to gain experiences that have enabled them to meet their individual needs in the areas of problem solving, personal growth, and development.





In its third year of existence, Westport's burgeoning program, headed by Mr. Stephen Nelson, has included a remedial reading lab, which administered to students with severe reading problems, and an in-service training program which trained teachers from the various subject areas to teach reading skills. The goal of the inservice program was to make each of our teachers a teacher of reading.


Enrichment was added to the usual learning experiences through the use of field trips, persons from the community who served as speakers, and the use of audio visual materials.



By affording the student more individualized instruction and learning opportunities, this formidable challenge was successfully met.



First year Spanish classes doubled in enrollment, so we had two teachers this year. A new French teacher was also added, and German II and III.

Students learned Spanish, German, and French through oral practice in the laboratory, working with tapes of native speakers. They also memorized short dialogues, practiced grammar drills, and learned to hold a simple conversation. Advanced classes read newspapers, magazines, and short stories from foreign countries and learned to write short compositions.

The Westport H.S. library is now officially known as the Resource Center. During the summer of 1972, the old library was enlarged by removing a wall which formerly separated it from a study hall. Additional shelves, tables, a new card catalog cabinet and storage cabinets for audio-visual equipment and materials were acquired. Ten electrical outlets were provided. During the summer, an eve-pleasing blue-green carpet was installed wall to wall and the ceiling was lowered and treated with acoustical tile. The walls were given a fresh coat of paint. Venetian blinds were installed.

All of these improvements along with the annual purchases of magazines, books, and the audiovisual materials were calculated to enrich the curricula offered.

A new 3M Copier, purchased with fine money, has proven to be of service to teachers in preparing materials for classroom work. Students use the machine to avoid dreary note taking for research projects. Hopefully this machine will tend to eliminate vandalism to books.

In general the modern up-to-date appearance and acoustical quality, in addition to quality instructional materials, should make the Westport Resource Center an attractive learning center.














ROGER McGEE



Seven students of Westport took on every challenge put up to them and attained the highest honors possible in one season.


The team was challenged nine times and emerged victorious eight of the nine. They overcame their only defeat in the league playoff.




