RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING


SINCE the establishment of the ROTC program at William Chrisman in 1935, the unit has not only won the highest rating given by the army, but has also upheld the tradition of William Chrisman in other fields. The unit has proved itself to be a definite asset to the community by participating in various community events and by furnishing cadets to serve in the capacity of ushers or traffic quards.

While the essential mission of the unit is to provide such basic military training as might be of value should the student consider a military career, it also lays the foundation for intelligent citizenship by teaching the principles of leadership, respect for authority, and habits of precision, courtesy, and correct deportment. The students best portraying these qualities are those selected for advancement.

The complete course offers three years of instruction, of which the first two include such subjects as close order drill, map reading, first aid, and weapons. The third year cadets receive instruction in small unit tactics, military history, method of instruction, and advanced instruction in subjects studied the first two years. These appointed as cadet officers also assist regular army personnel in instructing first and second year cadets.

The cadet battalion uses the top of campus hill as a parade ground. The annual Field Night exhibition, however, is held on the football field at Ott school. The awards for fine performance, made at this time, are much coveted; and various cadets vie with one another in this competition.







MASTER MARKSMEN

UNDER the able direction of Sgt. Ist Class William H. Dickson the five members of the rifle team claimed high honors this year. Next fall the team will be composed of two returning marksmen and three others.

Frank Jennings had the highest average of the team this year. His average was 183. The highest average made by the team in recent years, made at the Westport high meet this year, was 918. In the Camp Perry Indoor Rifle Match the team took 1st place out of 19 teams. The team ranked 21st out of 207 teams from the 5th Army Area in the Hearst trophy meet at Kemper when the Bears competed in the 5th Army inter-collegiate rifle matches they ranked 15th. Out of the 14 shoulder to shoulder matches in which they participated the rifle team won all but one.







CHRISMANITES really have a team to cheer about this year and should be proud of the many victories that it has scored in proving supremacy in the regional Class A tournament, the William Jewell tournament, and the Blue Springs tournament. The William Chrisman cagers nabbed second place in the Ruskin tournament and placed themselves high in the standing of the Pony Express Conference.

The season has brought many thrills and chills. One of the former was the drubbing given Blue Springs in the Ruskin tournament. The small Blue Springs outfit just couldn't cope with the towering strength of the Chrisman quintet. The game ended 54 to 8. The heartbreaker was the return game with North Kansas City in which an overtime free-shot spelled defeat for Chrisman. That score was 34 to 35. The highest Chrisman score was 59 points against Grandview; the lowest was 26 points, compiled in two games, in defeating and being defeated by Lafayette. Worth calling attention to are the games played in the Regional tournament. The William Chrisman basketeers stamped on Central in the preliminaries to a tune of 41 to 25, then cleaned Paseo 45-29 in the semi-finals and won the championship by whipping Southwest 53-33. By winning the regional tournament. Chrisman received the right to play in the state tournament where, although beaten by St. Louis McBride High School by the score of 60 to 45, they showed their rivals a hard time. Had Tommy Conrow, our basketball captain this year, been able to play his usual game, the score might have been changed, but the 5-foot II-inch rebounding spark-plug was sidelined with a bad ankle. The Chrisman team was exceptionally deadly at the free-throw line, missing only two charity shots in the entire game.

Along with the 24 to 6 record of wins and losses chalked up this season, three team members won positions on various honorary all-star teams. Besides being the leading scorer for the team, Gary Bergen was awarded first team honors in the Blue Springs tournament.

BERGEN was elected to the second team in the William Jewell tournament. Tom Conrow was on the first team of the Blue Springs. Lloyd Adams was the only Chrisman player to receive a first team award in the William Jewell tournament. At the end of the season the Pony Express League selected an all-star team which included Gary Bergen on the first and Tom Conrow on the second team. 






The Chrisman thin-clads were led by Coach Hartzog. The managers were Raymond Willoughby, Dick Edson, and Charles Harrison.






this is not the climax of the entire play. Boy gets girl in the third act. Here the plawwright, Thornton Wilder, brings in a very beautiful philosophy of death.



"M" C L U B





SENIOR CLASS PLAY


"Ramshackle Inn"

DIVERSIFIED OCCUPATIONS

ONE OF the most interesting classes at Chrisman is Diversified Occupations, which is taught by Mr. Ray Pearce. This class is in its fourth year in the Chrisman curriculum. The main purpose of this class is to provide a practical education for the large percentage of young working people who earn their living in other than professional pursuits. This gives the students contact with occupational practices and conditions, effective vocational training, development of desirable work habits and

attitudes.

The student is under the supervision of the co-ordinator and the employer for whom he works. He is graded on his class work and the quality of his outside work. This year the occupations in which the students work are plumbing, carpentry, moulding, wood finishing, office work, telephone operation, storekeeping, selling, grocery retail, and auto mechanics.

DRIVER EDUCATION

DRIVER Education is a comparatively new course at Chrisman. It is taught by Mr. Grover Redford.

The course is open to upperclassmen. The prospective driver must be sixteen years of age, must have a driver's license, and must, of course, lack the knowledge of how to drive a car. The students enrolled in the course meet for lecture and recitation on three days a week. On two days a week they have the actual experience of driving

a car. This car is a special one, designed for driver education courses and furnished to the school by a local automobile dealer. Nineteen students completed the course during the first semester and twenty-four during the second term.

We believe the course is a practical one and will help to make driving on our highways a less hazardous undertaking.



MATHEMATICS is one of the most important subjects taught in our school; some principle of mathematics is used everyday in almost all walks of life, from simple arithmetic to solid geometry and trigonometry. Two units of credit in mathematics are essential to college entrance.

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
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I wish to extend my heartiest congratulations and best wishes to the 1950 graduating class of the William Chrisman High School.
