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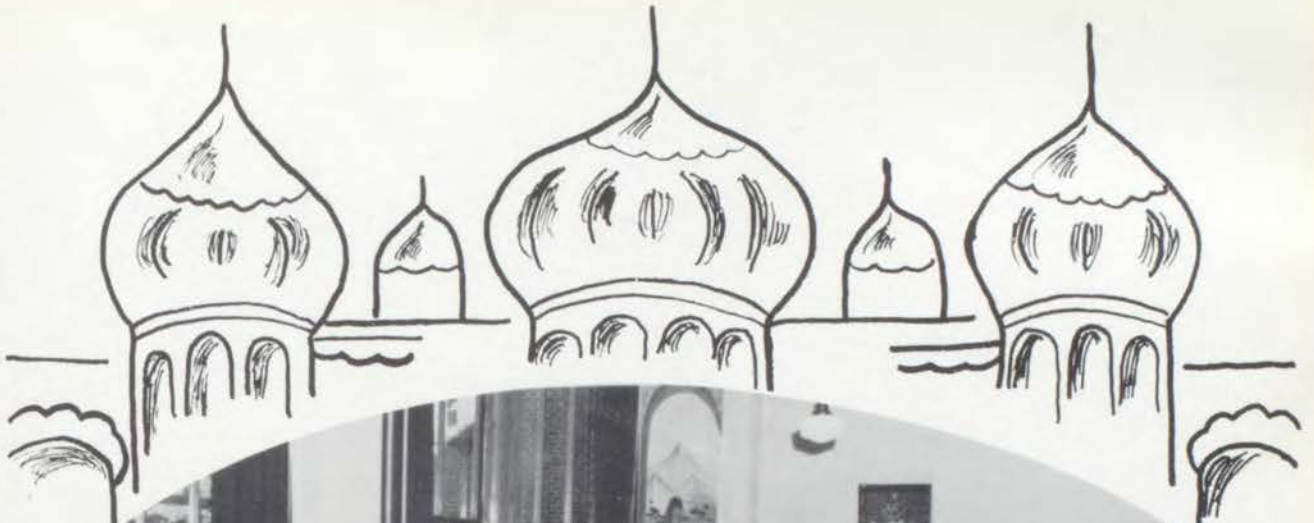
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DEDICATION

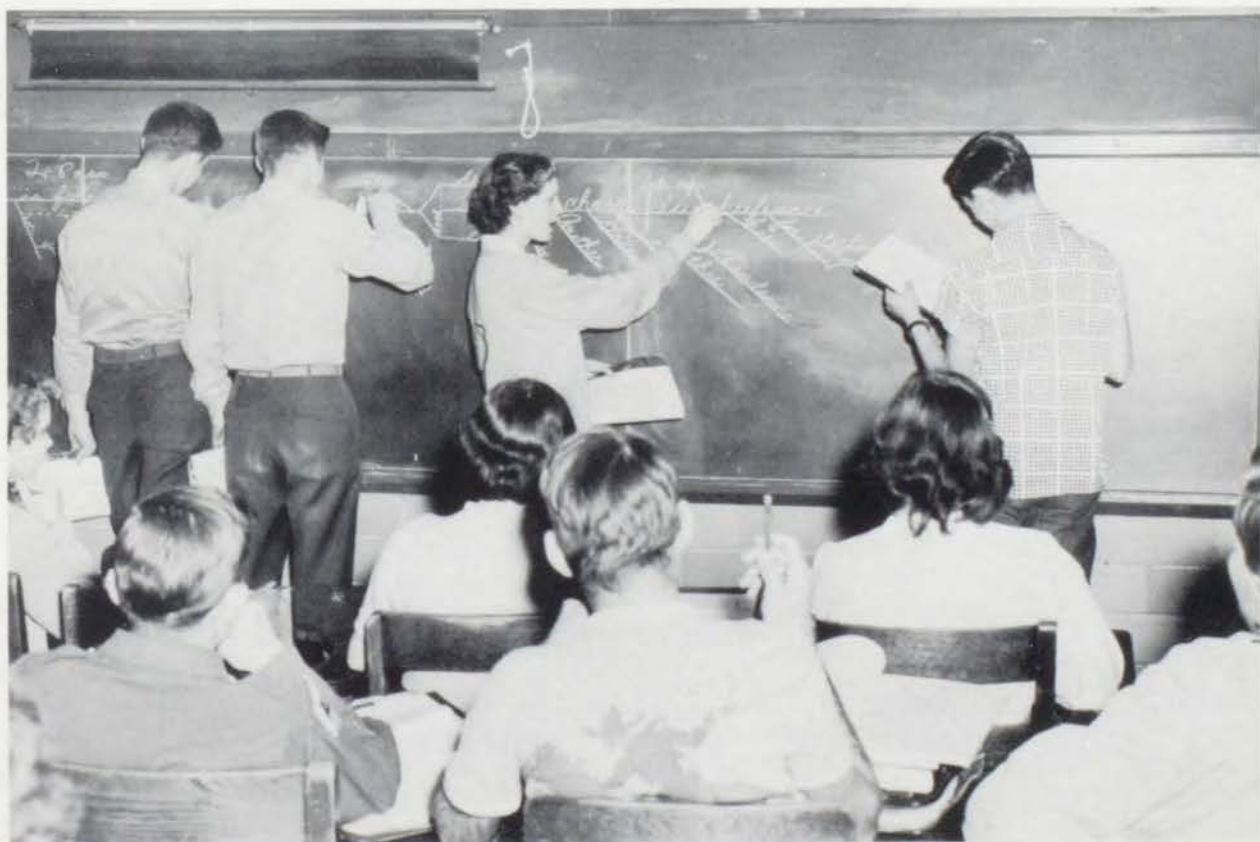

Patty was escorted by Vernon Hazelrigg. The attendants; Shirley

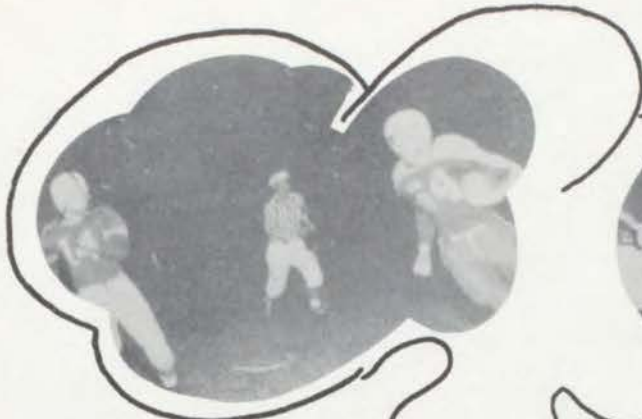

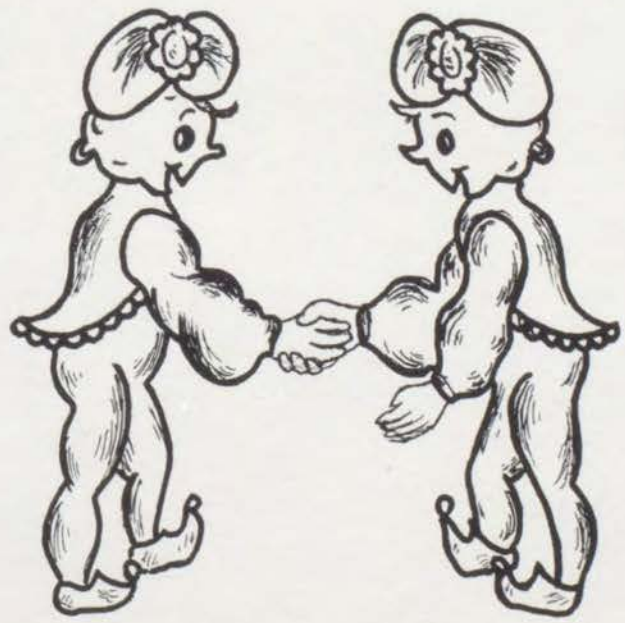
Teachers, too, find them courteous, friendly and cooperative. It is custodians like ours who keep well trimmed the wick of the lamp of knowledge.

NAHS FURTHERS ARTISTIC TALENT

Established to promote appreciation of art and to further interest and opportunities in this field, the National Art Honor Society was chartered in 1937 by Miss Nell Sampson, art instructor at William Chrisman. Her untiring and inspiring leadership has kept this an outstanding organization through the years.

The scholastic requirements for membership are an "S" average in art and at least an "M" average in all other subjects. Each student who is interested in becoming a member must prepare a minimum of ten pieces to enter in the spring exhibit. After the new members are selected, they are formally initiated at a program held in the William Chrisman auditorium. The program includes the presentation of awards and N. A. H. S. pins, and a candle-lighting ceremony. Following the program the art exhibit is open to the public.

National Art Honor Society participates in the Emery Bird Thayer National Scholastic exhibit and the art program of the Independence School System in the spring at the Memorial hall. The Sturges Jewelry Company awards a medal to the outstanding art student.

Plaques are presented by the National Forensic League to member schools which have had the greatest number of members and degrees over an extended period of time. Chrisman received its first plaque in 1946 and its second in 1950.

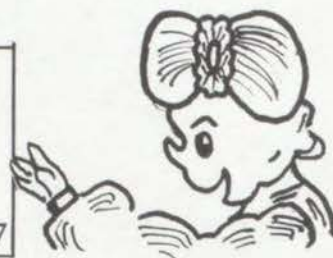


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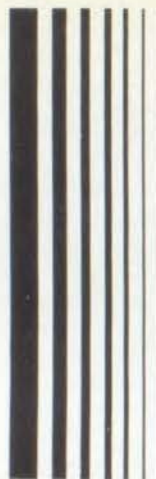
