

Mr. Parks and Mr. Brown believe that the doors of opportunity for young people were never so wide as at the present. With the advent of the atomic age and all it signifies, the extension of educational opportunity at all levels, and the extension of our physical horizons by jet communication, the outlook for future graduates is promising and intriguing.

Emory C. Parks, principal of William Chrisman Division II, has been in the Independence schools since 1951. During that time he has served as junior high school counselor, director of guidance services, vice-principal of William Chrisman for one year, and principal of Ott secondary school.

His Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees in Education were earned at Central Missouri State College, at Warrensburg. Mr. Parks has done post graduate work at the University of Kansas.

Leroy Brown, vice-principal, came to the school system in 1955 from the Waverly, Missouri, public schools. He taught ninth grade science for a year and a half until he became vice-principal of Ott secondary school the second semester of the 1956-57 term. His Bachelor of Science degree was conferred by the Central Missouri State College, Warrensburg, in 1951; his Master of Arts degree by the University of Kansas City in 1956. Mr. Benson who spent much time and effort in planning and furnishing William Chrisman, Division I, well realizes that the new building with its thirty-two doors open is a symbol of the many opportunities offered to each one who enters for the purpose of enriching his experiences. Those who are content with meager successes may find too late that through carelessness the door has closed to their opportunities. Therefore, as the door swings open, each must realize its values and hold on to its key of success.

Mr. Lefever's philosophy concerning "doors of opportunity" is, "This year we opened new doors into a wonderful new building. To many of us











The Cooperative Occupational Education proggram in the William Chrisman high school is a combination of industrial and distributive cooperative vocational program, which has undergone a change to be known by the present title.

The student is in class part of the day and on the job part of the day. Several occupations are represented in the program, each student studying information related to the field in which he is employed.

This year there are 65 students. These are employed by 44 business firms and represent 38 different jobs. The average student works 29 hours per week.

The student learner may take training in any occupation in which an acceptable local training agency is available. Some of the fields in which students are trained are as follows: auto mechanics, printing, photography, salesmanship, merchandising, sheet metal work, plumbing, electricity, cleaning and pressing, meat cutting, service station operation, radio-television repair, library work, telephone operation, sewing machine demonstration, and many others. By employing students in this program, employers make a decided contribution

The library assistants at Division II derive valuable work experience. The assistants learn to perform a routine job faithfully and accurately over a long period of time. The knowledge and understanding of library arrangement and procedures pay these students dividends not only in high school and college but throughout their future careers. This may also lead to a career as a librarian.

Voluntary work in the library is a form of social service to the school. This year pupils worked each morning before school and three assisted for a half hour or longer after school. Such assistants followed a schedule prepared by the librarian, Miss Pulliam.
