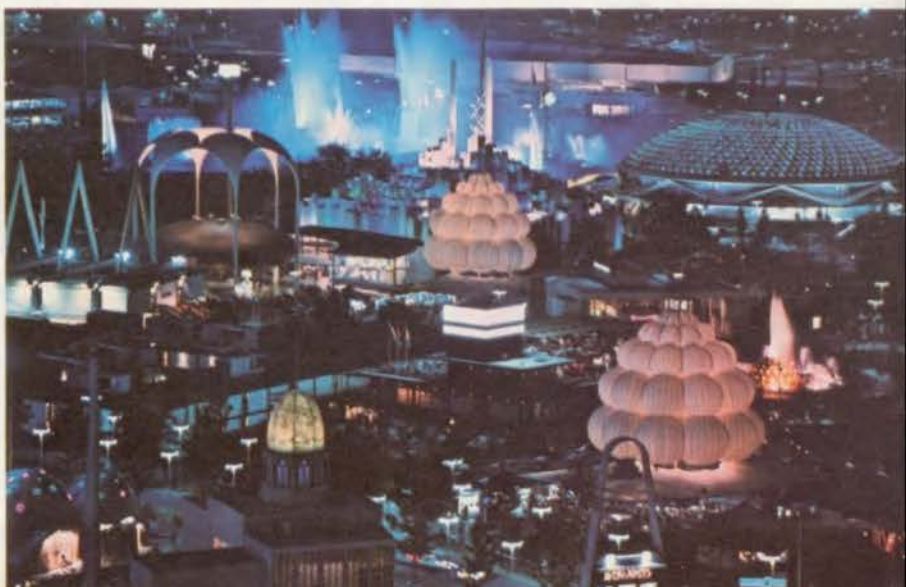

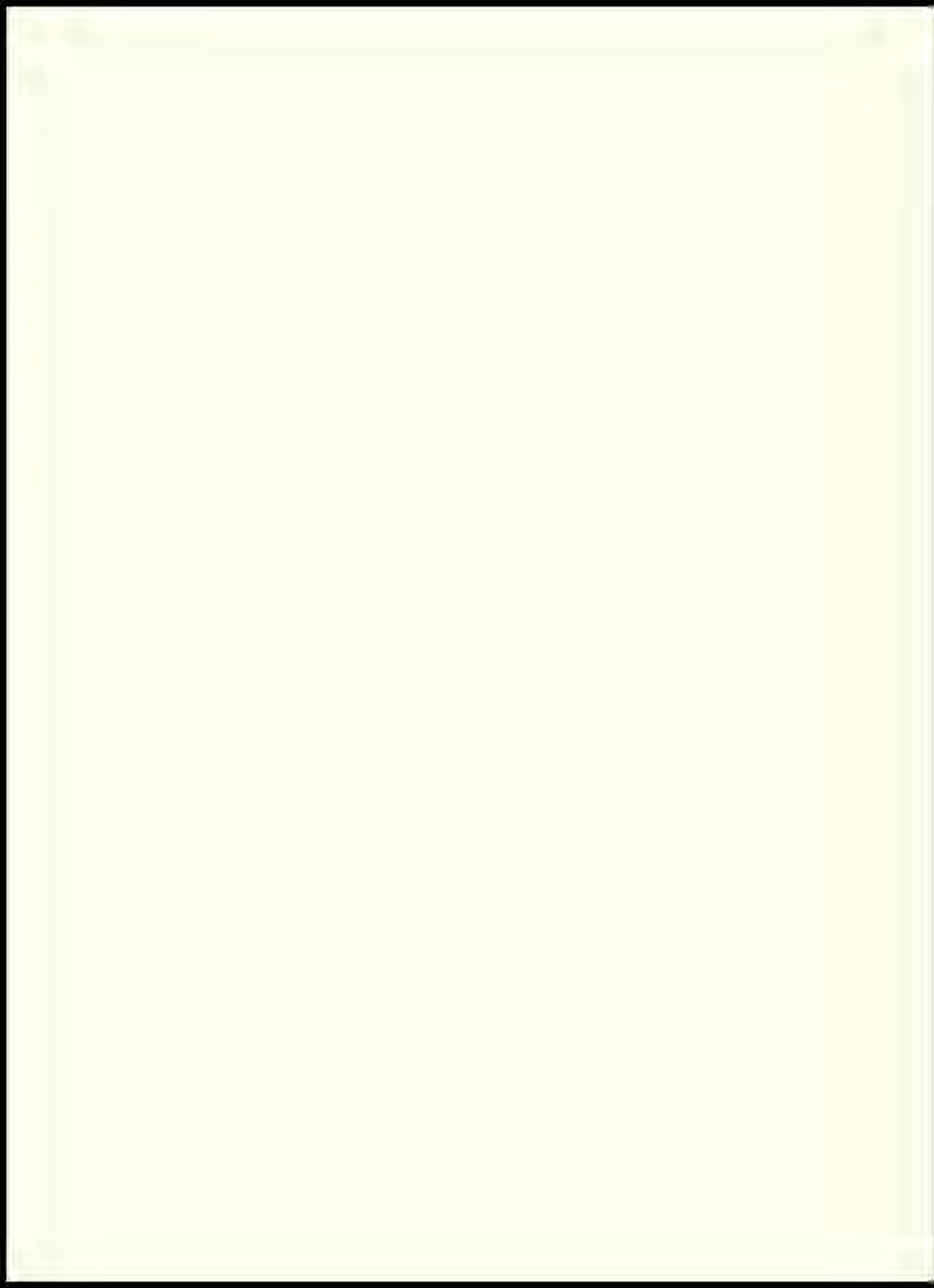

Chrisman accepts challenge of change

Before this decade closes, man may set foot on the moon, and the curriculum and organization of schools will be considerably changed. Both of these events illustrate that the past is gone forever and the future will always bring change.

Ralph McGill, publisher of the *Atlantic Constitution*, in a recent column, stated the correlation between change and education in a sentence, "We cannot, any more than past generations, see the face of the future, but we know that written across it is the word education."

While meeting the challenge of change in the spirit of the 60's, educators and students seek to strengthen the school program of William Chrisman in many definite ways.

Instructional programs are designed to develop the potentialities of all children and youth. Simultaneously, an attempt is made to balance the curriculum amid various pressures for special emphasis. In an era of ever-growing body of knowledge it is difficult to make a wise selection of content which will accomplish this balance.

Schools have taken a definite role as

leaders and their method in dealing with serious national problems such as youth unemployment and juvenile delinquency must be clear-cut and beneficial. The same method must be used in teaching about controversial issues, and about other ideologies such as communism.

Throughout the school program a main objective is the most effective utilization of both students' and teachers' time and talents. Entirely new instructional materials, technology and space will be needed in the new program. In recognition that today's decisions must change with the times, plans are being evolved for continuing educational research, experimentation and innovation.

Study of these key issues will bring about changes, but what is equally important, is that in responding to the challenge of change, Chrisman and all other schools are contributing more than ever to the strength of the nation. As schools strengthen the individual student to cope with change in a changing society and to assume the responsibilities of his citizenship, the nation is the stronger for it.

First of all, the education of teachers has changed from a high school education or one year in normal school to a baccalaureate or master's degree as preparation for teaching. Secondly, the world wide phenomenon of the increase in knowledge has called for broader and deeper education for teachers and students. Third, research and experience have brought about many new patterns in educational programs.

As important as all of these changes are to today's education, even more important is the change America has undergone in the last decade in assigning a top-priority role to education and in setting the goals for education in a much different framework. Today, the school's task is to extend the opportunity for sound education and with a greater range of occupational objectives in a world of incredible complexity amid an unprecedented expansion of knowledge.

The chief figure, the central figure, in carrying out that commitment is the teacher.

Change is nothing new in American education. However, the rate of change has become increasingly rapid in the past few years due to the tremendous growth in high school enrollment accompanied by the vast changes in the composition of the student body, the introduction of mass technology, the rapid improvements in communication and the development of new social patterns.

Mr. Edward Shelton, principal of William Chrisman, met these challenges of changing school life in his work with the students and faculty. He faced the task of presenting the students with the ideals of a changing society.

The schools have always had the task of meeting the needs of society with the best tools available. That is still their goal—the times have changed—the store of knowledge is greatly expanded—the immediacy is more keenly felt.

The challenge of change calls on each school system to determine the most effective ways for its teachers to teach and students to learn so that all the boys and girls will take their place as productive members of a complex society.

The challenge for quality education is tremendous!

Mr. William Burlingame, vice-principal of William Chrisman, worked with other administrators, faculty and students in adjusting to the challenge of change. He was gratified by the response of all involved.

The division of the Independence school system was a change that certainly brought forth many challenges—challenges to the administrators, teachers and students.

To the administration it meant the loss of many teachers and the problems involved in selecting and securing new ones. It also meant the sophomore class would join the junior and senior classes at William Chrisman.

To the teachers remaining at Chrisman it meant acquainting the new teachers with Chrisman's policies and with the acceptance of larger responsibilities. To the new teachers it meant a challenge to learn and improve in their teaching methods and offered the opportunity of becoming a member of an excellent teaching staff.

However, the greatest challenge came to the student body. Because of the necessary division of the senior class in the reorganization of the system into a two junior high school, two senior high school plan, approximately one-half of the student body was transferred to the second high school. This meant the loss of many fine scholars, athletes, debaters and musicians. It presented a great challenge to Chrisman's student body.

The board of education elected by the people is the general agent of the state in carrying out the will of the people in the matter of public education. America was founded and operates today on a twin dedication: the worth of the individual and the general good of society. Nowhere is this dual dedication more in force than in the schools.

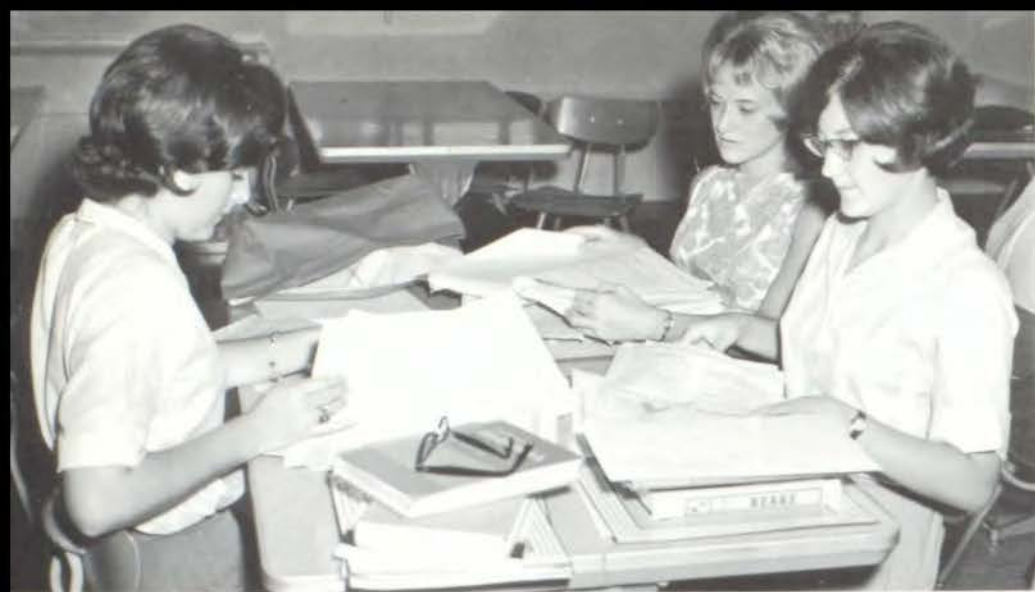

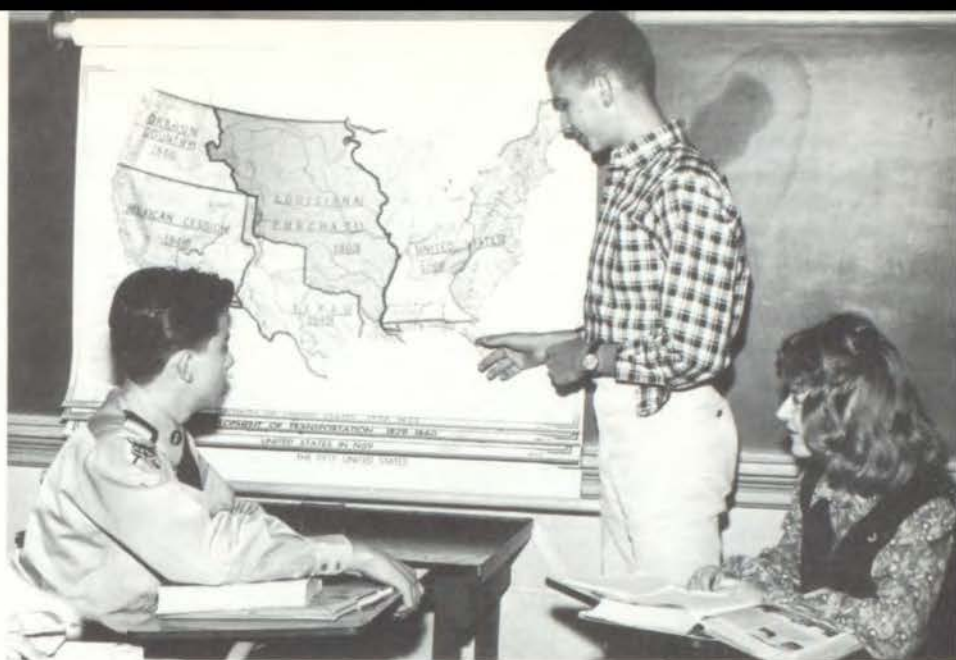

Three basic assumptions should guide those who seek to strengthen the school program for these students. One is that sound decisions about the kind of education that is good for today's students are important.

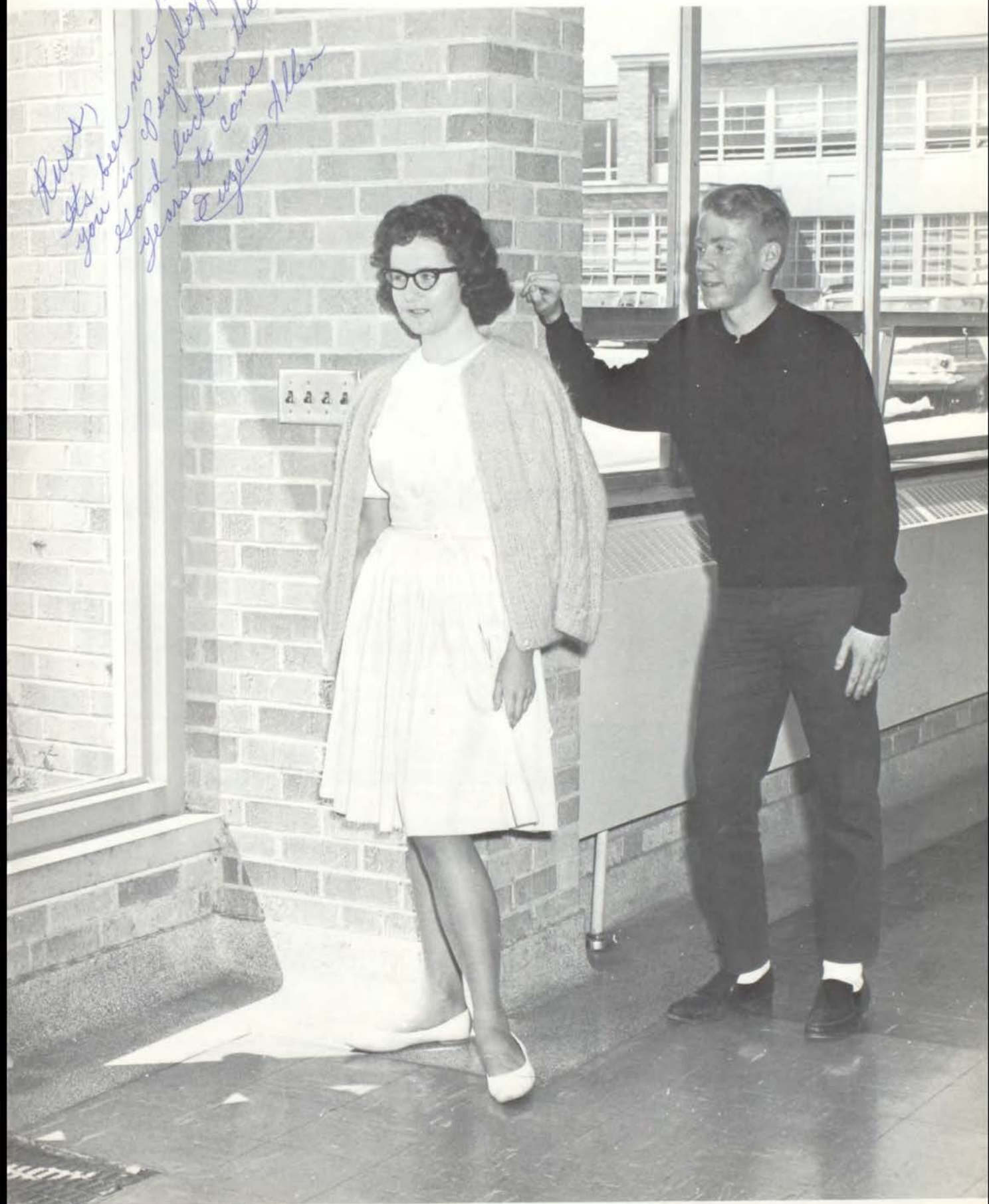
The second assumption is that a prime purpose of education is to teach students to think. This is particularly important in a time when knowledge becomes outdated so quickly. If students learn how to think and how to keep adding to their knowledge, they can remain abreast of the times long after their formal education is completed.

The third basic assumption is that an educated person must have clear and compelling values. Knowledge without values is useless, perhaps dangerous.

If a student can think rationally and critically, education can become a lifelong process. Without the basic skills, he will find himself in a world in which his inventory of knowledge is inadequate and his capacity for meeting unknown situations is limited. It is the duty of all students to avail themselves of the educational opportunities offered them.

Bruin players achieve winning area berths

Chrisman Bruins opened the season against Lillis, ranked number one in the area, and were handed a 33—12 defeat. After journeying to Sedalia the Bears lost to Smith-Cotton 19—13.

Chrisman opened the conference against Raytown South who squeaked past the blue and gold 21—20. A homecoming crowd saw the Bears lose to Park Hill 18—6.

North Kansas City stopped the Bruins just short of victory for the second time by a score of 21—20. Conference champs Raytown halted the Bears 34—19.

A 32—14 victory over Bishop Meige was the first of the season. The second came in defeating Truman; Chrisman then beat Ruskin 27—12 on the Golden Eagle field. The Bears ended the season against Center losing 54—12.

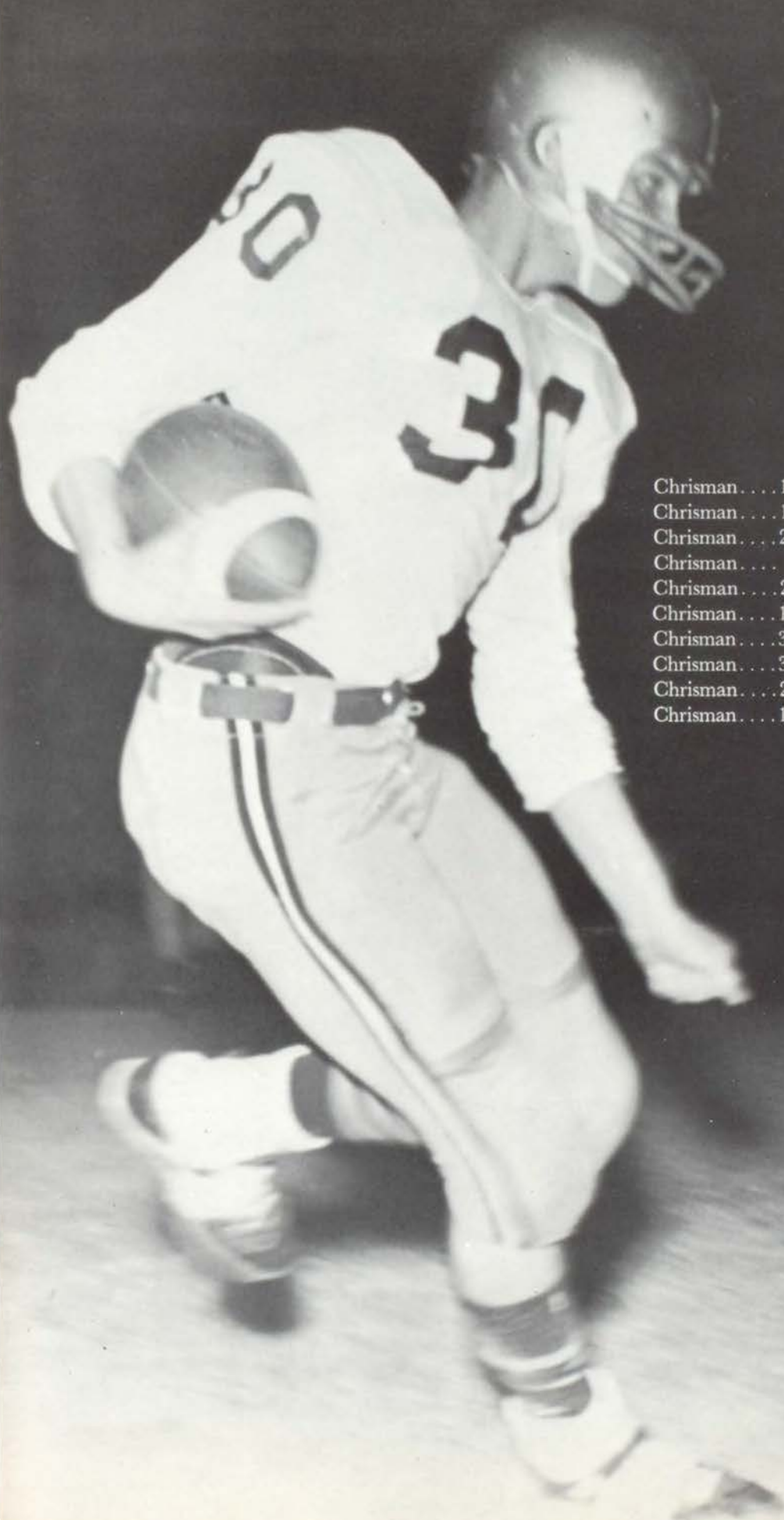
Under the excellent coaching of Ron Bruch, Chrisman made 121 first downs to the opponents 91. The Bears also gained 1912 yards rushing and 856 yards passing for a total offensive gain of 2786

yards to the 2567 for the opposition.

Leading the Bruin attack was Jon Yates who scored 60 points and gained 971 yards. Senior back Cecil Taylor carried the ball 59 times in five games to average 8.15 yards per carry. He also had 90 yards on pass receiving for a total of 668 yards and 32 points.

Passing for 780 yards was quarterback Bob Sheetz who collected 999 yards offensively and scored 40 points. Mike Walters led in pass receiving with 30 catches for 488 yards and 24 points.

Co-Captains Mike Helmig and Tom Miller along with Bob Alderson and Roy Porter were line stand-outs. Helmig, Yates and Sheetz were each selected as a player of the week and Helmig placed on the first team of the Greater Kansas City area and the Independence area team. Halfback Cecil Taylor received honorable mention on the Kansas City team; he and Jon Yates received an honorable mention berth on the Independence area second team.

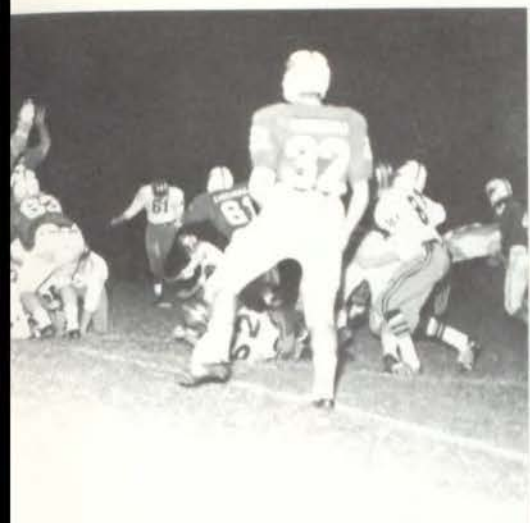

Chrisman cagers won the class L Regional tournament, placed third in the North Kansas City tourney and took the consolation championship in the Center tournament.



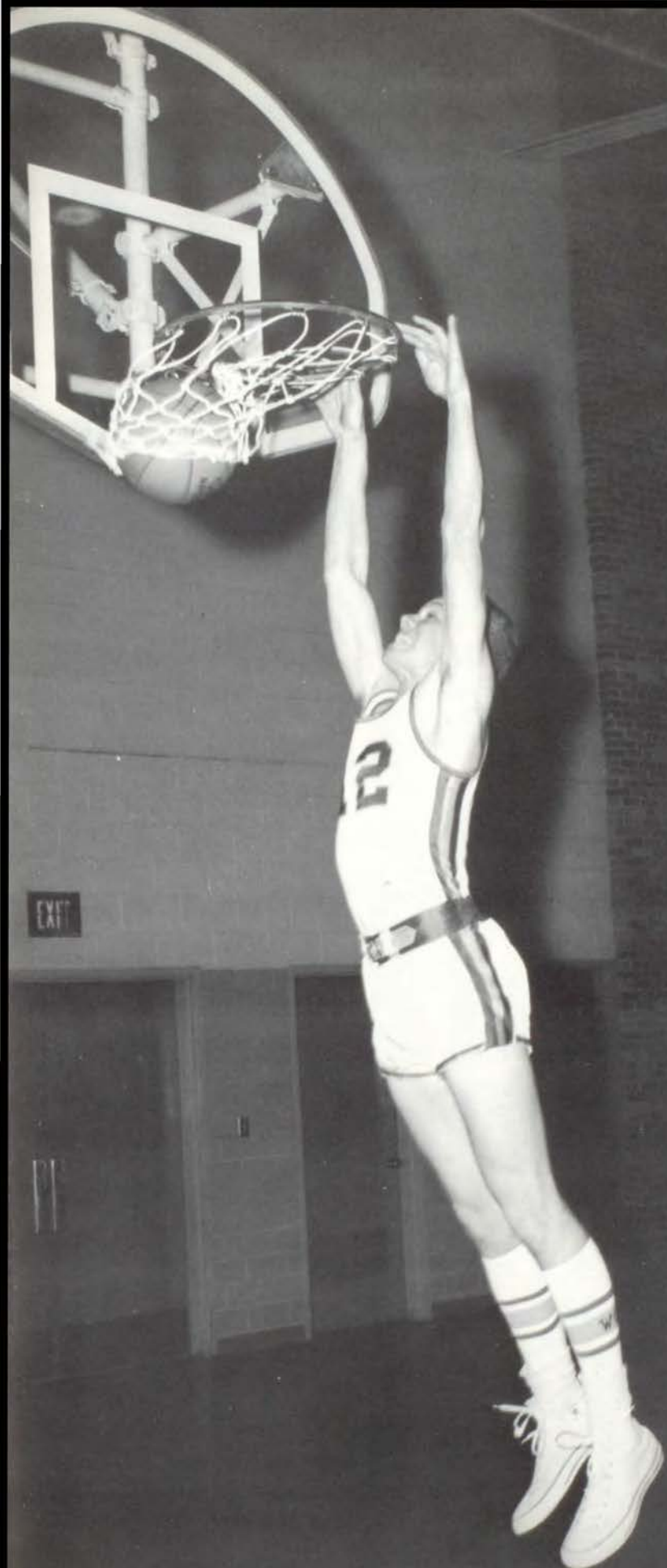

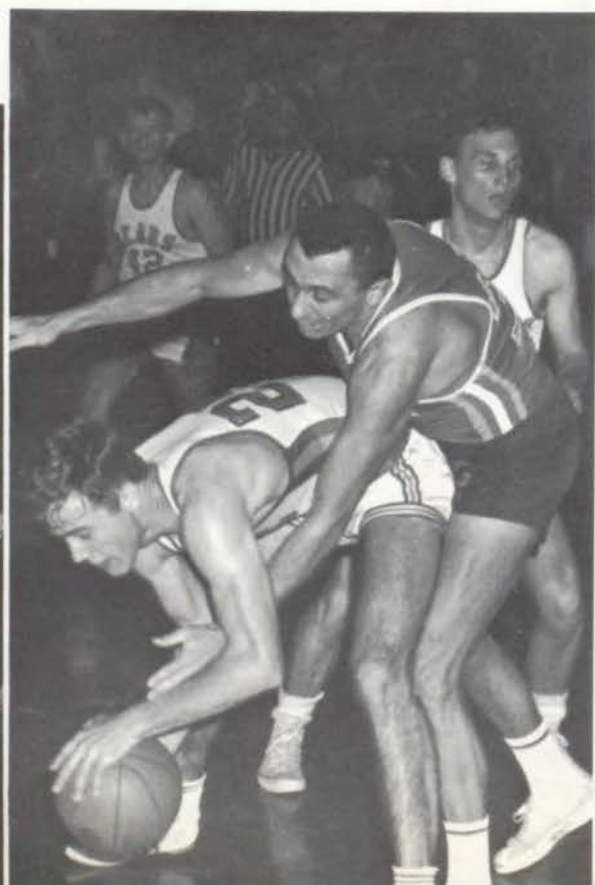

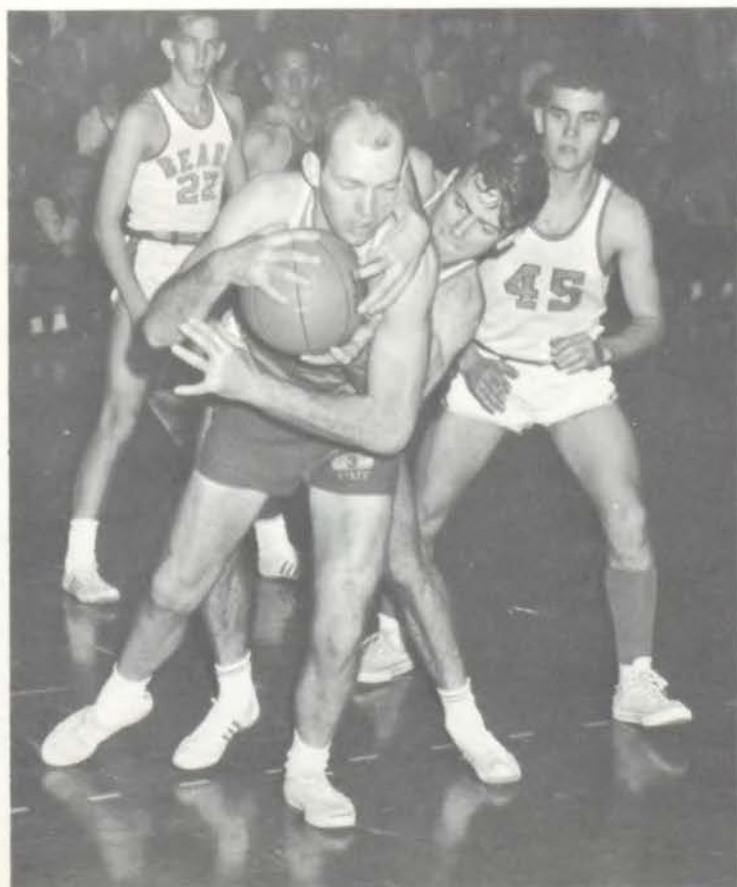

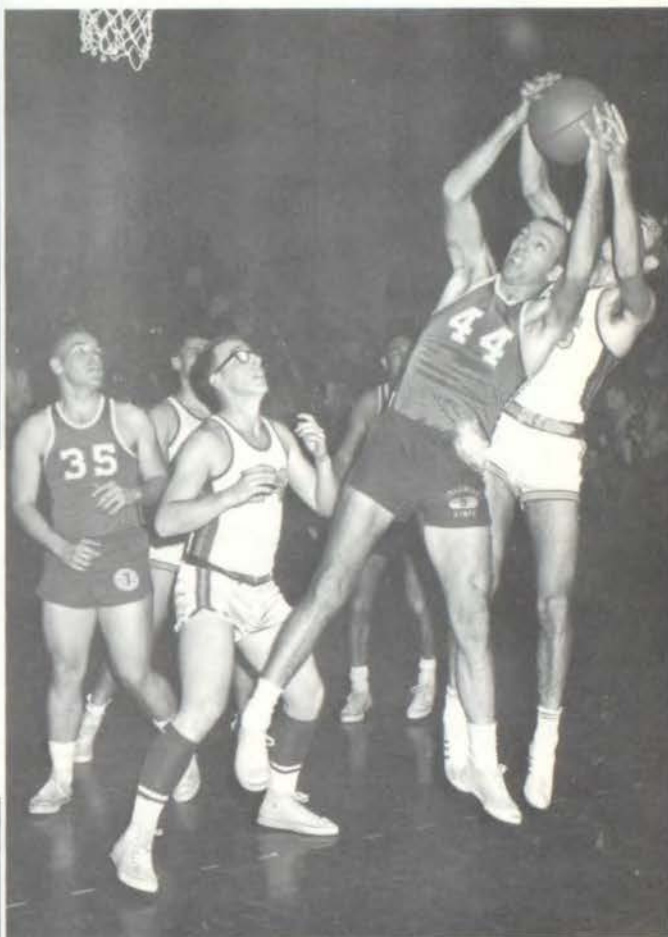

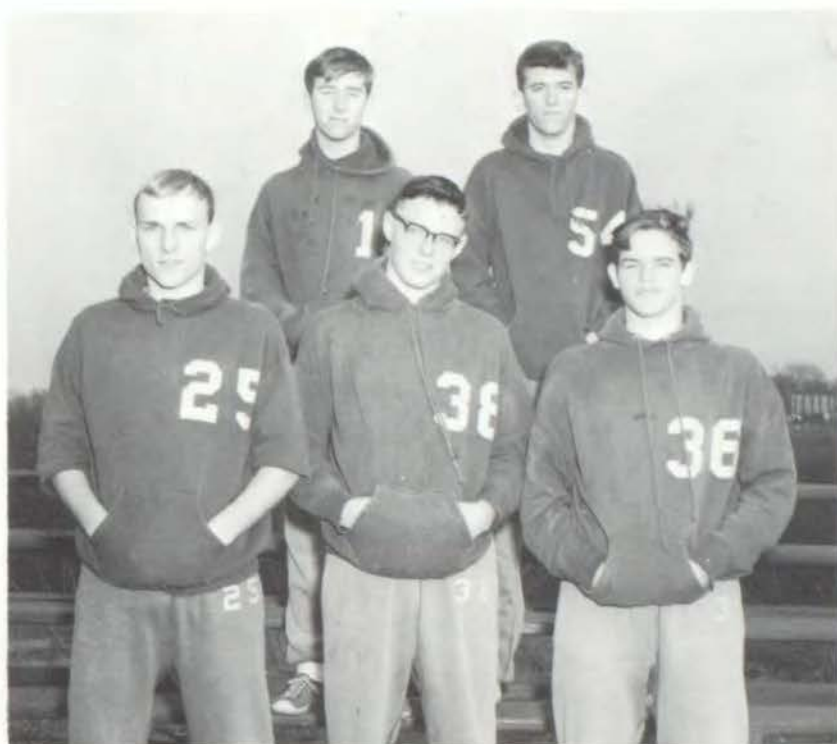

A supervised work experience program offers students an opportunity to apply classroom activities to real situations.

In addition to the opportunity offered the student to observe business and economic conditions first hand, a chance is also offered to develop several on-the-job personality characteristics, as responsibility, social adaptability, promptness and using one's own judgment.

A basic requirement for a student enrolled in the work experience program is that he should have completed a minimum of one unit in business education and be enrolled in a related business education course of secretarial practice or clerical practice at the present time.

The student's past record is examined carefully with special emphasis being placed on attendance for the past three years. His scholastic rating should be an M average. This is done at the end of the junior year before he can be accepted on the program.

His senior year a student must carry four subjects, no study hall, and work the full afternoon. He must maintain the M average with no failures. If for any reason his job is discontinued or he is dismissed, he must spend the full six hours in school.

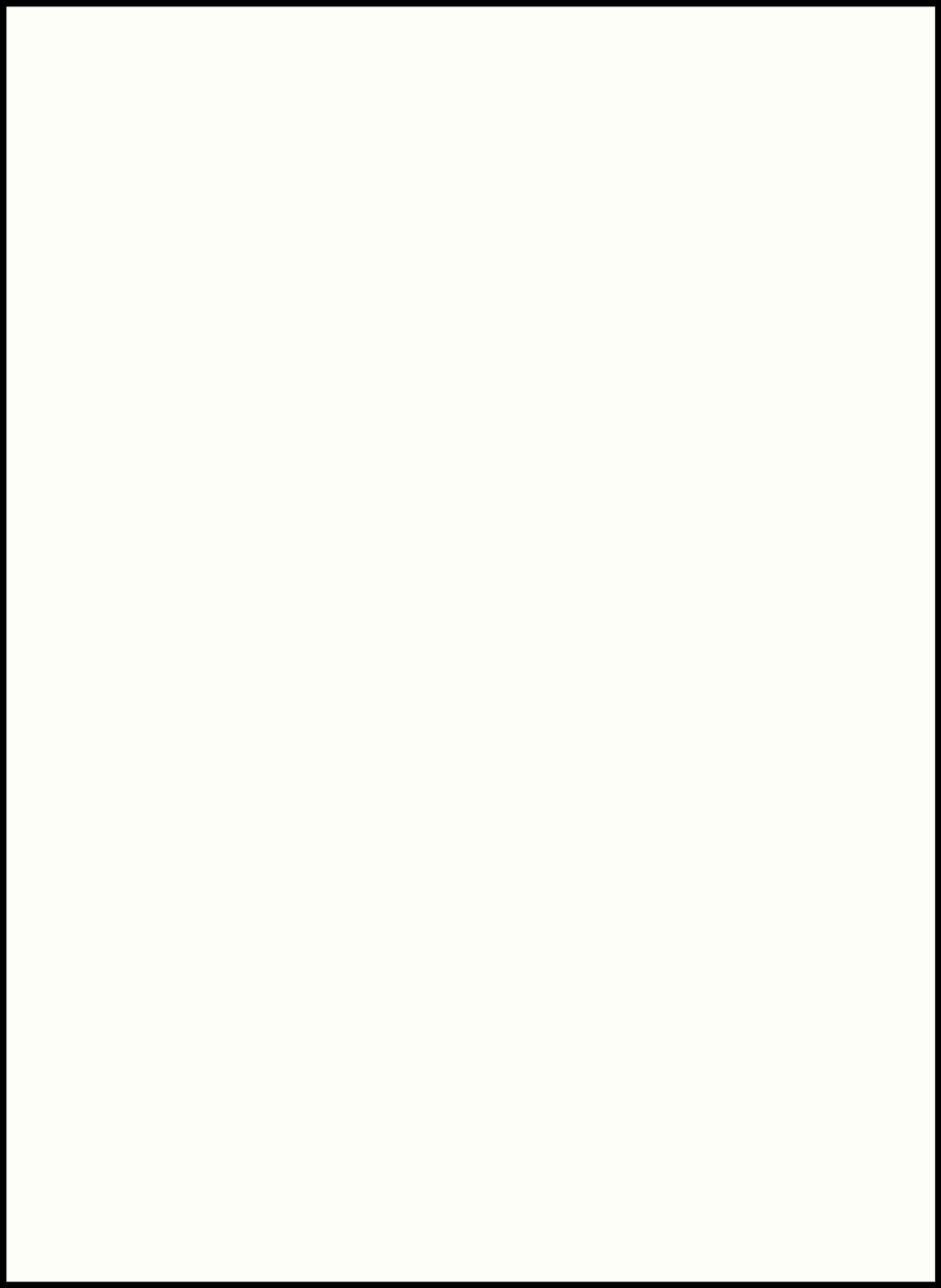

New President—Foreign Minister Giuseppe Saragat (right) was formally notified in Rome on the night of December 28 that he had been elected president of Italy.

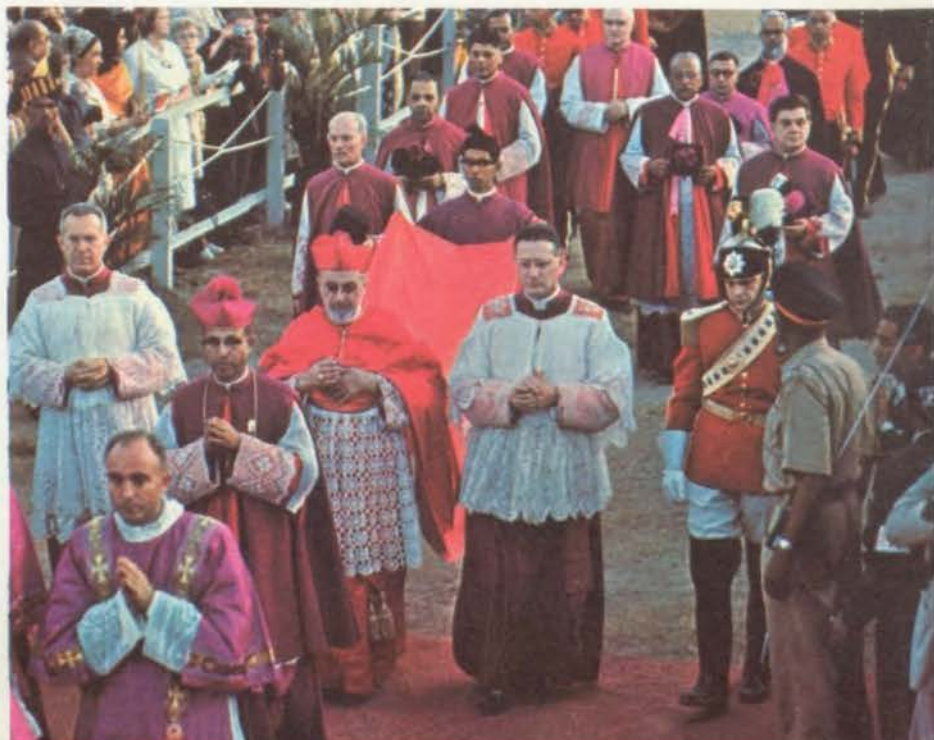
