
For 21 years she referred to Winnetonka as "my school." In the hearts of many, it will always remain that way.
















Former student is first casualty

It didn't seem possible to those who had lived through prior wars, but the United States fought and won the war in the Persian Gulf in the short span of six weeks. And American high school students now know what it's like to fight a war on the homefront.

Winnetonka was one high school that became involved in many ways. Probably the most significant--and certainly the saddest-was that the first casualty of the war was a former Winnetonka student, Lt. Cmdr. Scott Speicher. Speicher was a sophomore at Winnetonka in 1973 when he moved to Florida with his parents. Griffin Rites reporter, Theresa Handrahan, interviewed some of his classmates who remembered Scott as "funny, devoted, hardworking." One friend, Evan Callow, had just visited him in Florida a year and a half ago. "He loved flying," Callow said of Speicher, a jet fighter pilot. "If he wasn't up and flying for more than a week, he would get antsy." Speicher taught a Sunday school class to fourth and fifth graders. Just before he left for the Middle East, says Callow, "he took the kids to the base and let them climb into his jet. They had a good time, and he loved it."

There were many, many other former Winnetonkans who were stationed in the gulf area during the winter of 1991. The twin sons of Mrs. Edna Riehl, cafteria worker, were both fighter pilots. Freshman John White received a phone call from the gulf one day -- it was his brother, Ron, calling to wish him a happy birthday. Nearly everyone, it seemed, had a friend or family member stationed there. At one time, it was believed there were at least 60 Winnetonka graduates in Saudi Arabia.

The war brought back some special memories for junior Sonya Vaughn, whose family lived in Saudi Arabia four years ago. In an article in The Griffin Rites, she recalled the customs of the people she lived among-customs based firmly on the Islamic religion.

And naturally, there were the Saddam Hussein jokes, a lot of them pertaining to the new vocabulary word, Scud, that came from the war.


Most of us will never forget where we were and how we heard when our nation was at war. And some did not forget the troops after the war had ended. Mr. Dan Stanley and Mr. Harold Harbaugh led a drive to get an ice-water fountain installed near the gym. The fountain would be dedicated to those Winnetonka grads who fought in what came to be known as Operation: Desert Storm. Money was collected from students in the cafeteria, and Coach Stanley collected the names of those who fought. The names will be inscribed on a plaque near the fountain.

The war seemed to bring with it a newfound sense of patriotism among the student body and faculty. The pictures on these pages reflect this patriotism and how Winnetonka shared in the war effort.









### Spring comedy teaches lesson about living

You Can't Take It With You, a comedy written in the 1930s by Moss Har and George S. Kaufman, was the spring play for Winnetonka this year.

The play is about an eccentric family, headed by Martin Vanderhof (Scot Grant), who got sick of the "real world" one day and decided to do what he wanted in life. His entire family followed suit, and the result is mayhem. Vanderhof's daughter, Penelope Sycamore (Shannon Snow) divides her time between writing a play and painting a masterpiece. Her husband, Paul (Matt Meeks) and assistant, Mr. DePinna (Jake Watson) keep busy in the basement working with explosives. Daughter Essie (Alicia Smith) practices her ballet all over the house, while her husband (Doug Vaughn) runs a printing press with socialist overtones. 

Angela Lembke, junior, for instance, is her car. She drives that cute, white Volkswagen





Performing at several football games, the band also marched in two local parades. They took home the "crowd pleaser" trophy from the Claycomo Funfest.



The band marched every morning before school, had some afternoon practices, and attended a two-week band camp prior to the start of school. The practice really paid off.


"I'm very pleased," said director Pat Setser.









One question that is usually asked about the wrestling matmaids is, "What exactly do they do?"


A lot more than most would believe. It is not just an easy way to letter, as some might have you believe. On the contrary, matmaids continually prove their worth to players and coaches alike.

"We get a lot of teasing from people, but I think the wrestlers appreciate us, and that's who we do it for," said Sindy Spring, sophomore.



















### Golfers win only match in sudden death playoff


The Winnetonka golf team fared about as well as its football team this year, turning in a scorecard of one win and 11 losses.



Prior to her coming here, she had never heard of Kansas City, and her dream was to go to California. Nevertheless, as a result of her stay here, Katarina says she has changed considerably. She has learned to be more positive and to listen closely to others. And she is much more independent. One of the biggest differences she noted was in comparing her school in Yugoslavia to Winnetonka. There, she says, students have to study more, take numerous tests, and it is not as much fun. Here, Katarina says, "school is not only a place to study, but a place where you learn to socialize through many activities and sports."

Germaine Fonseca also came to Winnetonka through the AFS program. As Kansas City was

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unknown to her in Ecuador, she had hoped to go to Florida. However, she grew to enjoy Kansas City very much. And after a year away from her homeland, she, too, claims to be much more independent. "In Ecuador," said Germaine, "the society is traditional. The schools are strict and so are the rules." She noted that every student there must take a test at the end of the year; if they pass they move on to the next grade. Germaine says she'll miss the dances and sports most of all, because her school does not offer them.

Neri Antepli wanted to come to America through the Education Foundation to Improve her English and to learn of the many things offered in the United States. Just like Katarina and Germaine, she had never heard of Kansas City and thought it was in Texas at first. Some of the biggest differences she found between the United States and her homeland of Germany were the law and the school systems. In Germany, the legal drinking age is 16 and one must be 18 to get a driver's license. As a result, teenagers there ride their bicycles and walk most places. Neri's schoolday in Germany ends at 1:30 everyday with 45 minute classes that only meet every other day. That sounds pretty good to American students until they find out that Neri must also attend school on every second and fourth Saturday. After a year away from home, Neri says she is more grown up and respects her parents more. When she goes home, she will miss our school spirit, dances, and the friends and family she has made here.

Myra Van der Spek, from the Netherlands, made it unanimous, because she too had never heard of Kansas City. (Looks as if our Chamber of Commerce better get a press agent!) Through the Education Foundation, she was able to experience a new culture and become more independent as a result of her stay in Kansas City. She also says she is not as shy as she used to be and is "more open for new things and ideas." High schools in the Netherlands are very different from Winnetonka, according to Myra. There, they have three different levels -- a fouryear, five-year, and six-year high school. The grades a student receives after his first year determines his length of stay. Also, no elective classes are offered-just the basics. Another interesting comparison Myra makes is, "Americans have everything they want."

### After 21 years Winnetonka gets an honor society







### Retirements

### Mr. Richard Eitel

Mr. Eitel retires after 21 years at Winnetonka. One of the founding faculty members, he was here when they opened the doors in March 1971.

### Mrs. Aylene Keown

After a teaching career that spanned 47 years and six decades, another of Winnetonka's original faculty retires this year. And one could say that Mrs. Keown is retiring at the top of her profession, having this year been awarded the Northland Chamber of Commerce Excellence in Teaching Award.

Mrs. Keown was Winnetonka's first journalism teacher and yearbook sponsor, having sponsored publications at Hutchinson (KS) High School for seventeen years. When she and her husband moved to Kansas City in 1968, she began teaching English at Oak Park High School. Then, when Winnetonka opened, she came here. Now she refers to it as "my school."

"What I always remember about Mrs. Keown is she is a tremendous teacher because she has a big vision of life," says Mrs. Mimi Rainen, who team taught with Mrs. Keown for ten years. "She just has a commanding personality."

Why did she stay in teaching so long? The answer is a simple one. "The kids," said Mrs. Keown. "They're all good kids and they needed a teacher." And the students and teachers she has affected over the years will remember her for an eternity. Including those in Albany, Missouri, who will celebrate their 50-year reunion this summer--the first students Mrs. Keown taught.

### Mr. Marvin Nuernberger

Mr. Nuernberger began his 41-year career in a one-room schoolhouse in Nebraska where he not only taught all eight grades, but also cleaned up and kept the furnace going in the winter. Then he'd go home to work on his parents' farm.

During his years with the NKC district, Mr. Nuernberger has also worn many hats. He has taught both industrial arts and business classes (such as he has done at Winnetonka), as well as having been an assistant principal at three different schools and principal at Eastgate Middle School.

From a one-room school to a modern, urban high school, Mr. Nuernberger must have lots of memories--both good and bad. But he only dwells on the good. "Some of the high points is seeing students able to move on with independence in their work after completing the basic knowhow," said Mr. Nuernberger. "I also enjoy returning students-the ones who come back to say hello. It gives me a chance to see how they have grown up."
